Bulldogs Win Over Seagraves, Denver City Here Tonight

Having won their first Class A conference game at Seagraves last Friday night 13 to 9, Coach Leo Jackson's Tahoka Bulldogs meet an apparently stronger Denver City team here tonight at 9:00 o'clock. The game has been moved back to 9:00 on account of the revival meeting in progress at the Baptist Church.

Denver City, coached this year by Wilson Head, defeated Seagraves by a score of 19 to 0 two weeks ago.

Tahoka and Seagraves were very evenly matched in their game last Friday night, according to Coach Jackson, but the Bulldogs got to rolling in the last quarter and pushed over two touchdowns.

After scrapping through three quarters during which both teams looked good at times, in the middle of the fourth quarter, Halfback Roy Huffaker got away on a 30-yard run for a touchdown, and Bill Woods plunged through the line for the conversion. About three minutes later, Woods plunged over for another touchdown from the 8-yard line.

Both Woods and Huffaker were the backfield stars of the night, while Gene Earl Knight, co-captain with Woods, and Lane Jones, the Sophomore center, looked good in the line.

Denver City and Tahoka will be playing for the lead spot in this district tonight, and the game promises to be one of the best of the season. Seminole, possibly the favorite to win the district championship this year, does not start its conference season until October 8.

Army, Navy Tests Are Offered Here

The second qualifying test for the Army Specialized Training program and the Navy College program V-12 which will be given throughout the country on Tuesday, Nov. 9, will be administered at the Tahoka High School, Supt. W. T. Hines announced today. A pamphlet of general information which contains an admission-identification form may be obtained at the High School.

This form properly filled out will admit to the test students between the ages of 17 and 21, inclusive, who are recent high school graduates or who will be graduated by March 1, 1944. Intend to take the tests should be made known immediately to Leo Jackson, High School principal, in order that the necessary test supplies may be ordered.

The same examination will be taken by both Army and Navy candidates. The examination is designed to test the aptitude and general knowledge required for the program of college training, and all qualified students are urged to take the test. At the time of the test each candidate will be given a choice of service preference, but taking the test does not obligate the candidate to enlist in the service.

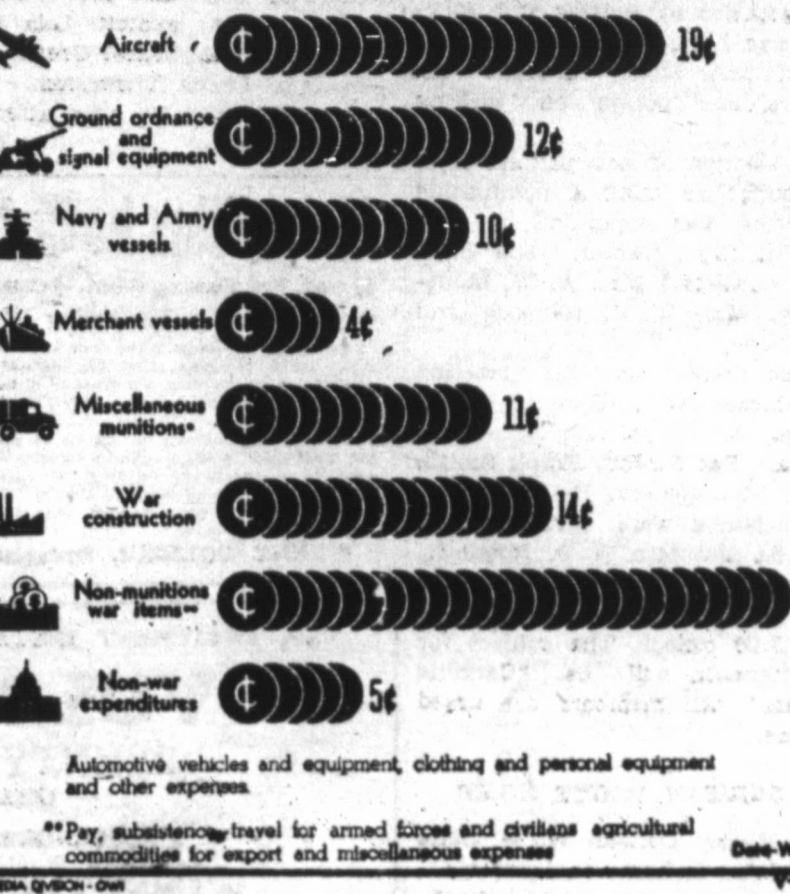
The Army Specialized Training and the Navy College programs enable students to continue academic training at government expense following induction into the armed services. Successful completion of the prescribed courses may, following further officer training, lead to a commission in the Army or the Navy.

Those selected for the Army will, after further screening and basic military training, be sent to college. Students chosen for the Navy program, after selection by the Office of Naval Officer Procurement, will be detailed directly to college. Students who attend college under either of the programs will be under military discipline on active duty in uniform with pay. All expenses, including tuition, food, housing, books, and uniforms will be paid by the Army or the Navy.

Kohler Heads New War Chest Drive

Wallace Kohler has been appointed chairman of the War Fund of Lynn county. It was announced here today. The purpose of the War Fund is to assist our fighting forces through the USO and to supply medical aid and food to the stricken people of the United Nations.

Nationally \$125,000,000 is being raised for these purposes and the Texas quota is \$4,885,000. The quota for Lynn county has not been announced.

Mr. Kohler is local manager of Cicerio Smith Lumber company, and though he has been here only a short time, he has been identified himself with several civic enterprises.

Mr. Kohler is planning a soliciting organization that will reach every person in the county having an income in order that everyone may have an opportunity of helping in this effort. Lynn county is joining forces with all other counties in the state under the state leadership of Geo. A. Butler, state president of the War Chest, and Governor Cokes Stevenson, honorary chairman of the campaign.

Soil Conservation Supervisors Will Be Elected Tuesday

Lynn County Soil Conservation District will elect district supervisors Tuesday night, Oct. 5, in a county-wide election. Land owners are eligible to vote.

The election will be of the convention type, that is, the land owners will gather in conventions in five centers at 8:00 that night and nominate those whom they desire from their respective district, and such nominee or nominees will then be voted on by written ballot.

The election conventions will be held at Wilson, Tahoka, Draw, Wells, and New Home. All of the meeting places are at the school buildings except the Tahoka meeting which will be held in the county court room.

The meeting at Wilson will be conducted by the present supervisor, John Sander. District 2, which meets at Tahoka, by B. J. Emanuel; District 3, at Draw, by R. L. Littlepage; District 4, at Wells, by R. C. Wood; and District 5, at New Home, by Lloyd McCormick, all these men being the present district supervisors.

Landowners residing within Lynn county are eligible to vote in the district in which they own land, and are urged to attend their respective meetings and help elect supervisors.

All landowners should be interested in the conservation of the soil. This is one of the most fertile farming counties in the state of Texas, and plans are being made to keep it that way. Through proper soil conservation measures, this can be done and will be done if landowners are interested enough to cooperate in the soil conservation program, local agricultural workers say.

Waco Pastor Will Conduct Meeting

Extend Bond Drive As Lynn County Fails On Quota

The Third War Loan drive will be extended through Oct 16 on all E, F, and G Bonds, which include those bought by small investors. Lynn county having failed to meet the heavy quota assigned it by the Treasury Department.

Although Lynn county has not reached its quota, in raising nearly \$600,000.00 for the War effort, this county has accomplished more than in any other drive in the county's history.

A total of \$572,296.61 in War Bonds were bought during the month of September up to Thursday.

Of this amount, \$366,945.11 in bonds were sold by Tahoka institutions, \$351,313.86 of which was by the First National Bank.

Wilson made an excellent report, having sold \$148,751.50 in bonds. O'Donnell fell far behind, having reported only \$46,600.00.

Added to Lynn county's total was \$5,000.00 worth of bonds bought by Southwestern Public Service, \$4,000.00 by West Texas Gas company, and \$1,000.00 by Southwestern Associated Telephone company.

Citizens are urged by Deen Nowlin, county chairman, to buy all the bonds possible now, or at least before October 16, in order that Lynn county may meet its quota of \$960,500.00.

Tahoka Man's Son In Sensational Raid

T/Sgt. William A. Glenn, son of W. L. Glenn who is employed at the Fulkerson service station here, recently figured in a heroic raid from an air base in England on the Fiesler aircraft factories in Kassel, Germany, according to press reports published at the time.

Every engine on the Flying Fortress Poisonality, on which T/Sgt. Glenn was the top-turret gunner, was out of operation at one time or another during the raid but she dropped her bombs on the target and got home again in spite of the fact that on the return trip 14 enemy fighters jumped on Poisonality and filled her with holes.

Five members of the crew were wounded, one killed, and two of the engines were put out of commission. A third engine had frozen and the riddled Fortress approached the home land with only one engine running. Luckily, just as this engine was sucking up its last gas, the frozen engine thawed out and a safe landing was made on a half-finished RAF field on the English coast.

While the German fighters were doing their worst, 2nd Lt. William J. Holloway of Tucson, Ariz., navigator, and 2nd Lt. Edward C. Picon of Sayerville, N. J., bombardier, were knocked down and stunned when a shell exploded in the oxygen tank aft of a nose hatch. This shell started a fire which T/Sgt. Glenn and another member of the crew extinguished.

Altogether, four of the attacking German fighters were knocked down out of the air by the Poisonality gunners.

EDMUND MAEKER BUILDS HIS OWN TERRACES

Edmund Maeker of the Wilson vicinity believes in the old adage, "If you want something done, do it yourself."

Plans were completed last spring by engineers for the Soil Conservation Service for terracing and other conservation work on the Maeker farm. County road equipment was used for terracing approximately 100 acres. Lack of repairs made it necessary to stop this work. Results this crop year were so gratifying on the 100 acres that Maeker is now terracing the remainder of his farm with his own equipment. He uses a three-disc plow on one tractor, followed by a second tractor and small blade.

"With my own equipment, I can build nearly a mile of terraces a day," Maeker stated. He is building broad base terraces so that he can farm the tops of the terraces with four-row equipment. His terraces are level with closed ends designed to hold all of the water on the land where it falls.

Maeker says this type of work will prevent his soil washing away and at the same time help him produce more grain and cotton, needed so badly in helping to win the war.
