LUBBOCK PASTOR IS BROTHERHOOD SPEAKER

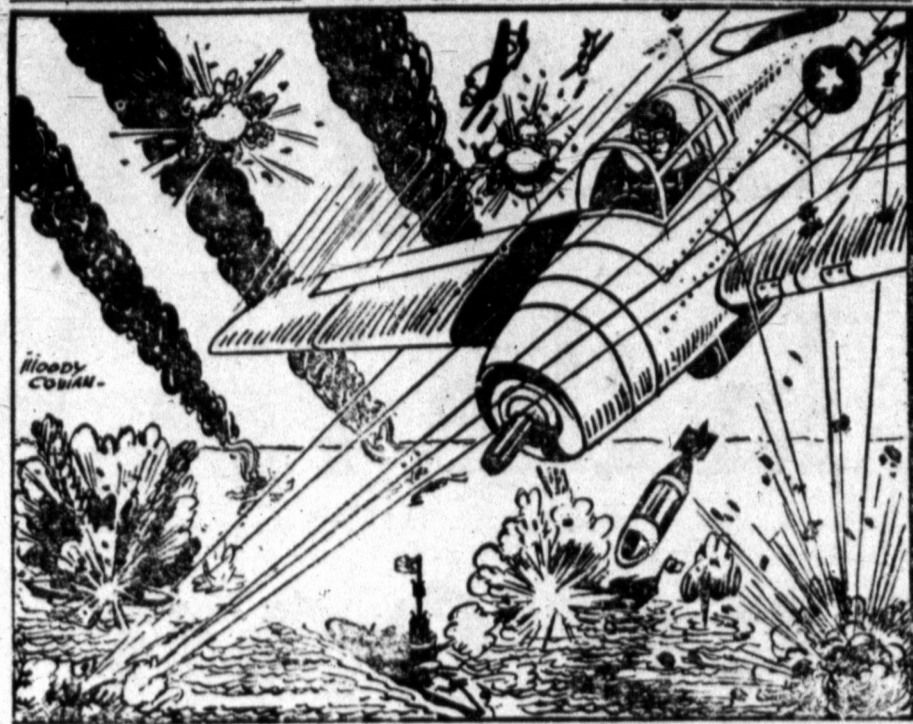

The award was announced by Major General William H. Gill, Commander of the veteran's 32d (Red Arrow) Infantry division.

Pfc. Curry entered the Army in January, 1941. He also holds the American Defense Ribbon and the Asiatic Pacific Theatre Ribbon and the Good Conduct Medal. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Wiley Curry, Tahoka, Texas.

Premature Celebration

Encyclopedia Britannica points out that Republican newspapers conceded the election of Democratic candidate Samuel J. Tilden in 1876. Both parties believed Tilden to have a popular plurality of 250,000 based on his election in certain northern states as well as what was believed to be the "solid South." In the final count, however, Gov. Rutherford B. Hayes of Ohio was elected by one electoral vote involving 19 states in the transition from Negro to white government, and elections are notorious for fraudulent practices, a serious question was raised regarding the returns and also regarding the authority of the federal government to question state returns.

Tie Vote

Jefferson and Burr received the same number of electoral votes in the presidential election of 1800, and the house of representatives was called on to decide which should be president. The house, being controlled by Jefferson's party known as the Federalists, decided in favor of Jefferson, making Aaron Burr vice president. This dispute resulted in the 12th Constitutional Amendment which provides that electors vote separately for President and vice president. Before the 12th Amendment, which was adopted in 1804, a candidate receiving the largest number of votes was elected President while the office of vice president went to the candidate receiving the next highest number.

Pfc. C. W. Conway Flying In Europe With Air Transport

European Division, Air Transport—From the time an Air Transport Command plane leaves the ground until it arrives at its destination, contact is maintained with ground control stations through the flight radio operator. He is the only link of communication between the plane and the ground. Serving in European Theater of Operations in this capacity, Pfc. Claude W. Conway, son of Rosemary Conway, Tahoka, Texas, is responsible for the airway communications as his plane flies along the various flight corridors.

In supplying the demands of vital war cargo and carrying important passengers, Pfc. Conway travels all over the United Kingdom and the continents of Europe and Africa. He has been to many countries and famous cities, while performing his duties as a flight radio operator. The task of a flight radio operator calls for knowledge of myriad subjects. He must have an intimate understanding of the radio procedures used by the different allied nations as well as the American method. He must know how to code and cipher messages, and to make emergency repairs to the radio during flight. He must give check point reports to ground control as his plane passes over certain designated points. Every message to and from the plane is transmitted through the flight radio operator.

The European Division, USAAF Air Transport Command, commanded by Brigadier General Earl S. Hog, to which Pfc. Conway is assigned, has the important mission of supplying vital war cargo and carrying important passengers throughout the war zones. Pfc. Conway and the other flight radio operators, through their skill and training, are important factors in bringing their cargo to its destination safely.

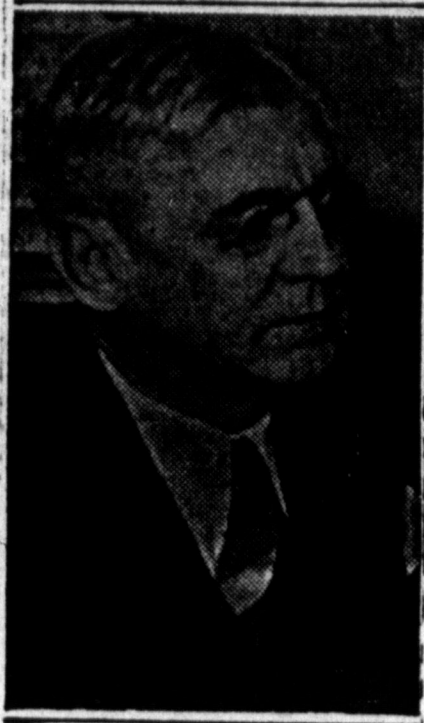
Wilson FFA Holds Annual Banquet

The citation sent his wife, who has been here visiting Mr. and Mrs. Lt. Moore, dated March 2, reads as follows: "1st. Lt. Kay K. Moore—Cavalry Reconnaissance Troop for heroic achievement against an armed enemy on 9 Feb. 1945. When his platoon was pinned down on the edge of Germany by superior enemy fire directed upon it from dominating dug-in positions, 1st. Lt. Moore moved across 300 yards of open fire-swept terrain to an artillery observation post to obtain support. Under the protection of the artillery fire his platoon was able to withdraw without loss. The courage displayed by Lt. Moore was an inspiration to his men and in keeping with the highest tradition of the armed forces of the United States."

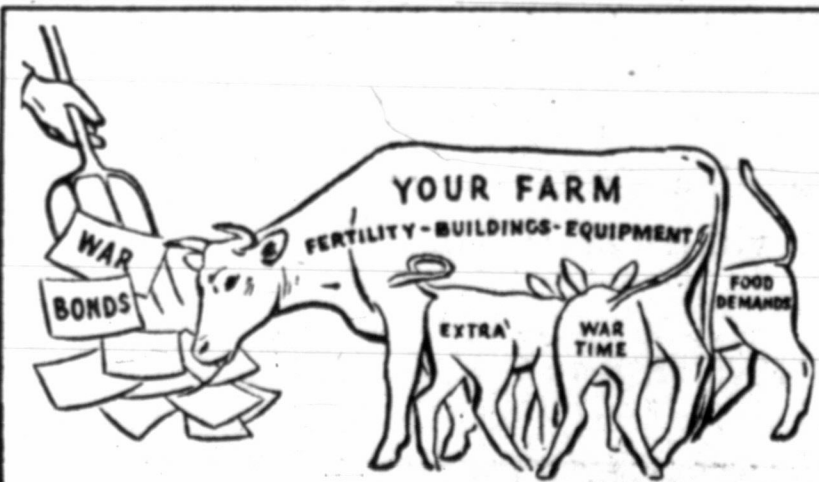
