Scholastics Show Slight Decrease In Lynn County

Where are the 938 Lynn County School children we have lost since the 1939-1940 school census was taken? Is large scale farming; the urban trend of population; the decrease of large families; the trend to production centers; the government farm program, and our drought conditions which has sent the Mexican children back south early responsible? Or were there numerous children missed by the census takers this spring to cause our alarming drop in the scholastic population of this year?

In 1939-1940 there were 3,740 school children in this county. To date, there are 2,811 noses counted for 1946-1947. At a State Per capita of \$30.00 to \$34.00 per head to help our schools financially, it is a pity to miss a single student, according to Lenore M. Tunnell, County Superintendent.

We can still take any child missed and place him on a supplementary census roll for any district until July first; everyone is asked to check and see that every child of school age in his care be rendered. This will help your child, your school, and your county.

A tabulation of the census figures for the past three years is given for your study below. These figures represent the scholastic population before any transfers or districts consolidated to out of county schools have been added:

The following are the rules and regulations of Ranch House:

1. The judgment of the sponsors will be final authority at all activities.
2. No one under the influence of liquor will be admitted.
3. No member will be allowed to leave the club until ready to return home.
4. Damage to property will be charged to offender.
5. Club will be open two (2) nights weekly: Thursday 8:00 to 10:30 P. M., and Saturday 8:00 to 11:00 P. M.
6. Members will be allowed only three (3) guests at one time. Members will be held responsible for the conduct of their guests.
7. Charter members of the Senior Class of 1946 of Tahoka High School are eligible for membership for a period of three years.
8. Unacceptable behavior at the club will not be tolerated. A warning will be given for a first offense. Ejection and membership card suspension will be the result of a second offense.

Mr. and Mrs. Lonnie Lumsden of Wilson attended funeral services last Saturday afternoon at Shiner for Mr. Lumsden's foster mother, Mrs. Julia C. Green, who had died there on the preceding Thursday after a long illness.

Julia Dickson was born August 6, 1860 in Lavaca county, and has lived there all her life. She married Wm. G. Green in 1876, and moved to the Green ranch on Peach Creek, later moving to the Shiner home.

Wm. G. Green bought four leagues of Wilson county school land, then cut it up into farms. Thus the Green estate owns most of Wilson and a great many farms around Wilson.

Her husband preceded Mrs. Green in death, as did their only child, Dickson Green. She is survived by her grandson, Dickson Green, Jr., one nephew and several nieces.

Mrs. Green was quite well known in the Wilson section as she formerly spent much time in the Lumsden home.

Mrs. Turpin, who is a native of Bristol, England, is "carried away" with America and especially Lynn county. She feels that this will be a lovely place to call home.

City Recreation Program Draws Many Children

From fifty to seventy children may have been taking advantage of the city's summer recreation program since it began last Saturday, according to Alton Cain, general chairman, and Jim Foust, director.

The program, sponsored by local civic groups, is designed to furnish wholesome recreation, properly directed through the summer months for children of the town and county. Such games as volleyball, badminton, shuffle board, croquet, softball and football are offered in addition to play on the swings, rings, sand boxes, etc.

Adult directors are on the playground from 9 a. m. until 12 noon and from 3 to 7 p. m. week days.

High School Coach Jim Foust is director of the play program, but is being assisted by representatives from various organizations including the Phebe K. Warner Club, Parent-Teachers association, Methodist Friendship class, Church of Christ Baptist Ladies, and Pythian Sisters.

The program is being financed by the Tahoka Rotary Club, Chamber of Commerce, City of Tahoka, Phebe K. Warner club, and PTA.

Coach Foust states that any boy or group of boys wishing to play softball should see him so that games may be arranged. Two softball diamonds have been provided one for small fellows, and another for the larger boys.

The ladies' firm, which will be known as Brooks-Walker Manufacturing company, will manufacture men's work gloves for wholesale trade, children's cotton clothing, and possibly other items.

Mrs. Brooks had for the past several months been operating a small shop in the Rose Theatre building.

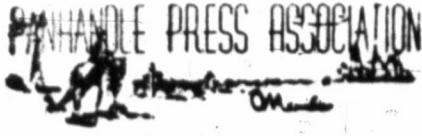

During the war Russia received much praise from the officials and the people of the United States for the valiant part she was playing in the winning of the war. This feeling of admiration was genuine. We were free to give her full credit. But since the victory was won we have been having all kinds of trouble in getting along with Russia. She has been inclined to stand aloof from us and continually acts as if she were suspicious of us. She shows little desire to cooperate. She doesn't like our democracy. She seems fearful that it may take root among Russians. That would not suit Stalin and Molotov and the other Soviet leaders. As leaders of the Communist party they rule Russia. So they have been snobbing our President. They have even been reluctant to keep their agreements with us and other allied powers. They have also shown a disposition to dictate to neighboring countries. Is she aspiring to become a world dictator? We do not know, but we do not like the attitude she has assumed since the close of the war.

According to news reports the situation in Germany is constantly becoming more and more tense. It is a situation that must be controlled with a firm hand but with all proper restraint and the utmost common sense. The German people obviously are still obsessed to a degree with the idea that they constitute a super race and are destined eventually to rule the world, and naturally they are impatient and inclined to be rebellious under restraint. They must be educated out of this super-human obsession and into the tenets and spirit of democracy. By all means this must be done with respect to the younger generation and the little children just now coming on the scene of action. Great patience, consideration, and kindness toward them by the American occupation forces will do much to mollify the situation and to bring Germany around eventually to the democratic way of life.

JET-PROPELLED PLANE COMING TO LUBBOCK
Lubbock, Texas.—South Plains residents will have the opportunity to get a close-up view of the Army Air Forces jet-propelled Lockheed P-80 "Shooting Star" June 23 at the Lubbock National Aeronautics Association air show which will be held at the Lubbock Municipal Airport commencing at 10:00 a. m. Major Victor G. Modena, assistant recruiting officer at Goodfellow Field, San Angelo, has assured NAA officials that at least two of the 9-mile a minute P-80's will be at the field for the show. Other air force planes which will go through maneuvers during the show are an A-26, B-25, P-47, P-51, AT-6, and AT-7. There is a possibility that these models will be supplemented by others.
In addition to the Army Air Forces show, the program will feature a display of new models of private aircraft and a model airplane show, the latter event carrying a \$25.00 cash prize.
The Army flying exhibition is scheduled for 2:00 p. m.

Sidelights From Washington

(By George Mahon)
My mail from our District indicates widespread approval of the quick action of the House of Representatives in passing legislation to stop the paralyzing railroad strike. Within two hours after the President addressed the joint session of Congress we had passed the bill requested by him.
The railroad unions are made up of the very highest type of American citizens. They did a great job during the war. The union organizations were 18 to 2 against the strike. It was principally the stubbornness of one man, Mr. A. P. Whitney, that produced the disastrous situation. A country that cannot protect itself against utter chaos is in a bad shape. I am convinced that the quick action of the House gave hope and encouragement to a great majority of the American people.
The American people have been kicked around by such tyrants as John L. Lewis until their patience is threadbare. People generally do not have time and opportunity to read the Congressional Record and they cannot understand why more effective action was not taken against racketeers in industry and labor months ago.
The fact is that before the war, during the war, and since the war, the House of Representatives passed legislation to meet the situation but the legislation has usually died in the Senate. However, the Senate has now passed the Case Bill which was approved months ago by the House, and the bill has gone to the White House.
Those of us who voted for the bill to stop Mr. Whitney's paralyzing railroad strike have been threatened by Mr. Whitney, and he has also insulted the American people. In commenting on those of us who voted for the bill, Mr. Whitney, according to the Associated Press, said:
"My Board of Directors already has authorized me to spend \$2,500,000 to defeat the members of Congress who have voted for the shackling labor legislation Mr. Truman has proposed. We mean to defeat every member of Congress who voted for that bill."
The C. I. O. continues to breathe advocated and are advocating remedial legislation. What we desperately need in America today is out threats against those who have government in the public interest—not government by pressure groups who threaten legislators and insult the intelligence and patriotism of the people. Minority groups are entitled to be heard in America and they are entitled to a fair deal and every legitimate right, but they are not entitled to run roughshod over the majority.
There is no perfect answer to all the problems which beset our Country. But one thing is sure—this Nation cannot safely go forward without the adoption of a more clear-cut and workable Labor-Industry policy—a policy which will safeguard the best interests of the American people.

ARMY OFFERS EXCELLENT TRAINING OPPORTUNITIES

T-Sgt. Joe F. Raindl and S-Sgt. Billie J. Stephens arrived in Tahoka today to explain to eligible young men the many advantages now offered by the army to those who enlist at this time. Sgt. Raindl explained that all men who enlist in the regular army before the 6th of October 1946 have the opportunity to choose any approved college of their desire upon the termination of their enlistment and have the tuition plus a liberal subsistence allowance paid to them under the GI Bill of Rights while attending. Upon the completion of their army enlistment, Sgt. Raindl further stated that those men who are eligible will receive as many months of college training as they serve during their army enlistment plus twelve months. Figured in actual cash, the maximum amount of training, which is five years of college for a three year enlistment, will be worth \$2,500 of paid tuition and either \$3,120 or \$4,320 paid in subsistence allowance, depending on whether the student is single or has dependents to support.

Sgt. Stephens who re-enlisted in the Air Corps for three years wants all eligible men to know that Air Corps enlistments are being accepted and that all Air Corps Technical training schools are wide open

to any applicants who desire technical training in Radio, mechanics, or other Air Corps specialties. Sgt. Raindl's and Stephens' home office is located at Room 203 Federal Building, Lubbock, Texas. Any men who are interested in an en-

listment are urged to contact them personally or by mail at that address in regards to any information pertaining to the Army. Army Recruiters will be in this town every Monday at the Post Office.

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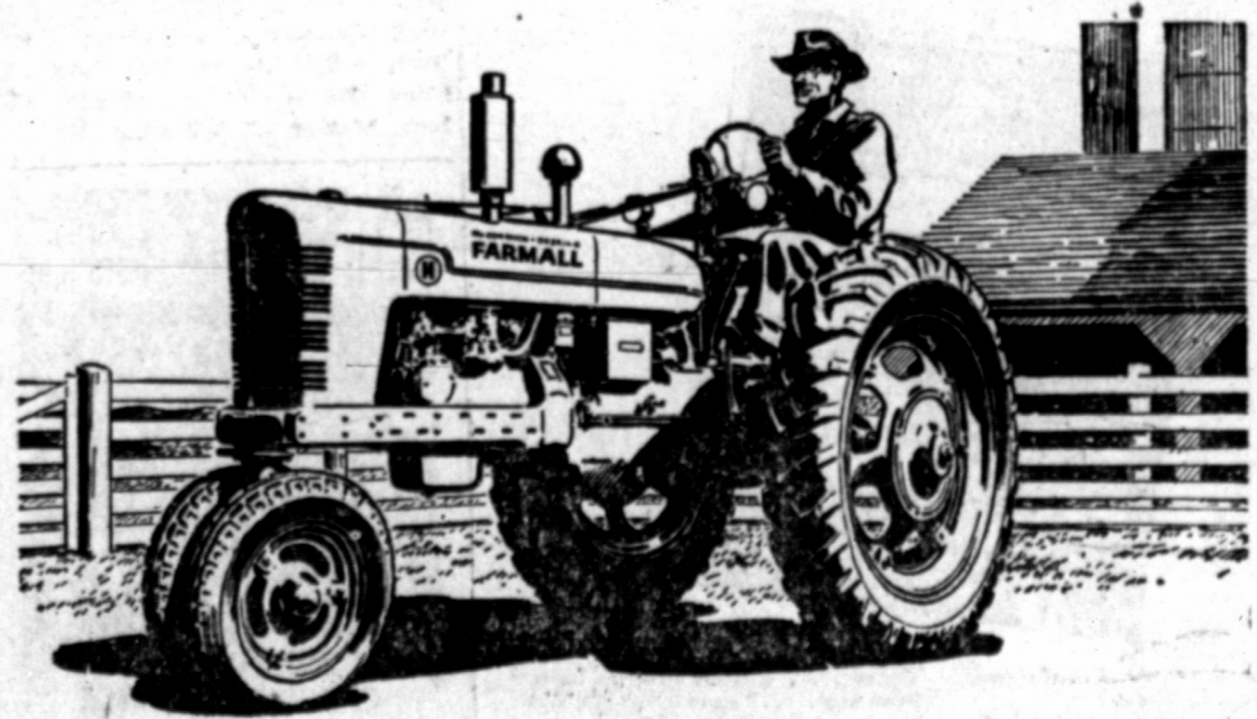

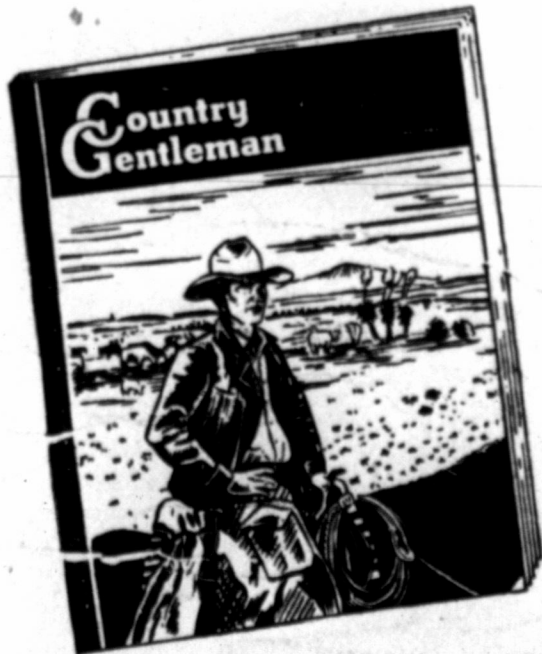
