No Planting **Deadline Set**

There will bt no date set as the deadline for planting or replanting cotton in Lynn county according to Carl Sanders, chairman of the Lynn county A. C. A. committee. According to the regulations set up by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation it is not possible for the county committe or the corporation to set such a date in abvance of close of the normal cotton planting date is left, up to he adjustor and the producer. Sanders points out that individual producers will be notified wh n to turn in their final screage reports which will be somethime after the first of June. After he has turned in the final acreage report the producer will have nothing to report unless he has a loss. If he has a loss he will report it to the local A. A. A. office in Tahoka and an adjustor will be sent out to inspect he loss The chairman cautions against putting the cotton avreage to other use until it is released by he adjustor or other representative of the Federal Crop Insurance Cor-

Rain Statistics Show Increase Over Last Year

Well. anyway, we have gotten more rain during the first five months this year than we got during the first five months last year. The grand total this year up to this minute is 3.43 inches. Just think of it. That is 43 percent more than we got up to the same date last year, which was 2,39 inches.

Last year we received 11.52 inches during the entire year. If our rate of increase continues for the next seven months, the total this year will be 16.47 inches, almost enough to make a crop if properly distributed.

Almos; the entire rainfall during the past two years, however, has come in little driblets. the amount each time being too small to last until it thundered again.

Since October, 1944, there have been only three rains that amounted to more than one inch. The first of the three came on September 28, 1945, when the rainfall amounted to 1.39 inches. Two weeks later, October 9. 1945, came a rain hat amounted to 1.27 inches. On January 14 this year the rainfall amounted to 1.14 inches. And that's all. The rest of the rains for the past 18 months have been just little

when all was said and done there was only .00 of an inch of water in our old rainwater can.

And it didn't rain much anywhere in the county.

The rainfall for the first five months this year is as follows: January, 1.66 inches: February, .10; March, 23; April, 57; and May. .87; total, 3.43.



"Hey, doesn't he even get a checkride in that thing before he switches over?"

"Shove off, Mac," the sailor groundcrewman said. "This is naval air ferry squadron three. If we checked those guys out we couldn't of flown 21,000 planes 20 million miles in two years, could we? Not with only 3,000 pilots anyway." "Yeah, but do all these guys know

how to fly all types of planes?"
"Mac, they can fly 35 different types of naval aircraft."

Comdr. Henry S. Blake, USNR, commanding officer of squadron three, walked up and began to explain a little of his outfit's far flung operations since its commissioning December 1, 1943.

"What the crewman told you was correct. We laid special emphasis on training pilots to operate the highest number of types of navy planes so they would go anywhere, anytime. At one time we had 80 per cent of our officers and men away on ferry trips to Saipan, Okinawa, Iwo Jima and carriers standing off Tokyo.'

The squadron was started when increased plane production made it impossible for naval activities to dispatch pilots to pick up and ferry each new aircraft, the commander explained.

(By George Mahon)

This is Saturday noon, The President is scheduled to address a joint session of Congress at four P. M. today.

The intolerable strike and stikes of recent months are retarding production. Producing inflation and wrecking the economy of the

A straightforward labor-management policy, which some of us have long advocated, would have avoided this tragic situation. Before Pearl Harbor, during the war, and since the war, the House of Representatives has passed legislation designed to protect the public from disastrous strikes and labor-management trouble, and at the same time gave labor and manageent a fair deal.

But the efforts of the House have been ineffective. Why? Because the U.S. Senate has willfully failed and refused to take favorable action on what the House has done. In fairness it must be said that the Teras Senators have not been parties to this inexcusable delay

To be more specific: On June 7, 1940, the House passed a bill to revise the National Labor Relations Act by a roll call vote of 258 to 129. It went to the Senate Committee on Education and Labor and died there. On December 3, 1941-four days before Pearl Harbor- the House again passed a bill for this purpose by a vote of 253 to 136. This bill also went to the Senate Committee on Education and Labor and died there. On February 7, 1946, the House again passed a bill which is commonly referred to as the Case Bill. That bill passed the House by a vote of 258 to 155. It also went to the Senate Committee on Education and Labor and re-

mained there until a few days ago. I am among those in the House who voted for each of these bills. It is fervently hoped that those

in the Senate who have blocked appropriate legislation in the past will now, at long last, join in a pro-

Atomic Bomb At Bikini

Last ween The News published a small portion of a communication from Lt. W. M. Waldrip of Tahoka describing the atomic bomb experiments being made out in the Pacific this summer. He is a member of the B-17 Unit that are flying the radio-controlled planes. Last week we closed with his brief description of the Bikini lagoon and island n the area of the experiments. At that point we again pick up his story.

The observation ships are to be drawn up still farther to the north east back of Bikini and some 20 miles from the center of the explosion.
