For many years The News has carried as its motto and slogan, printed right under its masthead, the following quotation from the noted French infidel, Voltaire, "I wholly disapprove of what you say but will defend to the death your right to say it." We carry this slogan because it seems most appropriate and in thorough accord with the spirit of democracy and the American way of life. It does not mean that we approve anything else that Voltaire might have written. Needless to say, his moral life was not above reproach and some of his religious views were supremely baneful. There was much provocation, however, for much that he said in denunciation of the Church, for the Catholic Church was the only one that he knew anything about, and in his day it was a very corrupt institution. And even yet, the Catholic Church holds many views and engages in many practices that are wholly un-American.

American and other Allied soldiers won the first World War in 1918, but selfish and short-sighted American politicians in the United States Senate defeated America when they turned down the peace treaty embodying the League of Nations brought back from France by President Woodrow Wilson. There are evidences that a few isolationist politicians in this country will attempt to bring about a repetition of this catastrophe when the treaty of peace is written following this war. We need no isolationists and no apologists for Germany at the peace table or in the President's chair when the terms of this peace are being made. We are afraid of some Republican leaders.

Two weeks ago a Lynn county man was convicted of murder, committed, according to the evidence, while he was under the influence of liquor. Last week, a Meadow man was indicted at Brownfield for murder without malice and for drunken driving, the result of a highway tragedy in which three persons were killed and several others injured. Two of the death victims were the daughter and the grand-daughter of a Tahoka man. All the victims, apparently, were without fault. Liquor in the stomach of a man at the wheel of a car was responsible for the tragedy. When will America come to its senses and abolish the accursed liquor traffic?

DRAW H. D. CLUB

The Draw Home Demonstration Club met Friday, Sept. 1, at the home of Mrs. Louis McKay from 3 to 5 p. m.

The county home demonstration agent, Miss Carolyn Dixon, demonstrated "Storage in the Bedroom." In each bedroom there should be at least one built-in closet, which will give adequate space for hanging clothes and storing unused clothing.

Miss Emily Waller, club poultry demonstrator, assisted by Mrs. Graham Hensley, gave a short skit on packing foods for Christmas boxes for the boys in service. All foods shipped to the boys should be prepared so they will be protected against gases, grease, water, rats, insects, and odors.

Loan Price Set on 1944 Plains Cotton

War Food Administration through the Commodity Credit Corporation will make loans on 1944 crop cotton, according to B. J. Emanuel, chairman of Lynn county AAA committee.

Premiums and discounts for grade and staple in the 1944 program will be calculated in relation to the loan rate on 15-16 inch middling cotton. The rate on 15-16 middling, net weight, in Lynn county is 21.18 cents.

Loans will be made directly by the CCC, or through lending agencies approved by the CCC.

State and county Agricultural Adjustment Agency committees will designate persons as clerks to assist producers in preparing and executing loan papers.

Cotton Producers' notes will bear interest at the rate of 3 percent per annum and will mature July 31, 1945, but will be callable on demand. Loans will be available until May 1, 1945.

Loans will be approved on cotton represented by warehouse receipts issued by warehouses approved by CCC and on farm-stored cotton secured by chattel mortgages. Cotton to be eligible for the loan must be classed by a Board of Cotton Examiners of the WPA.

Loan forms are being made available through approved cotton warehouses and the county agricultural conservation committees.

Cotton Pulling Wages To Be Set

Farm representatives from 20 South Plains counties are meeting in Lubbock today with a representative of the Labor Department in an effort to establish a wage ceiling for cotton gathering. Eight Lynn county farmers and the county agent are attending the meeting.

Farmers are cautioned against becoming alarmed over the high cost of getting cotton gathered this year. Many areas have had crop failures this year, and indications are more favorable than last year for sufficient hands. The price certainly should in no case exceed the average of last year, \$1.25 or \$1.50 delivered at the gin. Full details of the Lubbock meeting will be given by the county agent in next week's paper.

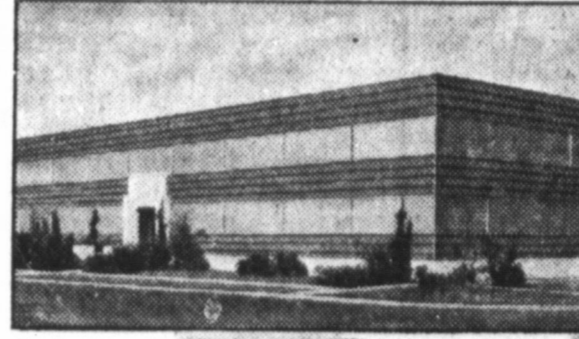
