Tahoka, Lynn County, Texas, Friday, August 23, 1946

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Those wishing to take instruction must first obtain a Certificate of Eligibility. Application must be made on Form 1950 at the office of the County Service Officer, Jackie Weathers in the Courthouse. Training may be started immediately. In fact, the first class is now under way. It is expected that there will be 20 or 25 students by the end of this week. The service has four new planes, and will secure others from time to time.

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The corps of instructors includes the following: Olen Parris, flight instructor; B. T. Smith, flight and ground instructor; Charles Stewart, instructor and flight examiner; Noah Lintley, C.A.A. Certified A. and M. mechanic and line man. Bill McNeely is general supervisor with Mrs. McNeely in charge of the office.

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So, that is the issue that confronts our people Saturday.

There are two candidates for lieutenant governor; Boyce House, a West Texan by birth and rearing, who now calls Fort Worth his home. ### First Bale Is Ginned In Tahoka

Tahoka's first bale of cotton for the season of 1946 was ginned at about six o'clock Tuesday afternoon. It was raised and brought in by Dale S. Thuren of Wells and the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce presented to him a \$50 war bond as a premium. It was not sold immediately but was left at The First National Bank corner as exhibit No. 1 of the 1946 crop.

There was at least one bale of Lynn county cotton ginned prior to this bale, however, probably more than one. Mr. Thuren brought his bale to the Wells gin and found another man at the gin with a bale. The ginner advised Thuren to bring his bale on to Tahoka, and he did so.

Back of all this is an interesting story.

This was the first bale of cotton Mr. Thuren ever raised in his life. When he planted his crop last spring, that was the first cotton seed he had ever planted. Furthermore, this was the first bale of cotton he ever saw picked, and it was the first he ever saw ginned. In fact, this has been the first year that Thuren has lived in the South except as a soldier. He is a native of Illinois.

When the Japs plunged us into war, Thuren enlisted in the Air Force and was sent to San Antonio for training. After service on two or three other fields, he was sent to the Lubbock Army Air Field. He

### Man Burns To Death As Flaming Gasoline Runs Through Downtown Post

Cecil Wisdom of Lubbock, 36, driver of a gasoline truck, was trapped in the cab and burned to death in Post Saturday night when his truck collided with a car causing the driver to lose control of the truck and it turned over and rolled up into a filling station igniting the gasoline pouring from its tank and threatening destruction of the business section of the town.

A lady who was riding in the truck with him escaped with only minor injuries. The car was being driven east by a Post citizen when it collided with the truck going north on the Post-Lubbock highway. The truck turned over and the gasoline gushed out of holes knocked in the tank and ignited. Streams of flaming gasoline went coursing down the street along the curbs setting fire to two buildings and destroying them and damaging every building on both sides of the street of that block.

A call for help came to the Tahoka fire department, which responded promptly. For a time it seemed that almost the whole town was in danger of destruction.

Funeral services for Wisdom were held in Lubbock Sunday afternoon. The Post man was not seriously injured.

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Just as a minor affair to fit in between more important matters, Tahoka decided recently to have a city election this week to select an alderman to fill the shoes, if possible, of J. L. Heare who recently acquired a home-out in the country and now divides his time between this attractive domicile and his cabin at Eagle Nest, New Mexico, and could therefore serve no longer as a member of the Tahoka city council.

So, the remaining members of the council called an election for Tuesday of this week, but they found that there were no ballots for the job. So, some of them got out among the business men begging one or another to permit his name to go on the ballot. They finally persuaded H. B. McCord to let his name be used. A little later they had the ballots printed and went on their several ways to their farms or to the mountains or somewhere and forgot all about the election.

Everybody else seemed to forget about the election too, except one man—maybe more—but this gentleman telephoned to the News to have an additional name printed on the ballot. He was told to file it with the city secretary in the usual way and she could certify it to the News office to be printed on the ballot, or, if that failed the voters could write in on the ballot any name they desired. No name had been mentioned, and nothing more was heard of the matter in the News office. The ballot with one name thereon was printed.

Came Tuesday, but the voters came not. Only three votes had been cast at mid-afternoon. Less than twenty had been cast at five o'clock or thereabout. Then the writers-in got busy. Voters began to trickle in. Orte gentlemen, it is said, approached Rollin McCord, forgetful that it was the name of Rollin's brother that was printed on the ballot, and impromptu him to go vote for the write-in candidate. That let the cat out of the bag. Rollin soon saw what was brewing and he got busy too. To make a long story short, by seven o'clock 82 votes had been polled, and when the votes were counted, 41 of them were for McCord and 41 for Alton Cain, who, it is said, had not been consulted and knew nothing of the write-in campaign.

So, nobody was elected and nobody can qualify for the position as the matter stands.

The City council will meet in regular session on the first Monday night in September, and something definite may be done about the matter at that time.

Mr. Ayers has been made county agent at large temporarily. He expects to be assigned to definite work about the middle of September. Until that time he will probably remain a resident of Tahoka and will assist in the county agent work in this and in Lubbock county.

Both Mr. Turner and Mr. Ayers have been efficient and popular county agents here. Each has done a good job of it. In fact, nearly all the agents that Lynn county has had have been highly satisfactory.

V. F. Jones was here as agent for several years and did a wonderful job. Judge Smith followed Turner

Dr. Newton, along with other national leaders, made this visit in response to an invitation from the Soviet Government, Soviet Red Cross, and the Red Crescent Society.

His address will doubtless be interesting and illuminating.

In the election Saturday there are four county contests to be settled. The one that is possibly attracting the most attention is the race for sheriff. The candidates are Sam Floyd and Sam Price.

Floyd is serving his second term as sheriff and was the leader in the first primary. His opponent is Sam Price, who served at one time as deputy sheriff of this county and served for two or three years in the U. S. Armed forces in the late World War. The supporters of each candidate are active and the contest is rather spirited.

There is also a contest between David Weathers and Frank McGlaun Jr. for tax assessor-collector. Weathers is a son of the incumbent in that office, Ray Weathers, and he led in the first primary. McGlaun made a remarkable race, however, considering the short time which he had after announcing to make the race. Both of these young men are married, and both did service in the armed forces.

The other races are not really county races. Commissioner Pat Swann of Wilson is opposed by E. J. Cooper of Tahoka. Swann is running for re-election but Cooper led in the first primary.

County Commissioner Lonnie Williams is opposed by Willis Pennington. Williams lives in the Bethel Church community between Draw and O'Donnell. Pennington lives near Tahoka. Pennington led in the first primary.

All four of these candidates are good men and substantial citizens, and Lynn county will have a good commissioners' court whoever is elected.

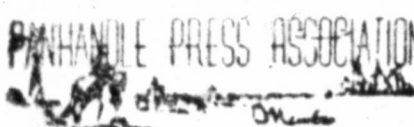

**RAINEY MAKES GALLANT FIGHT**

Although most men under similar circumstances would have given up the fight following the first Primary, Homer P. Rainey has fought on just as if nothing discouraging had happened. He seems to have hope, although to win the election tomorrow, he must overturn Jester's lead of 152,000 votes. That is a big assignment. Especially so since Grover Sellers' supporters and John Lee Smith's supporters in the first Primary were apparently far more hostile to Rainey than to Jester, and there were more than 385,000 of them. Even if Rainey should get all of Harley Sadler's vote of 108,000, he would still have far to go to win.

Rainey's predicament, as we see it, is due chiefly to the foolish notion which so long obsessed him that he could make political capital out of his differences with the board of regents of the University of Texas and could win the governorship on the issue of "academic freedom."

whatever that may be. Throughout his two campaigns, this issue has hung about his neck like a millstone, though apparently he has been trying to shake loose from it for many weeks. Recently he has said as little about this matter of "academic freedom" as possible, and in its place has pressed his charges that his differences with the University regents was due to the fact that they were Texas Regulars or Republicans and the scores of Special Interests and sought his scalp because he was a "liberal." Apparently, these charges have not been very impressive with a majority of the voters, who have regarded them largely as so much campaign thunder.

If Rainey could have forgotten his differences with the University regents two years ago and had never tried to make political capital of these differences, and if he had never mentioned this bugaboo of "academic freedom," but at the proper time had come before the people of Texas on the paramount issue of taxing our natural resources for the benefit of the people of Texas—sulphur and natural gas and gasoline and oil—he doubtless would have been the leading candidate in the first primary with a much better chance to win in the second. In fact, victory would have been almost certain.

Another mistake Rainey has made, as we see it, is that he has been too busy making straw men and knocking them down. We have never seen in print nor heard over the radio nor in private conversation the charge that he is an atheist. Yet he insists that that charge is being made everywhere and then denounces it as a slander concocted by the minions of the special interests.

There have been some grounds for the suspicion that he has had a leaning toward the economic and industrial phases of communism, but very few have gone so far as to charge him as being a communist. A simple refutation of that charge, it seems to us, would be far better than making a great row of it and thereupon basing upon its political enemies as liars and slanderers.

His methods arouse the suspicion in the minds of well-poised, thinking people that in thus raising up and demolishing these straw men he is merely yielding to the temptation to play a little politics.

In spite of these criticisms, however, it should be said in justice to Mr. Rainey that he is an able, scholarly, courageous, and patriotic citizen, and has the interests of the great common people at heart. The ends for which he is striving—better educational institutions, better opportunities for the inferior races among us, better care of the underprivileged and the unfortunate,

better living conditions for the average rural family, better roads and highways; these constitute a worthy program which all of us should favor. His proposals for increase of the taxes on our natural resources are going to appeal more and more to the people as they learn more and more of the facts concerning these matters, and if Mr. Rainey does not win tomorrow—and we do not think he will—then some great campaigner, preferably some distinguished jurist or lawyer who holds and deserves the confidence of the people can and may win on such a proposed program two years hence.

It is true that the great corporations usually oppose the imposition of additional taxes upon them. Yet all of us should understand that in most instances such corporations suffer no loss whatever by the imposition of new or additional taxes. To offset the taxes they can easily raise slightly the prices of the articles they manufacture and collect the extra amount from their customers. It is passed on to the ultimate consumer and he pays it without being conscious of it. None of us should get the idea that we can punish Big Business by taxing it. We can not punish the big oil companies, natural gas companies or sulphur companies by levying a tax on their products. Any tax levied upon them will be passed on to the consumer. Nevertheless, it is good business for the people of Texas to levy and collect a tax upon these natural resources for three-fourths of the sulphur, a major portion of the gasoline, and an enormous percentage of the natural gas produced in Texas are consumed by people living outside our state. For every cent of taxes which the consumers in Texas would be required to pay on these products, the people outside of Texas would pay several cents, amounting in the aggregate to many million dollars annually, which ultimately would go into the state treasury to help build our public schools and colleges, pay our teachers, build our highways, and farm-to-market roads, pay pensions to our old folks and care for our destitute and underprivileged children. Rainey favors these taxes; Jester opposes them. We think that Rainey is right.

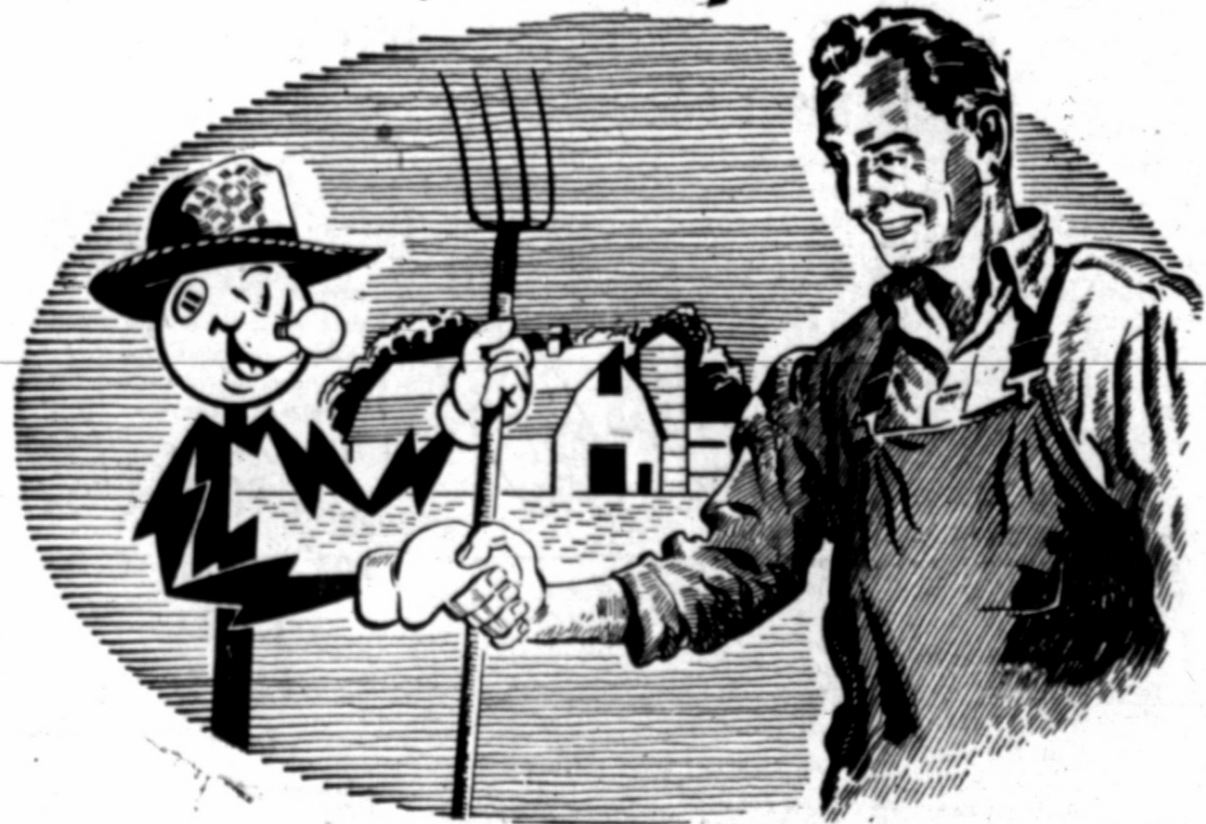
