Large Crowd At Prayer Service For War's End

Several hundred people from Tahoka and various communities of the county gathered in the City Park at 3:90 o'clock last Sunday afternoon to engage in a service of Prayer and thanksgiving in response to a call made by Judge Tom Garrad.

Judge Garrard presided. A number of prayers were offered and religious and patriotic songs were sung, led by Osa Gattis.

The speakers of the day were District Attorney Calloway Huffaker and Rev. Levi W. Price, Baptist returned later for basic training at pastor here. Both addresses were excellent. Wife Will Receive Husband's D.S.C.

Mrs. Lucille Johnson Burgin of Tahoka will be presented the Distinguished Service Cross for her husband, Pfc. James F. Burgin, killed in action in France June 30. 1944, at an All-Post Review at the Lubbock Army Air Field Sunday. May 26, at 3 p. m.

This information has been received by Mrs. Burgin from Major General J. A. Ulio of the War De-

Pfc. Burgin, who was 33 at the time of his death, was inducted on Feb. 6. 1942. He went overseas in the latter part of 1943 as a sergeant, but was reduced to private first class on transferring from the Air Corps to the Infantry. His mother lives at Carlsbad, N. M.

The Distinguished Service Cross citation reads: "For extraordinary heroism in action against the enemy on 30 June 1944, Pfc. Burgin, a machine gun section leader, volunteered to go oct and handgrenade an enemy strongpoint consisting of two pillboxes which had been by-passed. As he was moving forward, the enemy placed heavy small arms and mortar fire upon him. Disdaining to withdraw in face of this intense enemy fire, he continued forward to hand grenade one of the pillboxes and singlehandedly capture the occupants. On the way to the second pillbox. a very heavy enemy artillery barrage was laid down in front of Pfc. Burgin pinning him down. As soon as the artillery fire lifted momentarily, he moved to attack the pillbox but before he reached his objective the enemy continued the barrage and killed this valiant soldier. The extraordinary heroism and personal bravery displayed by Pfc. Burgin is in keeping with the highest traditions of the Armed

Killed In Action

Pfc. Doil Jones was killed in action on Luzon, Philippine Islands, in April 21, according to a message received Monday from the War Department by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Jones of Grassland.

A memorial service in his memory will be held at the Post Church of the Nazarene Sunday at 3 o'clock, conducted by Rev. D. W. Reed of Garnolia and Rev. Floyd Duke, the pastor of the Grassland Church f the Nazarene.

A member of Company B, 126th Infantry, Pfc. Jones had been overseas since Dec. 3, 1944. He entered the service July 10, 1944, received basic training at Camp Wolers, Texas, and went from there o the Fort Ord, Calif., embarkaion camp.

Roy Everett Free From Nazi Prison

Roy E. Everett Jr., O'Donnell, a prisoner of the Germany, was liberated by American Army forces on May 11, according to a message received here this week. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Everett, and has a small son Bobby Roy.

Everett entered the Army March 29, 1944, and after training in the States went overseas. He was listed as missing in action on December 21. Relatives learned on April 14 that he was a prisoner, when he wrote he was in Stalag No. 4 at Mulhberg, Germany, and that F. M. Walker of Grassland was in the same camp. This letter was dated January 3.

Pvt. R. V. Poindexter, son Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Poindexter of Wayside store, was among the American prisoners of war liberated in Germany recently, it has been learned here.

R. V. was taken prisoner Feb. 17, 1943, in North Africa, at the battle of Kassarine Pass, and he was held at Stalag 3-B, at least most of the time. Entering the service May 7, 1942, he trained at Fort Knox, Ky., for four months, then went with our forces to North Ireland, and from there on the North Africa invasion.

Boyd Rice and family lived Tahoka for a number of years back in the late twenties. Boyd being a rural mail carrier here. His father, J. E. Rice, lives in the Joe Stokes community.

Lynn county's over-all quota \$650,000.00, about the same as in the last two or three drives. However the quota for E Bonds is \$335,000, about double the previous quotas. This means the small purchasers will have to bear the heavy burden this time if the campaign is to be a success.







f communication between the plane and the ground, Serving in European Theater of Operations in this capacity, Pfc. Claude W. Conway, son of Rosemary Conway, Taoka, Texas is responsible for the irway communications as his plane lies along the various flight cor-

In supplying the demands of vital war cargo and carrying important passengers, Pfc. Conway travels all over the United Kingdom and the continents of Europe and Africa He has been to many countries and famous cities, while performing his duties as a flight radio operator. The task of a flight radio operator calls for knowledge of myriad ubjects. He must have an intimate

understanding of the radio procedures used by the different allied nations as well as the American method. He must know how to code and cipher messages, and to make emergency repairs to the radio during flight. He must give check point reports to ground control as his plane passes over certain designated points. Every message to and from the plane is transmitted through the flight radio

The European Division, USAAF Air Transport Command, commanded by Brigadier General Earl S. Hog, to which Pfc. Conway is assigned, has the important mission of supplying vital war cargo and carrying important parsengers throughout the war zones. Pfc. Conway and the other flight radio operators, through their skill and training, are important factors in bringing their cargo to its destination safely.


