## Lyntegar Adds 150 Miles of Lines in Four Counties

Approximately 150 miles of rural electric lines have been activated in the past six weeks by the Lyntegar Electric Cooperative, Inc., which has headquarters in Tahoka, according to Garland Pennington, manager.

Extensions include about 50 miles in one Terry county project, and numerous short extensions in Lynn, Garza, and Dawson counties. Applications for further extensions have been approved and will be made as materials are available.

The REA project now serves 2,287 customers by 800 miles of lines in seven counties, Pennington says. The counties are: Lynn, Terry, Hookley, Garza, Dawson, Borden and Martin.

Lyntegar is said to be one of the most efficient and most successful electric co-operatives in the nation, and is the largest one in this section of the state. It started in 1939 with only 147 miles of lines and about 360 members.

John Heck of Wilson is president of the co-operative and Graham Hensley is secretary.

## Pantex Is Planning Show in Tahoka

R. J. Wheeler of the Public Relations office of the Pantex Ordnance Plant of Amarillo was a Tahoka visitor last week and made arrangements for a public demonstration of its products at some date in August to be set.

While here he contacted Fred McGinty and Winston Wharton, president and secretary respectively of the Rotary Club, and it was tentatively agreed that he should appear on the Rotary program on August 17 and give the public demonstration on Saturday following. Definite announcement will be made later.

The Pantex Ordnance Plant was constructed in 1942 as one of the Government-owned facilities for loading ammunition for our Armed Forces. Ground was broken on March 27, 1942, and in the remarkably short time of five months and 21 days the load lines were ready to begin operations. The Certainseed Products Corporation had received the contract for operating this ordnance facility and was ready to take over, and on Sept. 17, 1942, the first bomb rolled off the production line.

The plant covers an area roughly four miles by six miles, located 17 miles northeast of Amarillo.

The Corporation has been able to meet its production schedules and furthermore have developed improvements in bomb and shell loading procedures resulting in noteworthy reduction in cost and man hours.

Two types of bombs and one type of shells are loaded at Pantex. One bomb is the general-purpose demolition bomb used by our Air Forces in the 500-lb. size, the bomb that sank about 39 Japanese transports and cargo ships in the Macassar Straits. The other is the 23-lb. fragmentation bomb used by the Air Forces against enemy personnel and their supplies.

To take care of intra-plant movement of materials and personnel there are 234 trucks and cars, 70 miles of paved roads and streets, and 30 miles of industrial rail lines.

Working conditions at the plant compare favorably with those of any other industry. The wage and salary structure is based around certain key jobs found comparable to others in the Panhandle area. Ninety percent of the labor needed is for inexperienced help. Women as well as men can be used on the load lines, and a large number of women are employed.

In contrast to many other county Democratic conventions held over Texas Saturday, Lynn county's convention was a very tame affair. Only about 15 people were in attendance, predominantly pro-Roosevelt.

Delegates elected to the state convention in Dallas on Sept. 12, were instructed to vote for such a change in the state organization which will make it harmonious with the administration.

Only two of three of the county's precincts are said to have held conventions prior to the county convention, and a majority of the 15 present were from Dixie and Tahoka.

## Mahon Seaker At Baptist Church

Upon invitation of the pulpit committee, Congressman George Mahon spoke at the Baptist Church at the morning worship hour last Sunday, taking for his subject Our World Tomorrow.

Asserting that our world tomorrow will be very different from the world we had prior to this great conflict, he called attention to a number of physical and material changes now being made that will make our world different. Among these he mentioned the super-highways that are to be constructed, air transportation, new means of destroying insect pests that will make our homes more sanitary, extension of electric lighting and power lines to practically every home in America, and other important and far-reaching changes.

He also predicted that steps would be taken to prevent a recurrence of such conflicts as we now have and to preserve the peace of the world.

But, he contended, all these material changes, all these progressive steps, all the means that we may provide for the peace of the world will not be sufficient to make our world of tomorrow a peaceful and a happy world unless we take God into our calculations and the great fundamental principles set forth in the Bible as our guiding principles.

The Bible, he declared, holding one aloft, is the only thing that can save the world.

Quite a number of visitors from other churches and even out-of-town visitors were present to hear the address, and many gathered around him to offer their congratulations at the close of the service.

He was accompanied by Mrs. Mahon, who was a teacher in the Tahoka public schools under Supt. H. P. Caviness at the time of their marriage almost twenty years ago and Mr. Caviness was in charge of the service and introduced the speaker Sunday morning.

The couple were dinner guests of Mr. and Mrs. Garland Pennington.

## Combat Medal For Lt. Corbin Douthit

With the Ninth Division in France —Lt. William Corbin Douthit, Tahoka, Texas, has been awarded the newly created Combat Infantryman badge for action in North Africa, Sicily, and on the Cherbourg Peninsula in France.

The Ninth Division saw its first action in North Africa, fighting its way through Maknassy, and was the first infantry unit to enter Bizerte. Later the Ninth fought in Sicily as part of Lt. Gen. George S. Patton's Seventh Army. The Ninth then moved to England to prepare for invasion of the continent. It landed on the beaches of Normandy early in the invasion, and was one of the first to enter Cherbourg.

Lt. Douthit, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Douthit, is a graduate of Tahoka High School and Texas Tech, following which he was grade school principal at Draw. Entering the Army Jan. 29, 1942, he trained at Fort Sill and Camp Walters, and was commissioned at Fort Deming, Ok., Aug. 8, 1942. He sailed overseas about Sept. 25, 1942, and was promoted to First Lieutenant in June, 1943. His wife, Helen, lives at Lubbock.

Lt. Robert Maddox with the Army Transport Command in the Pacific writes his parents, Mr. and Mrs. B. P. Maddox, that it looks as though the war in the Pacific will be over much sooner than he had anticipated. Robert is a navigator on a transport plane.

## W. G. Cole, Draw, Died Last Friday

William G. Cole, almost 76, died at 11:05 o'clock last Friday morning at the home of his nephew, Louis McKay, in the Draw community of a heart ailment.

The body was prepared for burial by Harris Funeral Home here and a Harris ambulance left with the body Friday night for Athens, Henderson county, former home of the aged man, where it was expected funeral services would be held Sunday. The body was to be buried beside the grave of a daughter who was burned to death a few years ago.

Mr. and Mrs. McKay and children and Mrs. McKay's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Cook, accompanied the remains to Athens.

Mr. Cole had been a resident of this county only a few months, having come out from Henderson county in March to make his home with the McKays. He became seriously ill of a heart ailment about a week preceding his death. Born on August 28, 1868, Mr. Cole lacked only one month of being 76 years of age. His wife preceded him in death many years ago, and a few years ago his only daughter met a tragic death by fire, and it was Mr. Cole's desire that his remains be interred beside her grave.

## '44 Crops Promise To Be Excellent

Scarcely ever have Lynn county crops been more promising at this time of the year than they are just now. Much of the feed is heading out and is now maturing. An excellent yield, throughout the county seems assured.

Cotton, which was already thrifty, has grown as if by magic since the recent soaking rain. Some of it is thigh high and the remainder of it has had a good growth and is fruiting well. Of course cotton pests, destructive hail storms, and even hot winds offer a continual threat to the crop until it has matured but if none of these calamities come, the chances are for a very excellent yield.

The hot weather of last week, following the soaking rain, was especially fine for cotton. The temperature here Wednesday of last week, according to the government thermometer kept by The News registered a high of 100 degrees, on Thursday a high of 101 degree and on Friday a high of 101.

## Tahoka Schools Open August 28; Buildings Ready

Tahoka schools will open the 1944-45 term on August 28, according to plans made by local school officials.

The high school building is being renovated and repaired, windows and other woodwork are being painted, the grade school building has been thoroughly reconditioned and it is expected that everything will be completely ready for the opening August 28 of what is hoped and expected will be another successful term for the Tahoka schools.

Due to inability to secure the proper site, as well as the unavailability of all material and the hesitancy of Federal and State officials to approve the plans, the colored school is not taking shape as fast as the school board had hoped. However, members of the board state they still have hopes and intentions of having the colored school built in time for most of the coming school term.

All high school students who will be entering the Tahoka schools for the first time are asked to have their transcripts sent to Mr. Leo Jackson, high school principal, before school opens in order that they may be evaluated and in order that there will be no delay in registration. Student may thereby have better opportunity, too, of getting to take the subjects they wish to take.

## Tahoka Schools Drop Agriculture

Since Tom H. Seay, vocational agriculture teacher for the past two years, resigned recently to accept employment elsewhere, the Tahoka school board has decided to drop vocational agriculture for the coming year because a suitable teacher can not be located.

Of course, this means that all activities of the vocational agriculture department are also dropped for the year, the News is informed. School officials wish to emphasize to parents that as of this date, there are no school sponsored activities of the agriculture department planned or anticipated.

Students will not lose any agriculture credits they may have earned and there will be ample sciences offered this year to care for all students.

## East-West Bus Line Service Improved

Greatly improved bus service became available to the people of Tahoka and Lynn county Tuesday when West Texas Transportation company began two schedules each way east and west through Tahoka.

John D. Harvey, operating manager, Eastland, was here Thursday of last week making preliminary plans for the added service.

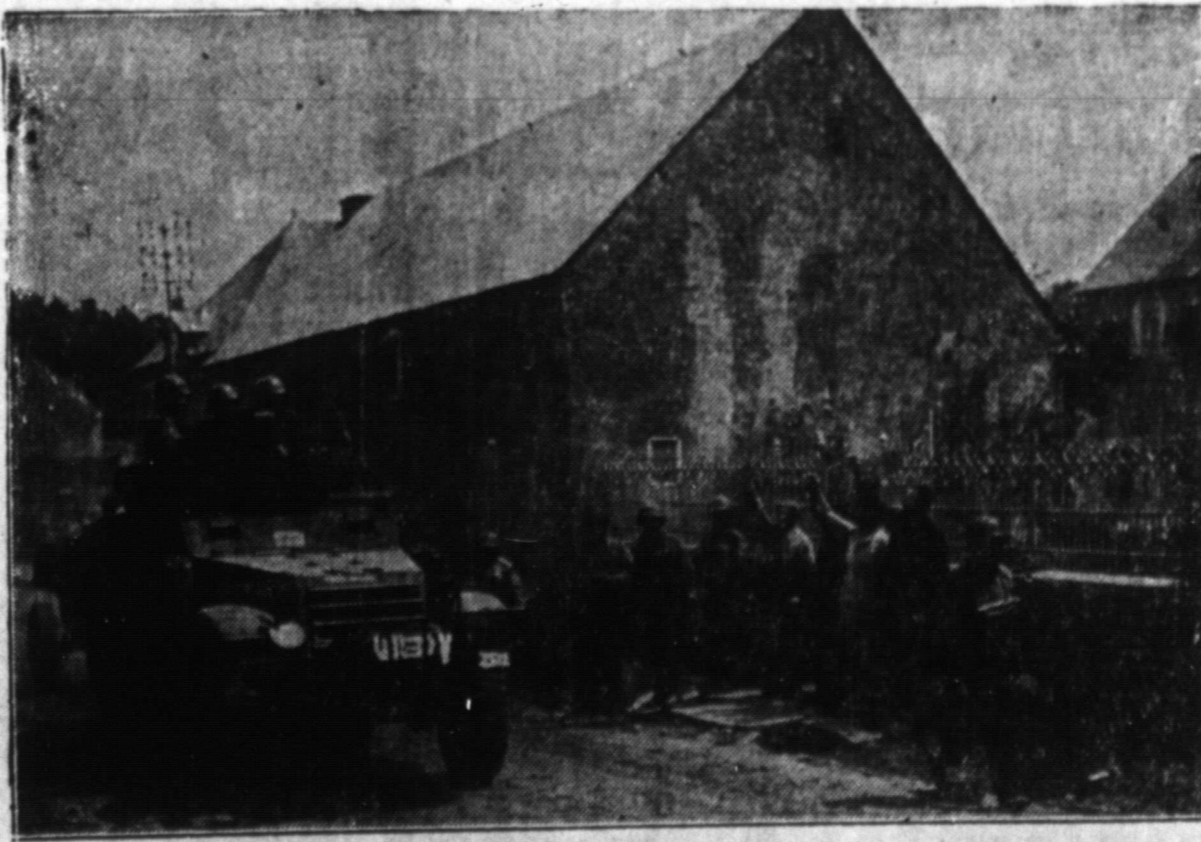
Buses leave Tahoka going east each day at 8:15 a. m. and at 12:20 p. m. West-bound buses leave Tahoka at 12:10 p. m. and 6:30 p. m.

West Texas buses now bring quick service to such centers as Fort Worth, Dallas, Waco, Houston, Austin, San Antonio, and El Paso.

For example, the schedule permits a person leaving Tahoka at 8:15 a. m. to be in Fort Worth at 8:08 that afternoon, or in Waco at 3:34 that afternoon, or in San Antonio shortly after midnight. Leaving on the 12:20 p. m. bus, one should be in Fort Worth at 10:58 that night. Leaving Tahoka at 6:30 p. m. on the westbound bus, one may be in El Paso next morning at 5:00 o'clock.

Passenger bus service has long been inconvenient in Tahoka to many patrons, and citizens will appreciate the improvement in service brought by this new transportation company. Patronage of the company will help Tahoka in numerous ways.

Although re-nominated by a vote approximately two to one over his opponent, George Mahon's majority in the recent primary election was proportionately much smaller than usual. Many good people, we understand, opposed him because he failed to prevent some of the higher-ups in Washington from adopting and executing a policy respecting feed that was very hurtful to farmers and stockmen in this section of the country. We are sure that George Mahon did all that was reasonably possible for him to do to prevent and to defeat the execution of this foolish program, but whether he did or not we do not feel that he should be blamed for the mistakes and the folly of those who instituted and executed the program. They and their higher-ups should get the blame for that. George Mahon is just one of about 450 congressmen. He is not President of the United States nor the head of any bureau or department of the government. Let's be fair and place the blame where it belongs.

The Columbia (S. C.) Record is quoted as saying in its issue of last Thursday that James F. Byrnes of that state, war mobilization director, plans to quit his job as "assistant president" at the end of this year or earlier. Byrnes, the paper claims, went to the Chicago Democratic convention with 750 of

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the convention votes pledged to him as the nominee for vice-president but "withdrew his name after party leaders bowed to the will of Sidney Hillman, CIO political boss." We certainly think that the Democratic party has gotten itself into a shameful mess when its leaders must bow to the will of the erstwhile Communist leader in this country. The Communists and the CIO labor unions have never let an opportunity pass to insult the South, abuse it and lie about it, because it has staunchly opposed every scheme of the Communists and the CIO to gain control of this country. Such men as James F. Byrnes and other Southern statesmen were put on the CIO-Communist black list a long time ago, and now it seems that the so-called Democratic party has approved the list and slapped the South also. We are wondering if the South will do anything about it.

**SURVIVORS ELIGIBLE TO BENEFITS FOR AGED**

Lubbock, Aug. 2.—Sometimes young widows, aged parents, and orphans do not know they are eligible for benefits and lose money through delay in filing their claims. In addition to the monthly old-age benefits payable to the insured worker himself at age 65 or after, the Federal Old-Age and Survivors Insurance system provides for the monthly benefits to members of his family. Benefits are also payable to his family at his death, whatever his age. Benefits totaling over 16 million dollars a month were in force at the end of 1943 for almost 900,000 beneficiaries. The sharpest increase in number was in widow's benefits, which rose 62 per cent. A safe rule is this: When in doubt about your right to old-age and survivors insurance benefits, visit your local office of the Social Security Board. No matter where you work and live, you're probably not very far from a Social Security field office or from one of its part-time service points. The Social Security Board field office servicing this area is located at 1311 Texas Avenue, Lubbock.

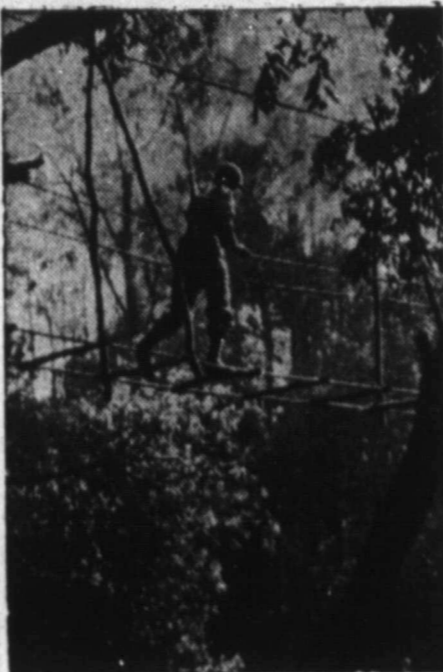

**WACS ARE NEEDED FOR MEDICAL TECHNICIANS**

Women are wanted by the hundreds to serve as medical technicians in the Women's Army Corps.

Such was the statement made this week by Captain Nina E. V. Donahue of the 8th Service Command Headquarters on her visit to the Army Recruiting office in Lubbock, to recruit and interview women for this branch of service.

Every eligible woman between the ages of 20 and 50 who possesses the desire to help her country in caring for its wounded and who has the ability to learn, may enlist now to serve as a Medical Technician with the Army of the United States whether she has had any previous experience or not. She will be trained by the Army in Specialist schools if she meets the initial qualifications for enlistment.

Capt. Donahue stated that the Surgeon General of the Army has found that casualties coming back from battle areas are much greater than anticipated, thus the immense training program established now for women to serve as Medical Technicians. Women who serve as x-ray, dental, laboratory and surgical technicians if they have a high school education, are physically fit and meet the required enlistment qualifications for service with the WAC. Women will be highly trained in leading hospitals throughout the nation and at special training schools, after which they will be assigned to duty where they are needed most. This training will offer unlimited opportunities for post war jobs in highly skilled professional fields.

Types of positions now open in this category include pharmacists, optometric, orthopedic, laboratory, dental, x-ray, medical laboratory, lip reading and hearing aid, surgi-

cal technicians, social workers, dental hygienists, occupational therapy and educational conditioning technicians.

Complete information may be secured by writing or visiting the U. S. Army Recruiting Station, P.O. box 1015, Lubbock.

Women not interested in becoming Medical Technicians can choose from 239 other different types of jobs, all vitally essential in the war effort.

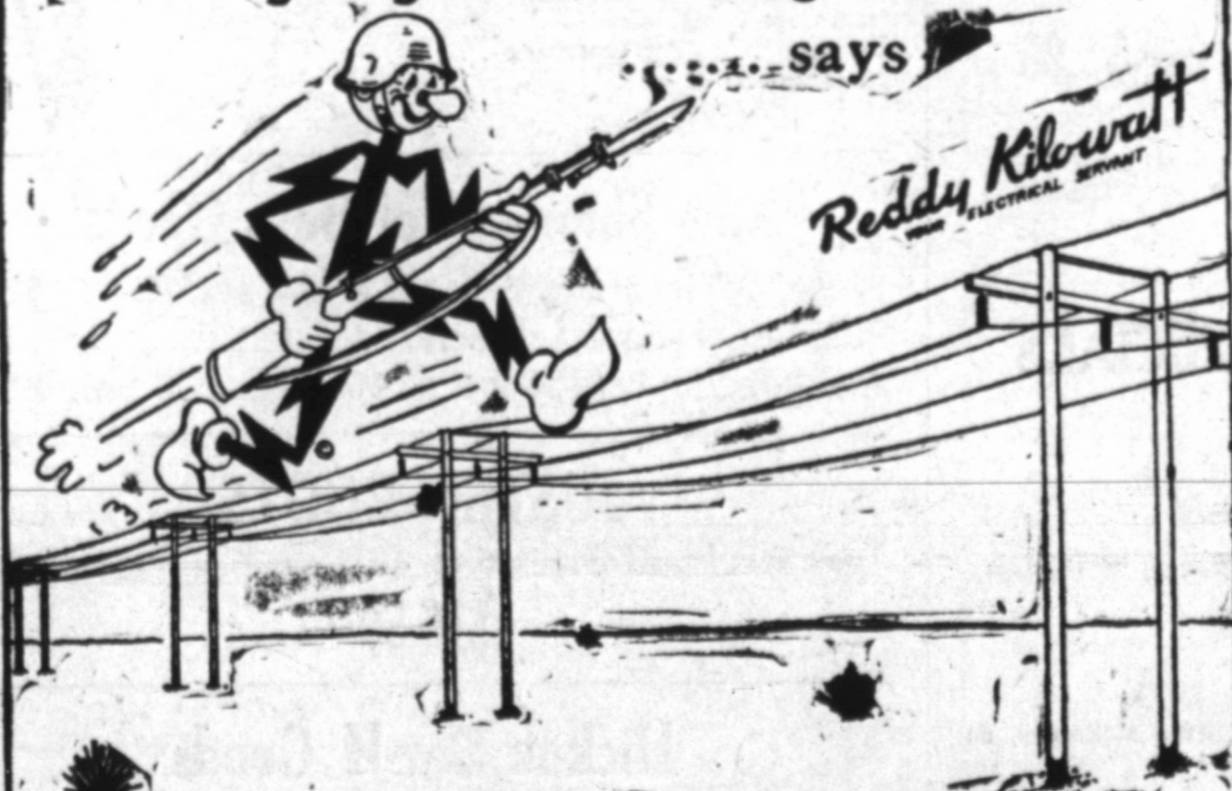
