## Demo. Committee Announces Rules For Candidates

The county Democratic Executive committee met here Monday and made out a list of the names of candidates to appear on the ballot in the Democratic primary election to be held on Saturday, July 27; determined the order in which the names of candidates for the various offices shall appear on the ballot by drawing them from a container; assessed the candidates for the expenses of holding the election; filled a couple of vacancies on the executive committee, and transacted such other business as was necessary.

The following schedule of charges was assessed against the candidates:

For each candidate running for county judge, county attorney, county clerk, sheriff, tax collector-assessor, \$70.00; for county superintendent of schools, \$50.00; for county treasurer, \$55.00; for district clerk, \$35.00; for county commissioner, \$35.00; for Justice of the Peace, \$15.00.

The law requires that these assessments shall be paid to the county Democratic executive committee chairman, Judge C. H. Cain of Tahoka, on or before Saturday, June 22. The name of any candidate who fails to pay will not be placed on the ballot.

It will be remembered that the state executive committee passed a resolution on February 26, known as the party fealty resolution, to the effect that every person who seeks to have his or her name printed on the ballot as a Democratic candidate for any office shall be required to answer whether he or she voted the straight Democratic ticket in the last election or acted and voted with the so-called Texas "Regulars" and scratched the Democratic ticket. In line with this resolution the Democratic Executive Committee for Lynn county sent out a questionnaire respecting this matter some time ago to each of the candidates. Judge Cain reports that all of them except four answered the questionnaire. It was doubtless a matter of mere neglect or indifference on the part of some if not all of the four who failed to file answers. Their failure to answer, however, whatever the cause, will not keep their names off the ballot.

The committee filled by appointment two vacancies among its membership. Oran Hickerson was named as the committeeman from Three Lakes to fill the place of E. D. Crouch deceased and J. Weldon Martin was named as committeeman from the Draw precinct to fill the place of E. W. Holloway who has moved out of the county.

Lynn has missed on the rain again. Threatening clouds Tuesday night, Wednesday, and Thursday promised much-needed moisture, but very little rain fell on Lynn county.

A brief shower Wednesday morning netted only .02 of an inch.

However, a heavy downpour came to an area of this section lying east of Central Church, mostly in Garza county. From a quarter to a half inch and more fell east of Draw near the caprock and south of Draw on the Borden county line. Good showers were also received southeast and southwest of the town of O'Donnell.

North of Petty and west of New Home, a heavy downpour covered a few sections, but accompanying hail destroyed some crops that were up.

Though the drought is still on, everyone was glad to see the cool weather which accompanied the threat of rain, for the thermometer had been in the vicinity of 100 degrees for several days.

## SOCIAL SECURITY MAN TO BE HERE WEDNESDAY

John Palmer, Manager of the Social Security Board, Lubbock, will be in Tahoka at the U. S. Post Office Wednesday, July 3, at 11 a. m. for the purpose of answering any questions you may have on Social Security, discussing possible benefits and taking claims from persons who seem to be entitled to benefits, and of taking applications for Social Security account number cards.

Many features of the old-age and survivors insurance plan are of particular interest to returning service men and women. One of the most important ones is the necessity of having a social security account number—whether he is entering covered employment for the first time or whether he is returning to a job in an office, store or other work in industry and commerce. A veteran who returns to his old job needs to know the social security number which was given to him when he got his first job. Anyone who has lost his card should apply to the Social Security Board for a duplicate.

Any veteran starting a new business will have to secure an employer's identification number. This number is secured through filing an application (Form SS-4) with the Social Security Board. It is suggested that he call in person for this purpose to have the advantage of a discussion with the field office staff of his obligations as an employer under the Social Security Act.

THE TWIN MEETS—IN RECORD-BREAKING TIME!—A new east-west speed record was set by this new Navy Neptune patrol bomber, a two-motored Lockheed P-2V, when it sat down at Burbank Field, Calif., 9 hours 23 minutes and 2 seconds after its take-off from Floyd Bennett Field. This sliced 39 minutes off the previous best speed, despite poor flying conditions that forced the plane 150 miles off course. The Neptune was piloted by Commander Thomas D. Davies, of Chevy Chase, Md., and carried three naval crewmen and two civilian passengers.

## Small Patches Of Wheat Do Well

Though Lynn county's wheat crop is almost negligible compared with Plains counties to our north, the crop in this county did not do so bad.

Champion Lynn county wheat farmer of the county, undoubtedly is the City of Tahoka. Last winter City Water Superintendent Pat Hines planted 26 acres of wheat on the city's sewer plant tract two miles south of town. It was irrigated from the sewer plant overflow, and was harvested last week. The 26 acres produced a little over 900 bushels of grain, or almost 40 bushels to the acre. Pat says the wheat brought \$1.75 per bushel and after all expenses are deducted the City will be \$1200.00 richer and will have seed left over for planting the tract again next winter.

Buel Draper had 30 acres in dry-land wheat north of town that harvested approximately 20 bushels to the acre, and Pete and Cecil Curry each had tracts that produced 17 and 19 bushels per acre, respectively.

## Time Runs Out On Cotton Planting, Acreage Is Light

It was looking very much like rain Tuesday afternoon when a representative of the News decided to get the views of those who ought to know as to the cotton acreage and the prospects for a crop, knowing that very little cotton would be planted after this date, rain or no rain.

The first question we propounded was: What percent of the normal acreage for Lynn county is up? The first answer we got was 20 per cent. The next man agreed with the first. Then we asked Clint Walker, the Triple-A secretary. His opinion was 15 to 20 per cent. Buster Fenton said he himself had 1,200 acres up and figured there were 20,000 acres in the county, probably 25,000 acres. Others agreed substantially with the above figures. We failed to contact County Agent Manuel Ayers, but if he has a different opinion we may give you that next week.

On a majority of the farms in the county there is no cotton—and there will be none this year. In a few localities the rains were more copious, and that is where the cotton acreage is found, most of it in the Dixie and the Wells communities.

Of course the yield per acre is altogether problematical at this time. It could be heavy, exceedingly light, or anywhere in between these two extremes. It is pretty safe to guess, however, that the total production in the county will lie between 5,000 and 20,000 bales. Either figure is exceedingly light for Lynn county for our production ordinarily runs from 40,000 to 80,000 bales.

Rains covering Lynn county at any time between this date and July 15 would mean an enormous feed acreage in the county. Weather and moisture conditions during the remainder of the summer and the fall would determine the yield. With a normal acreage yield the total county yield would be enormous. Since feed has come to be a real money crop scarcely less important than cotton, Lynn county has a chance to be in the "big money" this fall in spite of the distressing drought that has prevailed up to now.

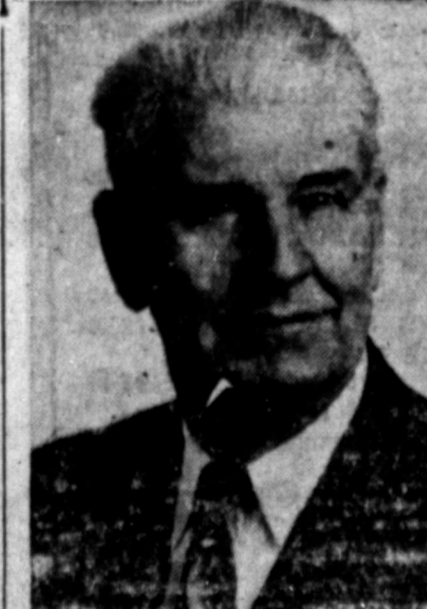
The feed crop last year brought in excellent money returns but farmers and local dealers were greatly hampered in the marketing of the crop for lack of railway cars in which to move it. If it is to be hoped that more cars will be available this year if a heavy or even a normal crop is produced.

**Uncle Sam's Bills Keep Warren Busy**

**Controller General Handles Thousands of Claims.**

WASHINGTON. — If you think you have bill trouble around the first of the month, consider Lindsay C. Warren, United States controller general.

Last year 447,649 claims poured in from people who figured Uncle Sam owed them money.

But that's just part of his worries. As head of the general accounting office, he keeps tabs on everything spent by the government.

In 1931 canceled government checks audited by his office were around 4 billion dollars. Ten years later they had mushroomed to 13 billion dollars. Last year the United States spent about 94 billion dollars.

Warren told a reporter the general accounting officer's chief chore is to see that the money is spent the way congress wants it spent.

"We're the last great bulwark for the people of this nation," said Warren, drawing a deep breath, against unbridled and illegal expenditures of the public substance."

In short, he and his men are policemen on a national beat.

Every check written by any government department is sent to the general accounting office after it is cashed.

And just to give you an idea of what this means: 416,160,500 cashed checks hurried back to the office for auditing and storage last year.

These checks, plus such things as copies of contracts and bills, mean that 90 tons of paper work (or about six box car loads) is dumped on the accounting office every month.

Now about the bills presented to Uncle Sam.

Most of them are routine. But on the other hand—

A dun wandered in the other day asking, what about paying for that stuff grandpa sold to General Sherman on his march through Georgia. The agency is checking to see if any record was made of this Civil war sale. If it finds the claim genuine, it will be paid.

Then there was the bill from a man who claimed he had averted a collision between the earth and a comet. He figured that, considering the magnitude of his performance, he was letting us taxpayers off cheap. He would settle for \$50,000. He didn't get the money.

**Find Radioactive Teeth In Victims of Atom Bomb**

WASHINGTON. — The atomic bomb that fell on Nagasaki literally jarred loose the teeth of those who survived and left some with radioactive gold fillings.

It also caused many to lose their hair, but no one wound up completely bald.

It also was reported by Comdr. Joseph Timmes of the navy medical corps who examined some of the living victims approximately a month after the bomb blast.

He also said the "radiation sickness" produced a form of anemia, caused directly by the fact that rays from the bomb interfered with the functions of the bone marrow—one of the principal manufacturing sites of red blood cells.

Some victims, he said, also showed a deficiency of white blood cells—nature's protective mechanism against disease invasion.

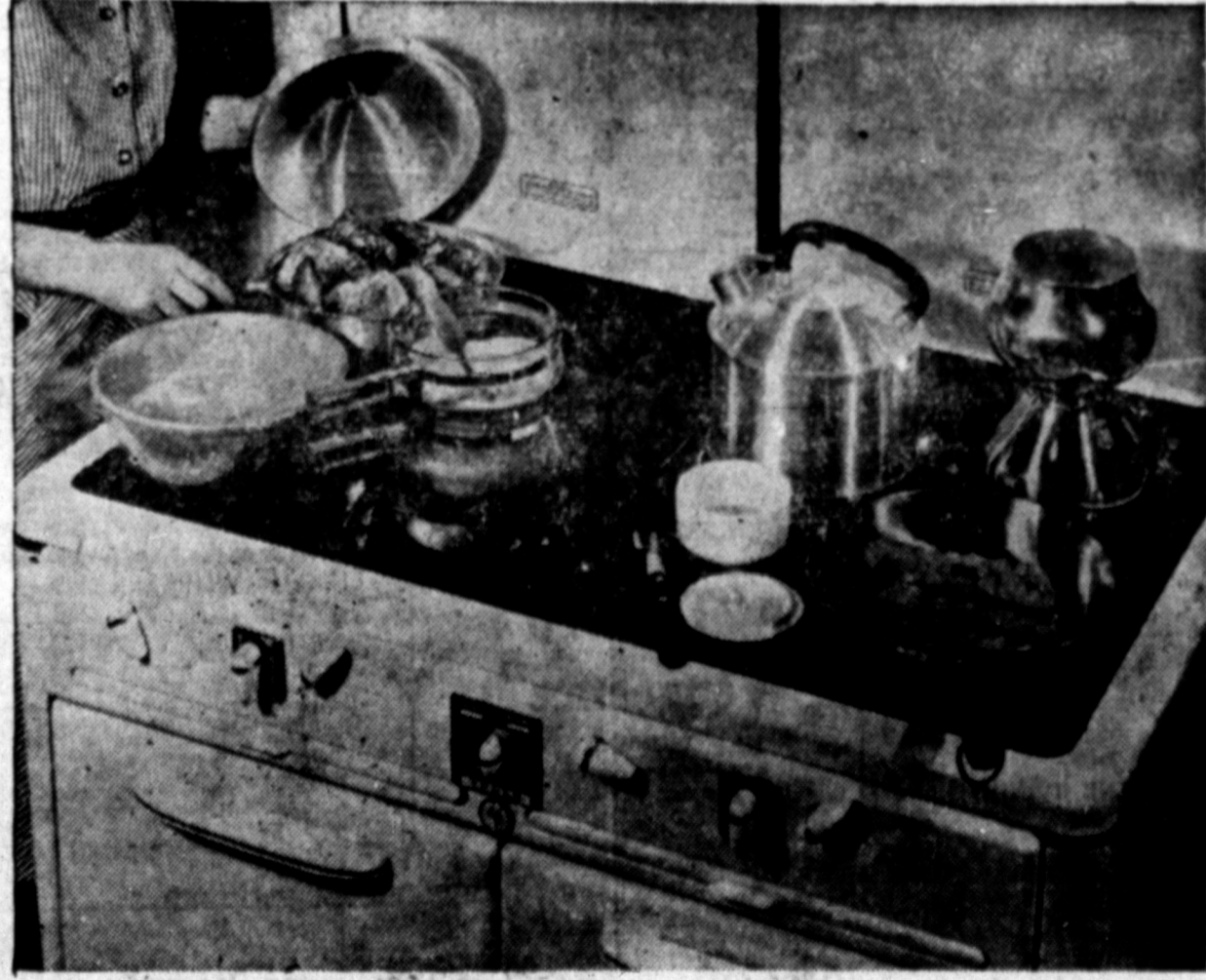

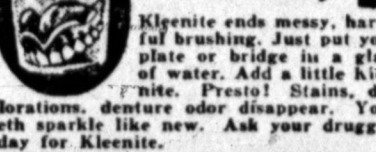

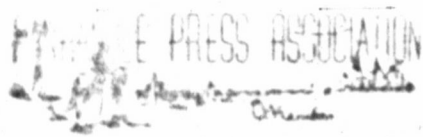

**HOW STARVATION MAY BE PREVENTED**

Last week we called attention to the wickedness and folly of permitting the use of millions and millions of bushels of grain in this country for the manufacture of liquor while we are trying to feed the countless millions of people in the war-torn countries of Europe and Asia who are begging for bread and meat; and we concluded that our Government should find a way to put a stop to it.

Press dispatches appearing in the daily newspapers since then have accentuated the distressful conditions that exist not only abroad but also in our own country. Sunday's Port Worth Star-Telegram carried a story sent out from Chicago, under these significant head lines: **MEAT-HUNGRY CROWDS STORM PACKING PLANTS;** and the story related that "Extra police were called out in Chicago Saturday to keep order among crowds which descended on two packing plants in search of meat. A throng of 1,000 gathered at one packing firm. In the lines were many war veterans. Packing company officials explained to the crowds that they could not sell meat across the counter as in retail stores. They also stated that even if they could, there was just no meat available."

On another page of the same paper was a story sent out from Washington, D. C., in which Secretary of Agriculture Anderson was quoted as saying Saturday night that he did not believe that a return to "consumer rationing" would be necessary. The government, he said, "is developing a simpler form of rationing nearer the source—the rationing of wheat and other short supplies to processors and distributors. As an example he cited an Agriculture Department order requiring millers to cut their distribution of flour for domestic consumption 25 per cent from last year's level. The Secretary said that American crop prospects are good, but he forecast short supplies of bread grains, meats and fats for 1947." These views were expressed

in a report prepared for an NBC radio program.

The Director General of the United Nations Food and Agriculture organization, Sir John Boyd Orr, appeared on the same program and expressed the belief that famine could be prevented next year if major producing countries will continue wartime controls, price grain so as to discourage farmers from feeding it to livestock, and **LIMIT THE AMOUNT OF GRAIN USED FOR INDUSTRIAL PURPOSES, INCLUDING ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES.**

There you have it. Let the Government limit, or better, prohibit entirely the use of grains for the manufacture of intoxicating liquor so that it may be used as food for the millions who are threatened with starvation.

We don't see the Britisher's point, however, in trying to prevent its use in part for the feeding of livestock, since the world is begging for meat as well as bread.

But it seems morally criminal to use life-giving and life-saving grain for the manufacture of liquor that destroys life, produces crime, and is responsible for the death of thousands of our people on the highways and in drunken brawls every year. We insist that our Government could and should prevent it.

**THE END OF ONE PIOUS FRAUD**

The great mass of Protestant, Baptist, and other Christian denominations in the United States are highly gratified at assurances recently given by President Truman that with the official close of the war, the services of Myron G. Taylor as his "personal representative" to the Vatican will be terminated.

As most people know, the Vatican is the great Palace in which the Pope of Rome resides and in which he exercises his authority as head of the Roman Catholic Church and as ruler of Vatican City, a state created in 1929 by agreement between the Pope and Mussolini whereby the Pope's secular and civil authority was restored to him. He is absolute dictator of the little state consisting of 105 acres of land and containing a population of possibly less than 1,000. But as ruler of this state he has authority to receive and dispatch diplomatic representatives from and to every other country in the world that will recognize his civil authority, and he undertakes to exercise great political influence over the nations of the world. The expenses of maintaining this state in great pomp and grandeur are paid by contributions from members of the Catholic Church.

Under the Constitution of the United States, this country can not maintain an embassy to any religious potentate but soon after Franklin D. Roosevelt became President he effected the same ends by sending a "personal representative" to the Pope. When Harry Truman became President, he found Myron G. Taylor functioning as the President's representa-

tive and continued him in that position.

For years the protest against this evasion of our Constitution has been growing more and more determined and vocal, and recently President Truman was besieged by representatives of Methodist, Baptist, Presbyterian, Congregational, and other great religious denominations to call Mr. Taylor back home and discontinue such recognition of the right of a religious potentate to exercise civil authority.

Since the Pope by reason of his position as head of the Roman Catholic Church claims the right to exercise civil and political authority also, all non-Catholics in this country maintain that the claim and exercise of these rights are un-American in principle and practice and should no longer be tolerated. Hence their determined protest.

It is to be hoped that no President hereafter will dare to repeat this offense against the spirit and the tenets of our Government.

Caso March of Waco, one of the candidates for the office of governor, was a caller at the News office last Friday. He had visited Tahoka once before and had made a speech on a business corner on that occasion. He proved himself to be a vigorous and effective public speaker and he stressed the fact that we need some revolutionary changes in our tax system. He proposed to build bigger and better schools, pay teachers much higher salaries, greatly increase the pensions to the needy folks, and do a lot of other things that cost big money, and asserted that it could all be done by levying only a reasonable tax on gas and sulphur and increasing the tax a cent or two a gallon on oil. Whether he overdraw the picture or not, we were convinced that these natural resources should be taxed for the benefit of the people of Texas. As it is, sulphur and gas are virtually escaping taxation in this state and are being shipped or piped to other states of the Union which are collecting stiff taxes from them. We believe that Texas, which produces these products, should get the benefit of reasonable taxes levied upon them. By doing this, Texas can build and finance as fine a public school system as any state in this Union; and that would be far better than calling upon the federal government to help finance our schools. Uncle Sam can not be expected to do that in any large measure for any considerable length of time without demanding a say-so in how our schools are operated. And the first thing we knew that Northern FEPC organization would be demanding that Negro children be allowed to sit in the same class rooms with the white children, yes, and that there be no discrimination whatever against the employment of Negro teachers to teach in these mixed schools. We do not believe that will ever be permitted in Texas but the large use of federal funds in our state schools would give these FEPC boys the welcome opportunity to give us plenty of

trouble along that line. We are going to watch Caso March, and if he clears himself of the suspicion that he is lined up with that C. I. O. outfit, he might be a good man for the people of Texas to tie to. At any rate, he is no weakling. He was making only a hand-shaking campaign here Friday, but he had already visited some 240 county seat towns in Texas and any number of others and may be cutting a wider swath than some folks think.

We know little of the origin or the background of the feud that seems to have been seething and boiling under the surface between two members of the United States Supreme Court for some time past and which burst forth with volcanic fury last week when Mr. Justice Jackson, by inference rather than by definite accusation, accused Mr. Justice Black of unethical and even corrupt conduct in the performance of his duties as a member of the court. The definite charge was that Justice Black had refused to recuse himself and had sat in judgement in a case pending in that court in which a former partner of Justice Black represented one of the litigants. Certainly that would not necessarily involve any degree of moral turpitude or wrong doing on the part of Mr. Black. That is done frequently in almost every court in our land. To assume that a judge can not be fair in determining the rights of litigants when a former law partner of the judge represents one of the litigants certainly would be, ordinarily, a violent assumption. A judge who would consciously permit that to influence him certainly would be either a weakling or a knave. But the serious part of the charge lies in the fact that in discussing the matter with Jackson at one time, Black demanded, according to Jackson's story, that Jackson should cover up certain facts respecting the matter. What those facts were, Jackson did not disclose. The inference is that there was something crooked. We believe that if these two gentlemen are to remain on the court, then Congress and the people should be enlightened. If Black does not resign, Congress should investigate. A judge on the bench, like Caesar's wife, should be above suspicion.

Hop Halsey of Lubbock was in Tahoka Monday in the interest of his candidacy for Congress. He has

been waging a vigorous speaking campaign over the radio recently and has also been very busy contacting the voters personally. Over the radio, he has been severely criticizing congressmen generally

who do not have the courage to stand up for their convictions and who allegedly accomplish little for the public good.

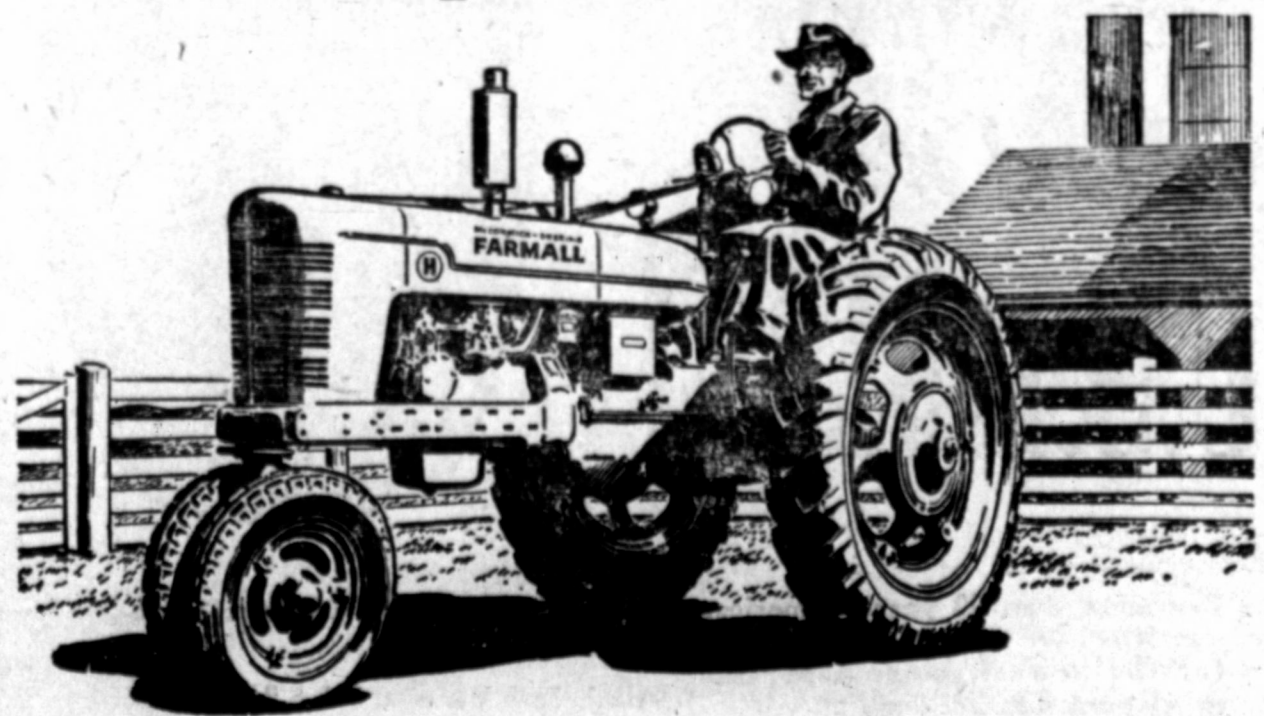

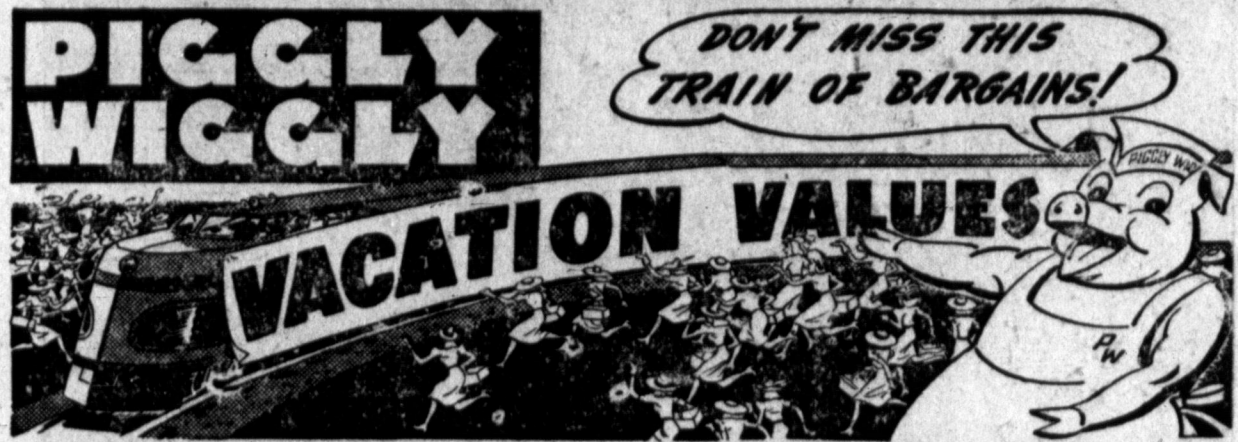

### Smith Tells Of Mexico Trip

Pyramids. How about visiting some pre-historic pyramids? Where, Egypt? No, in Mexico. To most people when pyramids are mentioned the country of Egypt is associated with the thought but such need not be the case. Here on our own continent are pyramids and one in particular, the Toltec Pyramid of the Sun, is larger than any pyramid of Egypt. It is not quite as tall but covers far more ground and is much greater in volume. The writer recently stood, after quite a climb, on top of the largest pyramid of the Toltec group and counted more than twenty others, many not completed. They are there in all states of completion.

The pyramids stand in the midst of what was once a large city located about thirty miles north west of Mexico, D. F. The city has not been occupied by an inhabitant for hundreds or possibly thousands of years yet it stands as mute evi-

dence of a once intelligent race of people that existed there. In the city may be found the ruins of many large buildings, courts, statues, bridges, etc. some with carvings that are amazingly artistic. These Indians developed a perpetual calendar that was carved on the face of a large stone. This calendar, known as the Mayan calendar, dates back several hundred years before the time of Christ and from it could be calculated all season changes and even eclipses of the sun and moon accurately for years in advance. Just what happened to stop the building of the pyramids and other structures no one knows. We know the Indians of that age had a high degree of knowledge of architecture, astronomy, and other sciences, yet one may visit today a volcano crater in which they threw live human sacrifices during their religious ceremonies. Just why did white man come to this continent? This comes to an end long before No one knows. Maybe the just God thought an end to the building of the pyramids, etc., regardless of the advancement they had made in the sciences, just as He does with some of the modern nations that leave Him out of their programs.

When south of the Rio Grande is mentioned we naturally think of Mexicans and that is correct, politically speaking, yet more than three fourths of the nearly twenty million people are direct descendants of the many Indian tribes that have been in the land of Mexico down through the ages and are not touched by Spanish blood. Many of these Indians live today almost exactly as they lived before the coming of the white man. It seems hard to get them to change. For this reason education is sadly neglected even though a system of national public education is set up and after a fashion is operating. During the last few years schools have been built in most of the communities. The public schools operate for two five month terms per year, August and January being the vacation months. Even the system of established schools does not make education universally popular for less than fifteen percent of the boys and girls attend school. They seem to continue as they have for centuries past by eking from the surrounding land whether it be in the dense jungles or all the way up to the high mountain plateaus.

A question might be in the mind of a reader as to whether a vacation in Mexico is worth while. The answer is yes. The roads are good and transverse the mountain ranges in such a manner as to offer beautiful scenic drives. It is a hunter and fisherman's paradise and if interested in photographing scenery it is there.

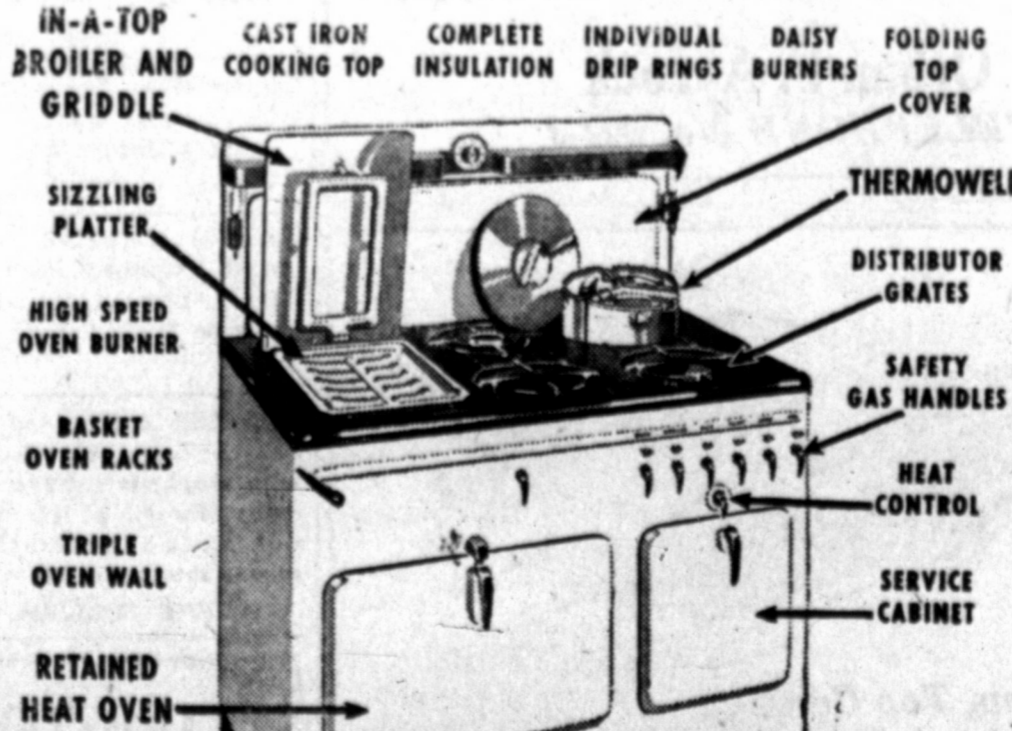
