Lynn County Short Of Quota As Bond **Drive Nears End**

Though Lynn county people have more money in the bank than ever before, Lynn county is failing to do its part in the Sixth War Loan Drive unless the people do something about buying War Bonds im-

War Bond sales to date total only \$465,000.00, and the county quota is \$645,000.00, according to County Chairman Truett Smith. Most of these are large bonds, and the sales of E bonds is "away, away below" our quota of \$273,000.

Wilson, however, was away over the top, according to W. L. Betts. \$102,805.75 in bonds having been sold there up until the first of the week, of which \$25,293.75 was in Series E bonds. That town's quota had been set at \$74,000.00 for all series.

Total bond sales at O'Donnell up to Saturday night were reported to be \$75,416.50, of which nearly half, \$35,193.75, was in E bonds.

Tahoka's total sales amounted to \$286,000.00 up to Wednesday, but the total sales of Series E bonds "embarassingly low," Smith





Now our government asks us for a loan of 14 billion more dollars of which five billion dollars must come from individuals. Why? Haven't we nearly finished off our so-called Number 1 Enemy? Can Japan hold up our powerful war machine very long? Your son, brother and friend in his Pacific foxhole wouldn't raise such questions because they are up against realities, not day dreams. They kill or are killed. They pray every waking moment for a sky-darkening cover of friendly planes. They thank America for giving them the finest medical care in the world when their rendezvous with destiny in a Pacific jungle is at hand. They know the war with the Japs is just beginning.

COTTON HARVESTER HERE TO STAY

The day of the cotton harvesting n achine has dawned, and the day of the Mexican cotton picker out - on these productive plains is wan-

These facts are obvious to any one who will open his eyes and look about. Conditions that se frequently prevail on these plain and the fact that fairly successful cotton harvesters are now being manufactured are rapidly bringing about this revolution.

Take this year, for instance More than sixty thousand bale: have been harvested up to date this fall in this county. But there are still 25,000 to 35,000 bales of cotton still in the fields unharvested. On account of unfavorable havesting weather for the past three or four weeks, multitudes of Mexican cotton pickers have already left the county. Many, many others will leave before Christmas. The prspects are that much cotton will still be in the fields on January 1.

How will it be gathered? Well, nany farmers already are preparing to use slides. A number of

harvesting machines. In fact, the Keeping The Record Straight few machines that our farm implement dealers have been able to procure have been snapped up by farmers almost as quick as they

Of course these machines, are not entirely satisfactory in every particular as yet, but defects will be eliminated and improvements made from time to time as in other machinery until they do become next

A further development that has come along with the advent of the cotton harvesting machine is the iscovery that the heavy foliage on the cotton can ge removed at will by chemical treatment at reasonable expense, a process which greatly facilitates the harvesting of the crop by machinery.

So, if there is a good crop next year, it may be expected that there will be a lively demand for harvesting machines, and it is probable that within a few years they may take the place of Mexican labor altogether.

This presents a rather gloomy prospect for the Mexicans and for the business men of the county, who sell so many goods to the Mexicans each fall and winter, but it will be quite a boom for the

Yes, the cotton harvester is here. and soon the faces of hordes of Mexicans will be seen on our streets no more forever.

Half the civilized world is now upset on account of the cigaret shortage It doesn't bother us and the savages. We don't smoke. 





Gem and Abrasive

The garnet is a member of the mineral family that varies in use from a gem, worn for personal decoration, to an abrasive, utilized in industry. Although widely distributed, garnets are found in only a few places in sufficient quantities to make their commercial recovery profitable.

Best known are the wine-red gems, others ranging from light browns and red through the darker shades to black. Some specimens have measured over two feet in diameter, and 6 to 12-inch crystals are commonly found.

Because garnet is very hard and can be broken into angular grains with sharp chisel-like edges, it is well adapted for use as an abrasive. Abrasive cloth or paper made from crushed garnet is excellent for smoothing wood surfaces before applying varnish or shellac, also for finishing boots, shoes and many articles made of rubber, leather and

Giant Bombsight

A giant bombsight which has never been off the ground-and never will be-is doing a king-size job at home in preparing cadets of the army air forces training command for raids against the Axis. This super-sight is bolted to the floor in classrooms of training command bombardier schools and there it will remain until victory. Five feet high, it compares in size to the actual AAF bombsight as a washtub compares to a wristwatch. In order to maintain their reputation as the world's finest bombshots, it is necessary that bombardier cadets be thoroughly familiar with the inner workings of their precision aiming device. Some of its vital parts are almost microscopic in size. The instructors concluded that a "big" bombsight, with correspondingly "big" parts, would enable the cadet to see more clearly just how things ticked on the inside when he drew bead on an enemy target.

Cat's Disease A respiratory disease of catsvariously called nasal catarrh, influenza or distemper-has been observed frequently in the northeastern states. The main characteristics of the disease are its highly infectious nature, debilitating effects and long course-about a month.

Its respiratory nature is manifested by sneezing and coughing, accompanied by a mucopurulent discharge from the eyes and nose. At autopsy, reddish-gray, densely consolidated areas are noted in the anterior lobes of the lungs.

Dr. James A. Baber, of Cornell university, has demonstrated that this respiratory disease of cats is due to a filterable virus capable of roducing elementary bodies.





which they purchased about six miles east of Tahoka in the Edith community, and Deen had resided in this county ever since.

On Nov. 7, 1925, he was married to Miss Mildred Bosworth, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. Bosworth, who also lived in that vicinity.

After being employed by a business firm in O'Donnell for a year or two while a single man, he came back to Tahoka and a little later accepted a position "as an automobile salesman and bookkeeper for W. G. Briley, Chevrolet

After Mr. Briley went out of pusiness, he opened a real estate business and accepted a position a local representative of the Temple Trust Company, which was then making many real estate loans in this section of the state. He also became agent for Wm. Peck, loan of Concordia, Kan as, and other loan companies or individuals.

On May 16, 1931, he was elected secretary of the Tahoka Nationa Farm Loan Association, with R. C. Wood as president, which was the Land Bank of Houston. Mr. Nowlin continued to serve in this capacity until June 1, 1943, when his work had become so heavy and his health so bad that he had to give up this work. His health continued to fail until finally he. was compilled to go to a hospital.

He was one of the most energetic and proficient business men the town has ever had.

In addition to his other duties. Mr. Nowlin was elected mayor of the city of Tahoka and took office on April 12, 1937, and has been re-elected without opposition at every mayoralty election since

During his term of office, he and the city council inaugurated a paving program, and many blocks in the business and residential section of the town were paved. The water supply was improved, and the city acquired the sewer system.
