

TOM GARRARD REPORTS ON COUNTY FINANCES

(Con'd from first page)
except recently voted bonds. All billed down the County only owes \$13,385.00 in principal, besides recently voted Road Bonds and, has \$11,666.84 cash in the bank to pay it.

The law makes the County Judge the county budget officer, and requires that he prepare the budget each year in the months of July for the coming year. To do this, I've got to figure out the expenses and needs as well as the income of each county office and the County at large. In view of the above savings and economies I believe and feel that I may be able to submit a budget that will justify a cut in the constitutional tax rate by the Commissioners' Court for 1947 of from 15% to 25%.

For the Lynn County permanent school fund we collected in the years 1945 and 1946 on outstanding notes the sum of \$34,500.00, all of which has been invested in 2 1/2% U. S. Government Savings Bonds, the income of which goes to the available school fund.

June 11, 1946 the Commissioners' Court and the County Judge signed contracts with the State Highway Department which in conjunction with the Federal Government contracted to build and maintain 29.5 miles of Farm to Market roads in Lynn County as part of the highway system without cost to Lynn County except to furnish right of way. Part of which road is under construction now. Which roads estimated to cost \$6500.00 per mile is a total sum of \$191,750.00 worth roads that the county has gotten from the state and Federal Government without cost to the county.

As soon as it became known that these roads would be built by the Highway Department, the citizens and tax payers of the county began to urge the Commissioners' Court and the County Judge to build more roads and numerous delegations of citizens of the county came before the court a number of times urging more roads, which culminated in a petition to the court signed by 244 citizens of the county asking that a bond election be ordered for \$850,000.00 to build Farm to Market roads. A check was made on the tax rolls to find if such 244 citizens were property tax paying voters, who had rendered property for taxes and the Lynn County Tax Rolls showed that 211 of the 244 signers of the petition were property tax paying citizens who had rendered property for taxation, and since the law only requires a petition of 50 property tax payers, the court could not do otherwise than grant the petition and let the property tax payers decide for themselves whether or not they wanted to vote the bonds and pay the tax. As is well known, the election was called and held March 9th, 1946. On March 11th, 1946 the court met and declared the result of the election which carried by more than two-thirds majority of votes cast.

On March 14, 1946 the court sold the bonds according to law for \$850,000.00 and accrued interest to date of delivery to bear 1 1/4-1 1/2% and 2% or an average interest rate of only 1.85% plus all proceedings which included all election supplies, printing of 850 bonds with interest coupons and market attorney's opinion, which would have cost county approximately \$2500.00. On April 20, 1946 the bonds were delivered and Lynn County was paid \$850,000.00.

On bonds and \$1427.93 accrued interest; without cost for election supplies, legal proceedings or market attorney's opinion, printing bonds, etc.

\$800,000.00 of this was immediately invested in U. S. Government short term bonds that can be cashed as and when we need the money on road work; \$50,000.00 was deposited in the bank to the Special Road Account and \$1427.93 was deposited in the bond sinking fund account. Making a total of \$851,427.93 Lynn County has on this special road bond fund, less small payment to engineers who have been working on the roads.

Engineers were employed to make survey and get up plans and specifications. Survey has been made on part of the road and plans and specifications prepared, advertisement to bidders have been published in 3 Lynn County papers, Lubbock Avalanche and "The Texas Contractor", a trade journal for all contractors, published in Dallas. The court will receive all bids and open them July 8 and if in line, contracts will be let to lowest and best bidder. The work will progress as rapidly as the engineer can get plans ready and contracts let as soon after advertisements for bids as law will permit. It is thought by the engineer that as much as 10 miles of the road can be built and hot top put on before cold weather comes. In notice to bidders we provide that preference be given local business men and labor, and this will be included in contracts.

The above is as complete statement of the most vital business activities of your County Judge as I can make without going into long tiresome details. All funds are in good shape. From a tax paying standpoint, valuations for tax purposes in the county are extremely low. As an example practically all lands in the county are valued from \$6 to \$8 per acre which is not more than 10% of its actual value and all other property is valued in same proportion and valuations will not be raised.

The Commissioners' Court and County Judge have provided for the returning servicemen and women a county Veterans Service officer who is one of their number, to make sure that such veterans get all the benefits to which they are entitled. And we in conjunction with other civic bodies, VFW and the American Legion have procured the full time service of a U. S. Employment officer to help all veterans and others in need of such service, without cost to the County.

In addition to all the court and Commissioner's Court duties, your County Judge has to prepare for all school and other elections. During the time I have been in office I've been called upon to do literally thousands of things for our people; as an example, during rationing I have been called upon to assist with every kind of rationing from gas-line to sugar and it's no over-statement to say this office has assisted in more than ten thousand gas and sugar rationing applications. Since the O. P. A. closed their office the early part of this year I've personally written more than 1000 letters and filled out as many applications for sugar - none of which were in any way connected with the duties of County Judge.

Since I am an attorney, literally hundreds of our county people come to me for legal advice and service which I have given without money and without price. I am sure that if I had charged for what I have done for my people at the rate of the average attorney fees I would have collected more than the amount of my salary. I love my home people and like to work for them. I'd rather live here than any place I know. I was tendered a place as associate of the Court of Civil Appeals at Amarillo, by the governor more than a year ago at a five salary, but declined the appointment because I wanted to live among my friends the remaining years of life allotted to me.

I hate this darn mess we call politics. I've held several high and responsible offices, mostly by appointment and only one or two by election. It's been a democratic cus-

tom in this state always that a person was entitled to a second term. I've only had one elective term.

The greatest thing in all this world is friendship and the affection of the human heart. So far as the County Judge's office is concerned, I can get along without it, but I can't get along and live without friends. I was for some years mother and father both to three motherless boys, all three of whom volunteered for service to their country's cause early in the war. One went through the German campaign and was wounded, awarded the Purple Heart and promoted a time or two. Another went through the Italian campaign; while the third after, after several months in service was given a medical discharge without his consent and against his will and wish. I hope no man will maliciously cast reflection on these honorable boys by saying their father is not worthy of the office he holds.

If my record of public service and private life has been such as to meet your approval I cover your continued friendship and support. On the other hand if there are those who oppose me who can show a better record than this, it is my duty to support him. The time is short before election, I cannot get out and make an active campaign on account of the many things required of me to be done in office, so please take this as a personal message to you.

From the record above you will note that since I've been in office there has been a constant reduction of the county's debts even as much as 5 years before their due date, and at the same time a constant increase in available cash funds in the bank. We are faced now with hard and stringent times after 2 years drought but the records of your county will convince you that we have provided for the rainy day. With so much work coming up in the immediate future, it is my thought that to change horses in the middle of the stream could result in nothing but confusion, waste, injury to the public and to each one individually; but you are the judge of that. 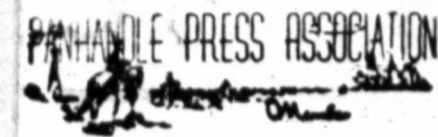

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Lynn or Adjoining Counties:
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We have the friendliest kind of feeling for the Negroes of our town and our Southland on the whole. We are sure that we the white people as a rule have not been as kind to them as we should have been. We are sure that we have not offered them the economic and educational opportunities that should have been given them. Nevertheless we are sure also that the white people of the South are the best friends in the world that the Negro has today. They are far better friends of his than are the communistic groups and the racial-equality groups in other parts of the country that have been leading him to believe that he has a right to social equality with the whites anywhere and everywhere and should assert them, especially in the South. These professed friends of the Negro know full well that the assertion of such rights can lead the Negro only into trouble. An example occurred down at Tyler only last week. A negro boarded a bus last week. A negro boarded "Jim Crow" law in this state. He took a seat among the whites. He was requested by the driver to remove to the space in the rear provided and get apart for Negro passengers. He refused to do it. A policeman was called and he attempted to make the Negro move. The Negro attacked and stabbed him with a knife. In the altercation that followed the Negro received a gunshot wound. Another Negro conveyed him to Corsicana, where he received treatment in a hospital. After being released from the hos-

pital officers located him at Barry near Corsicana. He resisted arrest and engaged them in a gun battle. He was shot three times and was captured. Now, if he lives, he must face trial in the courts for his criminal career—crimes committed because somebody had led him to believe that he had a right to sit down on the same seat with a white woman on a bus if he chose to do so. Only fanatics and office-seeking politicians would seek to put such ideas into his head; and they are poor friends of the Negro.

There are indications that the race for Congress in this district is going to get hotter and hotter as the campaign proceeds. For three or four weeks now Hop Halsey of Lubbock has been waging a vigorous campaign over the radio, on the public platform, and by personal contact. For more than a week, George Mahon, the present incumbent, has been in the district giving an account of his stewardship, and it is presumed that he will remain in the district until election day. Both of these gentlemen are fine fellows personally. Both are popular. Halsey has been attacking Congress generally for its alleged lack of courage and incompetence, and inferentially he includes his opponent among those who merit this criticism. Mahon has been citing his record as proof that he has served the interests of his constituency with fidelity and a high degree of success, and maintains that by reason of his experience, his important committee assignments, and his familiarity with the problems that confront Congress, he is able to give even better service now than ever before. Halsey has been hammering away at bureaucratic rule and at the dictatorial attitude of certain labor leaders, and making the plea that Congressmen with stiffer backbones should be sent to Washington. So, the contest gives promise of being much the closest that has been waged since Mahon was first elected nearly twelve years ago. That Halsey is making quite a dent on Mahon's previously impregnable support is obvious, and there are those who express the belief that he will be elected. Mahon's supporters on the other hand are unshaken in their confidence that he will be re-elected. Only time will tell.

Disappointed because Congress would not bow to his dictation, Chester Bowles, stabilization director of the OPA, announced in a huff last Friday his resignation, to take effect on July 10. He accompanied his resignation with an appeal to President Truman to veto the compromise OPA measure just passed by Congress. Failing to control Congress, he sought to induce the President to set aside its work. As this is being written no announcement has been made as to what the President will do about it. But we hope that the people will take note that Chester Bowles is holding only an appointive position. He was not elected to it by the people; yet he seeks to control the legislative body created by the Constitution and elected by the

people for the specific purpose of making their laws. Failing in this, he then seeks to make a rubber stamp of the President. We confess that we do not know whether Chester Bowles' judgement in this instance is better than that of the Congress or not, but we do know that it is the function and duty of Congress to pass laws and that Chester Bowles has no Constitutional, legal, or moral authority to crack the whip over its head. We think his resignation should be accepted very "pronto."

Communist Russia does not permit freedom of the press in that party leaders who rule the country do not permit it. They insist on censoring accounts of American newspaper correspondents giving information as to how relief funds sent to that country through the UNRRA are expended. As a reaction against that policy, the United States House of Representatives in spite of Administration opposition, voted almost three to one on Thursday of last week to withhold relief from any country censoring information as to how it is expended. We maintain that if Americans are to contribute vast sums of money for the relief of that and other war-torn countries whose people need food, then Americans have a right to know how those re-

lief funds are distributed or expended. The Russian dictators have no right to withhold this information from the donors. We think the

House of Representatives did the right thing. If the Russians are willing to do the right thing, we are ready to play ball.

Funeral services for M. L. Cathey, 84, pioneer citizen of Lynn county, who died at his home in O'Donnell Friday morning, were conducted in the Church of Christ in O'Donnell at 4:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon, followed by burial in the O'Donnell cemetery.

Survivors include his aged companion and six sons, V. M., J. D., Tom, Henry, and Roy, all of O'Donnell and vicinity, and Jim of Beaumont; one brother, N. B. Cathey of Dora, New Mexico; two sisters, Mrs. Sallie Martin of Springerville, Arizona, and Mrs. Mae Arnold of O'Donnell; and one nephew, W. S. Cathey of O'Donnell.

Mr. Cathey had been a resident of Lynn county for 45 years and was well known to practically all of the old cattlemen of the Plains and contiguous territory when it was strictly a ranching country. He had many friends in this section not only among the pioneers but also among the more recent arrivals and residents of this county.

Pioneer O'Donnell Citizen Dies

Funeral services were conducted in the Methodist Church in O'Donnell on Tuesday afternoon of last week for A. Y. Pemberton, 77, a long-time resident of O'Donnell and vicinity. He was the father of M. R. Pemberton of Seagraves who was a resident of Tahoka for years.

The services were conducted by Mrs. Pearl Keeton of the O'Donnell Nazarene Church, of which Mr. Pemberton had been a faithful member, and the body was interred in the O'Donnell cemetery. He had died at the home of a daughter, Mrs. J. E. McGregor, in O'Donnell June 25.

Survivors include the widow, Mrs. Nora Pemberton, four daughters and two sons. The daughters are Mrs. Ruby Jones of Stillwater, Oklahoma, Mrs. Beulah Easter of Seagraves, Mrs. Velma McGregor of O'Donnell, and Mrs. Esia Eubanks of Odessa; the sons, Mastin and M. R. of Seagraves. A number of grandchildren and great-grandchildren also survive.

Mr. Pemberton was a native of Missouri.

Olympia Stands in Midst Of Nature's Wonders

Olympia, Wash., occupies what has been pronounced one of America's finest examples of natural landscape gardening, in a setting of snow-capped ranges, vast forests, wild rhododendrons, and mountain streams. Mount Rainier rises to the east; visible to the north are the lofty Olympics, whence the city takes its name.

The governor's mansion is in a park setting near the new state capitol, on a rising knoll. The capitol dome is modeled along lines of that in Washington, D. C. The new governor's mansion is of Georgian style, red brick with marble trimmings.

The city developed at the head of navigation on the Sound, end of the Oregon trail, at a time when waterways were the natural highways, preferred to overland routes. While the capital is dominated by government, excellent rail and highways have developed the port. Olympia grew on land belonging to Edmund Sylvester, a Gloucester fisherman who held the property under the Oregon Provisional government, the original dating from 1848. It was thus one of the early north-west settlements.

Brazil's Coal Output Stimulated by War

Brazil's coal production rose from about 500,000 metric tons in 1931 to 907,224 in 1939, then jumped to 2,034,311 in 1943 as wartime shortages of imports stimulated the development of mining at home. Imports dropped from 1,700,000 tons in 1937 to about 600,000 in 1943.

Mining of Brazilian coal, long retarded by transportation difficulties and lower-cost imported coal, has been aided in recent years by government loans and tax exemptions. While few deposits of high-grade coal have been developed, Brazil has extensive bituminous deposits, largely rated as low-grade.

Total reserves in the four states of Rio Grande do Sul, Santa Catarina, Parana and Sao Paulo, where the chief deposits are located, are calculated at 5 billion metric tons.

Precautions Help to Preserve Dinnerware

Many of the precautions usually reserved for fine china are in order for everyday dinnerware. Here are a few suggestions that will help in giving dinnerware good care:

Scrape dishes with a rubber scraper or paper instead of a metal instrument that may mar their surfaces. Stack them in neat piles according to size—many crashes result from haphazard or top-heavy stacks.

Wash just a few dishes at a time and have a folded dish towel in the bottom of the dishpan or drainpan and on the enamel, hardwood or metal drainboard. This will help reduce breakage and is especially needed for fragile china.

Avoid harsh scouring powders, steel wool or metal cleaners which may scratch dishes; dampened whitening on a cloth will remove stubborn stains. Remember too that strong soaps, ammonia or washing soda is hard on gold and silver trims.

Soak Dishes

Many dishes and pans used in getting meals will wash more quickly and easily if they are filled with water immediately after using and allowed to soak until washed. A cold-water soak is recommended for loosening starchy foods, like dough or cereal, and also for eggs and milk. A hot-water soak is best for utensils which have held sugary foods like syrup or icing because sugar dissolves faster in hot than in cold water. Greasy utensils should have all possible grease removed — to save for cooking use later or salvage — and then should be wiped out with paper and allowed to soak in hot water containing a little baking soda. A time-saving way to keep silverware bright is to have a little aluminum pan filled with hot soda water near the dishpan and put into it any silver, tarnished with egg or other food.

U. S. Eats Well

U. S. citizens have had 10 per cent more food per capita during this war than in 1917-18—with 10 per cent fewer on farms and a one-third increase in the total national population, and twice as much food has gone each year to the armed services and for overseas shipments as during the last war. Production figures during the two wars show: Wheat production in 1944 was 1,079 million bushels, compared with 904 million bushels in 1918; corn, 3,228 million bushels compared with 2,441 million; beef and veal, 10,732 million pounds, compared with 8,486 million; pork, 12,893 million pounds, compared with 8,349 million; chickens, 3,400 million pounds, compared with 1,896 million; milk, 119 billion pounds, compared with 73 billion pounds; total fats and oils, 7,787 million pounds, compared with 4,866 million.

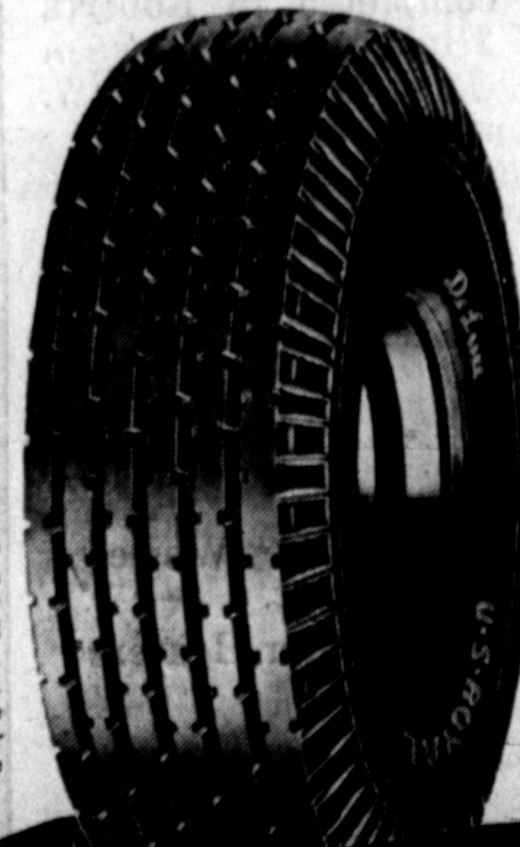

Atom Work of Russians Brings Them High Honor

MOSCOW, USSR.—Academician A. Kolmogorov asserted recently that the work of Konstantin Petrozhak and Georgi Floryov with uranium was "one of the greatest achievements in Soviet physics in recent years."
The two physicists, who shared a 100,000 ruble (\$18,870) Stalin prize award, were honored for their reported discovery of a new appearance of "the spontaneous disintegration of uranium," acclaimed as being of vital significance in the study of atomic energy.
Their work was said to have been done in 1943 and 1944.

Fix Rubber Cost to U. S. At 20 1/2 Cents Per Pound

WASHINGTON.—The state department announced completion of price negotiations for purchase of natural rubber from British, Dutch and French areas in the Far East.
The price was fixed at 20 1/2 cents a pound for standard top grades, delivered free on board ocean going steamers at far eastern ports. Under terms of the agreement the Reconstruction Finance corporation will buy all rubber in those areas allocated to the United States by the combined rubber committee.

Music Education Is Called Crime Cure

LINCOLN, NEB.—Music education may be useful in solving juvenile delinquency problems, according to State Superintendent Wayne O. Reed.
Music stimulates group activity and helps solve many of the problems which result from the surplus energies of youth, Reed explained.

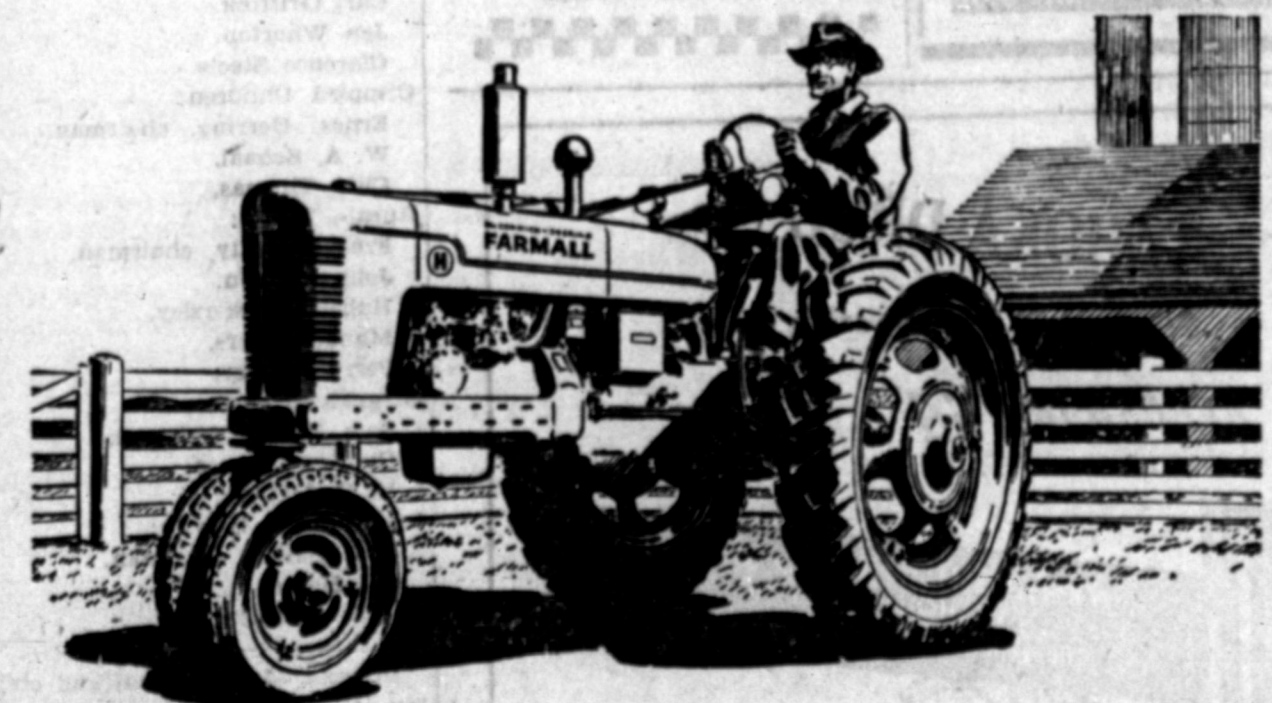

 Besides relatives residing in Lynn county, a few from distant points were here for the funeral. On account of personal illness Dr. E. E. Callaway of Abilene, who resided and practiced medicine here for many years and who is a nephew of "Uncle Joe," was unable to be here.
 "Uncle Joe" and Mrs. Callaway had been residents of Tahoka since 1923. They had moved here during that year from Cooledge, Limestone county. Mrs. Callaway is a native of Freestone county, but Mr. Callaway was born in Union county,

Arkansas, on November 27, 1857. At about the age of 20, he came with his mother and older brother to Johnson county, Texas, his father having previously died, and they settled near where the city of Citedburne now stands. A few years later they moved to Freestone county and in 1887 Mr. Callaway married Miss Denie Carley of Teague. She had been born on the site of that town. A few years after their marriage they settled on a farm a few miles north of Mexia, where they resided until the Trinity and Brazos Valley railway was being built through the county. Mr. Callaway then entered the real estate business and assisted in selling the townsite lots on which the town of Cooledge was built. He continued to engage in the real estate and insurance business in that town until 1923, when he and Mrs. Callaway decided to move to Tahoka. They had accumulated considerable property in the meantime and invested in much farming lands after locating here, owning several farms at the time of his death.
