Harvesting of Crop Is Getting Started In Lynn County

Cotton picking on a small scale was just beginning when rains came the first of this week, which delayed the harvesting for a few days. Only 16 bales had been ginned in Tahoka up to Thursday morning.

If fair weather prevails, some cotton will be gathered next week but on account of the rain the crop probably will not begin to open rapidly for several days yet.

The 16 bales ginned were all handled by the Farmers and Tahoka Co-op plants, but all the six gins are now ready for business. There are nearly thirty gins in Lynn

Also, the harvesting of the grain crop had just begun when the rain interfered. Three elevators have just been completed, the Farmers Co-op. the new Burleson No. 2, and the V. F. Jones. All are now ready for

Mr. Burleson reports that up to Thursday he had already handled 28 cars of the new maize crop. A car contains about 100,000 pounds of grain. He is of the opinion that the rain did practically no harm to the crop but greatly helped much of it and that the yield in the county will be greatly increased.

Already Mexicans are peginning to pour into the county to gather the cotton crop, which promises to be above the average. In fact, many believe that it will rank up toward the top for Lynn county barring the year of 1937, which broke all

Heavy Rainfall **Drenches County**

The entire South Plains and niuch adjacent territory are again thoroughly soaked. An all-day rain Tuesday did the work. The rain began falling at about 10 o'clock Monday night, continuing intermittently throughout the day Tuesday, and did not stop until 10 or 11

The rainfall in Tahoka amounted to 1.94 inches. In some parts of the county it was evidently more than that; in others, it might not have been quite that much. Similar rainfall is reported from all our neighboring counties.

While old feed which had already matured as well as the cotton which had suffered most from drouth will not be benefitted, much of the feed and the cotton will be materially helped. With an ordinary fall, all immature cotton bolls and those forming within the next two or three weeks will probably mature, increasing the yield in the county by several thousand bales. Young feed will likewise be greatly helped. Some of the young feed, however, is reported to have fallen down and may be considerably damaged At least it will render it much more difficult to harvest.

Some stock water was put in the lakes but most of the water soaked into the earth where it fell. Grass in the pastures and wheat yet to be planted will be helped.



Loan Price Set on 1944 Plains Cotton

War Food Administration through the Commodity Credit Corporation will make loans on 1944 crop cotton, according to B. J. Emanuel, chairman of Lynn county AAA com-

Premiums and discounts for grade and staple in the 1944 program will be calculated in relation to the loan rate on 15-16 inch middling cotton The rate on 15-16 middling, net weight, in Lynn county is 21.18

Loans will be made directly by the CCC, or through lending agencies approved by the CCC.

State and county Agricultural Adjustment Agency committees will designate persons as clerks to assist producers in preparing and executing loan papers.

Cotton Producers' notes will bear interest at the rate of 3 percent per annum and will mature July 31 1945, but will be callable on demand. Loans will be available until May 1

Loans will be approved on cotton represented by warehouse receipts issued by warehouses approved by CCC and on farm-stored cotton secured by chattel mortgages. Cotton to be eligible for the loan must be classed by a Board of Cotton Examiners of the WFA.

Loan forms are being made available through approved cotton warehouses and the county agricultural conservation committees.




