### Rain Delays Crop Harvest; Ginnings Total 1,172 Bales

Just as the harvesting of the crops was beginning to go strong. rain amounting to more than one and a half inches interfered for two or three days this week.

Just six hundred bales had been girned in Taboka up to Wednesday afternoon since our report was gathered on Weenerday of last week. The total ginnings here amounted to 1,172 bales, as reported by the six gins, as compared with 572 bales reported last week The harvesting of the feed crops was likewise delayed.
