"We fought their part of the part," he complains, "while they stayed at home and made good money but that's O. K. for them. Some one had to do it and they didn't have the guts or the nerve to face a gun or stay away from home, and as the war is over they won't even write at all, but that's O. K. I can get along without them now, and when I get home I don't care if they never speak to me. For I have nothing for them."

## Early 'Norther' Hits West Texas

A real whiz-bang norther struck this area Wednesday morning and blew almost a gale throughout the day. It held the temperature down to an unseasonably low point all day and drove it on down to a low of 47 degrees during the night. The thermometer registered a high of 101 degrees a few days ago.

In spite of the fact that the weather man had predicted showers for Wednesday afternoon, not a speck of cloud appeared above the horizon all day except dust clouds.

An Electrical storm did put on a show Sunday night, or rather during the early hours of Monday morning, and it actually rained on a few farms along the south line of the county, estimated as much as an inch on some farms in the vicinity of many farms along the south line of Joe Bailey and eastward. A half to three quarters of an inch fell in the Southwest part of the county.

The record for Tahoka since January 1, however, remains at slightly more than six inches for the entire period.

## Youth Worker Is Rotary Speaker

Jimmie E. Ball, noted religious worker among the youth, who was here last week conducting the Youth's Revival at the Methodist Church, was the guest speaker at the Rotary Club on Thursday.

He used the occasion to urge that a plan be adopted whereby the Bible might be taught, or at least read in the public schools. He contended that this could be done without any violation of the principle of Separation of Church and State. He said that it is being done already in 48 of the states, Texas included, such cities as Dallas and Lubbock having adopted the plan.

The proposal is that a teacher or director be selected and paid by the churches of the town, who may read the Scriptures without comment or explanation but who will urge that the pupils ask their parents or their pastor or some other person outside the school to explain to them any portion of the Scriptures read which they do not understand. Systematic Scripture readings have been prepared for this purpose.

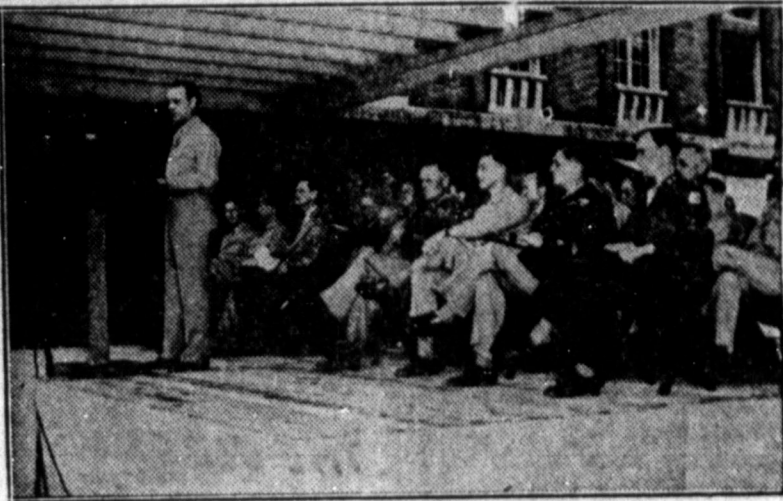
The need for this kind of work in the public schools is very urgent, he pointed out, because of the fact that many public school children rarely attend Sunday School regularly if at all, and some of those who do attend learn very little about the Bible. He contends that it will and does stimulate interest in study of the Bible wherever the system is adopted.

He lived in Houston prior to his entry into the army, and his wife and little son have been in Waco during his absence from home.

### Pioneer O'Donnell Citizen Is Dead

Funeral services conducted by Rev. R. T. Peck, pastor of the Assembly of God Church in O'Donnell assisted by Rev. Leon C. Quillin of the Assembly of God Church in Tahoka, were held in that Church in O'Donnell last Sunday afternoon for Benjamin Sutton, 90, a pioneer of the O'Donnell section. Burial followed in the O'Donnell cemetery.

Mr. Sutton, who was born in Mississippi on September 8, 1855, lacked only three days of being ninety years old. Though his wife had preceded him in death he is survived by eight of their eleven children.

Of his six sons Melvin lives in Oregon; Will and Marion in Calif. Charles at Rising Star; Marvin at Lamesa and George at O'Donnell. His daughters are Mrs. Mae Barton of Los Angeles, California and Mrs. Birdie Littlefield of Bronte. Other survivors include 35 grandchildren and 43 great grandchildren.

Mr. Sutton became a member of the Baptist church while at Lovington, N. M., in 1917. He was well spoken of by his friends around O'Donnell having lived in and near there during the past 25 years.

### Sgt. Price Brookshire Gets Army Discharge

S/Sgt. Price F. Brookshire is at home with his parents. Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Brookshire visiting and resting, following his honorable discharge from the Army Air Corps last week. Sgt. Brookshire had acquired 118 points during his four years of service, 8 months of which was spent in Italy as an aerial gunner in the 15th Air Force.

In the states since last November Sgt. Brookshire has been stationed in several different camps.

Besides ribbons designating the areas in which he served Sgt. Brookshire wears the Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal with 4 Oak Leaf Clusters, and his unit received the Presidential Citation.

Before entering the service Brookshire spent two years in the AAA office here.

C. W. Cleveland came back home a few days ago from Knox county, where he had spent the past few weeks with a sister.

Three Lynn county men have been freed from Japanese prison camps, relatives have been notified this week.

They are Roy Stephens and Miley Dove of Tahoka and Alfred B. Nietsch of Wilson.

A telegram from the War Department Tuesday morning informed Roy's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lee Roy Stephens of Midway, that he had been liberated, was in good health, and that messages could now be sent him.

When the Japs struck Pearl Harbor, Roy Stephens was a civilian employee on Wake Island in the Pacific. He was taken prisoner on Dec. 23, 1941, when that island fell after a heroic fight. He was classed a military prisoner, and most of his days of imprisonment were spent at the Shanghai prison. His family received eight letters and eight post cards from Roy during those long three years and nine months, the last being a card written Dec. 1, 1944, which came last Monday. Roy wrote that he had received 31 letters and some kodak pictures from his family and friends.

Roy Stephens is a graduate of Tahoka High School, where he was a star athlete, and attended Howard Payne and West Texas State colleges before going to Wake Island in 1941.

Word also came Tuesday to Mrs. Miley D. Dove, who lives here with her mother, Mrs. Dona Moore, that her husband, Cpl. Miley Dove had been liberated and would be returned to the states soon. Word was received Thursday morning that Riley D. also had been liberated. Cpl. Miley and Riley Dove, twins, formerly of Plainview, were with the 131st Field Artillery, "The Lost Battalion," which fell in Java. They were held prisoner in Thailand for most of the time, according to the few brief words received from them.

The Associated Press revealed on Tuesday, in a dispatch from Calcutta, India, that Alfred B. Nietsch, manchinat 2/c on the Battleship Houston, who had been reported "missing in action" had been found by the British in a Singapore war prison camp, along with others. Nietsch's mother lives a few miles west of Wilson.

The Cruiser Houston was sunk by enemy action on Feb. 28, 1942 in Sunda Strait, off the coast of Java, the day following the Battle of the Java Sea. The entire crew was presumed lost until survivors were found recently.

**Don't turn in fats that can be re-used!** But some fats, such as those rendered from lamb and mutton, are not suitable for re-use. Put them immediately in the salvage can. And, with other fats, after you've got all cooking good out of them, there is always a little left. No matter how little it is, save it.

Your butcher will still give you 4¢ and 2 red points for every pound you turn in. Save consistently—save every drop you can—every day—until Uncle Sam says the job is done.

**RELIGIOUS LIBERTY DOES NOT LICENSE CRIME**

Many people seem to be somewhat confused on this matter of freedom of religion. We have heard some express the opinion that it would have been a violation of this sacred right if we had arrested and dethroned Hirohito because the Japanese people regard him as divine and as one of their objects of worship.

Our religious rights, just like our freedom of speech and other personal rights, are not unlimited. We have freedom of speech, freedom of the press and freedom to worship God as we may please, indelibly written into our Constitution. But if one of us goes out onto the street and there curses and abuses one of our fellow citizens or uses vulgar and obscene language in a public place, the sheriff throws us into jail or hauls us before a court for trial. If this newspaper should willfully and maliciously publish a slander against any citizen, the publishers would be arrested and tried as criminals.

Likewise, no person can exercise his right of religious worship in a manner that would violate the criminal laws of our land. Just within the past few days, a preacher and other members of a fanatical religious sect have been arrested in Tennessee and Virginia on charges of murder committed by turning rattlesnakes loose in a congregation and otherwise causing the snakes to bite one or more of the persons participating in the services, resulting in their death.

Mormons, who professed to believe that God had given their leader a special divine revelation, have been prohibited by law from practicing polygamy, which they claimed as a religious right.

Any religious practice or act which is immoral in its nature or which seriously interferes with the rights of others finds no protection in our Constitution. On the other hand, it may be denounced and punished by law as a crime.

If Hirohito instigated or plotted with others to treacherously attack Pearl Harbor and make barbarous war on our country and other countries for conquest, and especially if he is guilty with others in perpetrating those unspeakable atrocities against United States prisoners of war, when he is the worst sort of international criminal and we would be within our rights to try and punish him even if every Japanese living should regard him as a god.

Nobody more highly prizes religion can not be used as a shield for crime in this country or any other country.

Church people as a rule are a little more lenient than others in their attitude toward our late enemies, the Japs and the Germans. Naturally they are not as hard-boiled as our military leaders and many of the soldiers who have had experience on the fighting fronts. Many churchmen still believe that there is virtue in kindness, and that we should now try it out on our late enemies. They believe that Christianity is the only guarantee against future war. Some of them decry the use of other means to prevent war, such as international agreements or maintenance of powerful armies and navies. They are probably right in maintaining that Christianity is the best and the most permanent cure for the war mania. But, many of the nations of the world are not yet Christian. Some of them are distinctly anti-Christian. It doubtless will require

many years, probably centuries to Christianize them. What are we going to do about war in the meantime? What do we do with a gang of bandits that rob a bank? When we catch them do we start them to church and to Sunday school hoping to reform them? No. We slam them in jail, try them, and send them to the penitentiary, and if they have killed some one in perpetrating the robbery, we strap them down in a chair behind prison bars and turn on the electricity. German leaders who started this war on their neighbors in Europe and the Jap leaders who started the Pacific war at Pearl Harbor were nothing more nor less than powerful international bandits who started out to murder and to rob and to enslave their unoffending neighbors. We must use our utmost endeavors to civilize and to Christianize eventually all the pagan and anti-Christian peoples of all the world, but in the meantime we must punish the war criminals and keep ourselves ready to nip in the bud any war that international bandits shall start hereafter.

Every day come additional accounts of atrocities committed by the Japanese against Allied prisoners of war. Much of it is so revolting as to be almost unbelievable. But, come to think of it nothing better could be expected of a nation of pagans whose propensity to satisfy the lusts and the passions of the flesh have never been curbed by the moral and spiritual teachings of Christianity and of the Bible. It is the natural fruitage of the natural man whose coarser nature has never been refined or modified in the least degree by the consciousness of the existence and the limitless power of a holy and just God. It affords only another unanswerable argument for Christianity and for Christian missions. "Japan," says one of our war correspondents, "is a stinking land of witchcraft, superstition, indescribable filth and disease. Sewers are almost unknown. Soap is rarely if ever used." And the writer suggests the "sinister significance of Western mechanical scientific gadgets and the so-called progress being superimposed on a people with no common background of spiritual, ethical, mental, and social values comparable to those of democratic nations." In other words, the placing of the products of our scientific knowledge, such as guns and explosives and tanks and battle-ships, at the disposal of the Japs is very much like giving an Indian a sixshooter and a rifle and all the whiskey he can drink and then turning him loose on the community and expecting him to maintain peace. Before allowing the Japs to arm to the teeth we should have civilized and Christianized them.

State leaders in the Home Guard are advocating universal military training to be given our young men

but not in training camps. It proposes that the training shall be given by the State Guard at or near the homes of the trainees, and that this training be spread out at about two nights per week so as not to interfere with the ordinary vocations or school attendance of these young men. That seems to us to be a happy solution of the problem.

### Son of 'Mother of Kings'

#### Became English Monarch

During the 18th century, Sophia of Hannover, Germany, became known as the "Mother of Kings." She herself was in line for the British succession as the great-granddaughter of Mary, Queen of Scots. When her death, in 1714, prevented fulfillment of the act of parliament by which she would have been offered the crown, her son, as George I, became the first of the Hannoverian dynasty to rule England.

Besides the Hannoverian and British lines, Sophia was associated with the royal house of Prussia by the marriage of her daughter, Sophia Charlotte, to Frederick I, first king of Prussia. Her granddaughter, Sophia Dorothea, married Frederick William I of Prussia, and became mother of Frederick the Great.

In Great Britain, although the Hannover blood relationship remained, the male succession of the house was broken when Victoria came to the throne and married Albert, of the German state of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha. During the First World War, George V relinquished all German titles. The name of the ruling house was then abandoned for that of Windsor.

### Reinforcements Improve

#### Appearance of Garments

A few reinforcements at proper places will improve the wearing quality and appearance of your garment quite out of proportion to the time you spend on it. Strengthen the end of a placket with a few extra stitches, or stay it by sewing a tape across the end on the underside.

Make dress and apron pockets more sturdy by laying a piece of tape on the underside of the garment in line with the pocket top. Stitch it in with the corners.

Rework raveled or weak buttonholes. Resew snaps or hooks and eyes securely, and resew loose buttons with strong thread, leaving a shank of thread so that the buttonhole can slip under the button without straining the cloth or puckering.

Replace sleazy trims, which make a garment look cheap, with more durable trimming. On some garments, collar edges, neck openings, belts and sleeve openings can be strengthened and made more attractive by a row or two of top-stitching.

### T.B. Infection

Now that tuberculosis in cattle has been reduced to a small fraction of 1 per cent as a result of the systematic federal-state campaign of eradication, veterinary officials are concerned about the danger of tuberculosis-free herds becoming reinfected. One way that this can happen is from persons who have tuberculosis, present evidence indicates. Dr. A. W. Wight, who directs tuberculosis eradication in livestock for the Federal Bureau of Animal Industry, cites a case, recorded in veterinary literature and supported by detailed records, in which four herds of cattle were infected by one person. Because of this danger he urges close cooperation between public health officials and veterinarians engaged in bovine tuberculosis eradication. Some cases of pulmonary tuberculosis, he explains, are caused by the bovine type of the germ and this can readily infect cattle. Knowledge of the kind of tuberculosis a human patient has is helpful to veterinarians in tracing the source of infection when healthy cattle in the locality become tubercular.

### Outdoor Center

The back yard has come to be recognized as the center for family outdoor living and should be so treated. It should offer some use for every member of the family and for the guests of the family—a sand box and swing for the youngsters, a lawn for sun-bathing and for family games and a fine tree or two for summer shade. There should be flower borders along the sides for mother and an area where father can grow tomatoes and small vegetables. A pergola or summer house serves many useful purposes, and there may be room for an outdoor fireplace for picnic suppers. Formerly the only use made of the back yard was for vegetable gardens, laundry drying and ash piles. The front yard was the only area that received any landscape attention, and it was generally decorated with either two round canna beds or two blue spruce. Family life was strictly an indoor affair as contrasted to today's mode of living.

### Inland Sea

The Inland Sea, often termed Japan's Mediterranean, borders the western portion of the main Jap island of Honshu on the south. The Inland sea winds for 260 miles in a chain of six small, shallow lakes, or nadas, connected by narrow straits. Varying little in size, the nadas average 40 miles in length by 20 miles in width. White sands, green pines, palisade shores and a thousand islands give them beauty renowned. If their basins were to be pushed up 100 feet, they would largely be come ash and lava hill country like surrounding land. Connecting the Inland sea with open ocean are three narrow straits, each fortified and easily defended against sea-level approach because their combined width is no more than that of the mouth of Delaware bay.

O'DONNELL MAY HAVE A NEW EAST WEST HIGHWAY

A start has been made toward securing a Federal highway designation for a road running west from Ft. Worth to Gall and thence to O'Donnell going west to Welch to Seagraves to Lovington, and over the mountains at Cloudercroft to join the lower route to California. It is estimated this route would save 150 miles between Ft. Worth and L. A. The only unpaved portion of pavement is between Gall, O'Donnell, and Welch. A Texas and a New Mexico Association will be formed later to push this project. The route would climb the cap rock near the present Mesquite-Gall road and would follow near to the established road to O'Donnell. Haynes, Anderson, Shoemaker and Garrard are working on the project. —O'Donnell Index-Press.

YOUR DRIVER'S LICENSE

Austin, Sept. 14. — Better check up on drivers license. Under the impetus of mounting traffic fatalities, the Department of Public Safety is about to begin a vigorous enforcement campaign against unlicensed drivers. Director Homer Garrison said today.

"This isn't a red tape or revenue proposition," Garrison said. "We are trying to keep people from being maimed and killed."

Estimating that Texas now has 250,000 drivers who either have no licenses or whose licenses have expired, Garrison said:

"The deliberately evasive person is likely to be dangerous, either because of known incompetence or in the case of many new residents and new drivers, ignorance of Texas safety rules."

"Of those who have expired licenses, probably a considerable number have developed defects or attitudes, or records of traffic violation and accident, that give them cause to fear examination."

"Of course most delinquents are merely lazy or negligent."

"But whatever the reason, the impressive facts remain that 15 per cent of drivers cause 85 per cent of collisions, and unlicensed drivers figure in more than proportionate share of them. As traffic volume and fatalities continue to increase, the citizen's obligation to comply with regulatory measures likewise increases. We are headed for a toll of ten lives lost daily to traffic in Texas, and it will require drastic action to hold the figure that low when post-war traffic gets into full swing."

### Veteran Advisory Body Formed

The Lynn county Veterans Agricultural Advisory Committee was organized in a meeting held Tuesday night, Sept. 11, in the Agricultural building in Tahoka. Fourteen members attended the organization meeting, and the following officers were elected: I. M. Draper, chairman; V. F. Jones, vice-chairman; and Manuel W. Ayers, secretary.

Other members present were Tom Garrard, Walter Slaton, J. R. Strain, W. W. Hagood, Wiley Curry, N. E. Wood, James A. Stephens, W. C. Huffaker, Dr. J. W. Sinclair, Charles Nelms, and D. W. Gaignat.

The function of the committee is to advise veterans desiring its aid in ways to serve their best interests; to help them find places on farms, and to compare information of a general nature regarding agricultural conditions in the county.

The committee is a part of the Selective Service Veterans' Assistance Program, and was created at the request of Grover Hill, Assistant War Food Administrator. He specified that the group should be

set up by the A & M College Extension Service under the leadership of the county agricultural agent.

All discharged servicemen are required to report to their local selective service boards within five days after demobilization. At that time inquiry is made regarding their plans. If any indicate a desire to engage in farming, they are informed about the advisory assistance which the committee and the county agricultural agent are prepared to render.

In addition, material containing information about the assistance program has been prepared by the War Department and is being distributed to servicemen in advance of discharge.

### RATTLESNAKE TAKES UP LODGING IN BATHROOM

The Fred Mathews family out at Grasland had a harrowing experience on Thursday morning of last week with a rattlesnake which had taken up lodging in their bathroom. They finally killed the serpent without any human casualties but they must have been almost frightened to death. We will let Fred tell about in his own way.

"About seven o'clock," Fred says, "my wife ran out of the house and screamed, 'Fred, there is a rattlesnake in the bathroom.'"

"I understood her to say 'A wasp nest' and so took no interest."

"She screamed again and I thought she said 'House on fire' and I put up some speed, and then she said 'Rattlesnake!'"

"Anyway I came in with a hoe with my fingers crossed, and then heard the old boy sing and discovered the noise behind the tub and so began punching. My wife asked for the hoe, as I was using a Centennial cane, and he crawled out, she broke his back. He measured three feet and four inches."

"This house is a little more than a half mile from the UU pasture, a rattlesnake breeding place in those canyons, and they always begin crawling up in here about August."

"I discovered that the drain pipe in the bath had sufficient room at its side for him to crawl up, and was next to the sills, as the bath room was built on the back porch. I plugged the extra space, naturally, several years later than I should have."

"I killed the two largest rattlers I ever saw about five years ago in the field about 100 yards apart. One measured 6 ft. 8 inches, and the other 6 ft. 11 inches."

"LeRoy Davis says he or they killed 27 rattlers a few years ago, the ear they broke out a 240-acre block purchased from the UU Company."

"All these places next to the breaks catch more rattlers than other places."

burial arrangements were under the direction of the W. M. Harris Funeral home and burial was in the Tahoka cemetery.

"Aleck" Riddle had been a resident of Tahoka for 38 years, living a life without offense to any human being. He was a good man who looked strictly after his own affairs and enjoyed the respect and esteem of our entire citizenship.

Born at Celeste, Hunt county, Texas, on December 11, 1883, Harmon Alexander Riddle was reared as an orphan. His mother died when he was three years of age. His father was a railroad man, and "Aleck" was taken by his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Carpenter, to raise. 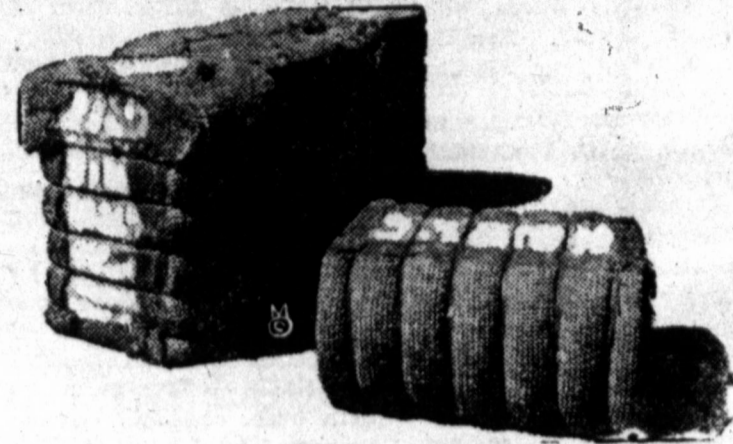
