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





Small Town Boys Navy Needs More On Texas U. Team Lynn County Men

Seeking a quota of 13 men from Lynn County during October, the Navy Recruiting Service sends an officer to Tahoka for the purpose of interviewing interested men and taking applications.

From about noon until about 4 o'clock in the afternoon, Yeoman Collier Parris of the Navy Recruiting Station at Lubbock is in Tahoka each Monday, prepared to take applications and make preliminary physical examinations, thus saving applicants an extra trip to Lubbock. They may set a date for departure and report to Lubbock on that day, receiving transportation by train at government expense to Dallas for final enlistment.

The recruiting officer may be contacted at the office of the Lynn County News, where Frank Hill is in possession of information and printed data concerning Navy enlistment, and can give the information at any time. He urges, however, that applicants try to meet the recruiting officer each Monday afternoon.

Men enlising in the Navy Construction Regiment, or Seabees, for which there is urgent need just now will be returned to their homes and permitted to continue work for two months or longer before being called into active service. Men with experience as carpenters, cooks, mechanics, electricians, engine operators, road machine operators, etc., may enlist with petty officer ratings. Those without experience may enlist and take up their choice of work, receiving special training. Promotions and advancements are made as quickly as a man qualifies.

Special appeal for Navy enlistment is made to men about to be called up for induction by the selective service system. Men may volunteer for the Navy even after they have been notified to report for induction.


