## Agriculture Goals For Year of 1945 Are Set by AAA

The following goals for Lynn county have been received in the local AAA office: 142,500 acres of cotton, 195,000 acres grain sorghums, and 1,000 acres wheat.

Support prices for the above products are: Cotton, 92.5% of parity; grain sorghums, \$1.65; wheat, 90% of parity.

Other products are supported as follows: Peanuts produced in 1945 will be supported by a base price of \$180.00 per ton for Spanish type. Soy beans will be supported with a \$2.04 per bushel price for certain varieties; Great Northern beans \$6.50 per hundred; blackeyed peas \$5.75; pinto beans, \$5.40; Irish potatoes will be supported by a 90% of parity price.

Applications for dairy production payments of 10 cents per pound for cream and 70 cents per hundred for milk for November and December, 1944, are now being accepted at the local AAA office. All milk producers who have not received these payments are urged to do so at once. Application for the next payment will be for the months of January, February and March, at the same rate as for November and December.

1944 producers of sudan for seed must furnish this office with the number of pounds produced and a sample weighing not less than 2.5 pounds not later than Feb. 10th, in order to be eligible for the \$3.50 per acre soil building practice payment. Don't overlook this requirement.

Lynn county farmers who desire loans on their grain sorghums have until Feb. 28 to submit their applications.

Sgt. Godsey attended Tahoka High School. He enlisted in the Army back in 1937, and was sent overseas in November, 1944.

Norman Guy Ward, formerly of Grassland, has been reported missing in action in Belgium since December 21, according to a telephone message received by his sister, Mrs. Zillah Huddleston from Mrs. Ward's parents at Wortham, several days ago, our Grassland correspondent, Mrs. V. V. Laws, reports.

Sgt. and Mrs. Ward had a baby whom he had never seen, and Mrs. Ward and the baby had been visiting a few days with Mrs. Huddleston at Grassland and were on their way back to their home at Wortham when the news came that Sgt. Ward was missing in action.

Sgt. Ward had made his home with Mrs. Huddleston at Grassland before he enlisted in the service. Other sisters are Mrs. Emma Sanderson of Grassland and Mrs. Doyle Young of Graham Chapel. He has a brother, Q. Ward, in the Army Air Corps, now headed for service overseas, and another brother, Arthur, who is engaged in defense work at Lufkin.

Sgt. Ward, 25, was with the Ninth Army and in a Tank division. His relatives and many friends are hoping that word may soon come that he is still alive and well.

## Eual Akin Is Home From Pacific War

Eual Akin, cook 2/c on a Navy ship in the Pacific, arrived home Thursday last week to visit his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Akin. He and his parents spent the week end visiting other relatives at Winters. It was the first time Eual had had leave in the 19 months he has been in the service, and his leave is for 30 days, with seven days additional for traveling time.

Eual has done much traveling in the Pacific, and has, no doubt, seen a lot of action.

Recently he has been to Saipan and Guam. He says the U. S. has worked wonders in restoring these two islands. He says about everything we have read in the papers about the Japs' fanatical stand is true. They fought until the last, and then, if not killed by our men, they committed suicide.

We managed to take a small percent as prisoners, and Eual had opportunity to talk to a number of the English-speaking Jap prisoners. He says they realize that Japan is whipped, but they did not wake up to this fact until after their capture. He thinks the Jap soldier is kept in complete ignorance of the real position of his home-land. For instance, many of the captured Japs actually believed they were fighting on the American home-land and that the plane raids came from east of the Mississippi.

The natives on Saipan as a whole didn't fight, and now are being rehabilitated in the hills, of that island by our Government.

## \$170 Reported In 'March of Dimes'

A total of \$171.55 has been reported in contributions to the "March of Dimes" infantile paralysis campaign in honor of President Roosevelt's birthday, according to W. B. Slaton and Wynne Collier.

No dance for the fund was held here, but, instead, the churches were asked to take collections last Sunday. So far, only two churches have indicated that they co-operated with the movement. The First Baptist Church of Tahoka took a collection which totaled \$98.05, and the First Methodist Church of Tahoka contributed \$56.30. The First National Bank gave \$10.00, and a number of smaller contributions totaled \$7.00 in cash.

## Lt. Sam Gatzki Is Flying Over Pacific

Fairfield Calif., Feb. 1.—Lt. Sam C. Gatzki has been assigned to duty at the Air Transport Command's Fairfield-Stinson Army Air Base, it was announced by Lt. Col. Arthur W. Stephenson, commanding officer.

Lt. Gatzki is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Gus Gatzki of near Tahoka, Lynn county, and entered the Army on June 27, 1940.

While at this base, Lt. Gatzki's duties will directly aid in the successful execution of the mission of his ATC installation: to funnel American aircraft and skilled air crews into the strategically important Pacific theatre of operations.

Editor's Note: Mr. Gatzki tells The News his other son, Sgt. Raymond W. Gatzki of the Marine Air Corps now is on Hebrides Island, and his son-in-law, Woodrow W. Stewart, 3/c Mechanists mate in the Navy Air Corps, is also in the Pacific. Lt. Gatzki is flying a C-54 transport to the present war front in the Central Pacific.

## Lt. Hickerson Gets His Third Oak Leaf

An 18th Air Force Liberator Station, England.—Lt. J. W. Hickerson, husband of Mrs. Laura R. Hickerson, of Tahoka, has been awarded a third Oak Leaf Cluster to the Air Medal "for meritorious achievement in accomplishing with distinction aerial operational missions over enemy occupied Continental Europe. The courage, boldness, and skill displayed by him in the face of determined opposition materially aided in the successful completion of these dangerous missions. His actions reflect great credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of the United States."

Lt. Hickerson, pilot of a B-24 Liberator, has taken part in bombing missions to Cologne, Karlsruhe, and he flew in support of General Patton's Third Army at Metz.

## Roy Stephens Is Still In Jap Prison

Mr. and Mrs. L. R. Stephens reported two cards last week end from their son, Roy Stephens, who has been a prisoner of the Japanese ever since soon after the Jap attack in December, 1941.

One of the cards was dated Aug. 8, 1944, and the other was undated. Of course, he wrote little other than the fact that he was well, but word from him was reassuring to the family.

Roy was on Wake Island, when the Jap attack came. After the fall of that island, he was ultimately taken to Shanghai, where he still remains.

Roy was a popular Tahoka High School student and athlete, and following his graduation here he attended Howard Payne College and West Texas State.

## Vickers' Brother Killed In Action

G. E. Vickers of the Joe Bailey community reports to The News that last week he received information that his brother, Pfc. Samuel Holloway Vickers, 27, whose home was at San Angelo, had been killed in action in Belgium on Jan. 10.

Pfc. Vickers' widow received a message from the War Department Monday of last week informing her of her husband's death and she immediately telephoned his brother here.

Pfc. Vickers was inducted into the Army last May and had been overseas just four months to a day when he met his tragic death.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. P. Vickers, live at Idalou.

## R. L. Atkins, 88, Died Last Week

Funeral services were held in the Draw Methodist Church at 3:30 o'clock last Friday afternoon for Richard Lemuel Atkins, 88, who died at the home of his nephew, Dick Atkins, at Draw at 11:45 Thursday morning, and the body was laid to rest in the Draw cemetery.

Rev. Leo Norcross, pastor of the Methodist church, officiated, and W. M. Harris of Tahoka, funeral director, had charge of the body.

Deceased had never been married, but he left many relatives as survivors, including nine nephews and eight nieces, and many grand nephews and grand nieces. He also left one sister surviving, Mrs. Betty Piliand of Hobbs, N. M., and she was here for the funeral services.

Two nephews living at a distance, R. L. Atkins of San Diego, Calif., and M. C. Atkins of Itasca, were also here. Mrs. A. W. Hancock, a niece, and her husband and their children, Ora Lee and John Hancock, all of Winters, and J. L. Wheat, brother of Mrs. Dick Hancock, also of Winters, were others present.

Born in Alabama on Nov. 18, 1856, Richard Lemuel Atkins came with his parents to Georgetown, Texas, when he was a lad about 15 years of age. After a residence there of probably 16 years, the family moved to Hill county and then came on out to Winters in 1905. From Winters, Mr. Atkins went to Amherst in 1921, where he continued to make his home until 1937, when he came to Draw to reside with his nephew, Dick Atkins, and family.

Mr. Atkins had been virtually an invalid for a number of years but he became critically ill about seven weeks ago. Death was attributed mainly to the infirmities of old age.

Mr. Atkins had been an almost life-time member of the Methodist Church and was a highly esteemed citizen. Many relatives and friends were grieved at his demise.

## Freak Explosion Wrecks New I. M. Draper Residence

The new I. M. Draper home just outside the southern limits of the city on the O'Donnell highway was almost wrecked by an explosion which occurred inside one of the rooms at about 1 o'clock Saturday morning while all the occupants of the house were asleep.

The explosion occurred in Mr. Draper's bedroom, and while he was greatly shocked and his mustache and the hair of his head was considerably singed, miraculously he sustained no serious personal injury.

The house, a seven-room structure, had been recently built, chiefly of old lumber, and had been finished with the exception of the stuccoing. The house had been piped for gas and a butane plant had been installed. It is believed that a leaky rubber hose connecting the piping with a heater permitted escaping gas to accumulate in such quantities that it was eventually ignited by a pilot light, causing the terrific explosion.

Practically the entire interior of the house was damaged. Walls were forced out of place, the paper and other finishing work ruined or marred, and damage of various kinds inflicted. Although each of the four bed rooms was occupied, luckily not a single occupant was injured with the exception of the slight injuries which Mr. Draper suffered. But all of them were terribly frightened.

The damage to the building has been estimated at \$700.00 or more.

He wears the Air Medal with one Oak Leaf Cluster, the African-European-Middle East theatre ribbon, and has been recently authorized to wear the Distinguished Unit badge as a member of a combat organization which has performed in an outstanding manner against the enemy.

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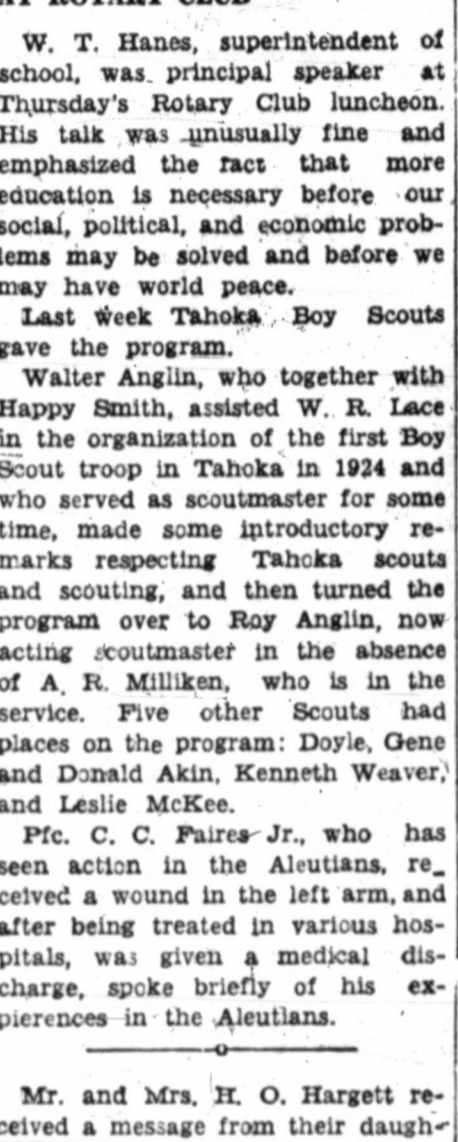

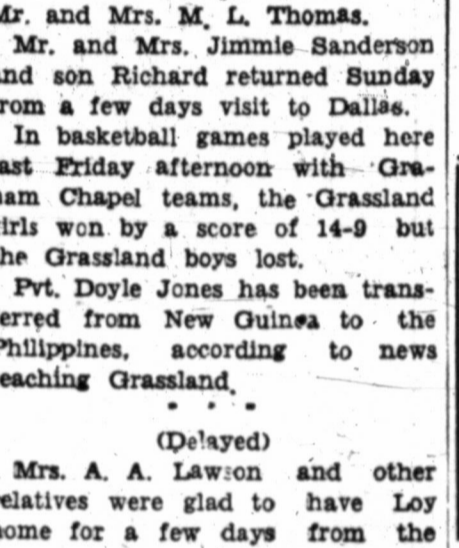

Orchids Guide Iron

Prospectors for iron ore in Brazil and Venezuela are guided to such deposits by the presence above ground of a certain type of rare and beautiful orchid blooms. Also in Venezuela, iron is invariably indicated by the presence of a little tree called the "copey."

Cuba is another region where distinctive vegetation definitely indicates a soil condition associated with deposits of iron ore. On that island ore deposits support a heavy growth of pine, and because of that fact Columbus is said to have discovered iron on his first voyage to the New World. A broken mast on one of his ships necessitated putting in to the north shore of the island, and beneath the pine tree cut down for the mast, ore was found.

In the southeastern part of the United States iron ore deposits are commonly overgrown with cedar in much thicker growths than in non-ore regions. In the east Texas "brown ore" field, outcrops of the ore-bearing green sand support relatively heavy growths of hardwood, almost the only hardwood in the locality.

Rate Bulls

Bulls are given milk and cream ratings in a new publication of the U. S. department of agriculture. The ratings are given by studying the yields of daughters of the sires in question, comparing them with the yields of their own mothers made under similar conditions, and crediting the gain, if any, to the influence of the bull's lineage. Thus if 10 daughters of a given sire gave a milk-yield record of 10,000 pounds for the test period, while their mothers have a comparable record of 9,000 pounds, the 1,000-pound difference is chalked up to the credit of the sire. This process is called "proving." A proved sire with a good record as shown by his daughters' production performance is naturally in demand for the improvement of other herds of milch cows. But to some bulls come only posthumous honors: in the agriculture department's list many animals are recorded as having died before the proof period (which may require several years) could be completed.
