## American Legion Post Elects New Officers For Year

Officers for the new year were elected Tuesday night by Marion G. Bradley Post No. 250, American Legion at its regular monthly meeting at the Legion Hall.

E. J. Hendrix was re-elected post commander, and R. R. Adams post adjutant.

Other officers named are: Chas. Walden, first vice commander; Dr. W. A. Schaal, second vice commander; Tom Gill, chaplain; W. E. (Happy) Smith, historian; and J. B. Oliver, sergeant-at-arms.

Six delegates and four alternates to the state convention were elected, namely: Hendrix, Claude Conway, Walden, Schaal, Tom Short, and Jim Woods, delegates; A. E. Ware, H. Y. Conrad, Happy Smith, A. M. Cade, alternates.

The local post has had a fairly active year in spite of the fact that attendance has been low at many of the meetings.

The local post now has a paid-up membership of 107 Legionnaires, as against a quota of 45, one of the outstanding records of the American Legion in Northwest Texas.

## Lt. Kay Moore Is Home From War

Lt. Kay Moore, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Moore, of New Home badly wounded in Germany, has been temporarily released from Fitzsimmons hospital, Denver, and is visiting his parents.

First hand information of his terrible experience develops that his reconnaissance outfit was ordered to clean out passageway thru a town of some 75,000. Apparently this had been accomplished when Kay stepped into his armored car and radioed his colonel that all was clear. As he arose to light a cigarette, a bazooka was fired from a distance of some fifty yards by a supposedly fanatical S. S. trooper who had evidently posed as a civilian.

The shot was a good one and molten metal struck Kay from his shoulder clear down to his heels. Had the shot been fired a few seconds earlier, his head would have been struck. Apparently there are as many as 200 pieces of steel yet embedded in his body. Fortunately, this metal does not cause infection as does lead.

As Kay stepped into the car to send the message, he left his driver with nine of the Germans. This fact convinced Kay that the rascal who "shot him in the back" was an S. S. trooper, since the killing of their fellowmen who had surrendered was a large part of their work.

Lt. Moore is returning to the Denver hospital this week for another operation.

He served about nine months with the 87th Recon. Troop, which saw action in Germany. In fact it is said that Cpl. Stone captured the very first Germans that were by his troop. He is held in very high esteem by his commanding officer for service rendered overseas the News learns.

He served in the Bismarck-Archipelago, East Indies, and Luzon campaigns.

George saw 26 months of action in the south west Pacific and though the brothers were often very close to each other it was never their good fortune to meet. George is now back at sea, after a 30-day leave home in December and January.

He was found dead, sitting on the same tractor at 5 o'clock that afternoon. Evidently, he was stricken while riding the tractor, the machine having traveled some distance before the engine died.

Funeral services were held at the O'Donnell Methodist Church Friday at 4:00 p. m. Rev. H. H. Hollowell a former pastor, and Rev. B. H. Crandall, present pastor, officiating.

He had lived in or near O'Donnell most of his adult life. He was a veteran of World War I, and at various times had worked for a lumber company, the bank, was in the insurance business a while, and more recently had been farming.

## Pfc. Music Is In El Paso Hospital

El Paso, Texas. — Pfc. Randolph W. Musick, Tahoka Infantryman wounded in Italy, is now a patient at William Beaumont General Hospital where he was flown from Europe for treatment for his wounded legs and face.

Pvt. Musick was in action with the 85th Infantry Division for 10 months as a rifleman. He was wounded April 19 by shrapnel from a German artillery which burst near his fox hole.

He has been awarded the Purple Heart for his wounds and a European Theatre of Operation Ribbon with two battle stars. Private Musick was a mechanic before he entered the army a year ago.

His wife, Franke, lives in Tahoka.

## Lt. Johnson, Liberated Prisoner, Is Home

First Lt. Cloyse Johnson and wife of Texarkana arrived here Friday to visit with his mother, Mrs. Jewel Johnson, also his grandmother, Mrs. Maude Bledsoe and aunt, Mrs. N. H. Cromer all of Tahoka.

Lt. Johnson has just arrived in the states after being a prisoner in Germany for 9 months. He was a Navigator on a B-17 and was shot down on his 11th mission. There were 33 out of 38 planes in his squadron went down the same day due to fighter opposition.

## Lt. Britt Kemp Is Awarded D.F.C. Posthumously

Fifth Air Force, Philippines.—Second Lt. Elias B. Kemp, Tahoka, navigator-bombardier on a B-25 Billy Mitchell bomber of the Fifth Air Force Bombardment Command, has been awarded posthumously a Distinguished Flying Cross for extraordinary achievement while participating in a flight over Phan Rang Bay on the coast of French Indo-China, by General George C. Kenney, commanding the Far East Air Forces.

He was a crew member of one of nine, unescorted B-25 aircraft which attacked a Japanese convoy consisting of a destroyer, two destroyer escorts, two tankers, and three or four smaller vessels. When about a mile from the concentration of shipping, his plane was hit by anti-aircraft fire from one of the destroyer-escorts. The right engine burst into flames, threatening to envelop the entire plane.

Although Lt. Kemp's plane was severely damaged, it remained in formation in order to protect the squadron leader's plane, the forward guns of which were not firing. A strafing attack was made on the destroyer-escort, knocking out its guns. Fifty yards beyond the ship, the plane crashed and exploded, killing all crew members.

The citation said, "The outstanding courage and devotion to duty displayed by Lt. Kemp during this flight are in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army Air Forces."

Commissioned on January 15, 1944, Lt. Kemp arrived overseas on January 23, 1945. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Eva M. Kemp, who is now making her home in Tahoka.

## Wide Publicity Is Given Air Course

The following article concerning the pre-flight course offered in Tahoka High School appeared in last week's issue of Cross Country News, a paper for private flyers which circulates through five southwestern states, Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Louisiana:

B. T. Smith, principal of one of the local schools and holder of a CAA ground instructor's certificate and commercial pilot's license, has just completed the third year of pre-flight aeronautical training for the students of Tahoka High School, one of the few aviation courses offered in Texas schools.

The course this year was terminated by giving the students the regular CAA private pilot's examination by using questions furnished by the CAA and the test conducted in the same manner as one given a candidate for a private license. The papers were sent to Washington for grading.

One hundred per cent of the pupils received a certificate of aeronautical knowledge and some of the grades ranged well up in the 90's.

The term "pre-flight" cannot be applied in its fullest meaning for the past year because every student taking the course had been up on demonstration flights and six had received their solo certificate, and are now practicing for their private license. These students are in the 17-18-year-old age groups.

Plans are now being formulated by Smith for expansion of the course during the coming school year through the use of surplus government aircraft and by the addition of a considerable amount of flight training.



## County Agent Says:

The Johnson grass eradication program in Lynn county is making some progress, according to reports coming into the County Agent's office during the week. Although this is too early to make any definite conclusions as to the results thus far obtained in the Johnson Grass program, a summary of the survey cards already received in the office indicate that some thirty-five per cent (35%) of the farms in the county are already free of Johnson Grass.

The most popular control methods used thus far seem to be intensive cultivation including plowing and hoeing. Quite a few, however, are using kerosene, distillate, tractor fuel, and salt with fair results.

Some new methods of controlling Johnson Grass have been reported in the survey that offer very promising results. One in particular was reported by Walter Maeker, who states that his neighbor, A. B. Prewitt, used one can of lye to five gallons of water and applied it to the Johnson grass when it was a round one foot tall. He says that got excellent top kill with a possibility that he might have killed it entirely since it has not come up again yet.

All the farmers in Lynn county who have not already received this months Johnson grass letter will be mailed one in the near future. It is hoped that all survey cards will be filed out and returned in order that a complete summary may be made of the Johnson Grass Control Program in Lynn county.

Dr. J. P. Campbell, O'Donnell, came by the office this week and reported that his Weeping Lovegrass demonstration was making nice progress. Dr. Campbell planted around twenty-five (25) acre of Weeping Lovegrass last fall on a very sandy plot of ground that he hopes to return to pasture later. Although he received his seed several months late and was unable to get a good stand of the grass. He reports that the grass survived the prolonged drought this summer and is now looking very promising.

Weeping Lovegrass is a bunch type perennial recently introduced from South Africa. This grass had made excellent stand and yields in both broadcast strips and rows in various parts of Oklahoma. It has completely controlled weeds or other undesirable competing plants on poor, eroded soil. It is a good seed producer and easy to establish. It makes a vigorous growth on various soil conditions and has excellent value for erosion control purposes. Weeping Lovegrass is a very promising plant for this area for revegetating eroded and abandoned land.

The deadline for making application for the free cotton classification and market news service under the Smith-Dooley act is within sight. According to information to the A. & M. College Extension Service from Olen E. Justice of Dallas, Aug. 1 is the closing date for applications from Texas counties east of the 100th meridian and Aug. 15 for the areas west of that degree of longitude. Justice is acting chief of the marketing reports division, U. S. Department of Agriculture, for the southwest area. He said that the free classification and market news service is a variety groups for the purpose of ers who are organized into one-variety groups for the purpose of improving the quality of their cotton. In order to be eligible for this free service, he explained, organized growers must apply for it on or before a specified date each year.

Specifically, applications must be received at the nearest Cotton Classing Office of the Office of Marketing Service on or before the dates given to make growers eligible to receive the service, Justice said.

The purpose of the service is to encourage cotton growers to produce better quality cotton by planting improved varieties of seed. Farmers eligible for the service submit samples of their cotton to cotton classing offices and receive free a certificate showing the grade and staple length. Justice said that the market news service provided information on the price of various grades and staple lengths at the principal markets. This information placed the grower in a better bargaining position to sell his cotton. The certificate of quality is necessary if cotton is placed in the government loan, but it is furnished free only to organized growers whose applications for the service are made on time, Justice explained.

Around ninety-eight per cent (98%) of the cotton produced in Lynn county last year was included in this free cotton classing service. All growers in the county are urged to get their applications to the Lubbock office by the August 15th deadline.

## Cpl. Elgin Harper Still In Germany

With the XXIII Corps in Germany—Cpl. Elgin E. Harper is with the 763rd Field Artillery Bn., carrying out a multitude of occupational duties with Major General Hugh J. Gaffey's XXIII Corps.

On the Continent since early this year, the 763rd now has its headquarters in historic Trier, on the banks of the Moselle, where it maintains a base of operations for asks such as Military Police duty, maintenance of the German border security patrol and operation of the hugh Allied camps in which are living thousands of former German prisoners of war who were liberated in th drive to Berlin.

Duty is not what was is in war-time, however the battalion is maintaining an active sports and recreational program; passes to Paris Brussels, the Riviera and the XXIII Corps Rest Center in Luxembourg are being made available, and organized tours of the centuries-old town of Trier are being conducted by 763rd officers.

Activated in 1944 at Fort Jackson S. C., the battalion trained there before sailing for Europe at the end of the year; service in France and he Belgian-Luxembourg area preceded its present assignment as a unit of the Fifteenth United States Army commanded by Lieutenant General Leonard T. Gerow.


Director of Orthopaedic at the New York State Reconstruction Hospital, where he will return following a few days visit in California.



## Show Manager Is Winner of Award

Ted Waggoner, manager of the Rose and Wallace Theatres, received a citation this week from the Motion Picture Theatre Managers Round Table club as an award for outstanding showmanship during the second quarter of 1945.

The Motion Picture Theatre Managers Round Table club, an organization for the exchange of advertising ideas of theatre men all over the world, is sponsored by the Quigley Theatre publications, and requires the full time services of an editor and associate editor in New York City, who with their staff handle publicity ideas from theatre managers from the four corners of the earth. Each week the best ideas and pictures of the theatre front advertising displays are printed in the Motion Picture Herald, a weekly theatre publication with far reaching circulation. Recently several pictures of the local theatres have been reproduced in this publication, and as a result of outstanding ideas Waggoner submitted, his theatres were placed among the first fifteen by a group of Motion Picture Executives who acted as judges.

The quarterly awards consist of citations and the advertising material winning these awards is carried over until the end of the year where it is again judged and a silver plaque is awarded the outstanding showman of the entire year. Although never winning a final award Waggoner has had his ideas in on the final judging every year except one during the past six years, running third and fourth in two of these years.

One other person in the state won a quarterly citation and that was a theatre manager for a big circuit in Dallas. In fact, every other winner was a theatre manager in cities of over 100,000 population.

Waggoner recently won a \$100.00 War Bond as second prize in a national contest for having the second best advertising campaign in the nation on a Universal Short Subject. This week he also received a citation from the United States Treasury Department for service rendered during the 7th War Loan.

## Son of 'Mother of Kings' Became English Monarch

During the 18th century, Sophia of Hannover, Germany, became known as the "Mother of Kings." She herself was in line for the British succession as the great-granddaughter of Mary, Queen of Scots. When her death, in 1714, prevented fulfillment of the act of parliament by which she would have been offered the crown, her son, as George I, became the first of the Hannoverian dynasty to rule England.

Besides the Hannoverian and British lines, Sophia was associated with the royal house of Prussia by the marriage of her daughter, Sophia Charlotte, to Frederick I, first king of Prussia. Her granddaughter, Sophia Dorothea, married Frederick William I of Prussia, and became mother of Frederick the Great.

In Great Britain, although the Hannover blood relationship remained, the male succession of the house was broken when Victoria came to the throne and married Albert, of the German state of Sax-Coburg and Gotha. During the First World War, George V relinquished all German titles. The name of the ruling house was then abandoned for that of Windsor.

## Reinforcements Improve Appearance of Garments

A few reinforcements at proper places will improve the wearing quality and appearance of your garment quite out of proportion to the time you spend on it. Strengthen the end of a placket with a few extra stitches, or stay it by sewing a tape across the end on the underside.

Make dress and apron pockets more sturdy by laying a piece of tape on the underside of the garment in line with the pocket top. Stitch it in with the corners.

Rework raveled or weak buttonholes. Resew snaps or hooks and eyes securely, and resew loose buttons with strong thread, leaving a shank of thread so that the buttonhole can slip under the button without straining the cloth or puckering.

Replace sleazy trims, which make a garment look cheap, with more durable trimming. On some garments, collar edges, neck openings, belts and sleeve openings can be strengthened and made more attractive by a row or two of topstitching.

## T.B. Infection

Now that tuberculosis in cattle has been reduced to a small fraction of 1 per cent as a result of the systematic federal-state campaign of eradication, veterinary officials are concerned about the danger of tuberculosis-free herds becoming reinfected. One way that this can happen is from persons who have tuberculosis, present evidence indicates. Dr. A. W. Wight, who directs tuberculosis eradication in livestock for the Federal Bureau of Animal Industry, cites a case, recorded in veterinary literature and supported by detailed records, in which four herds of cattle were infected by one person. Because of this danger he urges close cooperation between public health officials and veterinarians engaged in bovine tuberculosis eradication. Some cases of pulmonary tuberculosis, he explains, are caused by the bovine type of the germ and this type can readily infect cattle. Knowledge of the kind of tuberculosis a human patient has is helpful to veterinarians in tracing the source of infection when healthy cattle in the locality become tubercular.

## Outdoor Center

The back yard has come to be recognized as the center for family outdoor living and should be so treated. It should offer some use for every member of the family and for the guests of the family—a sand box and swing for the youngsters, a lawn for sun-bathing and for family games and a fine tree or two for summer shade. There should be flower borders along the sides for mother and an area where father can grow tomatoes and small vegetables. A pergola or summer house serves many useful purposes, and there may be room for an outdoor fireplace for picnic suppers. Formerly the only use made of the back yard was for vegetable gardens, laundry drying and ash piles. The front yard was the only area that received any landscape attention, and it was generally decorated with either two round canna beds or two blue spruce. Family life was strictly an indoor affair as contrasted to today's mode of living.

## Inland Sea

The Inland Sea, often termed Japan's Mediterranean, borders the western portion of the main Jap island of Honshu on the south. The Inland sea winds for 260 miles in a chain of six small, shallow lakes, or nadas, connected by narrow straits. Varying little in size, the nadas average 40 miles in length by 20 miles in width. White sands, green pines, palisade shores and a thousand islands give them beauty renowned. If their basins were to be pushed up 100 feet, they would largely become ash and lava hill country like surrounding land. Connecting this Inland sea with open ocean are three narrow straits, each fortified and easily defended against sea-level approach because their combined width is no more than that of the mouth of Delaware bay.



## Surgical Starch Sponges

Seen as a Possibility

There is a possibility of developing surgical sponges made of starch that can safely be sewed up in wounds because the sponge material can be absorbed by the body.

Starch sponges are made of starch paste slowly frozen and then thawed. The paste may be frozen and thawed in shallow pans and then cut into pieces of the required size and shape. A dry starch sponge is hard and somewhat brittle, but it will quickly absorb about 15 to 18 times its weight of liquid. When wet, the sponge is soft and pliable and will retain most of the liquid in it if handled gently. It has been shown that the starch dissolves in blood serum. These properties suggested use of the sponges as surgical dressings.

One of the advantages would be that wounds and incisions would not have to be reopened to remove dressings. The starch sponge would also be valuable in surface wounds, where tissues are sometimes torn when dressings are removed. The sponge might be filled with a medicinal solution, such as one of penicillin or a sulfa drug, which would be gradually released as the starch dissolves.

## Municipal Finances Show

Improvement During War

The municipal finance picture for the last year shows continued reduction of debt, excellent tax collections, capital improvements at a standstill, steady accumulation of reserves to finance public improvement programs after the war. Despite these favorable trends, municipalities generally during the year devoted considerable thought to new sources of revenue to ease the strain on the local property tax.

In this connection, collection of taxes delinquent since 1929 still is an important issue and the chief problem in hundreds of municipalities; and the many communities supplementing current tax levies with back taxes for the last six or seven years now face the necessity of living on current taxes only.

Some cities received revenues from new sources during the year, however. California and Washington communities, for example, received substantial amounts of new revenue from admission taxes, while Missouri localities report success with occupational licenses based on gross income instead of flat sum. Alabama and Virginia cities received shares of profits from the state liquor store monopoly.

## Table Thinning

Instead of pulling out young plants and discarding them, thrifty gardeners make good use of them. In a row of greens, for example, those that grow tall first are pulled for table use, leaving the smaller plants to develop for later use. Beets are thinned for the kettle at several stages of growth. Pull them first for tender cooked greens when the roots are about the size of the little finger and can be cooked attached to the tops. Later, pull beets when the roots reach walnut size, and serve the family tender baby beets. Onion rows may be thinned in much the same way. Some of the most delicious carrots are those of pencil size, thinned from the row. These tiny carrots are a treat exclusive to the home gardener because they never appear on markets. The saving way to use leaf lettuce and chard from the garden is to pick the leaves only, and let the plant continue to grow and produce more.

## Yandell Helps In Fight Against Japs

Aboard The USS Hugh W. Hadley In The Pacific — James L. Yandell, first class, USNR, Tahoka, Texas, helped this destroyer knock out 23 attacking Jap planes in 105 minutes when in the company of a smaller destroyer on a patrol off Okinawa. She was attacked by 150 Jap fighters. Her feat set an all-time Navy record.

The other ship, the USS EVANS, destroyed 18 enemy planes in 73 minutes.

The attack began at 8 a. m. May 11 when lookouts saw a "whirlwind" of planes coming at us from every direction. The men of repetition the Hadley went to work firing their guns so rapidly that reliefs had to be afforded the exhausted ammunition loaders.

The ships were under continuous attacks with enemy planes usually coming in four to six at a time. At times, each ship was shooting down planes that were attacking the other. At the start of the battle, this ship was not only able to hold her own against the attacking planes, but

was able to knock down four of the massed planes which attempted to pass the ships and continue on to Okinawa.

Only at the end of 60 minutes did the first plane get through and strike the Evans, followed by three other in quick succession. This knocked out the guns of the smaller destroyer, leaving its protection up to the skill of he gunners on this ship.

Once 10 enemy aircraft surrounded the ships and made a simultaneous attack. All 10 of them were destroyed, but not before this ship suffered heavy damage and most of her guns were knocked out.

In the meantime, Corsair fighters had joined the battle and though out numbered had managed to destroy about 50 of the enemy, and drive away the others.

At one point when it looked as if this ship would capsize, all the wounded were put over the side on rafts and floats, but the remaining

men stayed aboard and kept her afloat. Next day, both ships were brought in safely.

Not only had the HADLEY saved herself, but in giving assistance to the EVANS when it was greatly needed, enabled the crew of that ship to put out fires and make repairs which permitted her to limp back to port.



## Residue Removal Helps Control Corn Borer

The European corn borer develops into the flying and egg-laying moth stage late in the spring or early in the summer from borers that have passed the winter in the stalks and stubble of corn, and other coarse-stemmed crops and weeds. In order to prevent serious increases of this pest, entomologists of the USDA's research administration, say that all residues of these crops and weeds, especially corn, should be completely destroyed.

In 1944, despite light infestation in the eastern part of the infected region, due primarily to drought conditions, the European corn borer caused a corn crop loss of over \$22,000,000. Under favorable weather conditions, each female moth will lay an average of 400 eggs—and sometimes as many as 1,900—which hatch in four to nine days.

Infested cornstalks are removed in three ways: by feeding to livestock; by deep and clean plowing; and by complete burning. In the eastern states areas the corn borer attacks—in addition to corn—a great variety of vegetables, field crops, flowers, large-stemmed weeds and grasses. In these areas, remnants of these plants must be included in farm disposal or clean-up operations. In the lake states area the borer breeds mostly in corn. In most of the infested states there are two broods of the borer per year, and in the southernmost of these there may be three broods. The insect begins its activities earlier in the season in the most southern and eastern states and continues them later than it does in the lake states.

## Moisture Reduction Aids

### Dehydrated Food Life

Keeping quality of dehydrated vegetables increases markedly with a decrease in the moisture content, according to tests made at the Western research laboratory of the U. S. department of agriculture.

Dehydrated vegetables lowered in moisture content beyond present commercial attainments have been found to retain their quality proportionally better, without refrigeration as a protective measure, according to L. B. Howard of the laboratory staff. Although current dehydrated vegetables are serving their purpose, they are still subject to deterioration during storage, especially if they must meet the hazard of high temperatures for prolonged periods. Consequently there is need for an efficient and feasible method of lowering the moisture content below present purchase specifications.

Still lower moisture contents are attainable only through a limited number of measures, Dr. Howard points out. These would require additional costs. Of the methods now available, the use of the "in package" desiccant, or drying agent, such as calcined lime held in moisture-permeable packages, seems to offer the most promise.

## Photoflash Camera

Details concerning the electric illumination of an astounding new photoflash camera, now in use by the armed forces, and designed to take clear bird's-eye pictures by night from reconnaissance planes have been divulged. For proper operation, the flash tube is plugged into any one of three rather complex electronic devices designed for its use. Purpose of the auxiliary system is to pile up a tremendous amount of electrical energy which, when released suddenly into the flash tube, results in a blinding "explosion of light." Although each flash of the new tube is many hundred times as bright as that from flash bulbs used by news photographers, its duration is confined to a mere one thousandth of a second. So great, however, is the heat developed, that a steady blast of air must be forced through the jacket to cool the coil. Despite the forced cooling of the light source, heat from the flash is so intense that it chars wood at a distance of a foot or so from the tube.

## Belgium's Terrain

Belgium's polder country near the coast was once a region of lagoons. It has been reclaimed for agriculture by pumping and draining. The tracts of sandy, clayey soil—at or below sea level—are protected by dikes and laced by canals. Raised causeways cross the fields. The landscape is treeless except for rows of poplars planted along the dikes and causeways. The second strip of sandy soil stretches almost across the country. Its highest points are not more than 250 feet above sea level. Much of the land is barren heath; reclamation has been a continuous project. The western part of this strip is the plain of Flanders.
