Flying Farmers At National Meeting In Stillwater, Okla.

Wednesday afternoon several airplanes loaded with Lynn County Flying Farmers took off from the local airport and headed toward Stillwater, Okla. where they will attend the National Flying Farmers convention which is being held there this year.

The Tahoka Chamber of Commerce financed the round-trip expenses of two of the planes, which amounted to One Hundred and Sixty Dollars. That is the cost for rental of the planes and for their operation.

Other Texas Flying Farmers from all over the state will attend the National meeting and also nearly every state in the Union will be represented at this convention.

Texas and Lynn county Flying Farmers are going to try to take some of the first prizes away from this National meeting. The Texas Flying Farmers is a young organization, only a few months old and Lynn County was the first County in the state to organize, and helped in the organization of the Texas Flying Farmers.

Tahoka Clinic Will Be Expanded To Hospital Size

The foundation for an addition to the Tahoka Clinic has been laid and work on the structure will proceed as rapidly as material can be procured. O. W. Latson of Wichita Falls, father-in-law of Wynne Collier, is the contractor. The structure will include an operating room 14 by 20 feet, two additional treatment rooms, seven bed rooms, and an enlargement of the X-ray department, according to Dr. E. Prohl, owner of the Clinic. The building will be finished inside and outside to match the original structure, which is itself a thing of beauty.

This is the second time the Clinic has been expanded, but these and possible later additions are being built according to plans made when the original structure was built, so that there is no break in the symmetry of the expanded structure. As the demands may require, other additions will probably be made from time to time, as the Doctor has acquired title to adjacent property. Jester Gets 1410, Rainey 674 Votes

The results of Saturday's primary election for state officers contained some up-sets in this county as well as in the state at large.

Belden's Poll and most of the political dopesters were predicting that Homer Price Rainey would be the leading candidate for governor throughout the state, and the same sort of predictions were made for Lynn county. Most of us were fooled. Beauford Jester received more than twice as many votes in Lynn county as did Rainey, 1410 to 674.

Grover Sellers was third with 381 votes; John Lee Smith fourth with 296; and Jerry Sadler 5th with 291; nine others, 137.

It will be seen from these figures that Jester got more votes than any three of his opponents. Of the 2969 votes cast in the race for the United States Senate, Tom Connally received 2553 of them. The other four candidates combined received only 436 votes. Why that many people should have voted for one or another of the four in preference to Tom Connally, who has become a distinguished world figure, is more than ordinary folks can figure out.

As was to be expected, Boyce House of Fort Worth led in Lynn county for Lt. Governor, Allan Shivers of Jefferson county being second, 1661 to 1020. Joed Winfrey (Cont'd. on last page, Sec. 1)

Garrard, Mathis Re-elected, Run-off For Four Offices

The primary election in this county last Saturday failed to settle definitely who will be the Democratic nominee for sheriff, for tax assessor-collector, for commissioner from Precinct No. 1 and for commissioner of precinct No. 2. All other county and precinct contests were definitely settled. A total of 3,361 votes were cast in the county, according to election returns, but not quite that many were cast in any one contest.

Tom Garrard was re-elected county judge by a vote of 2,069 against 1,220 for his opponent, G. C. Grider. W. M. Mathis was re-elected county clerk over his opponent, Jas. D. H. Woods by a vote of 2123 to 1172.

Lenore M. Tunnell retains her position as county school superintendent, her vote being 2,043 against 1,275 for B. T. Smith. Herman Reid defeated Mrs. Lois Weathers for county treasurer by a vote of 2,172 to 1,130.

There were four candidates for sheriff, no one of whom received a clear majority and the contest therefore must be settled in the run-off election. Sheriff Sam H. Floyd, the incumbent, and Sam F. Price will be the opposing candidates in the runoff. In Saturday's election Floyd received 1,418 votes, Price 1,276, Claud W. Johnson 556, and Cleave Bairrington 156.

In the assessor-collector race, three ex-service men were in the contest. David G. Weathers led with 1,533 votes; A. F. McGlaun Jr. was second with 1,052 votes, and Jack W. Minor, third with 742.

In commissioners precinct No. 1, the Tahoka-Wilson precinct, E. J. Cooper has a lead of 40 votes over P. F. Swann, the incumbent. The vote was: Cooper, 470; Swann, 430; G. E. Jones, 233; and A. E. Hagens, 136; making a total of 1,269 votes.

In precinct No. 2, embracing the Draw, Grassland, and South Tahoka voting precincts, there is to be a run-off between Lonnie Williams, the incumbent, and Willis Pennington, who has a lead of 71 votes over Williams. The vote in that commissioners precinct is as follows: Pennington, 374; Williams, 303; C. W. Roberts, 143; J. A. Parrish, 68; and Samie Norwood, 53.

In precinct No. 3, O'Donnell, John Anderson, the incumbent commissioner, was re-elected by a vote of 471 to 149 for his opponent, B. W. Keth. Thad Smith of Precinct 4 was re-elected without an opponent, his vote being 480.

In justice precinct No. 1, P. D. Server defeated his opponent by a vote of 704 to 647 for justice of the peace. At O'Donnell, T. W. Brown was re-elected justice of the peace without an opponent, his vote being 583.

District Clerk Skip Taylor and County Attorney B. P. Maddox were also re-elected without opponents, as were District Judge Louis B. Reed of Lamesa, District Attorney Callowsy Huffaker, of Tahoka, and Preston E. Smith of Lubbock, Representative in the legislature.

Hot, Dry Weather Hard On Crops

Without looking up the record for past years, it is safe to say that the month of July just closed was one of the driest Julys in the history of this county.

Only .16 of an inch of precipitation fell in Tahoka during the entire month. Much more than that fell in some localities but it was generally very dry over the county. There was a rainfall of 2 to 2 1/2 inches early in the month covering two or three sections of land including the town of Wilson but it had been so extremely dry there and this rain fell in such torrents that only a comparatively small percent of the water soaked in the soil. More than an inch has been reported in other small areas at different times, but the rainfall over most of the county has been little more than the amount registered in Tahoka.

This year up to date has like-

wise has been one of the driest since rainfall records for the county have been kept. For the seven months ending July 31, the total rainfall has been only 5.23 inches against a total of 5.01 for the first seven months of last year. Total rainfall last year was 11.52 inches. Last year, there was only .47 of an inch in January but a total of 1.77 inches in July. This year, there were 1.66 in January and only .16 of an inch in July. Of the 11.52 inches last year, 7.54 of it fell in the months of July, August, September, and October. Only 3.98 inches fell during the other eight months. It is to be hoped that the rainfall during the remainder of this summer and the early fall will equal that of last year, which was: August, 1.02; September, 2.29; and October, 2.46.

There have been many warm days recently, the mercury rising to and above the 100 mark on a number of them.

Of course most crops are suffering intensely from the prolonged drouth.

Lindley's Leg Is Broken In Wreck

Dee Howell Lindly, 22 son of Mr. and Mrs. H. F. "Procher" Lindly of T-Bar, sustained serious injuries at about 3:30 o'clock last Saturday afternoon when he and Paul Halamick were thrown violently upon the ground from a motorcycle on which they were riding and which struck the rear fender of a pick-up which they were about to pass in the vicinity of Burleson Grain company.

Lindly's leg was broken in several places below the knee, and after being given first aid at Dr. Seale's Clinic, he was rushed to a Lubbock hospital for surgery and further treatment of the injured limb. As last reports he was doing as well as could be expected.

As the pick-up belonging to H. B. McCord and driven east by one of his employees along the Post highway, approached the intersecting street running north and south between Burleson's and Bosworth's grocery, the driver of the pick-up noticed the motorcycle coming down the highway at considerable speed, and he brought the pick-up almost to a full stop in order to turn north up the intersecting street after the motorcycle should pass.

When Halamick, who was in the driver's seat on the motorcycle, undertook to pass the pick-up, on the left, his machine struck its rear fender, causing him to lose control of his machine. It finally went over with its riders at the east tracks of the Santa Fe railway, inflicting the injuries to Lindly. Luckily, Halamick was only slightly hurt.

Social Security Man Coming Wednesday

Elliot Adams, Manager of the Social Security Board Field Office will be in Tahoka at the U. S. Post Office, at 11:00 a. m., Wednesday, August 7, for the purpose of answering any questions you may have on Social Security; discussing possible benefits and taking claims for persons who seem to be entitled to benefits; and of taking applications for Social Security account number cards.

Delay in filing a claim for old-age and survivors insurance benefits can cost the claimant money. Upon the death of the insured wage earner, his widow and children or his dependent parents are eligible for monthly or lump sum insurance payments if they meet certain requirements. If the wage earner has no family, then a lump sum may be

paid to the person who paid funeral expenses. Delay in filing claims result in the loss of several monthly checks especially among survivors who have not been informed about their rights.

Progress Is Made On Local Airport

A lot of progress has been made in improving the Tahoka Airport in the past three weeks. There is still a lot of work to be done before the field is in top shape.

Bill McNeely, owner of the field, stated that the new all-steel shop building has been completed and some of the hangars have been enclosed and concrete floors have been run in three of the T-hangars. An electric gasoline pump has been installed with a long pipe extended from the pump to the apron which has a 40-foot hose connected to it. This new refueling system will simplify the refueling system now in use.

The electric high-line which runs behind the hangars on the north side will soon be removed and will make the field a safer place to land and take off from. Every hangar will have an individual light and a plug-in for the air-compressor.

Bill says that he is widening his runways by several feet and will have each runway marked so that they can be easily identified from the air. He is also making a little progress toward completing his office, class room, and ready-room and should have them completed in the near future.

He is hoping to have the field inspected and approved and operating the G. I. Training program within the next three or four weeks. He has a licensed A. & E. mechanic to do all kinds of airplane repair work.

McNeely also plans to have his phone connected to a direct line in the near future and free transportation to and from town for his passengers.

The Tahoka Airport is already one of the best small town Airports in West Texas.

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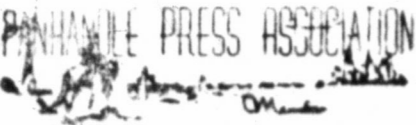

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MAHON'S RECORD APPROVED: George H. Mahon, rounding out his sixth term in Congress and running for the seventh, was given a sweeping majority over his only opponent, Hop Halsey of Lubbock, in the primary election last Saturday, carrying 23 of the 25 counties in the district and rolling up a majority of nearly 18,000 votes.

Mahon's record in Congress has thus been decisively approved by the voters and he has been given the green light sign to go ahead. Probably the most potent cause in bringing about this result was Mahon himself. He gave a straightforward, matter-of-fact, obviously honest and truthful report of his leadership in Congress to the people of the district in the spirit of bragadocio but in the spirit of a servant reporting to his master, the people. It took all the punch out of the criticism usually of a general nature, that was being leveled at him.

Another potent factor that worked in his favor was the obvious fact that with the committee assignments which he holds and the prestige which he enjoys by reason of long service in Congress, he can most assuredly accomplish more for the people of his district than could any new man. Although the people generally like Hop Halsey very much, few of them believed that he could possibly render them the service that Mahon is in position to render. Halsey should be gratified that under the circumstances he received nearly 27,000 votes.

Halsey raised few specific issues, and at least two of them rubbed the hair the wrong way with many voters. He declared that if sent to Congress he would advocate the payment of a pension by the federal government to every person over 65 in the sum of \$20.00 whether the State matched the sum or not. If such a law should be enacted, the people of the United States, rich and poor, would be taxed to pay pensions to thousands of millionaires and a few multi-millionaires together with other thousands of prosperous business men and property owners along with the needy old people of the United States, which, as the News has often pointed out, would be monstrously unjust and pernicious.

Again, he advocated a substantial appropriation by the federal government to supplement the pay of teachers in our public schools. Hundreds of thousands of people in Texas who want better schools and colleges in this state and better pay for teachers, are nevertheless opposed to the Federal Government meddling in our public school system. They see serious troubles ahead if such a policy should be adopted; among them the possible aggravation of the race trouble.

Many also thought that they saw in Halsey's method of campaigning a hang-over from the Les O'Daniel regime, and that evoked criticism for if there is any politician in Texas or Washington "deader" than O'Daniel is today, we have been unable to figure him out. In spite of all this, Hop Halsey retains the good wishes of thousands of supporters and of thousands of others who did not vote for him last Saturday. He doubtless has a bright political future in the field of state politics if he can avoid the mistakes of the past.

Urges Vaccination Against Smallpox

TAHOKA, July 30. — "From a health standpoint children are not ready to enter school until they have been successfully vaccinated against smallpox," Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, reminds parents who expect to enroll their youngsters in September. "Many school districts make vaccination an entrance requirement, and children who have never been vaccinated, and also those vaccinated in babyhood, should be taken to the physician for vaccination now, so that the scar will be well healed before school opens.

Immunization against diphtheria is also strongly recommended for further protection. Parents are urged to have their children protected from diphtheria by immunization with toxoid. Children who had this protection in infancy should receive a booster dose before entering school in order to maintain immunity at a high level.

"These two types of protection against disease should be considered 'musts' for preschool children," Dr. Cox declared. "Any other immunizations that the physician may recommend will, of course, provide additional health security."

In addition to this protection against specific communicable diseases each child getting ready to enter school should also receive a complete physical examination by his private physician or at the nearest clinic. Any treatment or correction of defects advised by the doctor should be undertaken immediately in order that the child may enter school in the best possible physical condition.

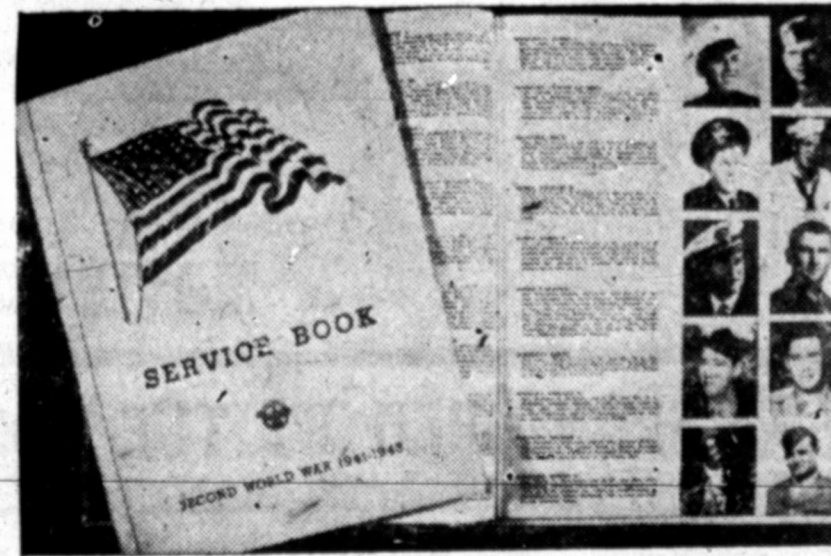

2 Million Hurt at Work In 1945, Official Report

WASHINGTON. — Work injuries disabled about 2,000,000 persons in 1945, the bureau of labor statistics reported.

Approximately 16,000 workers were killed and 84,500 permanently impaired, including 1,800 so seriously injured as to be unfit for any future employment in industry.

The total of injured was about 10 per cent less than in 1944, first year to show a drop in industrial accidents since 1938. The affected workers lost about 41,250,000 days of employment.

Doctor Said, Don't Get Up, So Woman Burns to Death

LONDON.—Told that her house was burning, Mrs. Ethel Roys, 27, stuck her head out of an upstairs window and replied: "I can't come down. The doctor said I was not to get up."

Mrs. Roys was burned to death. George Carter, who told the story at a coroner's inquest, saved four other occupants of the house.

Son of Hero Alvin York Enlists for Three Years

MANILA.—Pic. Woodrow Wilson York enlisted in the army for three years after his father, Sgt. Alvin York, World War I hero, wrote: "I probably would do the same thing if I were in your shoes."

The younger York, of Wolf River Tenn., was drafted in March, 1944. He has been guarding Japanese prisoners of war in Lingayen gulf on Luzon.

Quick Treatment

The army's policy of moving medical care, as well as surgical care, nearer and nearer to the front lines has proved eminently successful. The primary task of the medical corps is to keep soldiers on active duty, and this is especially vital in combat areas where regiments, divisions and whole army groups function as a team, with each unit doing its special task. Internists and the psychiatrists return about 66 per cent of the men who go back to combat duty while surgeons—because of the more serious nature of the cases they have to handle—return the other 34 per cent. The figures vary from one theater of operation to another but the medical division plays a most important role.

Notice, Please!

To The People of Lynn County:

We are now engaged in a big road building program in Lynn county at great cost to our tax-payers. We have engineers busily engaged making surveys and staking these roads and preparing plans and specifications. On these stakes that are set is valuable information to the engineers and contractors, which they MUST HAVE and the roads CANNOT BE BUILT WITHOUT THESE STAKES. Unfortunately a number of people are UNTHOUGHTEDLY plowing up or otherwise destroying these stakes. In some instances the engineers have been compelled to go back and reset these stakes for the THIRD TIME.

It is costing the County and the engineers approximately 50 cents per stake to set them. There are about 110 stakes per mile on the roads surveyed which cost \$55.00 per mile to set, and in some instances, where stakes have been destroyed and reset for the third time, this alone is costing \$165.00 per mile. So great has been the destruction and plowing up of stakes that, if it continues, will badly handicap the work and add so much to the cost of construction per mile as to hazard the whole road building program.

You good people want the work to continue and the roads built but unless there is better co-operation on the part of those who farm the lands along the roads under survey or construction, it is going to be impossible to do the job as planned.

We know that you would not maliciously or purposely cause such destruction, but it injures and handicaps us just as much to plow up or destroy these stakes unthoughtedly as it would if purposely done.

These stakes are set for the right-of-way line. They are all that the contractors and engineers have to go by and when removed, plowed up, or otherwise destroyed, it is necessary to pull men off of other jobs, re-survey and reset them. We are trying hard and conscientiously to do you a good job. PLEASE, PLEASE, EVERYONE, co-operate with us in every way possible to the end that we may do the best job possible at the lowest cost to all.

This is a very urgent appeal which we hope all will heed. Thanks!

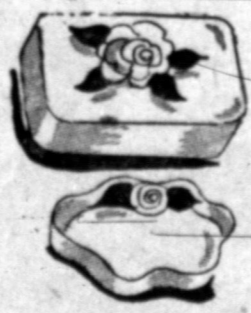

**H. J. R. No. 49
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**

Proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as "Section 7-a"; providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from the taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1945; and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from the motor vehicle registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; and providing for the proclamation of the election and the publication thereof.

Be It Resolved By The Legislature Of The State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows: "Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all refunds allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicle registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way, constructing, maintaining, and policing such public roadways, and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the Legislature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible prior to January 2, 1945, for payment out of the County and Road District Highway Fund under existing law; provided however, that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; and, provided, however, that the net revenue derived by counties from motor vehicle registration fees shall never be less than the maximum amounts allowed to be retained by each County and the percentages allowed to be retained by each County under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held in November, 1946, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that: subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945;

providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

"Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting FOR or AGAINST said proposed amendment."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the constitution for Amendments thereto. 42-47c.
