Sgt. R. L. Tyler Dies In Japanese Prison Camp

Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Tyler of the Joe Bailey community received a communication recently from Acting Adjutant General Edward T. Witsel informing them that their son, Sgt. R. L. Tyler, who had been long missing, had died of malaria in a Japanese prison camp at Carbatanuan on Luzon on July 19, 1942.

California for a short time and was He trained for about 12 months at Nichols Field, near Manila, and was stationed on Corregidor in Manila Bay for awhile. He was then sent to Clark Field on Luzon when the Japs made their attack on December 7, 1941. The parents received one letter from him written on January 15, 1942. They never heard from him again. He had been listed as missing in action since the fall of the Phlippines on March 6, 1942. He died July 19 following according to the message received from the office of the adjutant general.

Voters Approve 3 Amendments

Three of the four constitutional mendments which had been subnitted to a vote of the people at a s tate-wide election held last Saturday were adopted, according o returns compiled by the Texas lection bureau while one was overvhelmingly defeated.

Those receiving approval were the Soldier Vote amendment, the Supreme Court amendment, and he Pension or Welfare amendment. Depeated was the Salary Raise amendment of the

Only two of these amendments eceived majorities in Lynn county, owever, the Soldiers Vote and the ension amendments. The Supreme curt amendment was defeated by small majority in the county while the majority against the proposed legislative salary raise was more than nine to one the proposal losing in every voting precinct in the county. Hunding Sines Hunters who violated the federal migratory bird regulations during the last fiscal year paid \$62,357 in fines and received jail sentences totaling 462 days. The 60 game man-agement agents of the Fish and Wildlife service, working singly or with federal deputy game wardens and state officers, obtained 1,985 convictions for illegal hunting during the period. One of the largest fines was paid by an Ohio hunter who killed 28 ducks in one forenoon and received a fine amounting to \$17.80 per duck. According to W. E. Crouch, chief of the service's division of game management, the arrest was made by Game Manage-ment Agent Fred E. Brint who watched the shooting through binoculars and counted the ducks as they came tumbling out of the sky. Children in a nearby orphanage got the confiscated ducks for dinner.






