**TAHOKA SOLDIER IS REDEPLOYING TO PACIFIC**

Assembly Area Command, France—A veteran Quartermaster Depot Company, which operated for 18 months in England, Belgium, and Germany, is now at Camp Cleveland of the Assembly Area Command, near Reims, France, being processed for direct shipment to the Pacific.

The unit, of which Pfc. Houston H. Bain, Rt. 1, Tahoka Texas is a member, landed in England in December, 1943 and organized and operated general depots there for a year.

In February, 1945, the company began operation in Belgium, for the next six weeks handling from 2,500 to 3,500 tons of food daily while supplying two field armies. Thereafter, in Germany, the unit collected, cleaned and issued clothing for displaced persons, and operated a storage depot for captured enemy equipment, in addition to its regular functions.

**BROTHER OF MRS. McCORD WINS AIR MEDAL**

Mrs. Rollin McCord was greatly thrilled Tuesday morning when she received a clipping from a Boston newspaper stating that her brother, S/Sgt. Donald T. Lavie, aerial engineer, had been awarded the Air Medal by Brig. Gen. William Turner, commanding general of the India-China division, Air Transport Command.

The award was made, it was stated, upon completion of 250 hours of operational flight in transport aircraft over the dangerous and difficult India-China air routes, where enemy interception and attack was probable and expected.

His service involved "Flying at night as well as by day, at high altitudes over impassable mountainous terrain, through areas characterized by extremely treacherous weather conditions necessitating long periods of operation on instrument . . . requiring courageous and superior performance of his duties to overcome, he accomplished his mission with distinction.

Pfc. Lavie is Mrs. McCord's youngest brother.

**Rough Treatment Given**

**Early Insane Patients**

Bleedings and purges, floggings, threats and immersion in cold water all were part of the treatment of the mentally ill in the late 18th century, according to Dr. William L. Russell in "The New York Hospital: A History of the Psychiatric Service 1771-1936." Dr. Russell, professor of psychiatry, emeritus, at Cornell university, and consulting psychiatrist of the New York hospital, says an accepted plan of procedure at that time was to inspire the patient with "awe and dread."

"Firmness, harsh threats—even of death—seclusion in darkness, restricted diets, stripes and blows, sudden ducking in cold water almost to the point of drowning, the strait waistcoat, chains, cords, manacles, and other means of producing fear were, by the most eminent medical practitioners and teachers, regarded as legitimate and necessary measures. On the principle that 'no two different perceptions can subsist at the same time, the pain and acute discomfort produced by blisters, caustics, vomits, rough cathartics, and stentatories were considered to be therapeutic."

According to latest tabulation made by the Texas Election Bureau, the welfare, or pension, amendment was approved in the recent election by about 93,000 votes for it to a little over 72,000 votes against it. should be thrown down and that all persons above 65 should be paid an equal amount monthly, whether they are rich or poor, sick and afflicted or strong and well, and regardless of every other condition, good or bad, that might affect their financial status.

The defeated Japanese millions are "all smiles" and as polite as any modern Mexican senorita, but as long as they thought they were winning the war they practiced the most shocking brutalities upon their American prisoners of war, according to reports being given by these liberated prisoners. They were not only subjected to all kinds of torture but many of them were deliberately starved to death or allowed to die from disease without medical attention or regard for the insanitary conditions in which they were compelled to live.

One of the most diabolical features of a dictatorship is that it keeps the people in the dark. For example, that Jap Hasegawa, director of Domei's foreign (news) service, stated frankly a few days after the surrender that he "knew the jig was up when Adm. Thomas C. Kincaid and Vice Adm. Jesse Oldendorf won the battle of Leyte Gulf and the Jap Navy ceased to exist." But the Japanese people, he

said, never learned the full results of the Leyte Battle and still thought they had a navy and a chance to win the war. The fact is that they were lied to and kept in the dark throughout the war, and were misinformed and misled by the Japanese militarists for a long time before the Pearl Harbor attack. A certain amount of caution and of secrecy on the part of military leaders is doubtless necessary in any and every war, but when a government misinforms its people in order to lead them into war or in order to keep them fighting a hopeless fight, that is murder of its own subjects, pure and simple.

The American people generally must feel that some of our military leaders were off guard when they ought to have been on tiptoe ready for any emergency at Pearl Harbor; when the Japs made their treacherous attack on December 7, 1941, but they will not lend a very willing ear to the accusations of those who are now trying to besmirch the records of General George C. Marshall and Secretary Cordell Hull. They possibly bear some of the blame but no more than scores of others of the higher-ups and not as much as some of them.

STATEHOOD CENTENNIAL EDITION OF THE TEXAS ALMANAC NOW READY

The new Texas Almanac is off the press, the 1945-46 edition being commemorative of the Centennial of Texas Statehood. Although print paper is still alarmingly scarce, the fact that the new book contains 608 pages—the largest in history—is considered adequate proof of its value to the public. In harmony with its dedication, a considerable portion of the book is devoted to historical matter. There is a revised history of Texas, from Cabeza de Vaca to Coke R. Stevenson, and there are additional chapters on events and places of historic interest, including an extensive current account of Texas' participation in World War II.

In view of the postwar program of economic development, special attention is given to Texas manufacturing industries between 1940 and 1944, when pay rolls and volume of production more than trebled. There is full treatment also of Texas minerals, of which more than sixty kinds were produced last year, for a total value of more than a billion dollars—the greatest value of mineral production of any single state in the history of the nation.

### Floating Drydocks Change Concept of Sea Warfare

Enough electric equipment to furnish a good-sized factory plus a small hotel is installed on each floating drydock the navy is using to make emergency repairs of warships far from their most advanced permanent bases.

These floating factories, recently revealed to be in action, are changing the concept of naval warfare by enabling strategists to plan ocean-going operations without dependence on the availability of fixed bases. Whereas the old static concept of sea strategy required ships to operate within an approximate range of 2,000 miles from a permanent repair base, floating drydocks make it possible to establish bases as they are needed and as near the fighting zone as desired.

In operation these mobile drydocks prepare a warship for repair by literally lifting the damaged vessel out of the water, thus giving workmen access to any part of the hull or deck, the same as if the ship were being overhauled on land. This is achieved by admitting water to sealed compartments so that the drydock submerges. When this is accomplished, the damaged vessel is floated over the dock or the dock is submerged under the vessel. Then water is pumped out of the compartments, and the drydock, with the ship under repair now resting on it in a rack, arises to the surface. In this position, the damaged ship is completely out of the water, with its hull exposed, and examination or repair is made possible.

### F/O ROY HARVICK IS HERE ON FURLOUGH

F/O Roy Harvick came in last Saturday on a 30-day furlough for a visit with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Harvick, and other members of the family. He has been in the Pacific theater of operations for the past eighteen months, and was stationed on Guam.

He has been serving as a flight engineer on a B-29, and came home wearing the Distinguished Service Cross and an Air Medal with three Oak Leaf clusters.

He will probably be among those who will be granted a discharge some time soon.

### ON THE USS SHANGRI-LA IN TOKYO BAY

Lloyd Cecil Bradshaw, seaman, second class, Tahoka, Texas, is serving on the aircraft carrier, which is part of the powerful Pacific Fleet completing the first stages of the occupation of Japan.

### UNDERGOES OPERATION

at that hospital. She was in a most critical condition for a few days following the operation but is now reported to be improving nicely.

Mr. Jones, who has been at her bedside, came up home Wednesday but is returning to Temple today.

### Useful Permanent Magnets

Permanent magnets are those that will retain their magnetic properties indefinitely. Probably their oldest and most familiar useful form is the compass needle. According to legend, the Chinese Emperor Hoang-Ti used a magnet in this form to guide his chariot in 2600 B. C. From this simple beginning permanent magnets have been developed to such an extent that, during World War II, their use has enabled our fighting men to replace bulky, heavy equipment with portable models of reduced size and weight; has made possible hundreds of devices for airplanes, and has also permitted an increase in the sensitivity of many measuring and electrical communication instruments.

### Dancing Purposes

Ballroom dancing in general reached a new importance during 1944, according to Encyclopedia Britannica, which cites its use as an aid to keep war workers from going stale and its high therapeutic value in the rehabilitation of wounded veterans. Doctors state that persons with torn nerves and mental shock respond amazingly to this form of treatment. Another serious purpose for which dancing was used during 1944 was in combatting juvenile delinquency, the article points out. It describes the supervised clubhouses which recently sprang up throughout the country where youngsters, with the aid of a juke box, could dance to their heart's content in a saner, more wholesome atmosphere.

### Lawn Soil

It is to be hoped that your lawn soil is neither very sandy nor heavy clay. Sand fails to hold either moisture or plant food very long. It is true that grass will grow in a sandy soil if it is watered and fed regularly, but the attention required is apt to be more than most of us will give. On a heavy soil less attention is needed. If drainage is good and the ground is not packed by trampling feet, grass may do all right. Ideal lawn soil is a porous loam, sufficiently well drained so that it holds moisture and permits some circulation of air. For various reasons, however, the ideal soil is seldom available. We can improve sandy or clay soils by mixing in some of the opposite type, plus a generous proportion of humus.

### School Lunch

Your child's school lunch is important! Unless he gets milk as a beverage at three meals it is difficult to get in his quart a day. Also, because of the child's smaller stomach capacity, dividing his food fairly equally between all three meals is much better than having him "catch up" at a heavy dinner at night. Packed lunches are apt to be monotonous and unbalanced unless milk, fruit and vegetables are included. Highly seasoned foods, stimulating beverages, and sweets should have very little place in the child's diet. Fruit or milk desserts may be added occasionally.

### Broody Hens

Broodiness in poultry will cause only a minimum of trouble if the poultryman acts quickly. At the first symptom of broodiness, the hen should either be culled or removed to the broody coop. The most satisfactory coop is set off the ground and has a bottom of slats or chicken wire. It's also important to feed broody hens the same ration that you feed the laying flock. Records show that when hens go broody, they cease to be profitable as egg producers unless broken up immediately. If a producer doesn't want to sell hens at the first broody period, he should place bands on their legs or clip their tails to mark them as first offenders. Then, if the brooding tendency persists, the hens should be culled.

### COTTON BOLL WORMS APPEAR IN COUNTY

(By Counay Agent)

The cotton boll worm is showing up in quite a few localities in Lynn County. If no control methods are used it may cause quite a reduction in the already short cotton crop. Farmers are urged to check closely for the presence of boll worms. If found in numbers that will be likely to cause severe damage they should be dusted at the rate of eight (8) pounds per acre of Calcium Arsenate in the morning when there is no wind. If infestation is severe then another application may be necessary within a week.

### IS BACK HOME

After spending four years principally in a ship-building plant in Beaumont, Reginald Frazier came home about two weeks ago and is temporarily assisting in the produce business of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. F. Frazier.

Reginald was an electrician in the ship-building plant and he expects to do similar work here. He grew up in Tahoka and is one of our finest young men.

Mrs. Frazier, his mother, reports that they are expecting their other son, Harris, to come home soon. For five years he has been serving in the U. S. Army, and in the air forces for most of that time. He has spent much time in Russia but more recently has been in Germany and is now supposed to be on his way home.

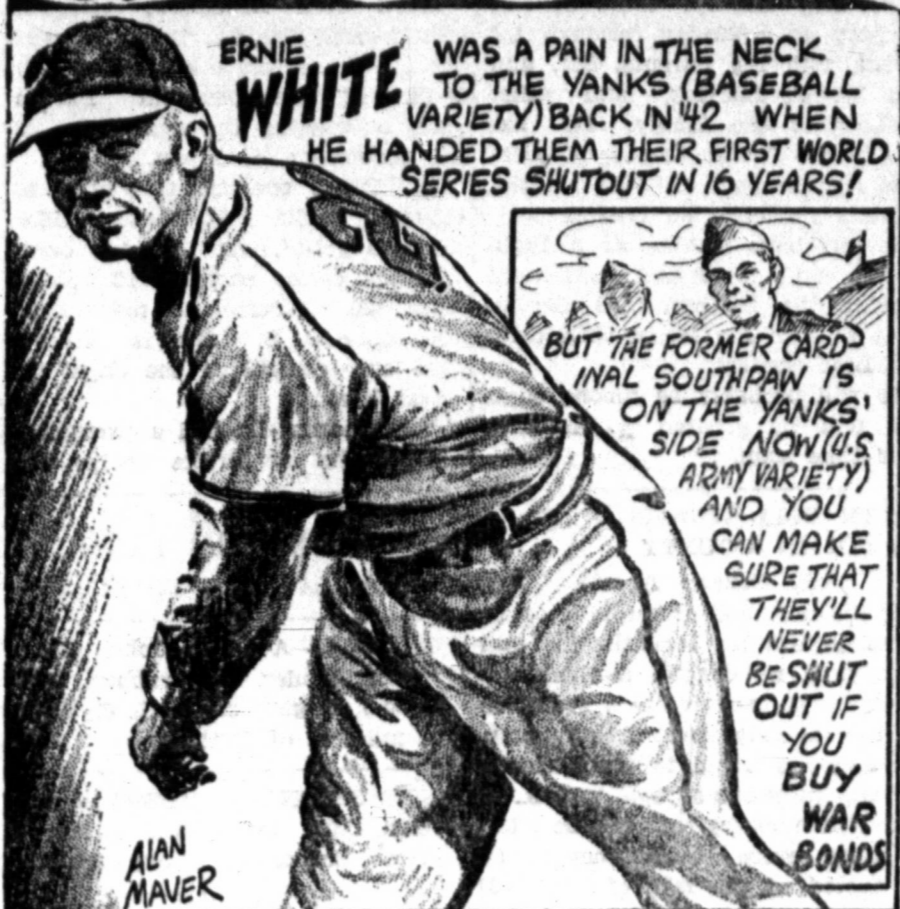

#### Ironing Tips

The wrong side of the garment is often the right side for ironing. Clothing specialists advise ironing on the wrong side all dark-colored cottons, also linens, rayons, satin weaves, crepes and wools—the last always protected by a pressing cloth. When garments of these fabrics are turned to the right side, they may need to have a few wrinkles smoothed out, but the less iron is used on the right side, the better the appearance generally. White and light-colored cottons are ironed on the right side. Heavy fabrics or parts of clothes that are double in thickness generally need to be ironed on both sides. Embroidery may be smoothed out quickly on the right side, then ironed on the wrong side over a thick, soft pad or Turkish towel. If the fabric shows shine where it is pressed on the right side, press over a cloth or tissue paper.

#### Protect Useful Chemicals

Edison's deafness is supposed to have come from a box on the ear inflicted because the chemicals he was experimenting with in the baggage car spilled on the baggage and ate holes in it. Even the most useful chemical has to be kept where it will not do injury. Pipes, tanks, kettles, valves, mixing equipment, and other parts for chemical manufacturing must be made of material that will stand the corrosion of the reagents they contain. Stoneware, a ceramic material, is often used. An improved stoneware is reported able to stand the shock of immediate change from dry ice to superheated steam, a temperature variation of more than 400 degrees Fahrenheit.

#### Efficient Tub

A bathtub that fills quickly and empties quickly is high on the list of things that postwar home builders want. The chief advantage of a tub that fills quickly and empties quickly is the saving in time. Another important advantage, however, is the fact that water which flows through the drain piping at high velocity will carry solids with it, thus scouring the drain and tending to keep the pipes clean. For rapid filling of a tub, the hot and cold lines leading to the fixture should be at least one-half inch in diameter and the spout should be one inch in diameter. With these specifications, providing water pressure is adequate, the bath will fill quickly and the water will not splash or gurgle. To insure quick draining of the fixture, the waste in the tub should be two inches in diameter and the bottom of the tub should be perfectly smooth and unimpeded by corrugations.

#### Seed Treatment

One of the most common mistakes a gardener makes is planting seeds too deep. Even the experienced hand finds it a painstaking business not to sow fine seeds a little too far below the surface where germination may be considerably slowed. When seeds are planted too deep, especially before the ground has become thoroughly warmed in spring, there is real danger of seeds rotting. Treatment will go far to minimize loss of this kind.

The method of treating seeds is simplicity itself. Small handy packets of the fungicide generally are available in seed stores. The packets contain enough chemical dust to treat several pounds of seed. The amount of dust that can be held on the tip of a penknife blade or on the flat end of a toothpick is put into the seed packet with the seed and shaken well.

### Vitamin A Valuable For Light Adaptation

If you want to have good dark-adaptation facilities, clear smooth skin and healthy mucous membranes, it is well to include generous amounts of vitamin A in your daily diet.

This fat-soluble vitamin has the distinction of being one of the earliest vitamins known, and it has several important functions in the body. Of major importance is its action in preventing night-blindness, which is difficultly in accommodating the eyes to changes in intensity of light. If your diet has been low in vitamin A, you may have difficulty in finding your way in the dark or in distinguishing objects when driving the car at night.

Vitamin A helps to keep the epithelial tissues healthy. These are the tissues which line the respiratory passages and the digestive and genito-urinary tracts. Adequate vitamin A helps keep the mucous membranes moist and healthy, whereas lack of vitamin A allows the passages to become dry and more susceptible to penetration by bacteria.

### Control Operations Curb Threats of Predators

The taking of 118,879 predatory animals in federal-cooperative control operations carried on in 29 states during the fiscal year 1944 has resulted in the saving of thousands of sheep, calves and poultry needed to increase the production of food and wool, according to a report made by the Fish and Wildlife Service.

Despite insufficient manpower, this total represented an increase of 5,592 over the take of 115,287 predators in the preceding year, and consisted of 108,050 coyotes, 8,900 bobcats, 1,170 wolves, 592 bears and 187 mountain lions.

The greatest number of coyotes were taken in Texas—14,756, followed by Oregon with 10,343; Colorado, 9,832; Nevada, 9,790; Idaho, 8,800; California, 8,211; and Montana, 7,035. Of the methods used for taking predators, trapping accounted for 72,727.

From July 1, 1915, to June 30, 1944, the service reports that control operations have destroyed a total of 1,771,663 predators, of which 1,569,415 were coyotes.

### County Agent Says:

Crops in Lynn County are holding up unbelievably well regardless of the prolonged drought. The chances for anything like a normal harvest of crops are being lessened each day that the dry weather continues. With over 300,000 acres County this year there will no doubt be thousands of acres that will never mature enough to be harvested.

ed. With the feed shortage in this area threatening to be one of the worst that we have ever witnessed it is becoming all the more necessary that farmers in Lynn county make arrangements to save every possible acre of their grain sorghum crop. The most practical method of getting maximum utilization of this year's grain sorghum crop is to put a large percentage of the acreage that is suitable into the silo. The per acre value of most grain sorghum crops in the form of silage as compared to dry roughage is around 50% higher, in favor of the silage. For further information regarding sizes, construction plans etc., on silos, farmers are asked to drop by the County Agent's Office.

The unusually late crops this year will no doubt cause a more or less slack labor period during the month of September. Since most of the crops are laid by and very little harvesting is to be done in September, farmers of the county are urged to concentrate their efforts on two important activities: first—intensify the Johnson Grass fight; second—build new silos or repair the old ones.

All the cows reported in the County Agent's office to be tested for Bangs disease in the Tahoka and O'Donnell vicinity will be tested in the near future. Anyone desiring to get their cows tested for Bangs disease this year are urged to list their cows in the County Agent's Office immediately. Those already listed will be notified as to the exact day the veterinarian will be at their place.

Farmers in Lynn County who are going to need the services of out-of-County combines are asked to contact the County Agent as soon as the need is determined. These needs will be handled by the State Farm Labor Program through the local County Agent.



**Ironing Tips**

The wrong side of the garment is often the right side for ironing. Clothing specialists advise ironing on the wrong side of all dark-colored cottons, also linens, rayons, satin weaves, crepes and wools—the last always protected by a pressing cloth. When garments of these fabrics are turned to the right side, they may need to have a few wrinkles smoothed out, but the less the iron is used on the right side, the better the appearance generally. White and light-colored cottons are ironed on the right side. Heavy fabrics or parts of clothes that are double in thickness generally need to be ironed on both sides. Embroidery may be smoothed out quickly on the right side, then ironed on the wrong side over a thick, soft pad or Turkish towel. If the fabric shows shine where it is pressed on the right side, press over a cloth or tissue paper.

**Protect Useful Chemicals**

Edison's deafness is supposed to have come from a box on the ear inflicted because the chemicals he was experimenting with in the baggage car spilled on the baggage and ate holes in it. Even the most useful chemical has to be kept where it will not do injury. Pipes, tanks, kettles, valves, mixing equipment, and other parts for chemical manufacturing must be made of material that will stand the corrosion of the reagents they contain. Stoneware, a ceramic material, is often used. An improved stoneware is reported able to stand the shock of immediate change from dry ice to superheated steam, a temperature variation of more than 400 degrees Fahrenheit.

**Drenching Wet Fuel Is Dangerous Practice**

One of the surest ways of inviting trouble is to throw kerosene on coals, wood or coal which is slow to start burning when a person is in a hurry for a fire in the kitchen stove.

Many folks after experiencing one quick burst of flame which does no more harm than sear their eyebrows say they will not use kerosene so carelessly in the future. But the next time that wood or coals are wet, the temptation presents itself again to throw on some more kerosene and speed up the flame. This time it may be fatal to persons or result in a flaming home, as records regularly show.

The Farm Safety Council recommends as an alternative to this dangerous method of starting fires a much safer but also rapid plan. Either have a few corn cobs or a few pieces of kindling soaking in kerosene placed in a tin can or pan away from stoves and fires. Then, if these are used to start a fire and there happen to be a few sparks left in the stove, an explosion will not result.
