He was appointed by Governor Pat M. Neff as assistant attorney general to represent the State before the Court of Criminal Appeals in cases appealed from the District Court.

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Following that service, he formed a law partnership with the late G. E. Lockhart, one of the leading criminal lawyers of West Texas, and the two located in Lubbook for the practice of their profession. Lockhart had lived in Tahoka for many years and had teenth mission. He had made served as district attorney of the old 72nd judicial di trict in the early years of his career as a law- her on the day before his death.

After this partnership was dissolved ten or twelve years ago, Judge Garrard moved to Tahoka since which time he has enjoyed an extensive law practice here and throughout this section of the

In the meantime, he also served for a number of years as a member of the state obard of education.

A little more than a year ?ago, following the death of County Judge Chester Connolly, he was appointed by the commissioners' court to fill the unexpired term and in the primary election of last July he was overwhelmingly elected to the position for the term which began on January 1, this

year. He has long been a warm friend and supporter of Governor Stevenson, and his friends would have been disappointed if the Governor had not appointed him to this posttion, though it was made before many people even knew that there was to be a vacancy. Lawyers and haymen alike believe that he will reflect credt upon himself and upon the Court by the character of service which he will render.




