## A. L. Lockwood, Pioneer and Bank President, Dies

A. L. Lockwood, president of The First National Bank of Tahoka, prominent leader in the Methodist Church here since its organization, and oldest citizen of Lynn county in point of residence here, died at 11:30 o'clock Sunday night in the Lubbock General Hospital, culminating a serious illness of a little more than a week, although he had been in failing health for several months.

In the presence of a great throng of friends and acquaintances, funeral services were conducted in the Methodist Church at 4:00 o'clock Monday afternoon by Rev. H. A. Nichols, the pastor, assisted by Rev. H. Hardy of Tahoka and Rev. H. C. Smith of Big Spring, former pastors. Eight years ago, it was stated, Mr. Lockwood had asked Brother Smith to come and speak at his funeral whenever that might be and wherever Brother Smith might be at the time.

Upon being notified of Mr. Lockwood's death, Brother Smith accordingly immediately canceled other engagements and came. He paid a sincere and beautiful tribute to Mr. Lockwood as a loyal Christian and as his own best friend. The Scripture reading was by Brother Nichols and prayer was offered by Brother Hardy. A wealth of flowers surrounded the bier and adorned the church.

The Harris Funeral Home had charge of funeral arrangements and directed the burial in the Tahoka cemetery. Active pallbearers were Walter Slaton, Pete Hegi, Coy Fielder, J. K. Applewhite, W. E. (Happy) (Cont'd. on last page)

## Geo. Neill In Race For Representative

Judge George W. Neill, one of the progressive, far-sighted men, who had the nerve to come to the "Far West" in the early years of this century and to undertake to build a town out on the "desert"—and succeeded—was here Monday shaking hands with a few old friends and making as many new ones as possible, for he is a candidate for the office of representative in the Legislature for the next term.

Brownfield consisted of just a few shacks and dug-outs when young Neill fought his way through the sand and the sage brush to that village in 1906 and hung out his shingle as an Attorney-at-Law in front of one of the shacks.

Neill and a few other brave souls in spite of sandstorms, prairie dogs, and rattlesnakes, stuck it out, and in a few years a real town began to emerge. In the absence of a regular chamber of commerce, Neill and two or three others acted, as such themselves and never ceased to boost for their town and county.

They were always willing and ready to help other towns in time of need too. Neill recalled Monday that Tahoka on one occasion had a big fire, and called for help. He and a few others climbed into an automobile—which was still a novelty at that time—and hit the trail through the bushes for Tahoka. The town had no water works, and so he and his companions joined Tahoka's bucket brigade, and they succeeded in saving the Stokes Hotel that stood then just north of the present Agriculture building.

So Neill has come up the hard way, and he knows this country from scratch. Now he wants to represent the fine people of this district in the legislature. The home people have honored him many times. He served several terms as county judge and county attorney of Terry county. He also operated an abstract business for a number of years. At times he has helped old Andy Jack Stricklin fill up that Terry County Herald.

Neill says he has no hobbies to run on. He just wants to be an honest, conservative, common-sense legislator, and he is asking his friends, old and new, to pull for him.

His name appears this week in our candidate list, and it will stay there till the votes are counted.

## 67 County Men Enter Services

Sixty-seven men left Tahoka Wednesday morning to be inducted into the armed forces of the United States, 37 for the Army and 30 for the Navy and the Marine Corps.

A number of married men, some with one or more children, were included in the group, but a majority of them were unmarried.

The names of the inductees were not available for publication this week, but we hope to have them next week.

## Joe Gill Is Killed In Glider Crash

Flight Officer Ernest E. "Joe" Gill, 27, formerly of Tahoka, died Monday noon at South Plains Army Air Field hospital from injuries received Friday while on a routine training flight.

F/O Albert C. Wyatt of Houston died in the crash. Joe, as he was known here, was an instructor in glider training at the base. The accident occurred at the Idalou auxiliary field as the plane, piloted by Joe's student, was coming in for a landing.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 2:00 p. m. at Rix Funeral Home in Lubbock, and the body was taken to Pence Lake, New Mexico Wednesday for burial.

Joe was a popular student while in Tahoka High School, where he graduated in 1936, and was a star football player. Following graduation here, he attended Howard Payne College one year and University of New Mexico two years. He entered the Army in September, 1941, and had been at the Lubbock field since January, 1943.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. I. Gill formerly of Tahoka, now living at Pence Lake, N. M.; three brothers, Tom Gill, local Santa Fe agent; Francis Gill, Slaton; and D. W. Gill, Lubbock. The three brothers left Lubbock Wednesday for Pence Lake to attend burial rites.

## Help Needed On Surgical Dressings

Lynn county's March-April quota of Red Cross surgical dressings having just now arrived, Mrs. Era Stewart, county dressings chairman, is appealing to women of the county to help fold them. The quota is 7,200 4x8 dressings and 9,000 4x4 dressings.

Women volunteers are requested to report on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays for work from 2:00 to 5:00 p. m., or on Tuesday night for work from 8:00 to 10:00.

## Cold Wave Brings Mist, Sleet, Snow

## Lt. (jg) Billy Hancock Tells of Drive Against Japs Over Islands In Pacific

Lt. (jg) Norman B. (Billy) Hancock, one of Lynn county's heroes of the Pacific air wars, has been here the past two weeks visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. N. Hancock of near New Home, his wife, the former Miss Betty Neil Smith of Ropesville, a teacher in Lubbock High School, and other relatives and friends.

Billy wears the Purple Heart medal for wounds received in action, and has been recommended for the Distinguished Flying Cross and two Air Medals for action in the Pacific while flying a Hellcat fighter plane from a Navy aircraft carrier. He will leave shortly for the East Coast, and expects to be sent back to a war front soon.

Billy has had many exciting experiences, and twice he has been featured in news dispatches from the battle zone.

He participated in the action at Tarawa in the Gilberts, in the Marshall Islands campaign, flew over Jap-held Kaviang, New Ireland, was in on raids over the Jap naval base at Truk and other Caroline Islands, and took part in air raids on the Marianas, and met the Japs also over Guam.

Billy has flown with attack forces to within less than 1,000 miles of Tokyo, and, in fact, has been at least a thousand miles closer to Japan than to our own nearest big base at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.

Lt. Billy says except at Tarawa,

where the fighting was terribly fierce and our losses of personnel large, we have had complete mastery of the situation wherever the task force to which he was attached went—and they were really going places to the broad expanses of the Pacific.

As pilot of a Hellcat fighter, he flew escort missions with bombers. Many times there was little opposition, or our planes had such superiority in numbers and in the surprise that the enemy could not make an effective defense. Other times, the going was a little rough.

For instance, on one raid his plane had been hit and was leaking oil badly. Two Zeros came in for the kill, but Billy dove into the ack-ack fire and managed to get back to his carrier.

He was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for action in his last mission in the Pacific, in which he brought down two Jap bombers.

Raymond Clapper, the noted news correspondent, was aboard the same carrier on which Billy was stationed, and Billy was well-acquainted with him. Clapper met his death when the plane he was flying in plunged into the sea a short distance from the carrier.

Like most other fighting men, Lt. Hancock is modest in speaking of his experiences, but Associated Press dispatches had told of his action before his arrival home.

Having bought a farm, I feel it is to my best interest to look after it as soon as I complete this term of office."

## Leave Waste Paper At County Building

Those having or collecting waste paper for contribution to the Red Cross are hereby advised that we have instructions that this paper must be tied into bundles of practically uniform size, not weighing more than 20 pounds. Magazines and newspapers should be tied into separate bundles.

These bundles should not be dumped out on the ground outside the Red Cross building but should be placed inside. The south door of the south room is never fastened. If the screen door is latched, the hand can be inserted and the latch lifted. The wind mutilates and scatters papers left outside, and it has been necessary to burn quite a quantity of such papers.

## Grassland Man Is Found Dead In Car

R. W. Babb, 58, residing about four miles southeast of Grassland and a long-time citizen of that community, was found dead in his car near his home at an early hour last Saturday morning. The discovery of the dead body was made by one of Mr. Babb's nephews and a companion as they were returning from Post at about 2:00 o'clock in the morning.

Noticing a car light which remained stationary, they decided to investigate. They found that the car had gone into the ditch alongside the road and that a dead body, which proved to be that of Mr. Babb, was in the car. One of his hands was still clutching the steering wheel. It is believed that he suffered a sudden heart attack and died almost instantly, as he is said to have suffered from previous attacks.

Mr. Babb, it seems, had driven to the home of a neighbor Friday night to spend a few hours while some young folks were having an entertainment in his home. He left the neighbor's at about 12 o'clock apparently well.

Funeral services were conducted Sunday afternoon in Post Baptist Church by Rev. D. W. Reed, Rev. H. C. Bristol, and Rev. Lynn Lemon. Deceased was a member of Central Baptist Church. The body was buried in the Post cemetery.

Attending the funeral services from Tahoka were E. J. Cooper and his daughter, Mrs. P. A. Nowlin, long-time friends of deceased and his family, and possibly other friends from Tahoka.

### Tests Made Here For Bang's Disease

Dewey S. Lavender, progressive Lynn county farmer of Route 3, O'Donnell, whose farm lies between T-Bar and Wells communities, has been very active in organizing a group of farmers of these communities in order to get their dairy cattle tested for Bangs disease, the disease of dairy cattle which results in humans becoming affected with undulant fever through the drinking of milk given by cows having the disease.

Several people in Lynn county are now affected with undulant fever as a result. Through the cooperation of Mr. Lavender, in organizing a group of 14 farmers and with the assistance of the County Agricultural Agent, 92 head of dairy cattle were tested on Friday, March 24. Of the number tested, seven cows were found to be reactors and five others to be suspicious.

Farmers who participated in the cooperative activity were: D. S. Lavender, W. R. Ledbetter, L. E. Fleming, Joe Waldrep, W. J. Jordan, Lloyd Edwards, Carl Sanders, Lamar McLaurin, C. C. Coffee, J. M. Pierce, R. A. Weatherby, A. Pendleton, and Bertice Askew, all of the T-Bar and Wells communities. Dr. C. V. Cox, veterinarian, made the tests.

By virtue of the farmers cooperation among themselves, the County Agricultural Agent was able to secure a substantial saving for the farmers both in the cost per head for the actual testing and eliminating entirely the mileage generally charged by veterinarians when making individual farm calls. The farms were clustered in the communities allowing the veterinarian to move rapidly from farm to farm testing

### Dickens Twin Child Is Taken By Death

Donnie Jean Dickens, one of the twin infants of Mr. and Mrs. Rex Dickens of Draw, died in the Frazier Hospital in Lamesa at 2:00 o'clock Sunday afternoon. Donnie Jean and a twin sister, Bonnie Dean, were born in the Tahoka Clinic on October 31, 1943. Donnie Jean was very frail at the time of birth and for several weeks was kept in the Lamesa hospital. Then she was brought home but her health never improved to any substantial degree, and she was taken back to the hospital soon after the first of the month. The health of the other twin as been excellent from birth.

In addition to the twin sister, two other children survive, Edith, 16, and Jesse, 11. One other boy died a few years ago.

Surviving are the parents, and the grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Jess Brigrance of Draw, and other relatives.

The family have the sincere sympathy of hosts of friends.



### Native Party Highlight Of South Sea Island

One of the highlights of South Sea island of Samoa is the tofa party, staged especially for the war-bound U. S. marines.

Tofa (accented on the fa) is the native word for good-by, and a tofa party is the customary farewell tossed for Leathernecks stationed there who have received orders to move on to other areas.

The floor of a hut or tent is generally the locale of a tofa party. A fire bucket is used for a mixing container and a bayonet to chop the ice. The marines sit on the floor and drink refreshments from their canteen cups, or directly from the fire bucket.

When taps blow and the lights go out, the party moves into the "boondocks" (jungles) to the fale (house) of the nearest native chief. If the departing marine has been friendly with the natives, the chief will order a kave (drinking ceremony) and siva-siva (dance).


Samoaans enjoy parties as much as marines, and the jungle tofas sometimes last until daybreak.



The negro should be educated and trained in those lines of work which he is best fitted by nature to do.

Prime Minister Winston Churchill strongly intimated in his speech last Sunday that the long-talked-of invasion of western Europe is close at hand. Americans should steel themselves to the certainty that such an invasion will be the beginning of a very bloody struggle. It means that many thousands of American soldiers are going to march into the very jaws of death. But they can take it, and they are going to win at the close of the struggle.

Headlines that have never been used by this paper might be "School Child Killed by Motorist Passing Bus," and may they never be used! Yet, just a few days ago an accident that would have been fatal to a school child of Tahoka was averted by apparently nothing less than Supreme intervention.

One of the school buses had stopped at a regular stopping place and was unloading as usual, when a young man with an ego or a don't care attitude attempted to drive a farm tractor in top road gear by the bus. This was attempted without the least apparent thought of slowing down, not to mention stopping, as per the state law. Fortunately, this young man saw a child that was alighting from the bus just in time to swerve the heavy machine and avoid running her down. The machine was being driven at a speed beyond the possibility of stopping in such a short distance and a quick swerve was all that saved the child's life.

The young man, after having been stopped by the bus driver, displayed a marked state of impiety and complained about the school children getting in his way.

It seems as though operators of motor driven vehicles are becoming a little careless and unthoughtfully developing a disregard for the lives of our school children. When a school bus is stopped for the purpose of unloading or loading children, all motorists are supposed to stop and wait until the bus is under way before passing. This is not unreasonable; it is very sensible and thoughtful to do so.

The Tahoka school buses travel almost 100,000 miles per year transporting our children to and from school, and the record, as far as safety is concerned, is good. Let us keep it that way, and never be forced to use the headlines mentioned above.

### Wilson Is Offering Canning Instruction

Recognizing the continued necessity for placing emphasis on food preservation, Wilson public school officials have completed arrangements for setting up a canning instruction center with sufficient facilities to process the major portion of the garden products of those citizens who do not have adequate

equipment or knowledge to do the job correctly.

C. O. Head, superintendent, has announced that Nolan J. Robnett, Vocational Agriculture Teacher, will have general supervision of the project, and that the school board will provide instructors with training and experience in canning to assist local victory gardeners lay away a supply of home grown food.

Each individual using the canning facilities will furnish his own cans and produce. The equipment, heat, water, and other essential items will be furnished free to patrons of the canning instruction center.

Funds for the service are made available through the State Board for Vocational Education, Austin. It is hoped by local officials that this opportunity for conserving food for victory will not be passed by, and that pantry shelves in our community will sag with weight of canned food put up under the supervision of capable instructors, following intelligent canning budget plans.

Meetings to discuss setting up a canning budget will be held Thursday nights at 8:30 p. m. in the Vocational Agriculture room at the Wilson school. Those needing help in canning or planning a canning program are urged to attend.

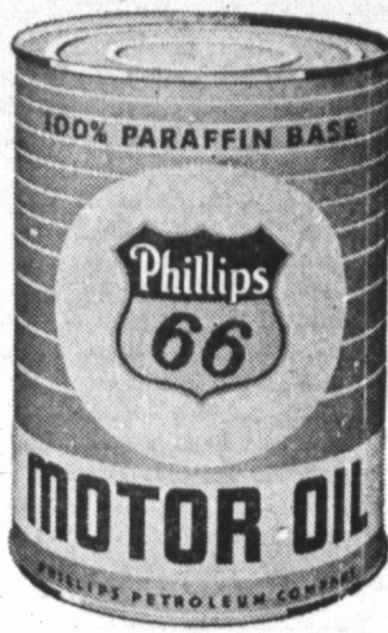

## Lockwood . . .

(Continued from page one)

Smith, Maurice Small, C. O. Carmack, and D. W. Gagnat.

The list of honorary pallbearers included Geo. W. Small, L. C. Haney, R. C. Wood, John Evans, C. A. Thomas, W. H. May, C. H. Cain, W. E. Suddarth, W. S. Anglin, Wynne Collier, Buel Draper, R. W. Fenton Jr., J. S. Weatherford, and perhaps others.

Mr. Lockwood, 76 years of age and a native Texan, was born in Burnett county on October 18, 1867. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Lockwood, he was one of eight brothers and four sisters. None of the brothers and only one of the sisters survive him, Mrs. Mattie Taylor, whose home for years has been in Saskatchewan, Canada, but who resides temporarily in Amarillo. She was here for the funeral. Also surviving and present were two nieces, Miss Annie McDonald of Amarillo and Mrs. Davie Wood of Lubbock. Three nephews, brothers of Mrs. Wood, and sons of one of Mr. Lockwood's brothers, who also reside at or near Lubbock, were present. Also here was a nephew of Mrs. Lockwood and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Brent of Wichita Falls.

Thomas Lockwood and family removed from Burnett to Scurry county in 1880, when the son, Anderson, or "Anse" as he was familiarly called by his intimate friends, was about thirteen years of age. The boy and others of the children attended school in Snyder for several years, and in 1886, at the age of 18, the youth came on up to Lynn county and procured a job as a cowhand on a ranch. That was about seventeen years before Lynn county was organized and before the town of Tahoka was laid out. In the meantime, the young man acquired some ranch property of his own, and the North addition to the city of Tahoka was built on land he had owned. He helped to organize the county and to establish the county seat.

He helped to organize the First National Bank of Tahoka in 1907 and was one of the original stockholders. A few years later he became president of the institution, a position which he held until his death.

In 1908, he was married to Miss Ione Baxter in Washington, D. C.

bringing his bride to Tahoka with him. She was a sister of the late Mrs. W. F. Petty. The couple have spent their entire married life in Tahoka. Mr. Petty was a prominent ranchman and was one of the first county commissioners of Lynn county.

Mr. Lockwood was in many ways an outstanding man and he left an

indelible impress upon the economic, political, and religious life of Lynn county. Long will he be remembered by her citizenship.

Mrs. E. S. Davis returned from Los Angeles. She had been visiting her daughters, Mmes. Owen D. Field and Mildred Bumpass, since January.
