Tom Garrard Is Appointed Judge Amarillo Court

Hon. Tom Garrard, County Judge of Lynn County, received notice Monday of his appointment by Governor Coke Stevenson to the office of associate justice of the court of civil appeals for the seventh supreme judicial district of Texas, which sits at Amarillo.

The appointment was made to fill a vacancy created by the resignation of Associate Justice Clayton Heare, which is to become effective Saturday March 31. Judge Heare, a brother of J. L. Heare of Tahoka, will return to private practice of law in Amarillo.

Garrard has long been prominent in the political and judicial life of Texas. Years ago, he served as District Attorney of the 70th judicial district of Texas, then comprising ten counties, extending from Midland to the Pecos River.

He was appointed by Governor Pat M. Neff as assistant attorney general to represent the State before the Court of Criminal Appeals in cases appealed from the District Court.

Following that service, he formed a law partnership with the late G. E. Lockhart, one of the leading criminal lawyers of West Texas, and the two located in Lubbock for the practice of their profession. Lockhart had lived in Tahoka for many years and had served as district attorney of the old 72nd judicial district in the early years of his career as a lawyer.

After this partnership was dissolved ten or twelve years ago, Judge Garrard moved to Tahoka since which time he has enjoyed an extensive law practice here and throughout this section of the state.

In the meantime, he also served for a number of years as a member of the state board of education.

A little more than a year ago, following the death of County Judge Chester Connolly, he was appointed by the commissioners' court to fill the unexpired term and in the primary election of last July he was overwhelmingly elected to the position for the term which began on January 1, this year.

He has long been a warm friend and supporter of Governor Stevenson, and his friends would have been disappointed if the Governor had not appointed him to this position, though it was made before many people even knew that there was to be a vacancy. Lawyers and laymen alike believe that he will reflect credit upon himself and upon the Court by the character of service which he will render.

B. P. Robinson Buried Tuesday

Bobbit Parker Robinson, 70, years of age and a resident of Lynn County for the past 19 years, died at about two o'clock Monday afternoon at the home of his son, Luther Robinson, in Lamesa, following a brief illness. He had been making his home with a daughter, Mrs. Ernest Cawthorn, who resides near Tahoka, but on March 18 he had gone to Lamesa to visit his son and family. On the following Wednesday, he suffered a paralytic stroke and became critically ill, terminating speedily in death. He had suffered previous strokes, it is said.

The body was brought to the Harris Funeral Home in Tahoka Monday evening, where it was prepared for burial, and on Tuesday Mr. Harris conveyed the body to Sulphur Springs, Mr. Robinson's former home, where funeral services were to be conducted Wednesday and where the remains were to be laid to rest.

Lt. Kemp Dies In Attack On Japs

Mrs. E. B. Kemp, the former Miss Marjorie Wells, received a message from the War Department in Washington, D. C., on last Friday informing her that her husband, Lt. Elias B. Kemp, was killed on February 23 while on an airplane mission over Indo-China. No details of his tragic death were given.

Mrs. Kemp had recently received a letter from her husband dated February 22 and written from some place in the Philippines. He had evidently been sent out on a mission from the Philippines to Indo-China, hundreds of miles away, when he met his death. Mrs. Kemp believes this was his fourteenth mission. He had made twelve and possibly thirteen missions before writing the letter to her on the day before his death.

Funeral services were conducted in the Nazarene Church in Plainview at 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon by Rev. W. R. McClure, Nazarene pastor at Sweetwater, assisted by Rev. D. M. Duke, pastor of the Plainview Nazarene Church. Burial was in a Plainview cemetery.

Including Mrs. Nance, six children survive, four daughters and two sons.

Mr. and Mrs. Nance were called to Plainview last week by her serious illness and were present at the funeral services. Mr. Nance came back home the first of this week but Mrs. Nance remained there for a few days longer.

Abilene College Is Presented Funds

Abilene Christian College, which includes among its students Mrs. Clovis Lorene Stephens, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. P. Stephens of Tahoka, has announced the provisional gift of \$65,000 by Mr. and Mrs. E. D. Chambers of Abilene.

The money, set up in a trust estate at the request of Mr. and Mrs. Chambers, will be given to the school when friends, patrons, and ex-students of the school raise another \$60,000 to match the trust fund.

Specific uses to which the money will be put are the erection of a new dormitory and improvements in the home economics department.

City Election Is Next Tuesday

Little interest is expected to be shown in the City election to be held next Tuesday in the county court room, since there is no contest for either of the four offices to be filled.

Friend has filed the name of T. J. Bovell for mayor. Bovell is a present member of the City Council. He will, if elected, succeed Deen Nowlin, deceased. J. L. Heare Council member, has been mayor pro-tem since Nowlin's death.

The name of W. O. Thomas has been filed for re-election as member of the Council, and the name of V. P. Jones filed to succeed Bovell.

A. F. McGowan, seeking the office of City marshal, re-election, is the only voluntary candidate.

Pfc. Billy Snider Missing In Action

Pfc. Billy Snider has been reported missing in action in Germany since March 2. He was with General Hodges' First Army, and had been in action at least three or four months.

Pfc. Snider's wife, Mrs. Louise Snider of Big Spring, was notified by the War Department Tuesday that her husband was missing.

Young Snider is the son of Mr. and Mrs. T. G. Snider, O'Donnell, Rt. 3, and was born in this county. He attended school at New Moore, and engaged in farming in that community before entering the service in March, 1944.

He received training at Camp Hood, Texas, and Camp Pickett, Va., before going overseas in Sept. 1944. From England he had gone to France, Belgium, and on into Germany. As an infantryman in the Army, he was assistant to the chief of a four-man team operating one of the big trench mortars. Several months ago he wrote his parents that at one time all three men working with him had been casualties, leaving only himself of the four, but that he was unhurt.

Another son of the Sniders, J. D., was discharged recently from the Army, having become ill before completing his training at Camp Fannin, Tyler, Texas. After spending some months in various hospitals he was given a Medical Discharge and is now at home.

A. W. Snider another son who farms near O'Donnell brought this information to The News.

Clothing Dealers To Discuss Rationing

All retailers of apparel, dry goods or house furnishings will meet Monday, April 2, at 8 p. m. in the district court room here to discuss with local ration board members and representatives from the District OPA the new retail price regulation covering their items.

Discussion will center around the pricing chart each merchant is required to file before April 20. This chart, showing the costs and selling prices of the goods offered for sale on March 19, 1945, will simplify the job of calculating ceiling prices, Jim Burleson, chairman of the Price Panel, stated.

"It is urgent that every retailer concerned with this new regulation be present at the meeting," he said, "for this will be the best opportunity to get any question concerning the new regulation answered."

Red Cross Fund Exceeds \$10,000

Lynn county has exceeded her \$7,500.00 goal for the 1945 Red Cross War Fund by contributing more than \$10,000.00, according to Rollin McCord, drive chairman.

"Thanks for the spirit manifest by our good citizens in this worthy cause," McCord said in his statement announcing the drive's success. "In compiling our lists for each community, we find that many persons have overlooked their contribution. Our volunteer workers have done a magnificent job, but it is practically impossible to contact each individual. Since our drive ends April 1st, those who wish to have their name on our honor rolls may yet do so by leaving their contribution with any bank or solicitor in the county."

Mrs. Solsbery Is Given Son's Medal

S/Sgt. George Otis Solsbery, a prisoner of war in Germany, has been honored by the Army with the Air Medal for his accomplishments with the 15th Air Force in the European Theatre of Operations before his plane was shot down over Italy more than a year ago.

The medal and ribbons were sent to Lubbock Army Air Field, where they were to have been presented. Sgt. Solsbery's mother, Mrs. A. L. Solsbery, last Saturday in a special ceremony. However, Mrs. Solsbery is an invalid and could not make the trip. Officers from the field came to Tahoka Wednesday to make the presentation to her.

Sgt. Solsbery, who will be 34 years of age on April 12, entered the Army Air Force Feb. 19, 1942. The next year he went overseas and saw service in Algiers, Morocco, Tunisia, Sardinia, Sicily and Italy. While flying over enemy territory his plane was shot down by the Germans on December 19, 1943, and he has since been in a prison camp near Vienna, Austria. He was unharmed when shot down.

S/Sgt. Solsbery has a brother, Marvin E. Solsbery, MM2/c in the Navy, who was seriously injured in the war in the Pacific May 31, 1944, when both his legs were broken. Marvin, 35, had his right leg amputated March 8, at Mare Island Naval Hospital, San Francisco.

Cpl. Walker Wins Citation For Action

Cpl. James Garland Walker with the Army Medical Corps, is member of a unit receiving the Presidential Citation for action on Dec. 17, while our army was being pushed back on the Western Front by the surprising German attack, according to word received by re-according to his brother, Ernest Walker.

Cpl. Walker, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Walker of New Lynn, has been overseas since Oct., 1943. He was in on the invasion of France, and has followed the army through Belgium and into Germany.

E. E. Hancock Is Named New Head Tahoka Schools

E. E. (Ervin) Hancock, former citizen of Lynn county and long a prominent school administrator of West Texas, will succeed W. T. Hanes as superintendent of the Tahoka Public Schools. He was elected to the position by the Tahoka school board at a meeting Thursday night of last week, and will become head of the local schools next July 1st.

Hancock was superintendent at Brownfield two years, before resigning the position there nearly a year ago to become associated with the Cobb Department Stores. However, he has decided to return to his first love, the school business. He was not an active applicant for the job here.

Hancock is the son of Mrs. F. H. Hancock of this city and the late L. H. Hancock, who was a prominent Lynn county farmer before his death a few years ago. He came here with his parents in 1925, living at New Home, and the next year was named superintendent of New Home school. He served successively as superintendent at Anson five years, 1924-33, at Petersburg five years, 1933-38, at Ralls four years, 1938-42, and at Brownfield, 1942-44.

He has likewise served as president of the West Texas Teachers Association, and has been active in the profession throughout this area. He is a Baptist, a Mason, and a Rotarian.

Mrs. Hancock also is well known to many people in this county. Mr. and Mrs. Hancock have two sons, Jerry, 11, and Jimmy, 6.

The incoming superintendent is a native of Mills county, graduated from high school at Mullin, attended North Texas State Teachers College, the University of Texas, and Texas Tech, receiving his B. A. degree from the latter institution in 1934, and his M. A. degree there in 1941.

W. T. Hanes, who has been head of the local schools the past seven years will move to Cameron this summer, where he was recently elected head of the schools. Hanes has done an excellent job as superintendent here, and most patrons believe the board has found a worthy successor in Hancock.

Boydston Injured In Fall From Truck

John Boydston sustained a fracture of one shoulder and severe bruises on one side of his face and head on Thursday afternoon of last week when he fell from his truck at the southwest corner of the square while it was driven by Dalton Morgan. Morgan was making a turn at the time, causing Mr. Boydston to lose his balance and fall.

One of the rear wheels passed over his shoulder and grazed his face and head, causing profuse bleeding.

After receiving first-aid treatment here, the injured man was taken to a Lubbock hospital, where he was given further treatment. He was released and was brought home Monday.

CUT WORMS WILL CUT 'EM

Tomato plants are a favorite of cut worms. The first few days after tomato plants are set, cut worms often take a heavy toll. To prevent this damage, place a tomato can, with both ends cut out over each plant, sinking the can 3 or 4 inches into the soil and leaving a part above the surface. If cans are not available, sprinkle poisoned bran mash over the area

where the tomatoes are to be planted. This should be done two or three days before planting. Apply the mash in the late evening. The following formula will get the worms:

- 5 pounds coarse wheat bran or egg-laying mash.
- 1 pint molasses.
- 3 ounces white arsenic or Paris Green.

Add enough water to make the mixture slightly moist and sticky. Sprinkle in small particles or flakes over infested area.

CHARLEY DONALDSON DIES AT SNYDER

Charles E. Donaldson, of Snyder, 78, a brother of John Donaldson of Taboka and himself a resident of Lynn County for many years, died at about 4 o'clock Wednesday afternoon in a Snyder hospital, where he has been a patient. He had been in very bad health for ten years or more and in an effort to regain his health he had taken treatment in a number of the best hospitals in the country.

Funeral services were conducted at 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon in a Snyder Funeral Chapel by the pastor of the First Baptist Church of Snyder, after which the body was conveyed to the Lubbock Cemetery, where it was buried at 5 o'clock.

Mr. and Mrs. John Donaldson had been called to Snyder early in the week when the brother's condition became critical and were at

his bedside many hours before death came. They did not remain in Snyder for the funeral services there but were present for the last rites in the cemetery at Lubbock.

Mr. Donaldson was one of the pioneer citizens of Lynn County, having bought a ranch and moved onto it about twelve miles southwest of Taboka in 1906 or thereabouts. He and Mrs. Donaldson resided there for almost thirty years, moving to a ranch which they had purchased in Scurry County about ten or eleven years ago.

He was born in Arkansas but migrated with his parents to Texas when he was about nine years of age, the family settling first at Valley Mills but moving to Moody the next year, where young Charles grew to manhood and continued to reside until after his marriage the bride being Miss Maude Carter, member of a prominent family at Belton. Only one child was born to them and she died years ago, and was buried in the Lubbock Cemetery.

Survivors include the widow, a brother, John Donaldson of Taboka, and a brother and a sister in Moody.

He united with the Baptist Church in early life and was a real Christian gentleman.

Many friends in Lynn County, especially among the "old-timers," have long held him in the highest esteem, and they have only words of praise for his life and character.

Charles Reed writes his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Reid, that he is now in Germany with the Ninth Army and that they are going after the "Krauts" with all they have.

Dalhart, Texas, is nearer to six other state capitals than to the capital of Texas.

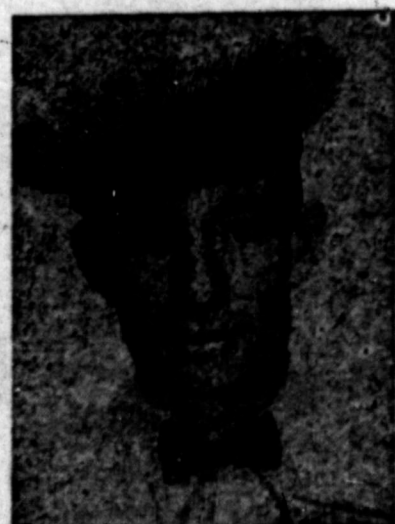

David Lloyd George, the great Prime Minister of Great Britain during the first World War, is dead. He died Monday night at the age of 81. As Prime Minister he was Britain's representative in the peace talks, the Big Four meeting of 1919. George, Woodrow Wilson, Georges Clemenceau of France, and Vittorio Orlando of Italy. Next to Woodrow Wilson Lloyd George was doubtless the greatest of the bunch. Clemenceau the "Tiger of France" had a towering intellect and unbending will power, but he was imperious and cynical, intolerant and selfish. Orlando was probably a better but a weaker man. Like Woodrow Wilson, Lloyd George was a real Democrat with a high degree of sympathy for the weak and the oppressed. Also like Wilson, he had a towering intellect. He was less an idealist but a more practical man. He was the strong man of Great Britain of his day, and there was no man in the Empire at that time better fitted for his job. A William by birth, he rose from obscurity to the highest position in Great Britain, and even in his declining days he was often con-

sulted by the statesmen of his country concerning vital matters of state. As a Christian gentleman and a statesman, his name will live through all the ages as one of Great Britain's greatest.

If Hitler and Himmler and other Nazi cut-throats are not devils incarnate, we hope that not one ever appears on this earth. Having led Germany into a brutal war and having poisoned the minds of millions of German people by their lying and hypocrisy, and having led their dotting dupes like lambs to the slaughter, they are now deluding and urging and unceasing and prying, as children—boys and girls—to throw themselves in the path of the oncoming armies of the Allies and thus court certain death and destruction in a vain attempt to stop the invading armies. It's about as sensible as throwing babes in front of a locomotive in the hope of thus stopping the thing. These demons, cornered and desperate, seem determined to bring the same fate to all their other people, even to their own friends and serf-like slaves. Telling the children that they must never capitulate, these demons are organizing and training them for underground guerrilla warfare after the German armies of "suicidal" have been dispersed or destroyed. Nero, who caused youths to be thrown to the lions, was a saint as compared with the men who rule present-day Germany.

Crop Insurance Is Available To Farms

Applications from at least 50 farms in the county will be required to make Federal Crop Insurance available to Lynn county growers, according to W. C. Huffaker, chairman of the county AAA committee.

"In the interest of sound program administration," Huffaker said, "Congress has required that crop insurance be limited to those counties in which a minimum participation is obtained."

"I am confident," he added, "that Lynn county cotton growers will more than meet this requirement. After all, crop insurance is the only protection available to farmers against the many production risks over which they have no control."

Under the crop insurance program, growers may insure their cotton crop, and, if desired, up to 75 percent of their average yield, or up to 50 percent if less protection is desired. Application can be made in the AAA office, or may be filed with local authorized agents. Application must be made prior to planting the crop, but in no case later than April 25. All cotton producers, whether share-croppers, tenants, or owners may apply for crop insurance on their interest in the crop.

The federal insurance program is written on a commodity rather than a cash basis. Coverage, premiums and indemnities are all calculated in terms of pounds of cotton. Transactions, however, may be simplified by translating the commodity amounts into cash equivalents.

The payment of indemnities on crop losses will vary with the growing season under the new cotton insurance program. For instance, if loss occurs after it is too late to seed to cotton, but prior to the first cultivation, the indemnity will be 40 percent of the maximum coverage. The land, of course, may be put to another use by the farmer. If loss occurs between the first cultivation and the end of harvest, the indemnity will be 75 percent of the maximum coverage. Under this adjustment method, the crop-catchment for harvesting costs which are not incurred. Protection will be for the full 100 percent of the maximum coverage between harvest and delivery to the gin.

Indemnities are paid by means of certificates, Huffaker said, which may be translated into their cash equivalents, or may be used as collateral for Government-sponsored commodity loans.

Sugar: Stamp No. 35 is good for five pounds of sugar, and will be valid until June 2.

Meats and Fats: Book IV, red stamps T5 through Z5 and A1 through J2 are good for 10 points each. K2 through P2 become valid April 1. T5, U5, V5, W5 and X5 expire April 18.

Fat Salvage: Every pound of waste kitchen fat is worth two red points and 4 cents.

Processed Foods: Book IV, blue stamps C2 through S2 are good for 10 points each. T2 through X2 become valid April 1. C2, D2, E2, F2 and G2 expire April 28.

Shoes: Book III, stamps one, two and three, with airplane picture, each good for one pair shoes indefinitely.

Gasoline: A coupons, 4 gal. each with No 15 expiring June 21. B-3, B-7, C-6 and C-7 rations have a value of 5 gallons each. R-2 and R-3, 5 gallons (valid for bulk delivery only); T coupons designated "Second Quarter" good for 5 gal. thru June 21; D, one and one-half gal.; and E-2 and E-3, one gal. each.

Tire Inspection: T book holders every six months or every 5,000 miles, whichever comes first. New Mileage Rationing Record required to obtain gasoline rations. Application for passenger car tire replacement must show condition of all tires in use.



 was the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Kemp now residing in Lubbock and was 26 years of age. He graduated at Levelland High School and entered the Texas Technological College in 1935. He left the College in 1939, lacking just a few hours of graduating in that institution. On November 19 of that year he was married to Miss Marjorie Wells, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Claud Wells of Tahoka, and they made their residence in Lubbock.

They had one child, a daughter, Sandra Carol, who will be four years old in May.

He enlisted for service in the Air Corps of the army in May, 1942, but was not called for service until November 9 of that year. He had nine months of navigation training and four months of bombardiering, and then took an eight-weeks course in aerial gunnery. He received his commission

at Ellington Field, Houston, on January 15, 1944. He left the States for over-seas service on December 31, 1944, going first to New Guinea. A few days later he was going on missions to the Philippines, helping to pave the way for the re-conquering of those islands by MacArthur's forces. He lived to see the major part of that task completed, and was evidently making it hot for the Japs on the Asiatic main land when he made the supreme sacrifice.

He is survived by his wife and little daughter, his parents, and one brother, Howard Kemp, engaged in defence work at Frederick, Okla.

Mrs. F. M. Sherrod has recently suffered two attacks of heart trouble, a rather severe one last Sunday. The family and friends are much concerned about her condition.
