Summer Recreation Work Is Starting

Youth Center Formally Opens

More than 200 youths and adults attended the opening of the Tahoka Youth Center, located in the old Red Cross building east of the court house, last Saturday night, and everyone went away thoroughly sold on the project.

A short program opening the Center featured talks by County Judge Tom Garrard and Dr. Emil Prohl, a tap dance by Barbara Wells, piano numbers by Mrs. Marjorie Kemp of O'Donnell, solos by Bill Sewell of Slaton, and group singing led by Sewell.

Following the program, the young people engaged in games and dancing until 11 o'clock.

The Center has been organized and furnished by the teen-agers of Tahoka under the sponsorship of Mrs. Terry Thompson and Mr. and Mrs. H. O. Hargett, as a place for recreation for all young people of the county. It is open to any youth who conducts himself properly for a membership fee of only \$1.00 for six months.

It includes two game rooms, a snack bar, and two rest rooms. Some of the equipment has been donated and other has been built by the youths. Phebe K. Warner club has furnished a piano, John Beard has loaned a nickelodeon rent free, the county has furnished several tables and chairs, the city recreation project has contributed two ping-pong tables, and others have given sets of dominoes, Chinese checkers, checkers, pictures, etc., to the center.

The center is designed to furnish wholesome recreation to the youth of the county, who might otherwise seek recreation in a less wholesome environment.

The Youth Center will be open two nights each week, Thursday and Saturday from 8 until 11 o'clock.

This Saturday night another program will be presented, when the youth of Post will be special guests.

All adults of the county are invited to drop by the Center for an inspection either of these nights.

Receive Checks For Conservation

Up to date Lynn county farmers have received a total of \$41519.67 in soil conservation payments for 1945 according to Clinton M. Walker, Secretary of the Lynn county A.C.A.

The checks are now mailed direct to the farmer from the disbursing office and do not come through the A. A. A. office as in the past. All applications for the 1945 payment have been transmitted to the State office and checks for carrying out soil building practices should soon be coming in to all the participating farmers, Walker reports.

Under the dairy production program a total of \$5,402.11 has been paid to dairy products producers for the 1st quarter of 1946. No applications for this payment for the period January-February-March will be accepted after May 31, 1946.

Commencing July 1, 1946 applications for the dairy subsidy will be taken for the quarter April-May-June and the rate of payment for this quarter will be ten cents per pound of butterfat and thirty five cents per cwt. for whole milk for April, and for May and June the rate will be fifteen cents for butterfat and fifty-five cents per cwt. for whole milk. These rates are subject to termination or revision in the event of any general increase in price ceilings for milk and its products.

Army Air Show Is Staged Here

Tahoka people were treated to a spectacular imitation of the real thing here Tuesday afternoon when Captain Lonnie Hicks of the AAF Lieutenant Swanson of the Air Recruiting Office, Lubbock, and Forces staged an aerial combat between two AT-6's, one with American markings and the other with Japanese markings. Lt. Hendler was the pilot of the American plane and Lt. Teuche of the simulated Japanese plane. Both pilots and planes were from the Goodfellow Field at San Angelo.

Upon the approach of the Japanese plane the U. S. plane made the attack. Then followed for several minutes a game of marvelous maneuvering on the part of the two pilots, the Jap seeking to escape or to maneuver his plane into position where he could gain the offensive. The U. S. Pilot was seeking with equal or superior skill to prevent this and to hold the offensive and finally to maneuver his plane into position where he could shoot down his antagonist. He finally succeeded and sent the Jap plane down, down, down, trailing smoke, as it sought to make its get-away.

Ex-service men say that the fight was very realistic but suggest that the real thing was often far more thrilling because in real battle numbers of planes on each side might be engaged.

Also there was on display for several hours of the afternoon aerial equipment, including a cut-away airplane engine and a Link trainer mounted on a trailer, and everybody interested was invited to inspect the equipment. The display was given on the public square immediately in front of the courthouse and attracted many people.

The Air Forces, Captain Hicks explained, are open to men between the ages of 17 and 34. The Office at 1114, 10th Street, Lubbock, invites you to come by and ask what it has to offer, he stated.

Lt. Swanson, who was in charge of the Air Show, also made an appeal for recruits for the service, impressing upon his hearers the necessity of maintaining a large army and air force for our own protection.

Wilson-New Lynn Election Saturday

A very important election is to be held in the Wilson and New Lynn school districts Saturday, or two elections in one.

First, the voters are to determine whether or not the two districts are to be consolidated; and

Second, they are to determine whether or not the outstanding bonds of each district will be assumed by the consolidated district in case the vote is in favor of consolidation.

Any person who is qualified to vote under the General Laws of Texas may vote on the Consolidation proposal.

But, in order to be qualified to vote on the Road Assumption proposition, a person must not only be qualified to vote under the General Laws but he must also be a property-tax-payer in the district in which he offers to vote.

The two propositions will be submitted separately and a person who is qualified may vote on either proposition without voting on the other. However, all voters in both precincts are urged to vote on both propositions if legally qualified to do so.

If Consolidation carries, all pupils in the present New Lynn district will hereafter attend school at Wilson. They will be transported by buses. It is contemplated that additional school facilities at Wilson will be supplied if needed.

These additional pupils will greatly increase the number of students in the Wilson schools and will enable the consolidated district to employ more teachers and build a better school system.

Supt. C. O. Head is the progressive and efficient superintendent of the Wilson schools and most assuredly will become the superintendent of the Consolidated district. He is assisted by an excellent faculty of teachers and it is assumed that most of these will remain after consolidation is effected. Others, of course, will be added to the number.

City Trucks Will Pick Up Junk, Spray With DDT

In an effort to prevent any outbreak of the dread-disease "polio" here, a city-wide clean up campaign will be waged next week, Mayor T. J. Bovell announces. The City, Chamber of Commerce, and Boy Scouts are sponsoring the drive.

All citizens are urged to clean up their premises and adjoining vacant lots, burn all trash and weeds, and put cans trash, garbage, etc., that will not burn into sacks, boxes, or garbage cans in the alleys during next week, May 27 through June 1.

The city will furnish trucks to pick up the junk free of charge to those co-operating with this campaign.

An order has been placed for a large quantity of DDT, and if this disinfectant arrives in time out-houses, lots, and barns will be sprayed to prevent breeding of flies and insects.

Mayor Bovell states that some people are requesting that an ordinance be passed prohibiting the keeping of cows, hogs, and chickens in town. The council does not wish to pass such an ordinance at this time, however, if keepers of livestock will clean up their lots and spray them with a strong DDT solution to eliminate fly-breeding places and cut down the odor, he believes it will not be necessary to pass ordinances regulating the keeping of animals in town.

Tahoka has been fortunate in having had only one or two cases of "polio" since the outbreak several years ago that spread over nearly all Texas. This year, the disease has started earlier than ever before, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, states spread of the disease can be slowed up or halted by such sanitation drives as planned here.

Mrs. Daniel Is Buried Here

The body of Mrs. Myrtle L. Daniel of Dawson county, 63, who was killed in an automobile collision twelve miles northeast of Lamesa on Wednesday night of last week, was buried here Friday afternoon following funeral services conducted in the First Methodist Church in O'Donnell, Rev. E. H. Crandall, the pastor, officiating.

Mrs. Daniel was the step-mother of the late A. M. Daniel, who died here in 1938, his widow now being Mrs. Louie Weathers, county treasurer of Lynn county.

Immediately upon hearing of the tragedy, Mr. and Mrs. Weathers rushed to the Rix Funeral Home in Lubbock, to which the body had been carried, and where it was prepared for burial.

Following the death of A. M. Daniel here in 1938, his step-mother, Mrs. Myrtle L. Daniel, came to live with his widow, who is now Mrs. Louie Weathers. The two women lived together here for a year or two, the two being very much attached to each other.

Other step-children of the deceased were Mrs. Arla Moore, C. A. Daniel, and Mrs. Thelma Goad, all of O'Donnell. Also surviving are one own son, E. B. Daniel of O'Donnell, and one daughter, Mrs. Donna Hemmingway of Midland.

Other survivors are six brothers and three sisters, only one of whom resides in this section of the state, J. E. McGregor of O'Donnell, a brother.

Mrs. Daniel's husband, L. E. (Bud) Daniel, died here in 1937, and his body was buried in the Tahoka cemetery. She was a resident of this and Dawson counties for a

LET'S EXPAND OUR SCHOOL SYSTEM

There is a decided trend throughout Texas for the consolidation of small school districts with adjacent larger districts and the building of bigger and better school systems. The movement has gained much headway in Lynn county. For instance, Lakeview, Petty, and Joe Stokes have been consolidated with the New Home district, and the consolidated district is planning to build a new high school building. O'Donnell district lying principally in Lynn county and Okay district in Dawson county have recently consolidated and are also preparing to construct additional buildings. Wilson and New Lynn are to vote on a

consolidation proposition Saturday, and the proposal will doubtless be approved.

For some reason, Tahoka seems to be lagging behind, though there are a number of adjacent school districts whose scholastics have been transferring into the Tahoka district for several years. We believe that the time is ripe for some consolidating to be done here. Edith, Midway, Three Lakes, West Point, Dixie, any or all of these and possibly one or two others, could be consolidated with the Tahoka district to their advantage and to Tahoka's.

In fact, if all of these districts would consolidate with the Tahoka district, the consolidated district, could easily have one of the finest school systems in Texas. We already have a good system here, but our school rooms are crowded and our teachers not as well paid as some. Why not all throw in together, construct an additional building, pay better salaries to teachers, and thus be able to build up a faculty here as good as the best in Texas? We can not do it as long as bigger and better schools keep taking our best teachers away from us.

So, folks, what are we waiting on? Why do we not get busy and do something about it? We understand that our board of trustees is ready to go if the people are. Let's go.

Lee O'Daniel came down to Texas and took a look and backed off from the gubernatorial race. Jimmy Allred shot a blast last Saturday night and then announced that he too did not choose to run. Bob Calvert got out two or three weeks ago. But-Coke Stevenson still declines to state whether he intends to run or not. Many people are wondering why. Some are declaring that he has already lost their votes by his dilly-dally course. He will lose more and more votes the longer he delays his announcement; if he does intend to run. If he doesn't we believe he ought to let the other boys know it. He could doubtless still win by a big majority if he were to announce now, but he gains nothing by keeping his intentions in the dark respecting his intentions.

When B. B. Calvert withdrew from the governor's race a few weeks ago, about the only explanation he made was that it would cost a man a hundred thousand dollars to be elected governor. He may have overstated the case but it doubtless would cost a lot of money. Nobody but a rich man can afford to run unless somebody digs up to help pay the expenses. Often the special interests do dig up and if their candidate is elected he is a very unusual character if he does not feel under deep obligation to them. The only way he can repay and the only way they expect him to repay them is to use his power in favor of legislation that would help them or in opposition to legislation that would hurt them. We believe that it would be better for the people to finance the campaigns of their favorites.

We are convinced that either the OPA is rotten per se or it is being administered in a rotten manner. If there is no way of eliminating injustices being practiced under the act as it stands then the act creating the OPA should be drastically amended or repealed. We think that a lot of this hue and cry that is raised every time repeal of a wartime measure is proposed is due in a large measure to the fear on the part of a lot of folks that repeal

UNITY—HOW EASY ATTAINED

In Acts 2: 1-4, we see that the Apostles spoke as the Holy Spirit gave them utterance. Come on now, neighbor, and let's see how easy it is for you and me to be one, to see things just alike. LT. WALDRIP WRITES OF ATOMIC BOMB EXPERIMENTS

The News has received the following communication from Lt. W. M. Waldrip of Tahoka, who has an APO address through San Francisco, which is self explanatory.

"I thought that perhaps you and some of the people of Lynn county might be interested in what is happening in 'Operation Crossroads.' That is the atomic bomb experiment that is being conducted out here this summer. I'm a member of the B-17 Unit that are flying the radio-controlled planes. They are the 'Drones' and 'Mother' ships. Very interesting work, I think."

And here follows a description of the operation. We are sure many of our readers will be interested in it.

From the preparations at Roosevelt N. M. for the Atom Bomb

Test, which is to take place at Bikini in July, it is possible to get a fair preview of what the AAF's share of that job will be.

Task Group 1.5, the AAF's part of the Army-Navy "Crossroads" is moving 2500 men and dozens of specially equipped planes to test bases on Kwajalein and Eniwetok. The Instrumentation or "Drone" unit with 400 men and a fleet of Flying Fortresses, pilotless and otherwise, will be based on Eniwetok, 180 miles west of Bikini. The "Attack" and photographic units, with 2100 men and a fleet of B-29's, including the one that will drop the bomb; another fleet of P-51's or photo "29's" and two C-54's will be based on Kwajalein, 230 miles southeast of Bikini.

Bikini Lagoon itself is an irregular oval about 22 miles from east to west, and, at the widest points, about 14 miles from north to south.

The Northeast "Corner" (of this oval) is marked Bikini Island. (Continued Next Week)

Safety Contest For Cub Flyers

All flyers of Piper Cub airplanes will have a chance to participate in a big Piper Safety Contest which is now underway, it was announced today by Bill McNeely, official sponsor of the contest in this area.

Primary purpose of the contest, which will be run simultaneously by approximately one thousand Authorized Piper Cub Dealers throughout the entire country, is to promote safety in flying in general, to increase interest in aviation on the part of the community and prepare it for the rapid development expected in the near future.

Eligibility requirements and contest rules have purposely been kept simple to encourage the greatest number of applicants. Bill McNeely urges prospective contestants to visit his airport office now and get complete details of the Piper Safety Contest. Entry blanks are available there, which should be filled out and turned in promptly to McNeely.

Serious Polio epidemics have already been reported in Amarillo, San Antonio, and other Texas cities. There are at least two cases in Lubbock.

We MUST take every precaution against the spread of the dread disease. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, says poliomyelitis is a gastro-intestinal infection. Its control depends largely on sanitation. Efforts must be made to eliminate the house-fly and the mosquito, and to eliminate or neutralize their breeding places. Garbage should be disposed of immediately, or kept under cover. Raw foods and vegetables should be washed thoroughly before use. Outdoor privies should be done away with, or thoroughly disinfected.

Some citizens are asking the City Council to pass an ordinance prohibiting the keeping of livestock in town, or at least in certain parts of town. This may not be necessary if our citizens keeping such livestock will use DDT generously about the lots, barns, etc., to kill flies.

CLEAN UP YOUR PLACE NOW

Put your trash, cans, garbage, etc. in sacks, boxes, or garbage cans, and place same in the alley at the rear of your house during the week May 27—June 1st.

The City of Tahoka trucks WILL PICK UP SUCH TRASH FREE.

The City of Tahoka will also spray your outhouses, barns, and lots with DDT to prevent breeding of flies.

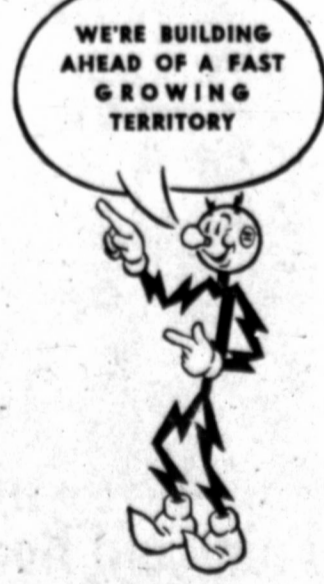
