## Coop. Clinic Is Held Here Monday

A clinic of and for Cooperative associations was held here Monday in the dining room situated in the basement of the Baptist Church. This place was offered and accepted for the meeting by reason of the fact that a luncheon was to be served at the noon hour, and a real feed consisting of barbecued beef, beans, pickles, bread, ice tea, ice cream and pie was served.

This was one of four such clinics being held on the South Plains this week. The second was held at Littlefield on Tuesday, the third at Plainview on Thursday, and the fourth was to be held at Crosbyton today.

About ten or twelve counties with seventeen or eighteen co-operatives were represented at the meeting here. Other clinics are being held throughout Texas.

Arrangements for the meeting and for the entertainment of the visitors here were made by C. E. McKnight of the Farmers Cooperative Association and by H. G. Hodges of the Tahoka Cooperative Association.

The meeting or clinic itself was directed by a panel consisting of C. E. Bowles representing the Houston Bank for Cooperatives; T. E. Daly, the attorney for that institution; Edward Brehnan, treasurer; M. C. James of the Extension department of the Texas A. & M. College; Dr. W. E. Paulson, head of the Marketing division at the College. Other officials and representatives of Agricultural organizations present included E. M. Cook, secretary of the Coop. Gin Assn at Georgetown; J. E. Montgomery, Cooperatives supervisor from the Department of Agriculture at Austin; Kenneth R. Loyd and Guy P. Bennett with the Producers' Grain Cooperative of Amarillo; H. Dean Smith of the Consumers Coop. Assn. of America; and Arturo Jemenez of Havana, Cuba, who is in this country making a study of Cooperatives.

The purpose of the meeting was to better acquaint local officers and members of cooperatives with the work. Talks were made, questions were invited and propounded and much valuable and interesting information was given. H. P. Caviness, president of the Farmers Cooperative association D. A. Barton, district representative, and other local officers of Cooperatives expressed the opinion that the meeting was very worth-while.

Among cooperatives represented at the meeting were those at Brownfield, Post, Lamesa, Mt. Land, Plainview, and numbers of others in this area.

## Clayton Erecting Garage Building

Ted Clayton is constructing a frame and stucco building, 24x48 feet in size, on a lot just east of the Clayton Lumber Company, which has been leased to Stone Brothers.

In one compartment of the building Sam Stone will do sheet metal and cabinet work. Another compartment will be used by Vester and David Stone as a garage and repair shop.

Construction on the building was begun on Wednesday of last week and Mr. Clayton hopes to have the building finished and ready for occupancy within another week.

All three of the Stone brothers are reputed to be expert workmen, and the sheet metal and cabinet works will fill a long-felt need here.

## Roy Mason Is Victim of Fatal Oilfield Mishap

Leroy Mason, generally known merely as Roy Mason, 32 years of age and a resident of Tahoka for the past fourteen years, was accidentally killed at his work near Eunice, New Mexico, on last Friday morning just one week after he had moved his family to that place in order that he might be with them and bear his work at the same time.

For about three weeks he had been in the employ of the Haliburton Oil Company but his job seemed to involve work at a cement mixer. He either slipped and fell or in some other way got his foot caught in the mixer and was pulled into the machine. Both legs were cut off just at or above the ankles. The accident happened at about 11:45 Friday morning and he was rushed to a hospital, where he received surgical attention but died at about 5:45 in the afternoon.

The remains were brought to Tahoka and funeral services were conducted by Elmo Burkett, Minister, at 6:45 Saturday afternoon at the Church of Christ here, followed by interment in the Tahoka cemetery under the direction of the Stanley Funeral Home.

Survivors include the wife and six children, Doris Marie, Clifford Joel, L. H., Ruby Atrall, Jerry Mac, and H. B. Mason; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Homer B. Mason of El Paso; five brothers and one sister; two of the brothers living at Abilene.

## Mrs. Docia Ayer Death Victim

Mrs. Docia Geneva Ayer, wife of Granvel Ayer, died here very unexpectedly at about 8 o'clock last Friday morning while undergoing a minor operation in the Seale Clinic.

In preparation for the operation, which was in no way a serious one, she was administered an anesthetic injection in the arm, and while the operation was in progress, her condition became serious. Dr. Seale immediately sensed the danger and began administering oxygen, then gave her artificial respiration, and did all in his power to save her life. She is said to have been an anemic and was in such a weakened condition that she was unable to stand the shock. Her husband was present at the time and related the facts stated above.

Funeral services were conducted at 5 o'clock Saturday afternoon at the Church of Christ, Elmo Burkett, Minister, officiating. Burial was in the Tahoka cemetery under the direction of the Stanley Funeral Home. There was a wealth of floral offerings which attested to the esteem in which she was held.

Present at the funeral were her father, O. M. Baker of Houston, her mother, Mrs. Verna Colquitt and her brother Billy Baker, both of Borger, and a number of her husband's relatives, together with a host of Tahoka friends of herself and husband. She had no other close relatives than those named.

Mrs. Ayer, whose maiden name was Docia Geneva Baker, was born and reared at Gladewater, Texas. She observed her twenty-first birthday on last March 13. She was married to Granvel Ayer on January 12, 1945, and she and her husband came to Tahoka last September, almost a year ago. For some time she had been employed as secretary for John Hudman and Charles Nelms, realtors, and as stenographer for Truett Smith, Attorney, in the Dean Nowlin building. Her husband has been employed at the Terry Thompson cleaning establishment.

During their residence here both made numerous friends in Tahoka and they were a highly respected young couple.

Mrs. Ayer was a member of the First Christian Church of Gladewater.

Mr. and Mrs. Gene Riley were called Monday to the bedside of Gene's brother, John Riley, who is very ill at Muskogee, Oklahoma.

Jim Foust, local football coach returned the first of the week from Corpus Christi where he had been attending the coaching school, minus one good automobile.

Jim Foust and Byron Boatman, coach of the Seminole school, were on their way home. Mr. Boatman was driving at the time the accident occurred which was no fault of his. He met a car a few miles on the other side of Eden and the car just pulled across onto his side of the road and he couldn't swerve in time to keep from being hit. Foust's car was almost completely wrecked.

The driver of the other car said that it was his fault and that he was blinded by Foust's car lights, which were dimmed and that he would pay for damages. Luckily no one was hurt except the girl friend of the fellow that hit them and her injuries were very slight.

## Election Called For City Post

## County Tax Rates To Be Reduced

County Judge Tom Garrard, budget officer, has filed a financial budget for the coming year, which has been agreed to by members of the commissioners court and will be officially approved and the rate of taxation set by the court at its first session in September.

This budget, if we except the funds which must be provided to take care of the new road bonds, calls for a very substantial reduction in the tax rate and the amount of taxes to be assessed against Lynn county property owners.

Specifically, the county rate last year was 80 cents and the state rate was 72 cents on each \$100 property valuation, or a total of \$1.52. This year, excluding the road bonds, the county rate is only 68 cents and the state rate is 37 cents, a total of only \$1.05 on each \$100 property valuation.

To care for the interest and the sinking fund on the road bonds there is an additional tax this year of 95 cents on the \$100. But, including the bond tax, the total rate for state and county taxes this year is only \$2.09 for each \$100 valuation; or an increase in the rate of only 48 cents per \$100, which would amount in dollars and cents to an average increase of only \$4.99 per quarter section of land over last year. This is as good as anybody could have hoped for.

Judge Garrard estimates that if tax collections continue to be good it may be possible to reduce the bond tax rate several cents next year.

## Fun Program, Barbecue Features of C. of C.—Service Men Meeting Here

### Aggie Building Is Provided For At Local School

In order to make provision for the reinstatement of vocational agriculture work in the Tahoka high school, which was suspended two years ago, the bus sheds on the school campus are being converted into a vocational agricultural building this week.

The structure is 30 by 60 feet in size. It is being cut into two rooms—one about 24 by 30 feet in size to be used as a class room, and the other about 36 by 30 feet to be used as a workshop. The windows are all in the south wall for light and ventilation.

The walls are being plastered and will be neatly finished, and the agriculture student's will really have a commodious and comfortable place in which to do their work.

The high school building became greatly crowded last year. This addition will afford little relief for that situation, however, for agriculture classes were not taught last year. It is beginning to look as if substantial additions will have to be added to our excellent school plant as soon as building material becomes available.

Virgil Carter, who taught in this county a number of years and who more recently has been superintendent at Meadow, is the new vocational agriculture instructor.

### 4-H Club Boys To State Meeting

Representing Lynn County at the first state wide meeting of 4-H members since 1941 on the campus of Texas A. and M. College, August 8-29-30 will be the following 4-H members: H. R. Tankersley, Rt. 5, Tahoka; Paul Stoker, Rt. 1, Wilson; Kenneth Pearson, Rt. C, Lamesa; and Bobby Henley, O'Donnell. Authorities are looking forward to making this the most outstanding 4-H meeting yet held.

This meeting will be known as the Texas 4-H Round-up and it will be somewhat different from those known in the past as short-courses. There will be only one contest conducted for 4-H boys and that will be the rifle program. The high three boys in each district will compete as a team representing their district. Boys must be 14 years of age or older.

The program has been arranged to get a maximum of boy and girl participation. This was requested by the twelve boys and girls who met at A. and M. early in May to plan for the Round-Up. They also suggested the name for the meeting. The discussion type of program will be followed and everyone in attendance will have an opportunity to take part in the discussions. The group will be divided into at least forty small groups and from these will be selected the finalists (about twelve boys and girls) who will sum up the discussions before the joint meeting of all those in attendance. This will be done on the last morning, Mr. J. P. Schmidt, from Ohio State University, will be in charge of the discussions. He is a recognized authority in this field and has made a national reputation as a discussion leader.

### R. L. Gibson Invited To Texas Air Day

R. L. Gibson was as happy as a boy last Saturday. He had a right to be. He received the following telegram from Harlingen, Texas, away down in the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

"R. L. Gibson, Tahoka, Texas: Governor Coke Stevenson and official committee take pleasure in inviting you as honor guest at 'Air Day in Texas' at Harlingen on September 7 and 8th. Certainly it will be privilege to have you present as 'Dean' of Texas Pilots and as representative of Texas Flying Farmers. Please wire acceptance." Mr. Gibson wired acceptance promptly.

Both the "feet" and the entertainment were "ions" at the meeting given by the Chamber of Commerce in honor of the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars out on the high school football field Tuesday night.

Barbecue and beans with all the customary trimmings, prepared by Richard Young, were served to a crowd estimated at 125 men. The barbecue was equal to the best and there was an abundance of it. Following the "feed" Ted Waggoner, president of the Chamber of Commerce, made a few appropriate remarks, recognized the visitors and a brief tribute to the ex-service men, and gave an account of the work undertaken and accomplished by the Chamber of Commerce, or at least of some of the work. For its achievements he gave credit especially to Terry Thompson, Clint Walker, and Winston Wharton.

Among the projects sponsored recently by the Chamber of Commerce and mentioned by Mr. Waggoner was the procuring of the softball field and the sponsoring of the softball games, Mr. Waggoner observing that these games had brought many people to Tahoka and created good will toward the town. There had been as many as 1,400 people present at one time at these games, he said.

Another worth-while project which he mentioned was the Flying Farmers organization. The Chamber of Commerce had lent it aid and encouragement and recently paid for the expenses of sending two planes to the national meeting at Stillwater, Oklahoma. He praised the Flying Farmers as having done more than any other agency to put Tahoka on the map.

He mentioned also the protection afforded the business men of Tahoka against solicitors for funds for this, that, and the other purpose—who are constantly calling upon the business men. The Chamber of Commerce, he reminded his hearers, has a secret committee to investigate all such solicitors, and the business men are thereupon advised as to whether the objects for which funds are solicited are worthy or otherwise.

Ted spoke through a microphone mounted on a truck, and when it seemed that he was about to close, Clint Walker slipped up to him and whispered something.

Ted then told the crowd that he had failed to recognize one gentleman present from Oklahoma, the mayor of some little town over there who had acquired local fame by paving every street in the town. (Cont'd. on last page)

### Roads To Be Hot Topped Soon

The commissioners court was in session here Monday, and in response to questions, Thad Smith of the New Home precinct said that the placing of the caliche base on that section of the new state highway extending from New Home to Wayside had been completed, and he had been informed that the work of spreading the Hot Top would begin probably within ten days or two weeks from that time.

Pat Swann stated that more than half of the caliche base had been laid from Wayside to Wilson. It will be completed and will be ready for the hot top within a very few weeks.

Judge Tom Garrard stated that the grading and drainage structures had been completed over probably ten miles of the Draw to Post highway project, and the work is now proceeding right along. It will soon be ready for the caliche.

### HAS ARM INJURED IN BLACKSMITH SHOP

**H. J. R. No. 62**  
**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION**  
 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 49-b, creating a Veteran's Land Board and establishing a Veteran's Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

Be It Resolved By The Legislature Of The State Of Texas: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 49-b which shall read as follows: "Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veteran's Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Legislature shall provide by law for the issuance by said Board of not to exceed twenty-five million Dollars (\$25,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veteran's Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as shall be prescribed by law, provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three percent (3%) per annum. "In the sale of such bonds a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent Free School Funds; such bonds to be issued only as needed, in the opinion of the Veteran's Land Board under legislative authorization. "The Veteran's Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purposes hereinafter stated, situated in this State (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation. "All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veteran's Land Fund. "The lands of the Veteran's Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and such rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by law; provided, however, that any such lands remaining unsold at the expiration of eight (8) years after the effective date of this Amendment may be sold to anyone as shall be prescribed by law.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State or Texas on the first Thursday in November, 1946, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words: "FOR the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words: "AGAINST the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

All moneys received and which have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments shall be credited to the Veteran's Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, in like manner as shall be provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds provided for herein, for a period of eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on the bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. After eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment, all moneys received by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law.

Section 5. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

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Section 19. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

Section 20. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

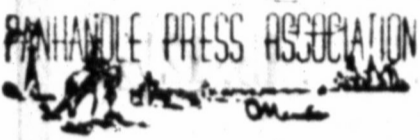

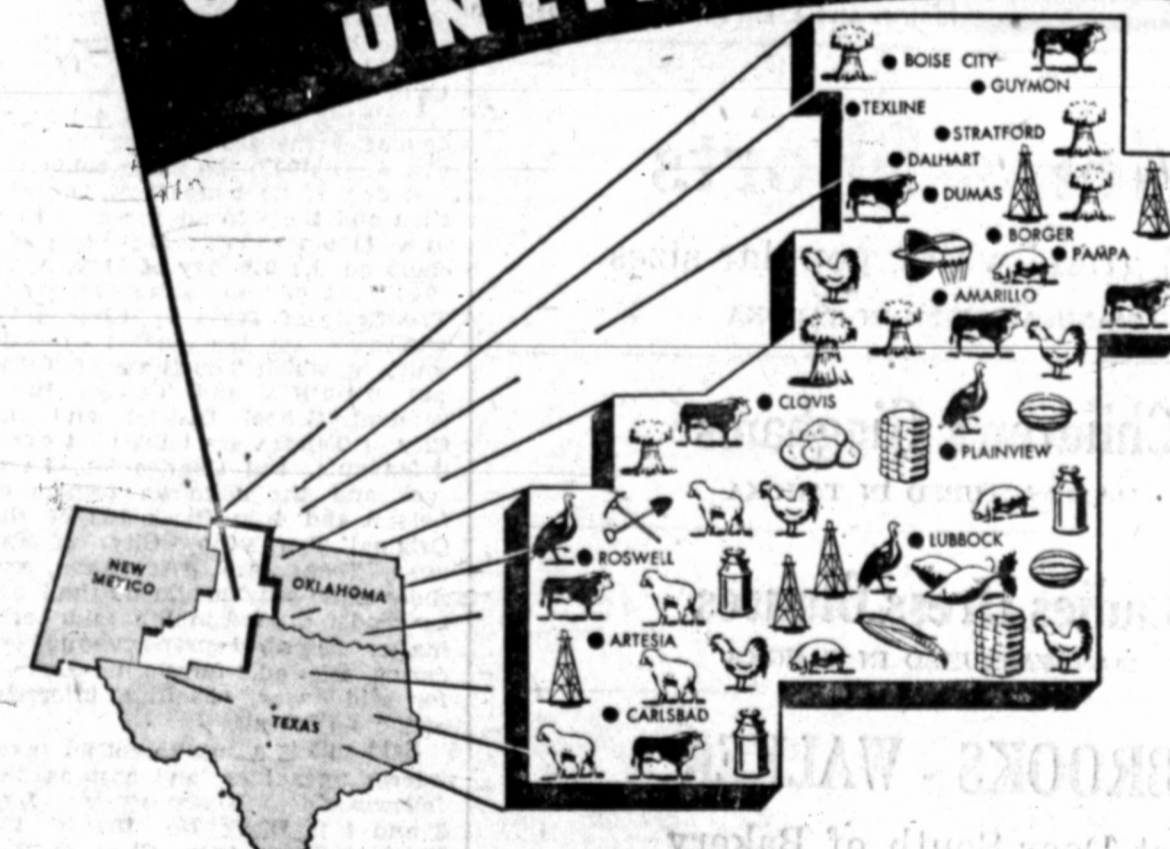

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE VIII OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS BY ADDING THERETO A NEW SECTION TO BE KNOWN AS "SECTION 7-A"; PROVIDING THAT SUBJECT TO LEGISLATIVE APPROPRIATION, ALLOCATION AND DIRECTION ALL NET REVENUES DERIVED FROM TAXES, EXCEPT GROSS PRODUCTION AND AD VALOREM TAXES, LEVIED ON MOTOR FUELS AND LUBRICANTS AND MOTOR VEHICLES REGISTRATION FEES SHALL BE USED FOR THE SOLE PURPOSES OF ACQUIRING RIGHTS-OF-WAY FOR AND CONSTRUCTING AND MAINTAINING PUBLIC ROADS; FOR THE ADMINISTRATION OF LAWS PERTAINING TO TRAFFIC AND SAFETY; AND FOR THE PAYMENT OF PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST ON COUNTY AND ROAD DISTRICT BONDS OR WARRANTS VOTED OR ISSUED PRIOR TO JANUARY 2, 1939, AND DECLARED ELIGIBLE FOR DEBT SERVICE PRIOR TO JANUARY 2, 1945; PROVIDING THAT ONE-FOURTH (1/4) OF SUCH NET REVENUE FROM THE MOTOR FUEL TAX SHALL BE ALLOCATED TO THE AVAILABLE SCHOOL FUND; PROVIDING AND INSURING THAT EACH COUNTY SHALL NEVER DERIVE LESS REVENUE FROM THE MOTOR REGISTRATION FEES THAN THE MAXIMUM AMOUNTS AND PERCENTAGES OF SUCH FEES ALLOWED TO BE RETAINED BY EACH COUNTY UNDER THE LAWS IN EFFECT ON JANUARY 1, 1945; NEGATING ANY INTERPRETATION OF THIS AMENDMENT AS AUTHORIZING THE PLEDGING OF THE STATE'S CREDIT FOR ANY PURPOSE; PROVIDING FOR THE SUBMISSION OF THIS AMENDMENT TO THE VOTERS OF THIS STATE; PRESCRIBING THE FORM OF BALLOT; AND PROVIDING FOR THE PROCLAMATION OF THE ELECTION AND THE PUBLICATION THEREOF.

Be It Resolved By The Legislature Of The State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-A and to read as follows:

"Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all refunds allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicle registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way, constructing, maintaining, and policing such public roadways, and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the Legislature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible prior to January 2, 1945, for payment out of the County and Road District Highway Fund under existing law; provided however, that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; and, provided, however, that the net revenue derived by counties from motor vehicle registration fees shall never be less than the maximum amounts allowed to be retained by each County and the percentage allowed to be retained by each County under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held in November, 1946, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that: subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem tax, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting FOR or AGAINST said proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the constitution for Amendments thereto. 42-41c

In fact, the second bomb lifted the obsolete Battleship Arkansas entirely out of the water.

Recently a lawyer was authorized to file suit for the taxes due on many of these lots and some of the citations are being published in the News. That cuts down the space for news items.

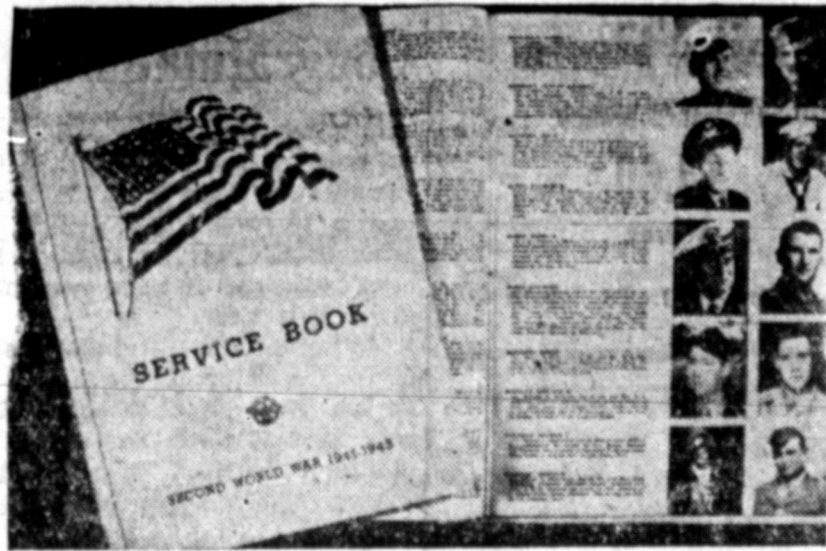

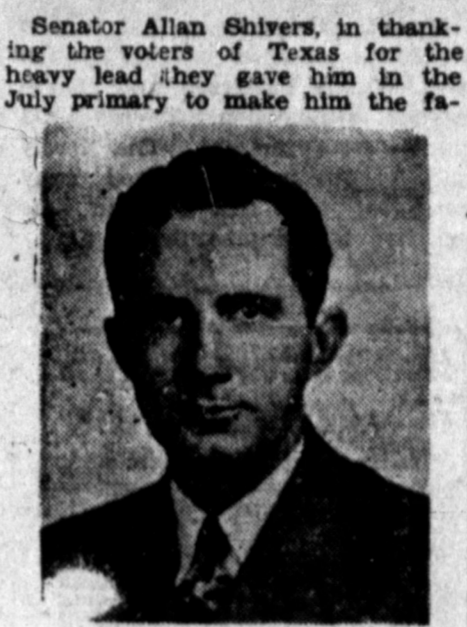

**Allan Shivers Is People's Favorite**



Senator Allan Shivers, in thanking the voters of Texas for the heavy lead they gave him in the July primary to make him the favorite candidate for lieutenant governor, also warned citizens that attempts will be made by "scheming minority pressure groups" to defeat him in the August 24 runoff.

The Jefferson County legislator, lawyer, and farmer, pointed with pride to the overwhelming support which he received in his present home county and in the county where he was reared to manhood. Shivers, a World War II combat war veteran (the only veteran in his race), polled approximately 75 per cent of the votes in Jefferson County, his present home, and was a 26 to 1 favorite over his runoff opponent in Tyler County, where he spent his youth. Sen. Shivers led his runoff opponent by approximately 100,000 votes in Texas.

"I am deeply grateful for the confidence the people of Texas have shown in me and the progressive program for Texas which I advocate," Shivers said "I shall strive even harder to work for the welfare of Texas."

"Because I represent the masses of the people, there will be those in the runoff campaign who will conspire to defeat me," Shivers predicted. "I will not be swayed by these radical, minority groups—the C.I.O. noisemakers in particular. My opponent is welcome to the support which they are giving him. I will continue to fight for the right and welfare and progress of our people who make up the backbone of Texas."
