Rising Sun Goes Down--Long War Ends

Two Are Injured In Plane Crash Friday Morning

B. T. Smith, principal of Tahoka Grade School and flight instructor at the local airport, and C. C. Pressley, O'Donnell farmer and a student pilot, were seriously injured when the plane they were flying crashed three miles south of Tahoka at about 11 o'clock last Saturday morning. The plane was badly wrecked.

Smith received a fractured skull, a back injury, and a smashed nose. Pressley received a broken and lacerated nose, broken ribs, and a minor back injury. Both are reported to be recovering nicely.

Federal inspectors have not made a report to anyone here on their findings, but cause of the crash is said to have arisen from several circumstances. Pressley was at the controls, as the plane took off a few minutes before and was at an altitude of only about 350 feet. In making a turn, a whirlwind was encountered, causing the plane to slip and lose altitude. Smith grabbed the controls, but could never get the nose up far enough to prevent a crash as the plane settled to the ground.

The plane fell in the N. M. Wyatt field. Luckily, Mr. Wyatt had just driven out to his farm. He rushed to the crashed plane, got the men out, and sent a passing motorist for a doctor.

They received treatment at Tahoka Clinic, and later Smith was taken to a Lubbock hospital for further examination and treatment.

Pvt. Clyde Allen In Army Hospital

The News received a card from Mrs. Clyde Allen written from the McCloskey General Hospital in Temple on last Friday stating that her husband, Pvt. Clyde Allen, had undergone a spinal operation in that institution on the preceding Tuesday.

"He has been in the hospital five and one-half months, at McCloskey four," Mrs. Allen writes. "He was feeling pretty well this afternoon. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Allen of Route 4 were down to see him Tuesday and Wednesday. The baby and I have been with him since he has been here. We hope to be home soon."

Pfc. Boyd Eason In China Command

Chinese Combat Command, U. S. Army—Pfc. Boyd Eason, 24, whose wife and year-old son, Carol Boyd, reside at O'Donnell, Texas, is now on duty with the Chinese Combat Command, the Chinese Army to increase their effectiveness against the Japanese invaders.

Eason, who was engaged in farming prior to his entrance into the Army in March, 1944, arrived in India in October of the same year, joined the 475th in North Burma shortly thereafter. He was among the men who threw blocks across the Burma Road to disable several light Jap tanks and trucks. Holder of the Combat Infantryman's Badge Eason has three brothers also serving in the U. S. Armed Forces. Clark, Ray, and Herbert.

Pfc. J. W. Flowers Is Winner of Citation

With The Fifth Army, Italy — Private First Class James W. Flowers, O'Donnell, Texas, recently was awarded the Division Citation for outstanding performance of duty in Italy.

He served on the Fifth Army front in the 363rd Infantry Regiment of the 91st "Powder River" Division.

His wife, Mrs. Emyne F. Flowers lives at O'Donnell.

O'Donnell Child Dies Of Tumor

Funeral services were held in the Methodist Church in O'Donnell Tuesday afternoon for Marvin Lee Sherrill, son of Mr. and Mrs. X. L. Sherrill of that place, 3 years, 11 months, and 15 days old, who died at 5 o'clock Sunday morning in St. Joseph's Hospital in Fort Worth, following an operation for tumor on the brain at 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon. The child never regained consciousness after the operation.

Rev. Crandall, pastor of the O'Donnell Methodist Church, and Rev. Cleo Norcross, pastor of the Draw Methodist Church, conducted the funeral services, and the body was buried in the O'Donnell cemetery.

The child became ill about three months ago. A little more than a month ago he was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital and except for one night spent at home he had been there ever since. Finally, the operation was performed last Saturday afternoon as a last resort with the hope that it might save the child's life.

Surviving are the parents and three brothers, Raymond Sherrill, 12, Jerry Lynn, 5, and Donald Wayne, 6 months old. Also surviving are three of the grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Sherrill of Draw and Mrs. Eakers, who resides with the family at O'Donnell. Numerous other relatives also survive, Mrs. Walter Mathis of Tahoka being an aunt.

The bereaved family have the sympathy of a host of friends.

Tire, Cigarette Thieves Active

Two stores were burglarized at Wilson on Thursday night of last week, The Wilson Mercantile and Lemon's Grocery. A quantity of cigarettes was taken from each store, amounting to some 13 or 18 cartons in all. No other kind of merchandise was missed from either store.

On the same night five tires were stolen from as many different cars here. It is not known whether there was any connection between the thefts here and at Wilson or not. It is certain, however, that the car which the tire thieves drove here was the same as that driven by thieves at Snyder on the preceding night, where three tires were stolen. Sheriff Sam Floyd personally inspected the tracks made at each place and was convinced that they were made by the same car.

Airlines Official Is Visitor In Tahoka

Tull G. Ray, vice president of American Airlines, the Mexican division of Pan-American Airways, and wife and son, of Mexico City, were here last Saturday and again Wednesday visiting his uncle, L. C. Haney, and family.

Tull Rea was reared at Roscoe and Sweetwater, and the editors of The News have known him since he was a child. His rise in his field has been almost sensational.

As a youth, Tull was very industrious, and has made his own way, financially since he was about ten years of age. At about 14 or 15 he began studying telegraphy, worked in the telegraph relay office in Sweetwater. Soon he got a chance to go to Love Field, the Dallas airport, as telegrapher, and while there he attracted wide acclaim for aiding in directing by wireless the dirigible Shenandoah to safety when it became helplessly lost in a storm over the Davis Mountains.

Tull next became the Love Field manager, then Chicago Airport manager, and for the past few years has been a vice-president in charge of operations with Pan-American, possibly the largest civilian airline company in the world.

His mother is a sister of Mr. Haney.

Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Whited and daughter Mary Jane of Richardson left Tuesday for home after a few days visit here with their former neighbors, the N. H. Cromer family. They were accompanied home by Noah Lee Cromer, who will visit former schoolmates at Richardson for a week or two.

Tahoka was closed up tight all day Wednesday in celebration of the victorious conclusion of the war. Practically every business in town, including filling stations, drug stores, and even most of the cafes were closed.

At 6:00 o'clock Tuesday evening, President Truman had announced that Japan had accepted the terms of surrender recently laid down by the three great powers, the United States, Great Britain, and Russia, fully and unconditionally, and that he had ordered the American forces to cease from further offensive action. He also announced that General MacArthur had been designated to represent the United States in receiving from the Japs their signed acceptance of these terms and to enforce compliance therewith.

Immediately following this announcement, the people of Tahoka began to celebrate in a mild way, chiefly by the sounding of automobile horns, and fire sirens. At 9:00 o'clock, the Texas State Guard staged a brief drill and fired salutes to celebrate the end of the conflict.

There was really no wild demonstration, for the end had been expected for several days and there was no element of surprise in the peace announcement. It was received rather with grim satisfaction, and the joy of the people was restrained and sobered by the knowledge that many of our sons who had gone overseas to win this victory would never return.

There was a large turnout at the church service at the revival meeting that night at the Baptist Church, the Assembly of God and possibly other Churches, and prayers of thanks for the successful termination of the war were offered. Other churches were open throughout the day Wednesday where any who desired might resort for thanksgiving and worship.

Mother Draw Ladies Dies In Milam County

Mrs. A. R. Hensley and son, Garham returned last Friday from Milam county, where they had attended the funeral of Mrs. Hensley's mother near Milano on the preceding Tuesday.

Mrs. Hensley and her sister, Mrs. R. R. Ragan, had gone to Milano on May 17 upon being informed that their mother, Mrs. Rebecca Graham, had fallen at her home there and broken her hip. Mrs. Hensley had remained at her mother's bedside until the end came late on Monday of last week.

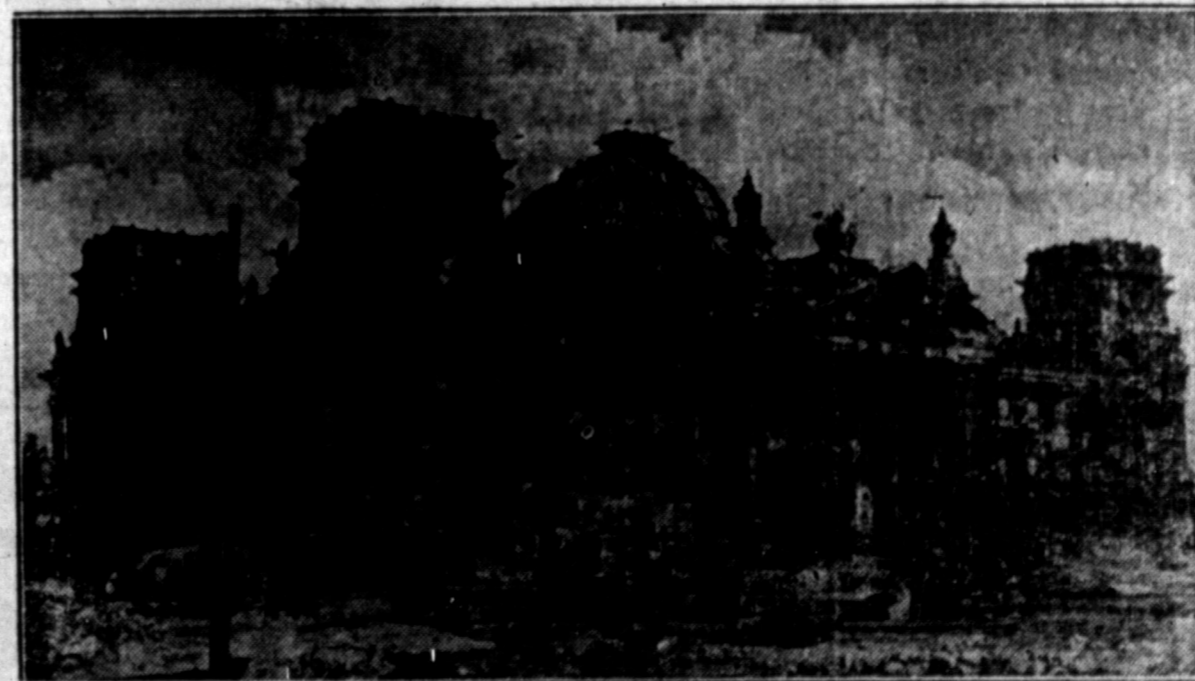
Mrs. Graham had visited her daughter here on several occasions and had spent three months here last year.

CELEBRATES BIRTHDAY

D. T. Rogers, pioneer citizen of Tahoka, who has been confined to his home just east of town by ill for the past several years, celebrated his 75th birthday anniversary last Saturday, and despite his feeble condition he was brought over to town for a short time to meet some of his friends.

Mr. Rogers came to Tahoka more than forty years ago, just after the town had been laid out, and there were then only a few buildings here. Being a carpenter by trade, he helped to build many of the early houses constructed here, and being a progressive citizen, he has had a part in every progressive movement that was ever launched here until he was stricken and rendered almost helpless some ten years ago. Active in the civic, political, and religious life of the town, he made a far deeper and more lasting impress upon our town and county than hundreds of new-comers here would ever suspect.

Mr. Rogers is a native Texan, having been born in Lee county. When he was about nine years of age his parents moved to the old college town of Salado in Bell county, and there he grew to manhood, married, and lived until he was well up in his thirties, removing from Salado directly to Tahoka.

Not only was he a pioneer resident of Tahoka but he has lived to see nearly all his friends of those early days pass on, and nothing gives him more pleasure now than for his friends yet living to call at his home and review with him both the halcyon and the stormy days of the past.

County Agent Says:

A summary of the Lynn county Johnson Grass Control Program shows that at this time 78 per cent of the farms in the county are infested with Johnson grass, leaving only 22 per cent free of the grass. Most of these 22 per cent have had Johnson grass but have killed it out. Of the 78 per cent who have Johnson grass, the infestation varies anywhere from a few scattered patches to very heavy infestation. Thirty per cent of the farmers do not know how the Johnson grass got started on their place. It was already there when they bought or rented the farm. Forty per cent say that it came to their farms from bar ditches and fence rows. Twenty per cent got a start of Johnson grass from planting contaminated seed. Ten per cent say it came from their neighbors.

Control methods used include: Sixty per cent used plow and hoe. Twenty-five per cent used Kerosene and 25 per cent used distillate or tractor fuel. Fifteen per cent used salt, five per cent used other control methods such as grazing, mowing, eye water, and cotton burr ashes.

Results of the various control measures used were reported as follows: Fifty-two per cent of the farmers considered the results obtained from using control methods were fair. Thirty-seven per cent report good results, and eleven per cent report bad results. An interesting feature of this part of the summary is the fact that good, fair and bad results were obtained from the use of identically the same control measures. This of course would lead one to presume that possibly the most important thing to consider in controlling Johnson grass is not necessarily which control measure to use, but how to use the one that is decided upon.

Ninety-eight per cent of the farmers reporting thought that the program should be continued. Two per cent thought possibly something else should be tried. Forty per cent of the farmers are willing to remove all their fences from the bar ditches to enable the commissioners to back-slope them. Forty-five per cent have no fences in the way of back-sloping.

Suggestions for improving the program include: Fifty per cent suggest more cooperation from the county in keeping the bar ditches clean. Thirty-five per cent say intensive cultivation. Twelve per cent suggest continuous application of Kerosene or tractor fuel. Six per cent suggested other methods, such as 100% cooperation of hods, such as 100% cooperation of all concerned, planting clean seeds, beginning early and staying with it late with a greater application of more elbow grease.

This survey indicates that there is quite a lot of interest and activity in Lynn County on the Johnson grass control program. On the other hand there is entirely too much Johnson grass going to seed. The big fight is yet to come. It is the opinion of the county agent that August is one of the best months to fight Johnson grass. Every farmer in the county is urgently requested to use every available means of controlling the Johnson grass on his farm if Johnson grass is held down until war-scarce chemicals become available, then it will be possible to strike it a death blow that should bring it completely under control.

BRONZE STAR AWARDED TO S/SGT. DANIEL R. EVANS

Staff Sergeant Daniel R. Evans, son of Mr. Daniel H. Evans of Wilson, serving with the 71st Infantry Division of the Third Army, was recently awarded the Bronze Star by Major General William G. Wyman, commanding general of this division, for heroic achievement in action against the enemy on April 26 in the vicinity of Illhofen, Germany.

The commendation for Sgt. Evans said: "Following the crossing of the Danube River, Company M, 5th Infantry, established its 81mm. mortars just behind a levee near Illhofen. Enemy snipers immediately began firing at the mortar position, and it was necessary to return this fire with individual weapons in order to keep the enemy pinned down.

"During the exchange of fire an enemy rifleman was observed running from a near-by house to the other side of the levee carrying a number of hand grenades. Sgt. Evans, despite intense sniper fire, crossed the levee and shot the enemy rifleman who was in the process of tossing stick grenades over the levee on the American troops. Sgt. Evans' heroic action prevented many casualties to his company and was materially responsible for the successful completion of his

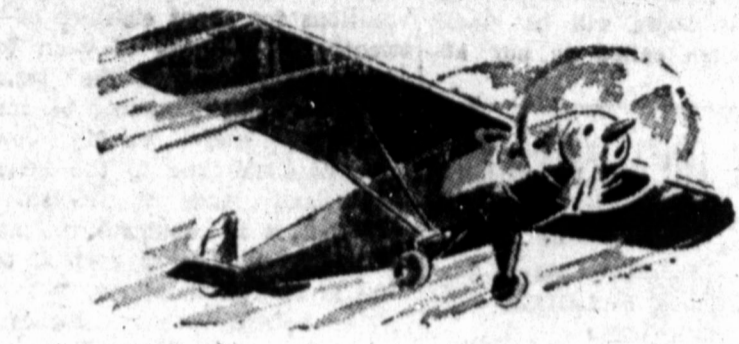

Citation Given Sgt. Joe Thurman

With The 32d Infantry Division In Luzon. — Sgt. Joseph Thurman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe M. Thurman, who live in Tahoka, Texas shared a citation awarded the 3rd Battalion of the crack 127th Infantry Regiment by Major General William H. Gill, commander of the veteran 32d (Red Arrow) Infantry Division, for outstanding performance of duty in action against the enemy on Leyte Island during an eight-day period.

The battalion was ordered to attack a hill which was the key defensive position of the vaunted Japanese Imperial First Division. The assigned mission was to knock out all installations, annihilate the foe, capture and hold the commanding ground which he occupied.

The signal was given. With supporting mortar and machine gun fire, the battalion pushed ahead against fanatical enemy resistance. For 8 days a vicious battle raged. Foot by foot, yard by yard, the men pressed forward.

Numerous "banzai" counter attacks at times halted our men but their courage never wavered. Individual acts of heroism were commonplace. Time and again officers and enlisted men, severely wounded continued to fight on, rejecting medical aid and refusing to leave the field of battle.

On the eighth days our men were ready for the final assault. Two hundred yards of barren, open and exposed ground lay between them and the crest of the hill. Braving the enemy's point-blank fire, the men advanced doggedly until the crest was reached.

"This signal victory broke the enemy's claimed impregnable Yamashita line and contributed greatly to the complete and utter defeat of the Japanese troops on Leyte the citation reads in part.

In the service since March, 1943, Truman served through the Leyte campaign as a rifleman in Company "L". Now fighting on Luzon, he holds the Purple Heart, the Combat Infantryman Badge, the Good Conduct Medal, the Asiatic-Pacific Ribbon and the Philippine Liberation Medal. A brother, T-5 Noel

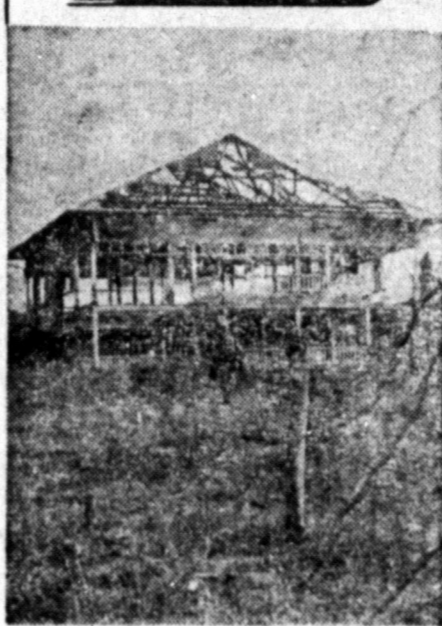

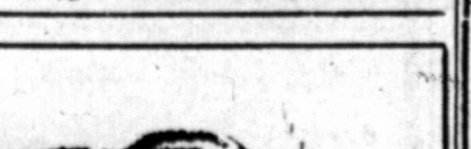
