For 34 of the local girls, freshmen FHA members, it was the first such meeting they had attended.

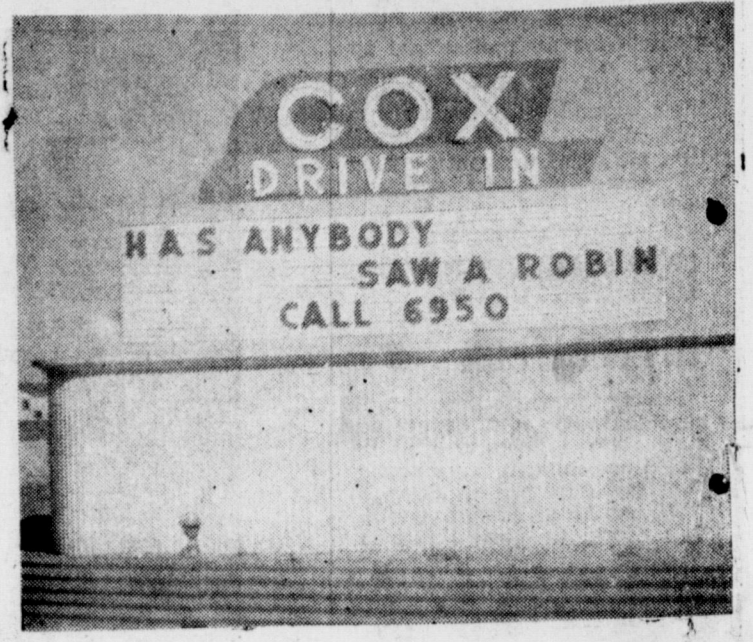
Robin Sumner, president of Area 1, of Amarillo high school, was mistress of ceremonies.

George Bragg Home Highlighted By 40-Foot Long Family Room, Den

Mr. and Mrs. George Bragg moved into their new white brick, ranch style home at 1846 West Avenue D on October 18, just 90 days after George began construction on a set of plans he drew up himself, and for which he acted as his own contractor.

The Bragg residence contains more than 2700 square feet under roof, located on a 100x140 foot lot near the new Richland Hills elementary school.

Setting off the white brick walls of the house are the shake roof and turquoise trim. Inside are three spacious bedrooms, living room, utility room, and a 40 foot long combination kitchen, dining room and family room. Also there are two full baths and six huge storage closets, part of them ce-

dar lined and with built in storage cabinets.

The focal point of this house is the family room. Paneled in bleached mahogany, with accents of turquoise and sandalwood, the long room contains a U-shaped kitchen with built-in range and oven in turquoise, built-in food mixer and blender, and custom built cabinets of bleached mahogany.

The dining area is offset from the kitchen and den area by a white brick planter box.

The entire area is floored in vinyl tile, and the drapes contain the accent colors.

Incidentally, Mrs. Bragg designed and made all her own drapes, and the coverlet for the custom made oversize bed in the

master bedroom.

The living room, hall and all the three bedrooms are carpeted in a beige carpet. The living room contains modern sectional furniture, which Mrs. Bragg is quick to point out is also comfortable, and a blond piano. Drapes in this room also carry out the sandalwood color scheme with turquoise accents.

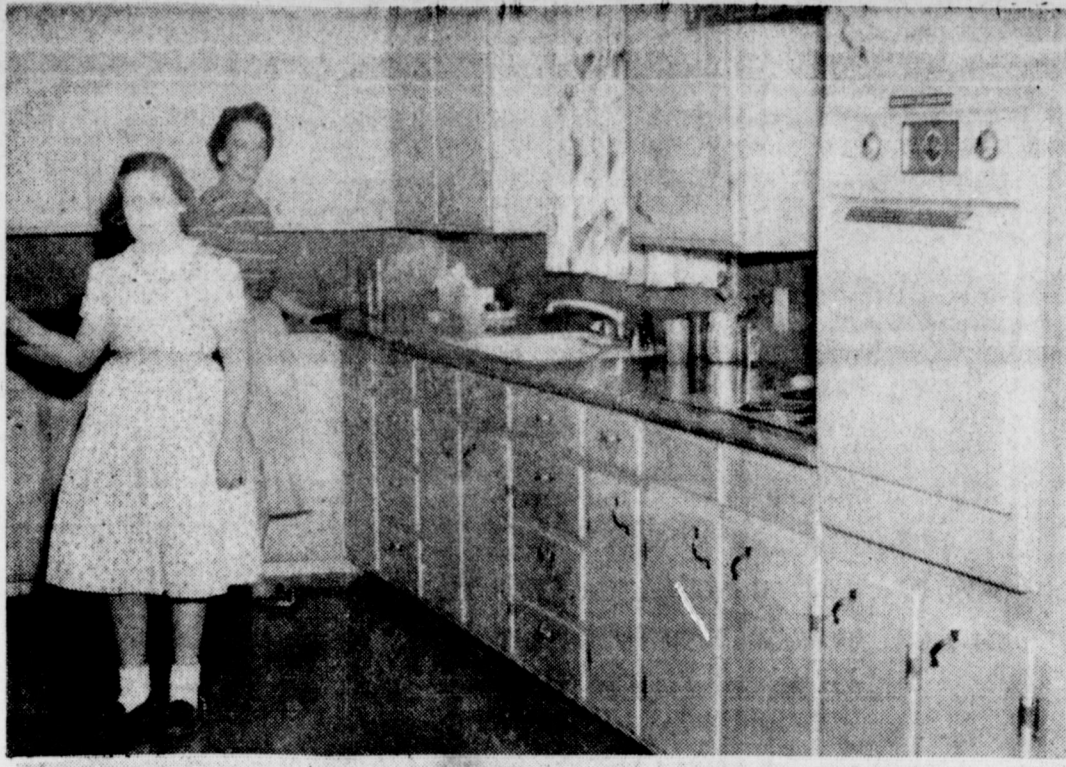
Randy, the Bragg's five year old son has a room of his own in sandalwood with accents of brown and beige. Karran, 11, has her own room decorated in brown and flamingo.

One bathroom is decorated with blue metal tile and a confetti pattern tile floor. The master bath is in sand beige, with a custom built table along two walls.

The master bedroom features two walk in closets, with cedar linings and built in cabinets. One closet conceals the entrance to an underground cellar area, which could double as a storm cellar.

All light fixtures are finished with the ceiling except the one over the dining table, which has a brass modern design.

Outside are a convenient patio with built-in barbecue facilities for outdoor entertaining.

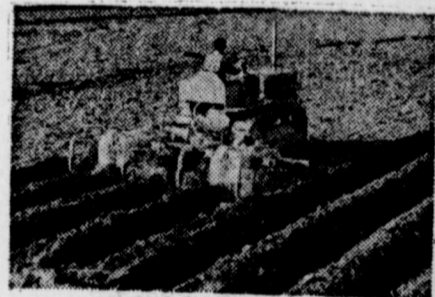

on grain sorghum after application of 100 pounds nitrogen per acre"

Because of the widespread interest in close-row spacing of grain sorghum, a field experiment was carried on in the summer of 1957 on Pullman clay loam to determine the effects on yield of planting two rows per row as compared with only one row per bed experiment. The land was broken to a depth of forty inches, leveled, and irrigated. On June 17, 1957, Texas hybrid 610 was planted at four rates of seeding (5.6, 7.0, 8.4, and 10.2 pounds per acre) in one and two rows per bed at each seeding application. Three rates of fertilizer (0, 100, and 200 pounds per acre) were used at each seeding rate. The first fertilizer application was made at the rate of 100 pounds of nitrogen in the form of grain sorghum plants were one to two inches high. The second application of 100 pounds of nitrogen was made in the form of anhydrous ammonia when the grain sorghum plants were scheduled for a top-dressing of 100 pounds of nitrogen per acre but heavy rains which followed the second application delayed this application until the last of August. In order not to damage the roots and tops of the grain sorghum through the use of an anhydrous ammonia sprayer and tractor, this last nitrogen application was made by using a "High Boy" sprayer and tractor. Under 1957 conditions two rows per bed with 5.6 pounds of seed, and 100 pounds of nitrogen per acre produced a significantly higher yield of grain.

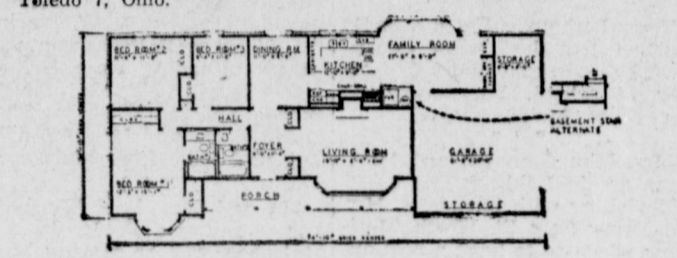
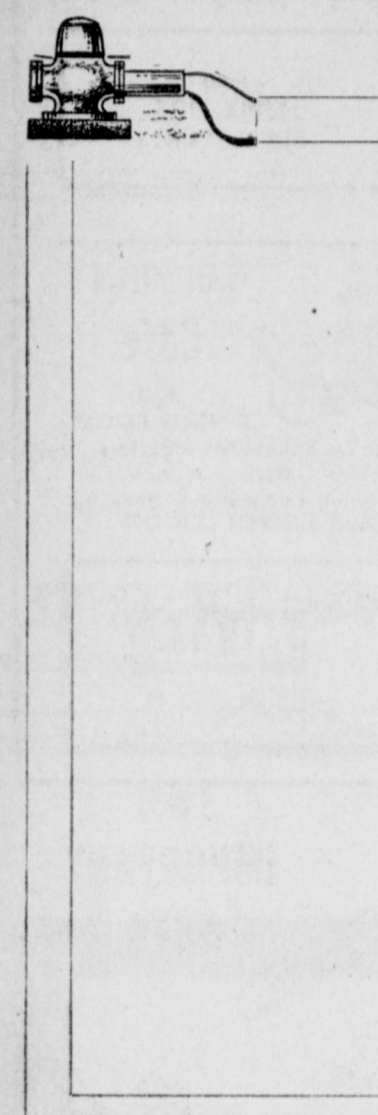
