Support prices for the above products are: Cotton, 92.5% of parity; grain sorghums, \$1.65; wheat, 90% of parity.

Other products are supported as follows: Peanuts produced in 1945 will be supported by a base price of \$160.00 per ton for Spainish type. Soy beans will be supported with a \$2.04 per bushel price for certain varieties; Great Northern beans \$6.50 per hundred; blackeyed peas \$5.75; pinto beans, \$5.40; Irish potatoes will be supported by a 90% of parity price.

payments of 10 cents per pound for cream and 70 cents per hundred for milk for November and December, 1944, are now being accepted at the local AAA office. All milk producers who have not received these payments are urged to do so at once. Application for the next payment will be for the months of January, February and March, at the same rate as for November and ports. December.

Freak Explosion Wrecks New I. M. Draper Residence
