Editorial

District-level judicial proceedings in another state are arely worthy of editorial comment, but pending proceedings in our neighboring state of New Mexico recently caught our eye not just because of their absurdity but because they're a perfect example of the abuse of the judicial system.

If you haven't heard, Santa Fe District Judge Daniel Sanchez has issued a temporary restraining order against felevision talk show host David Letterman, after New Mexico citizen Colleen Nestler filed an application for a restraining order based on claims that Letterman according to Associated Press and Elonline stories — has been harassing her over the airwaves during the past 10

Harassment which reportedly began with Nestler's telepathic communications with the talk show host.

While we believe the ability of private citizens to seek relief through the court system is important, such frivolous actions as this make us wonder whether the problem is the applicant or the New Mexico district judge who allowed such action to proceed to a hearing.

Our nation's judicial systems are backed up enough with cases of merit. Adding cases that are based in delusion is a disservice to both the applicant - in this case an obviously disturbed individual who is needlessly placed in a position of ridicule — and the public, through the criminal waste of taxpaver's money.

In the past, we know of cases where individuals filing frivolous law suits have been ordered to pay the attorney fees of both sides. Maybe the answer to such cases as this is for a higher court to order payment of attorney fees by the judge who allowed the ball to start rolling in the first place.

Following the end of the sign-up period all applications will be ranked based on a predetermined will have complete details of criteria set.

An NRCS conservation resource planner will develop contracts and conservation plans for each successful application. Producers with approved 2006 contracts can begin implementing the approved conservation practices in Spring 2006.

For 2006, Texas funding priorities were developed with the assistance of local input, the NRCS State Technical Committee and Texas State conservationist Dr. Larry Butler and his staff.


The initial \$72.37 million allocated for Texas will be used to solve locally identified resource problems in individual counties and will also fund special statewide resource concerns recommended by the Texas State Technical Committee such as water quantity, water and air quality, wildlife habitat and control of invasive species.

A breakdown of the initial allocation amounts shows \$66 million is designated for priority addressed through the EQIP program.

A total of \$34 million will be used to provide county base funding throughout the state and an additional \$32 million will be targeted to specific needs conservation concerns including brush and invasive species management, irrigation water conservation, water and air quality related animal feeding operations, water quality, assistance for limited resource farmers and ranchers, reforestation and wildlife habitat.

EQIP-GSWC The program received an initial 2006 allocation of \$5.5 million. The EQIP-GSWC program is dedicated to water conservation measures in Texas counties that utilize the Ogallala Aquifer.

An additional \$4.5 million in funds will supplement the



In the field, the 2005 crop has impressed many a West Texas traveler over the past few months. Now that the majority of this year's field activity is complete, the focus for crop watchers will be tracking how quickly the tens of thousands of modules waiting to be processed move from field to gin yard.

Module storage has been the standard across the Texas High Plains for more than twenty years and does an outstanding job of protecting cotton quality during what can be a llengthy wait for ginning.

Earlier this season, Plains Cotton Growers joined forces with the Texas Independent Ginners Association to remind producers how important the creation of uniform size modules was to keeping ginning costs down and to increasing the efficiency of a gin transporting modules from the field.

The facts about stroke

Stroke is the third leading cause of death in the United States after heart disease and cancer. It is a major cause of physical and mental disabilities in older adults.

According to Andrew B. Crocker, Gerontology Health specialist with Texas Cooperative Extension, a stroke happens when blood cannot flow to a part of the brain. When the brain does not get the oxygen and nutrients it needs from the blood, its cells are damaged or begin to die. If brain cells are only damaged, they sometimes can be repaired. But brain cells that have died cannot be brought back to life. This means that the brain may stop sending signals to other parts of the body that control things like speaking, thinking, and walking.

There are two major types of strokes: ischemic and hemorrhagic. Ischemic stroke is the most common kind and is caused by blood clots or the narrowing of a blood vessel leading to the brain. flowing into other regions of the brain and prevents these regions.

Hemorrhagic happens when a broken blood vessel causes bleeding from reaching brain cells.

Many people are familiar with the term "mini-stroke." A "mini-stroke" is technically called a Transient Ischemic Attack (TIA). TIAs may occur when blockage of the blood

immediately harmful as a Even if you are in perfect and Eric Magby of Colorado regular stroke, a TIA is still a health, you may have some medical emergency. The affects of the TIA may be major, debilitating stroke.

Signs and symptoms of a stroke include but are not limited to

- · Sudden numbness or of the body.
- · Sudden confusion, trouble speaking understanding.
- Sudden problems seeing in one eye or both eyes.

 Sudden dizziness, loss of balance or trouble walking.

The warning signs of a stroke may last only a few minutes and then go away. Always pay attention to any stroke symptoms, even if they are fleeting. If you suspect someone may be having a stroke, the National Stroke Association recommends you act FAST:

- Face... ask the person to smile. Does one side of the face droop?
- Arms... ask the person to normal blood flow. The clot keeps blood from raise both arms. Does one arm drift downward?
- Speech... ask the person needed oxygen and nutrients to repeat a simple sentence from reaching brain cells in such as, "It's sunny today." Are the words slurred? Can stroke the person repeat the sentence correctly?
- · Time... If the person in the brain. This break also shows any of these stops oxygen and nutrients symptoms, time is important. Call 9-1-1 immediately!






