Shower Tuesday Aids Crops Over Much of County

A light rain fell throughout Lynn county and most of the other counties of the South Plains on Tuesday morning, which will be of great benefit to crops, though more rain would have been welcomed. The rainfall in Tahoka amounted to .46 of an inch. In some localities in the county was much heavier than that and in others it was lighter. In a strip of country lying this side of Grassland farmers report that an inch to 1 1/2 inches of water fell. Further south, in the Draw-Redwine area, the precipitation was very light. O'Donnell and vicinity also received very little rain. In other parts of the county the fall probably averaged about a half inch.

This moisture has been very helpful to the crops temporarily but they will need more rainfall soon.

Geo. Mahon Knew Of Atomic Bomb

Following the announcement by President Truman of the new atomic bomb, Congressman George Mahon made known some of the inside facts in connection with the production of this deadly and spectacular weapon.

The eight man subcommittee on Military Appropriations of which Mahon is a member provided the federal funds for the project, beginning in the early days of the war. It was necessary to maintain the secrecy of the project in order to deny to the enemy any knowledge of it. The committee devised a way to provide funds for the project without even making known to the Congress that such an undertaking was in operation.

In commenting on the new weapon Mahon said, "Our committee has been working on the project for more than three years. General Marshall assured us of his faith and the faith of the President and qualified experts in the project and we backed it, providing the funds, feeling that if the two billion dollar experiment was a success it would shorten the war and save lives. That apparently is what is to happen."

Finally after months of impatient waiting for the production of the first bomb, Secretary of War Stimson.

Overseas he was with the 13th armored division of the Third Army and was one of those who fought their way through Germany and on into Austria, helping to capture Braunau in Austria, Adolf Hitler's old home town. For a while he was also stationed at Nuernberg, Germany. He was in the war area from February until June 20, and arrived back home in Tahoka, on Sunday, July 29.

At the end of his furlough, he will be sent to the Pacific to help clean up on the Japs.

Pfc. Chancy was born in Sweetwater but was reared here, attended the Tahoka public school, and before enlisting in the service he was a picture show operator.

Soldier Collects Many Souvenirs In Germany

Pvt. Rupert Douglas Davenport, 18, combat infantryman, who was with the U. S. Army during the march into Germany, but who now is in France guarding prisoners, has sent his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J.B. Davenport, a German rifle.

He writes that among the other trophies which he has are two Luger pistols, a machine gun, field glasses, watch, a pistol which shoots 22 shells and fits in his watch pocket, sword, and camera.

He has no idea when he will be able to come home.

County Agent Says:

The additional moisture received this week should materially increase our chances at a grain sorghum crop this year. There is quite a large acreage however that was planted so late that there is little hope for a grain crop being harvested from it. With the prospect of a great many acres of young feed that has a very small chance of maturing a grain crop, there is on foot at this time a program to focus our attention upon the value of and need for more silage.

Mr. C. W. Jackson, who is in charge of the Farm and Home Radio Program, is plugging silage on his radio program almost every day. According to the present prospects we are faced with a greater need for more silage now than at any other time. Many farmers with livestock ran out of roughage this year and had to buy expensive roughage when they ordinarily would

be taking advantage of summer pasture. A few acres of grain sorghum put in the silo is the best insurance against his condition.

Quite a number of letters from out of County landlords have arrived in the County Agent's office regarding the Johnson Grass program in this county. Those who have written in are surely in agreement with the Johnson Grass control program and think that we cannot over emphasize the importance of controlling the Johnson Grass in this county. Most of the landlords are anxious to do their part in bearing the necessary expenses to control Johnson Grass. Typical of the replies received from out of county landlords is this card from Belton, Texas. "Dear Sir—Your letter anent Johnson Grass control has been received, and I have forwarded same to Jack Cook, tenant, Wilson, Texas, RFD No. 2, with the request that he answer your card, or better still personally confer with you and cooperate with you and all the farmers of Lynn or any other counties on the South Plains. Cook knows all about Johnson Grass as he was raised in a Johnson Grass patch at Salado, Bell county, ten miles south of here. If there are more than two or three farms in Bell county that is not covered, more or less, I do know them and I came to Bell county on March 25, 1875, and have been here all the time. I know what Johnson Grass means to farming. Ask E. I. Hill, Lynn County News man. He also knows about this wonderful (?) grass as he too was raised down here. 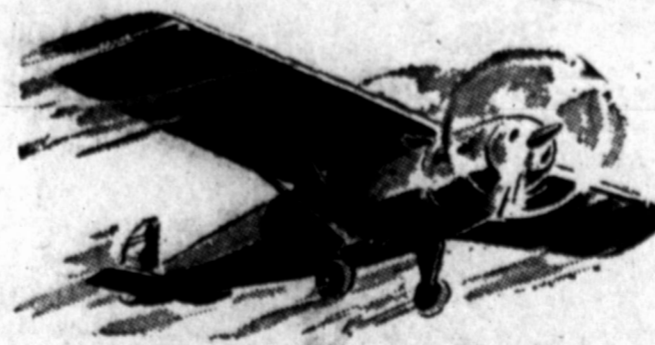

William Shirer, war commentator who has spent many years in Europe, says that many of our soldiers are coming home with a strong dislike for all our Allies, especially the English, French, Belgians, and Italians, and he thinks it is due mainly to the fact they have seen only the worst side of these people and have had no opportunity to come to know them intimately or socially. He thinks that something ought to be done about it; that those remaining over there for any considerable length of time should be given much opportunity to mix and mingle with the people of those lands. He is probably right. Even here in our own country, soldiers from the North and East who have been sent down to camps, and airfields in the South have often gotten a wrong impression of the Southern people and the same is doubtless true of Southern boys who have been sent to other parts of our country. Shirer suggests that

courses designed to correct any such false impressions should be included in the curriculum of the 1,236,200 American soldier in Europe who have enrolled for various educational courses being offered by our Army authorities over there. Otherwise, they may come back home more isolationist than were our bitterest isolationist leaders before the war. It is a matter for our most serious consideration.

First reports of the work of the Big Three at Potsdam, reveal that a very large portion of Germany is to be awarded to Poland. This is just to our liking, provided Poland is herself given a free hand to run her own affairs, unhampered by Russia. Likewise, a portion of that part of Germany which projects far to the southeast between Poland and Czechoslovakia is to be given to the latter country; which also suits us. Russia is to get all that portion of East Prussia which does not go to Poland. East Prussia for many decades has been a hot-bed of German militarism, and its dissection and assignment to the Russians and the Poles is a matter of retributive justice which should please everybody except the Germans. The Sarr Valley in Southwest Germany will probably be given to France, another hunk of Western Germany will go to Belgium, and still another to Holland. It seems probable that a portion of the Rhine Valley will be internationalized. It seems certain that Germany is to be trimmed down to proper size and a watch is to be kept over her for years to prevent her re-arming. Like wise, her schools are to be reorganized and her children to be educated along democratic principles, it is hoped. That too suits us. Germany may never again be allowed to ride on a "high horse."

Lt. Governor John Lee Smith may often be radical and erratic, but he has recently called attention again to many acts of disloyalty on the part some labor leaders and members of some labor unions whose inexcusable conduct goes unpunished. Right here in Texas recent strikes have been started in war industry plants by certain labor unions which are calculated to slow down our war efforts, and instead of punishing the strikers our government has seized the plants and has thus made the owners and operators suffer for the sins of the strikers. Our authorities at Washington should get hard-boiled with such strikers rather than with the unfeeling employers. It is a species of disloyalty and hi-jacking that must be suppressed sooner or later.

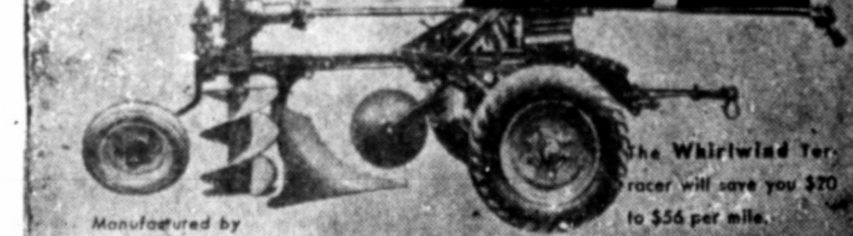

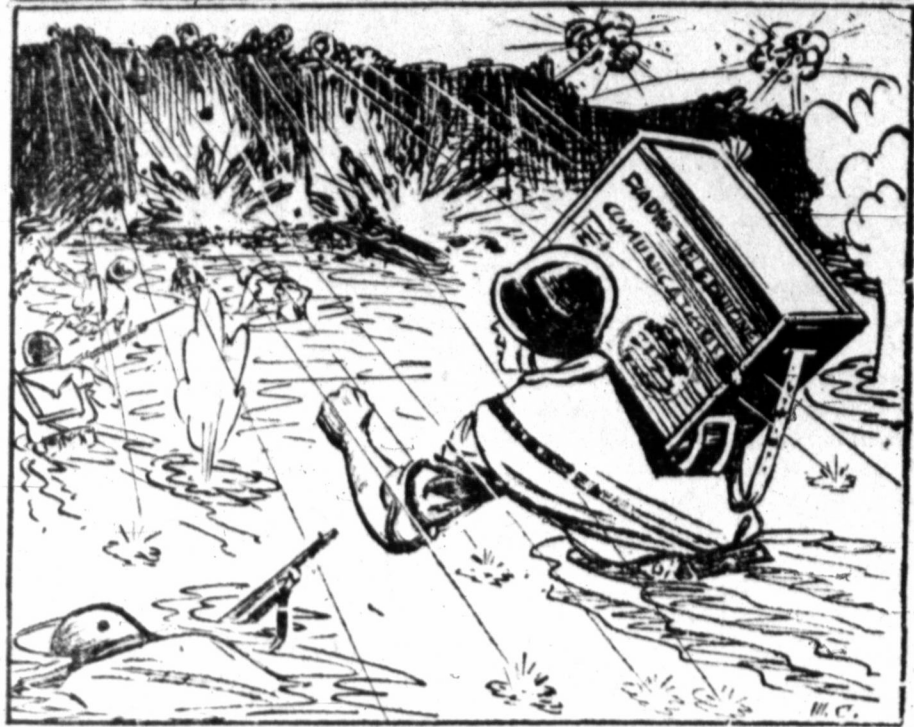

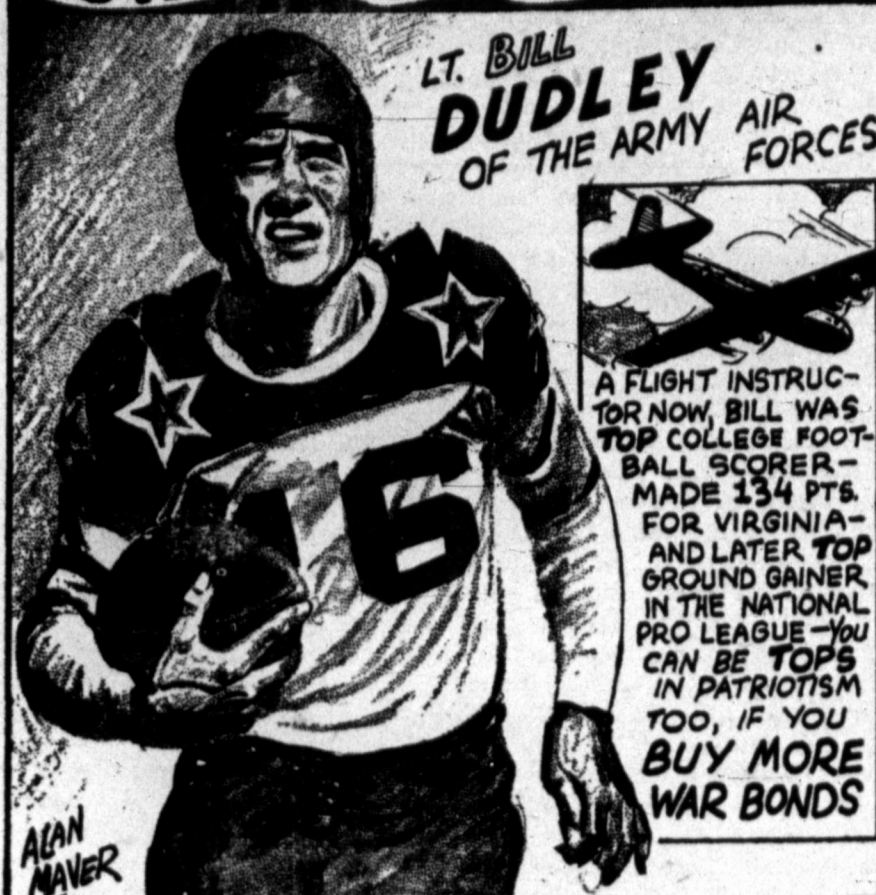

Drenching Wet Fuel Is Dangerous Practice

One of the surest ways of inviting trouble is to throw kerosene on cobs, wood or coal which is slow to start burning when a person is in a hurry for a fire in the kitchen stove.

Many folks after experiencing one quick burst of flame which does no more harm than near their eyebrows say they will not use kerosene so carelessly in the future. But the next time that wood or cobs are wet, the temptation presents itself again to throw on some more kerosene and speed up the flame. This time it may be fatal to persons or result in a flaming home, as records regularly show.

The Farm Safety Council recommends as an alternative to this dangerous method of starting fires a much safer but also rapid plan. Either have a few corn cobs or a few pieces of kindling soaking in kerosene placed in a tin can or pan away from stoves and fires. Then, if these are used to start a fire and there happen to be a few sparks left in the stove, an explosion will not result.

Vegetable Economy Oils

From the standpoint of domestic economy the most prominent vegetable oils are soybean, cottonseed, and peanut. In times of normal world trade tremendous tonnages of palm, coconut, and other less well-known vegetable oils are imported into this country for processing into various types of food fats. The odorless and flavorless characteristics of this group of oils are achieved only through the usual commercial practices of refining, bleaching and deodorizing. In the raw state, they all have characteristic, and, to American palates, undesirable flavors and odors, due to foreign ingredients originating in the fruit, husks, or seeds from which the oil was expressed.

Mystic Symbol

The swastika, mystic symbol of good fortune, goes back to prehistoric times and has been found by archeologists in all corners of the earth. It was used by North American Indians thousands of years before the advent of Columbus. The Nazis appropriated it as a symbol of "their national unity." Since it has been identified with Nazi aggression, several organizations throughout the world have discarded it, including the Indian chiefs in an Arizona gathering who committed to flames all their possessions that bore the swastika. The Indians, interestingly, hold that the Nazi swastika is turned the wrong way—which means bad luck.

Jap Music

Marines have been surprised to find that a large proportion of the recordings found on captured Tinian, although titled in Japanese, give forth with the best swing by Benny Goodman, as well as many Occidental classics, such as Bach, Beethoven, Liszt and others.

The Marines, however, cannot reciprocate Japanese appreciation of our music. The eerie, lilting strains of the "samisen" and the "shakuhachi" simply fail to soothe. The only exception, perhaps, is "Ame no Burusu" (Rainy Day Blues), which is done in the manner of modern American swing and was extremely popular in Tokyo during 1941.

This will probably have the effect of hastening the victory over the Japs and makes it doubly sure that Japan is to be destroyed as a military power. It means further that Russia expects to extend her sovereignty in eastern Asia and to establish air and naval bases in the Pacific.

Russia's entry into the war will doubtless prove to be one of the most momentous events of modern times.

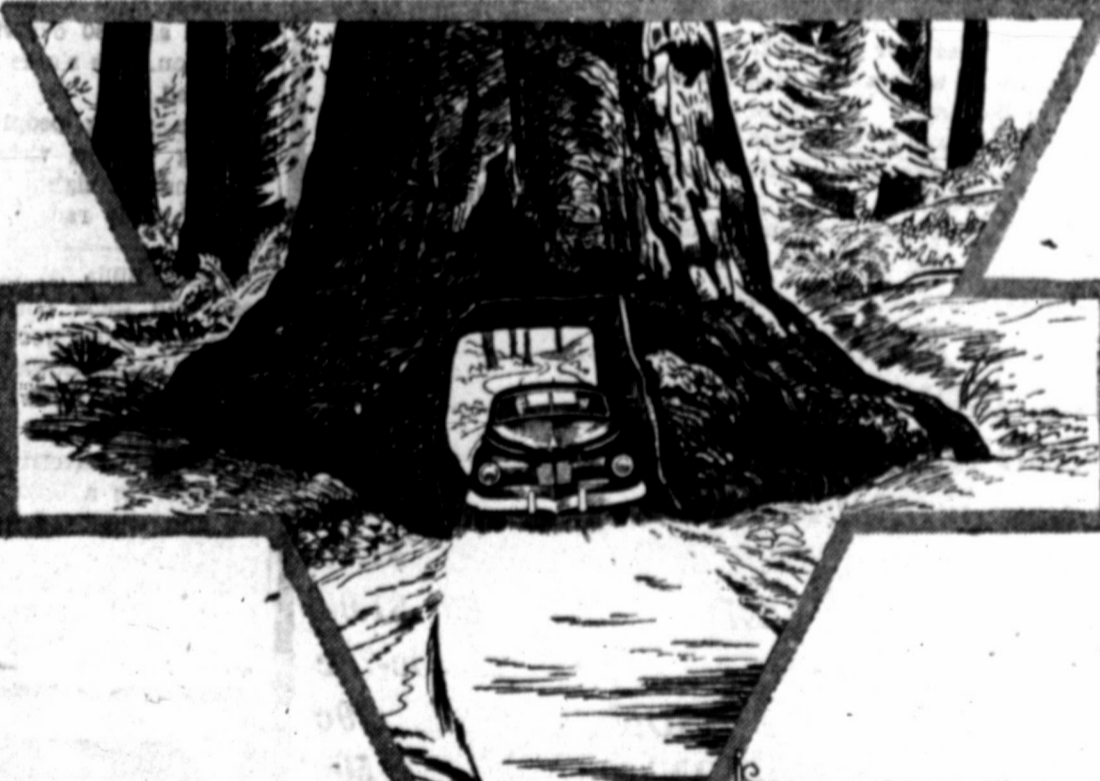

held at Camp Miniwanaca, August 31 through August 26th. One boy from each forty eight states, is selected to receive this scholarship. The boys are selected on the basis of their accomplishments in 4-H Club work. The selection is based upon four factors: (1) Athletic activities; (2) Scholastic records; (3) Leadership; (4) Character. These four points stand for four-square development in the individual.

The American Youth Foundation, through which the training work is given, is a non-denominational Christian Leadership Training organization. The 1945 season will mark the 32nd anniversary of the establishment of these camp-conferences. The organization has no propaganda, does not promote a program of its own in the local field, and serves wholly through existing organizations working with youth. It is comprised of a group of specialists in youth training. Its purpose is to assist young people to discover and to develop their best selves, to help them make a constructive life adjustment, and to better equip them to guide others. More than 1000 young people and leaders from 40 states and 1 Canadian province attended the 1944 leadership training camps.

The curriculum is composed of courses in Christian Ideals, Personal Foundations, Personal Enrichment, Leadership Principles, and Leadership Practice. A comprehensive program of group social and recreational activities is included in the camp schedule. The day is di-

vided between class work and recreation group games, track and aquatic events — together with evening inspirational meetings, night beach games, council circle, etc. A system of personal measurement, including individual "Prescriptions" based on discovered needs, is an important phase of the training program.

Camp Miniwanaca, where the training is given, occupies 200 acres on Lake Michigan and Stony Lake, near Shelby, Michigan. It is one of the most beautiful camps in the world. All students live in tents, sending their own blankets from home. The air is bracing and crisp, the food is excellent, and companions genial. Here, under experienced leaders, is presented an opportunity to work out a personal evaluation chart for individual development, followed by definite suggestions for future growth. This in itself is a challenging experience. Contacts with camp executives, and with fellow students from almost every state and from provinces of Canada, have proven a liberal education to groups of past years.

son came to the Capitol last May and asked for a secret meeting with five members of our Committee. He said that the first bomb was about to be produced and that the chances for success were better than 99 percent. He requested that we proceed immediately to Oak Ridge, Tennessee and inspect one plant there. We were flown to the plant and escorted through the different facilities by Major General Groves, the manager, and a group of scientists. I was amazed by the huge size of project. It was unbelievably big and the complicated processes for the production of the bomb were astounding. We were cautioned as to secrecy and shown the whole works. The processes are not only secret, they are incomprehensible to the layman. The final product is a very inoffensive looking substance, but its power defies description. It will be up to the President to decide just how much information can be made public.

The bomb has such terrific power it poses a threat to civilization itself. America must stay far ahead in scientific research or face destruction. Our plans for future protection must be well laid. We must not only insist upon an organization for world peace we must demand it and make it work. That is the only hope for civilization.
