So children under 16 cannot legally be employed for farm work, such as cotton picking, etc., Sunday, at Mackenzie State Park during local school hours if the farm products concerned go into interstate or foreign commerce.

Farmer's are responsible under the Federal law if they hire Mr. and Mrs. Dan Winn Jr., of under-age children to do farm work during school hours. And resident children and to migratory children.

He said "school hours" means hose hours when school actually s in session for the school disrict where the child under 16 is currently living.

The law, he said, sets no minmum age for employing minors on farms before or after school hours, or during school holidays



Recent years have seen the addition of ferry companies, bridge companies, common motor carriers, turnpikes, oil pipelines, commor carrier pipelines, motor bus companies and many other types of concerns in our rapidly expanding modern transportation sys
