Flying Farmers In Spotlight At National Meeting

Texas' Flying Farmers, and the delegation from Lynn county in particular, stole the show last week at the National Flying Farmers annual convention held at Oklahoma A. & M. College in Stillwater, Okla. There were 48 present from Texas, 12 of them from Lynn county. Twelve states were represented.

Highlight of the meeting was a speech by General Ira C. Eaker of the U. S. Army Air Forces, also a Texan.

The National organization is opening a campaign to have painted on large buildings and highways in each town in the nation the town's name, highway numbers, directions to landing fields, and other information that will be of benefit to the private pilot of today.

Fifty photographers from newspapers and press associations, farm and news magazines, trade journals and three or four news-reel companies were on hand to photograph the meeting, and Lynn county and the Texas delegation just about stole the show. Local Flying Farmers making the trip report.

Main reason was their number, a couple of newsworthy members, and the unique Texas uniform originated by Billy Hill of The News and County Agent Manuel Ayers, the shirt of which carries a large map of Texas and a farmer piloting an airplane embroidered on the back thereof.

R. H. "Kid" Gibson, 76, Tahoka, was probably the most photographed and most interviewed man at the meeting, and he was presented the President's Award as the oldest Flying Farmer in the United States. Mr. Gibson was also taken for a ride in an Army helicopter.

Clayton Beard, president of the Texas Flying Farmers and also of the local chapter, which was the first organized in the state, was taken up in an air plane and made a short radio broadcast from the air.

Lynn county was nosed out by Kiowa County, Okla., 12 to 13 for having the largest delegation from a single county present.

Henry Bomhoff of near El Reno was given the award for having contributed more to farming thru aviation than any other member.

The Temple family of Buffalo, Okla., was given an award for being the largest family of flyers—five—at the convention.

Hundreds of feet of newsreel were taken, and some of the local members are likely to be seen in the shows soon.

Nance, Billy Hill, Manuel Ayers, Mr. and Mrs. McNabb of near Meadow, Durward McMillen, and Jarrell Brown, the latter representing the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce. Five planes carried the delegation.

First-aid instructions will be given by Bill Griffin who will maintain a first-aid station during the camp.

4-H boys attending this Encampment will be accompanied by County Agricultural Agents and local adult leaders from their respective counties. Extension District 2 is composed of 20 Counties and some 250 4-H club boys are expected to attend this Encampment.

Arrangements to use facilities at the Army Air Field were made by the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce through the assistance of the Lubbock Branch of Federal Housing Authority.

Lynn County delegation will meet at the Tahoka City Park 9:00 A. M. Monday August 12, and go to the Encampment by truck. Mr. J. B. Oliver, local 4-H Club leader will drive his truck and Mr. Hall Robinson will also accompany the group to the camp.

New Building Is Being Erected

The foundation for a spacious building on the east side of the square has been laid and construction will proceed as rapidly as material can be procured and workmen can do the job. R. L. Littlepage is the owner of the lots and is having the building constructed.

It is understood that it is to be used as a store room and showroom for the sale of the new Kaiser and Frazier cars. A local man will have charge of the business, if present plans materialize.

County Demos Hold Convention, Pass Resolutions

The county Democratic convention held in the courthouse last Saturday afternoon was a thoroughly harmonious affair—at least on the surface. If the fires of discord were smouldering beneath, they were smouldering fires that brought no eruption. The little Rainey lion and the big Jester ram lay down together.

A mixed delegation was named as delegates to the state convention. Some resolutions of a general nature were passed but the resolvers refrained from wandering far onto controversial grounds.

Judge C. H. Cain as county chairman called the convention to order. Judge J. W. Elliott was elected as temporary and finally as permanent chairman and Walter S. Anglin as secretary.

The credentials committee consisted of B. M. Haymes of O'Donnell, E. R. Tunnell of Dixie, and W. Z. Florence of Draw. There were no contesting delegations and this committee had smooth sailing.

The committee on delegation to the state convention consisted of Rollin M. Cord, Buel Draper, and C. H. Cain. The list of delegates recommended and selected appears at the end of this story.

Judge B. P. Maddox, Charles Schultz, and G. B. Sherrad were appointed as a committee on resolutions. Cily Maddox and Sherrad functioned.

While the resolutions as presented and adopted are in a somewhat confused condition, yet this much is clear:

1. That the convention endorsed the National Democratic Administration, and its policies, foreign and domestic.

2. That, quoting, "We endorse our President, Harry S. Truman, and commend him for carrying through the principles and ideals of the greatest Democrat of all times, Franklin D. Roosevelt."

3. "That we express our appreciation and gratitude to our Soldiers, Sailors, and Marines for their great service to our country."

4. "That we instruct our delegates to vote as a unit on all matters coming before the State Convention."

5. "That the delegates from this county attending the state convention cast the entire vote of this convention on all questions coming before said state convention."

6. "That we as Texas Democrats resent the interference of all un-Democratic pressure groups who seek to control the affairs of our state to promote and advance their own selfish purposes at the expense of the public weal."

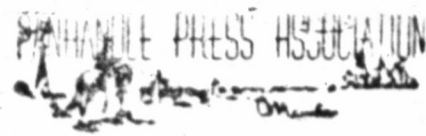

HI-HO-HUM

County conventions are doubtless necessary as a means of preserving some sort of party organization and machinery, but otherwise they amount to practically nothing. As moulders of public opinion, they are nil. Their actions may or may not reflect the sentiment of the rank and file. They are dominated and controlled by that faction which, at that particular time and place, can out-vote, out-manuever, or out-slick the opposition. The resolutions they adopt usually have about as much effect as a squirt-gun at a prairie fire.

We listened in on the radio broadcast of the Lubbock county Democratic convention held in the courthouse there last Saturday afternoon. Our verdict is that it was a mess. It must have gotten disgusted with itself, for it adjourned right in the middle of its program of proceedings, if it had a program. It did pass a few resolutions, however, voted down one or two, and floundered around over various amendments and substitute resolutions, not seeming to understand the difference between an amendment and a substitute.

It passed one resolution indorsing the Roosevelt and the me-too Truman administrations and praising Roosevelt as "the greatest Democrat of all time," evidently forgetting all about one Thomas Jefferson, who wrote the Declaration of Independence castigating and defying the British King, the British parliament, and the British army, denouncing autocracy and tyranny and proclaiming in clear tones the very foundation principles upon which all democratic government rests—the same Thomas Jefferson who founded the Democratic party and demonstrated to an assounded world how democracy really works. They evidently forgot about James Madison "the Father of our Constitution," and Woodrow Wilson, who met the first real challenge of Autocracy on the battlefields of the world, drove back the enemy, and then proposed the greatest plan ever devised by man up to that time to preserve the

peace of the world. That proposal was turned down by the Republicans and a bunch of isolationist Democrats.

The Lubbock convention also turned down in a jiffy an amendment offered which would have included also the endorsement of our present state Democratic administration, which has saved and tied up in the public treasury the greatest surplus that has ever existed in the history of this state.

And although the cloven hand of the C. I. O. was seen and the blatant voice of the PAC was heard in the discussion and action on these resolutions, the convention then turned around and passed another resolution calling upon the legislature to repeal the primary election laws and leave the parties free to make their own regulations, the purpose being, of course, to bar the Negro from participation in Democratic party affairs. The only alternative, as we see it, would be the selection of its nominees by party conventions, such as the man, strosky which was then being held.

It passed another resolution which puzzled us a bit. This resolution called upon the governor to call a special session of the legislature to re-district the state. Since Democratic nominees for the legislature have already been selected or will be selected on the fourth Saturday in this month, who are to be elected on November 4, and since any re-districting of the state would nullify all or many of these districts and the nomination and election of many of these nominees, if said re-districting were to take immediate effect, it is evident that such action at a special session of the legislature could only create confusion and turmoil of the worst kind. On the other hand, the regular legislature will meet in January and will have from then on out to enact a re-districting bill. The Lubbock convention seems to have gone off half-cocked.

Resort to violence at polling places is an exceedingly rare occurrence in the United States. We are ordinarily good democrats and good Americans. We give and take and let the majority rule. The gun battle, therefore, which broke out between two political factions at Athens, Tennessee, on Thursday of last week and continued for six hours, resulting in the serious wounding of six men and minor injuries to a dozen others together with the near wrecking of the jail and the courthouse, attracted nationwide attention. The trouble broke out when G. I.'s, who had put out a ticket in opposition to the entrenched Democratic machine, discovered that the "machine" was undertaking to steal the election. The violence is to be deplored but the G. I.'s can hardly be blamed. It was about the only way open to them to prevent the election fraud being perpetrated under their very eyes, for the "machine" held all the county offices and would have prevented justice being done in the courts. The whole country must be gratified that G. I.'s won out in the end. We

would not advocate the use of violence in any instance but we have some corrupt political machines here and there in Texas that need to be demolished. There is one in Duval county that has been operating for thirty or forty years, by which one man has controlled practically the entire vote of the county at every election. At the election two years ago there were a few independent votes, and a few more still at the recent election but usually the entire vote of the county has been cast solidly for one man for each office with only one or two dissenting votes, if any at all. And there are more than 4400 votes in the county. There were only 17 dissenting votes in the governor's race two years ago, and little more

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
 Proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as "Section 7-a"; providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from the taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; and providing for the proclamation of the election and the publication thereof.

Be It Resolved By The Legislature Of The State of Texas:
Section 1. That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows:
 "Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all refunds allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicle registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way, constructing, maintaining, and policing such public roadways, and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the Legislature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible prior to January 2, 1945, for payment out of the County and Road District Highway Fund under existing law; provided however, that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; and provided, however, that the net revenue derived by counties from motor vehicle registration fees shall never be less than the maximum amounts allowed to be retained by each County under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held in November, 1946, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:
FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that: subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived

from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the constitution for Amendments thereto. 42-41c.

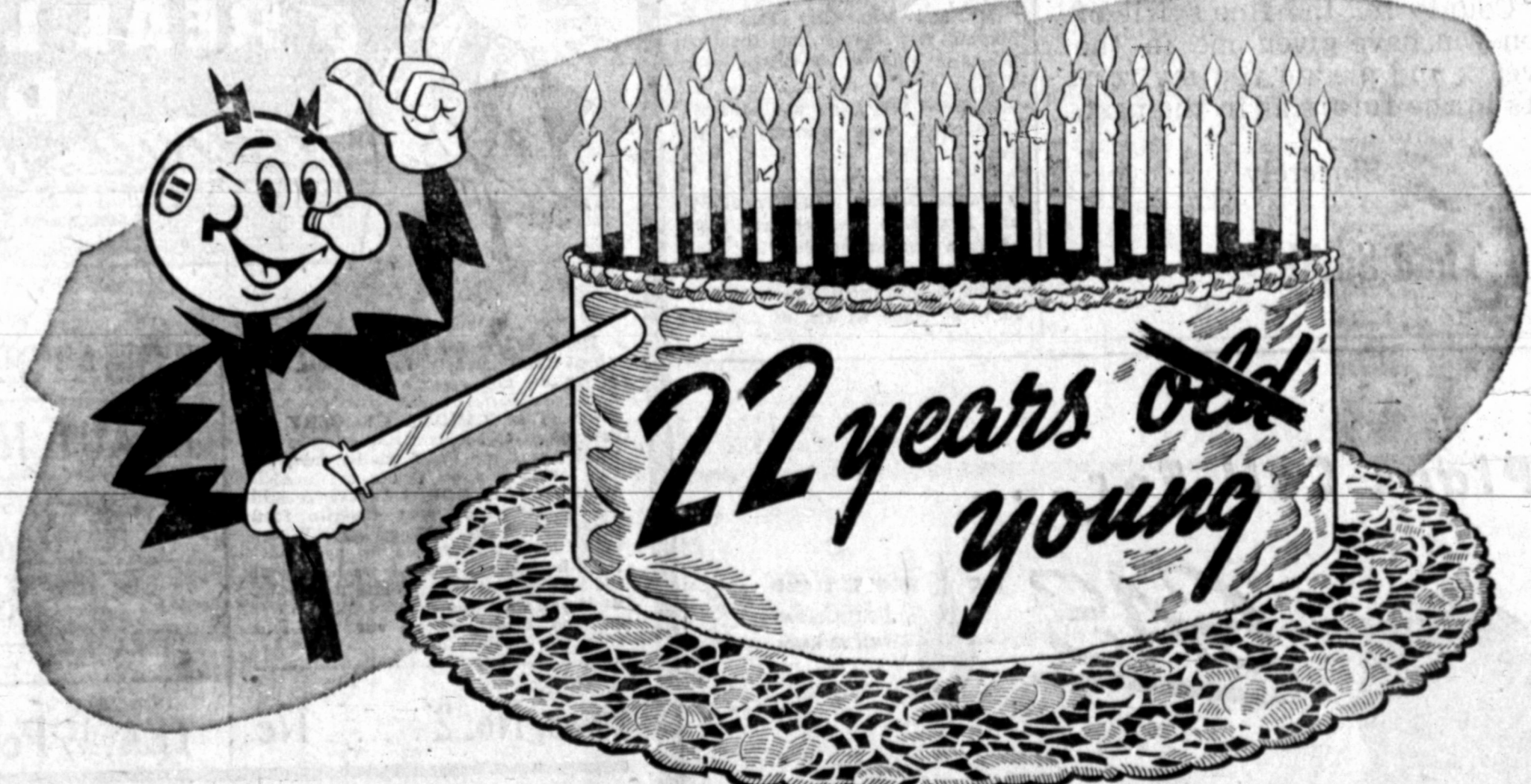

MISS BERTA HILL GIVES VIEWS ON EUROPE

Miss Berta Hill, formerly Tech. 4/g, equivalent to Sergeant, in the WAC's, who spent some ten days in the editor's home following her return from Germany, left last Friday night for Austin to see about reinstatement in her former position as inspector for the Old Age pension commission.

Miss Hill stated that the News was in error in stating two weeks ago that most of the WAC's were being sent home. She says that they are being sent home only in the regular way, on points, and that more possibly are being sent overseas now than are being sent home. She herself remained awhile after she could have come home on account of the dire need for help. Demobilization of the 7th army and the sending of so many of the soldiers back to America made her work very heavy, and she had very few leaves of absence during her year's service in Germany. Once she went to Switzerland and to the Bavarian Alps for a few days of rest and sightseeing and once to Denmark.

She was stationed at Heidelberg during most of her stay in Germany, and she had ample opportunity to get the viewpoint of many German civilians respecting the war and the course Germany had pursued. She does not think that the people of Germany generally feel any regrets for bringing on the war, they only regret that they lost. She does not think that they have suffered any remorse or conscience for the cruelties and inhumanities

perpetrated by the German leaders and soldiers upon the Jews, Poles, Czechoslovakians, or anybody else. Furthermore, she thinks that they will take advantage of every opportunity presented to prepare for another war. She thinks that it will be an almost impossible task to educate the war-bred spirit out of them. The little children, especially the boys, are still insolent and defiant in their attitude.

It has been difficult, she says, to find anti-Nazi teachers for the schools and colleges of Germany, and a large number of teachers were "fired" not long ago because of their alleged sympathy with the Nazi regime.

Furthermore, she is of the opinion that Americans should not be misled by the sympathetic complaints and appeals of the German people. To her they do not look as if they had suffered for food anything, they had even missed even a meal. They are fat and rosy-cheeked, she says, in striking contrast with the cadaverous appearance of the peoples whom they have tortured or almost starved to death. There are many hunchbacked children among these oppressed peoples, she declares, as a result of the starvation which they had to suffer.

She warns that Germany will make trouble again if she ever has the chance.

She brought back home with her the following ribbons and medals: The European campaign ribbon; Good Conduct medal; Victory ribbon; Army Commendation ribbon; 2 Overseas Service bars; Army of Occupation ribbon; Meritorious Unit Award; and the American Theatre Campaign ribbon.

Several other planes stopped over here for refueling over the weekend from Stamford, Portales, Beaumont, Mineral Wells, Lubbock and other points.

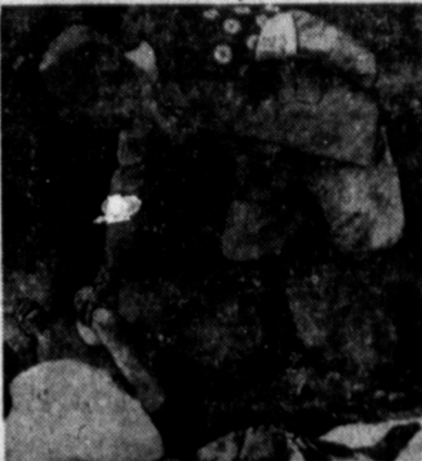
Jap Photos Just Released Show Horrors of Nagasaki 20 Hours After A-Bomb Hit

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 49-b, creating a Veteran's Land Board and establishing a Veteran's Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

Be It Resolved By The Legislature Of The State Of Texas: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 49-b which shall read as follows: "Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veteran's Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Legislature shall provide by law for the issuance by said Board of not to exceed Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veteran's Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as shall be prescribed by law, provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum.

"In the sale of such bonds a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent Free School Funds; such bonds to be issued only as needed, in the opinion of the Veteran's Land Board under legislative authorization.

"The Veteran's Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State: (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation.

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veteran's Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veteran's Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and such rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by law; provided, however, that any such lands remaining unsold at the expiration of eight (8) years after the effective date of this Amendment may be sold to anyone as shall be prescribed by law.

"All moneys received and which have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments shall be credited to the Veteran's Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, in like manner as shall be provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period of eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay in interest on the bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. After eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment, all moneys received by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Thursday in November, 1946, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b

creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of the determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

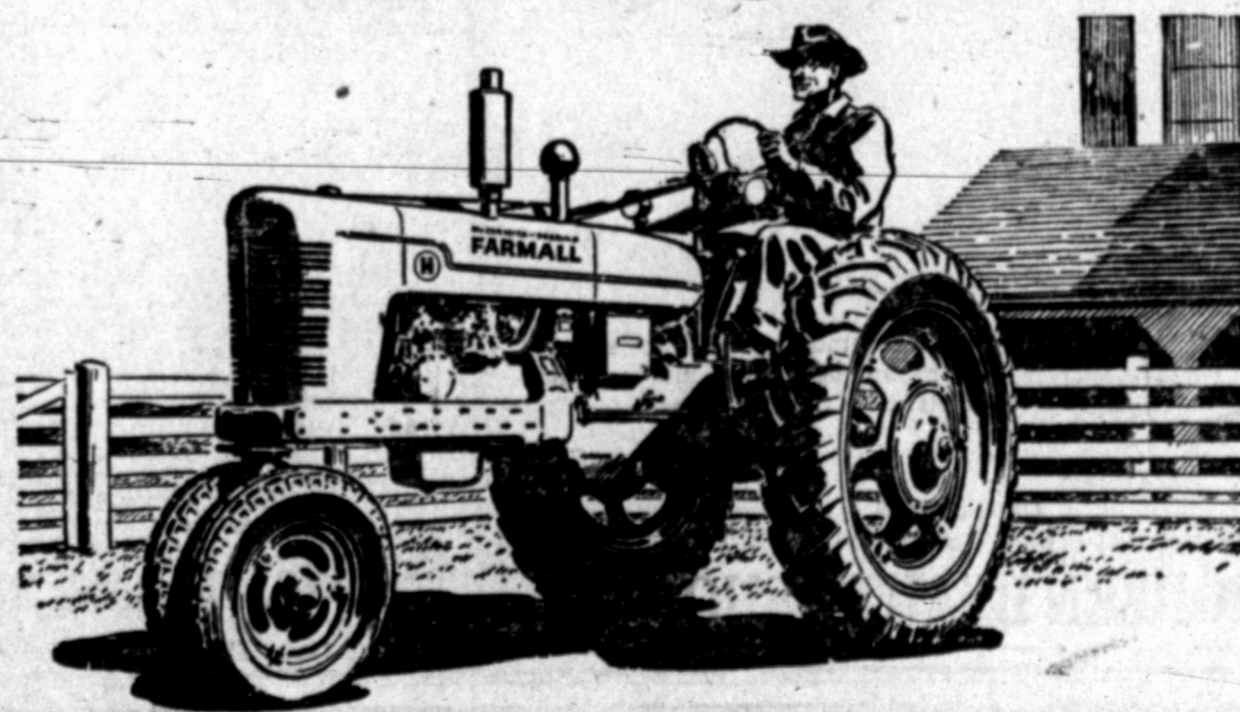
