### New School Term Opens Next Week

#### All of Schools, Except One, Will Open On Monday

Lynn county schools, with one exception, will open for the 1946-1947 session next Monday morning, Sept. 2. The exception is New Home, which will open on the following Monday.

Though school officially starts on Monday in Tahoka, Supt. Vernon Brewer states that buses will not run until Tuesday.

He announces the following revised schedule for registration, with slight changes from the registration plan announced in The News last week:

Football boys and seniors will register Monday afternoon at 1:00 o'clock. Tuesday morning all bus students and Juniors will register at 9 o'clock. Tuesday afternoon at 1 o'clock, all eighth, ninth, and tenth grade students will register. Classes will start Wednesday.

All elementary school students will register Tuesday morning. On arrival at the grade school building, students will report to the gym for room assignments. The first, second, third, and fourth grades will sit in the bleachers on the west side of the gym, and the fifth, sixth and seventh grade students will sit in bleachers on the east side. Principal Urban Brown will fully explain the procedures to follow in registering.

The buses will not run Monday, but will make their initial run on Tuesday morning. At noon the buses will make the return run. There will be no students who ride the buses at school Tuesday afternoon.

The lunch room will open Wednesday. All students will be given an opportunity to buy lunch tickets. Due to an expected large enrollment, no "unders" will be taken by the local schools this year.

The faculty will meet at the High School Monday morning at 9:30 o'clock.

Mr. Brewer reports that the faculty is complete, and everything points toward a most successful term.

Coach Jim Foust is at Fort Stockton with a large group of football boys, giving them some pre-season conditioning for the tough schedule ahead.

#### New Home Will Open Sept. 9th

Final preparations are being made for opening of the 1946-47 school term at New Home schools. The building has been remodeled inside. All the walls have been "kempted" and the woodwork has been refinished. Rest rooms have been installed for the boys and girls.

The New Home school will begin September 9th. The buses will run at 9:00 o'clock and school will begin at 9:30 Monday. There will be a general assembly at 9:30 to 10:00. Then various teachers and pupils will be assigned rooms to register and issue books and assign lessons. When this is done the buses will run probably about 11:00.

Mrs. Hubbard will teach first grade. Mrs. Guy Coleman the second. Mrs. Eva Smith the fifth. Mrs. Anna Jean Corbell the sixth and seventh. Mrs. A. L. Pace the eighth. Mrs. Gains high school English. Mr. Wilmer Smith High School Principal and science teacher. Mrs. Lola Smith, math teacher. Mr. A. L. Pace Superintendent and social science. The third and fourth grades and Home Economics have not been assigned.

#### Most of County Gets Plenty Of Rain; Crops Aided

Rains totaling 3.45 inches in Tahoka covered Lynn county Monday and Tuesday bringing to an end one of the most prolonged drouths in the memory of most residents of this section. Though the rains came too late to assure a big crop this year, they were extremely welcome by all.

Crops of both feed and cotton will be greatly benefited in most areas, though most farmers had not had sufficient moisture during the spring and summer to get all their crops off to a growing start, and on many acres no crops are growing.

At any rate, however, the rains will greatly increase the farm income from this section this fall.

Tahoka received .75 of an inch Monday night and Tuesday morning, while that night and early Wednesday morning a steady down-pour brought another 2.68 inches of water. To the south along the highway to O'Donnell, however, the rain was much lighter. But in many localities, it was much heavier.

Deluges of water fell in the Draw vicinity, some estimating the rains at four or five inches. Approximately four inches was reported by Ivan McWhirter on his place about ten miles west of town. While I. M. Draper at the south edge of town reported 2.50 inches, George Short received one inch Monday night and four inches Wednesday night at his place three miles north. J. W. Lamb reported 4 1/2 at his place near Wayside, A. L. Pace approximately four inches at New Home, and C. O. Head three or four inches at Wilson. Hubert Tankersley reported four inches or more at West Point. Rumors are current that six or seven inches fell in some localities.

Mist was falling Thursday morning and prospects were that the total fall had not been reached.

At any rate, many of the lakes are full, the frogs are croaking, and everyone is smiling.

#### Polio Victim Is Reported Improving

At last reports, Onie Belle Jaquess, 7, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Jaquess, was apparently recovering from an attack of poliomyelitis in the county hospital in Los Angeles, California, which she suffered while she and her parents were on their way from Lubbock to the coast city. The family have long been residents of Tahoka, the child being the grand-daughter of J. W. Jaquess, who has been caretaker of the high school building and premises ever since the building was constructed.

On the next day after Ed and family had left Lubbock on Thursday some three weeks ago for Los Angeles, the child developed fever. On arrival there it was taken to the hospital and its illness was diagnosed as polio. It was said to be a light attack, however.

#### Large Vote Cast Here In Second Primary Election

Sheriff Sam Floyd was returned to office, Frank McGlaun Jr. was elected county assessor and collector, and E. J. Cooper and Willie Pennington were named commissioners from Precincts 1 and 2, respectively, in the second or run-off primary election held last Saturday. Approximately 3,100 votes were cast in the county, a high figure for a second primary election in this county.

According to results tabulated by Judge C. H. Cain, county Democratic chairman, Floyd won over Sam Price 1720 to 1372.

In the race for tax assessor and collector, Frank McGlaun Jr. came from behind to defeat the first primary leader, David Weathers, by 19 votes, in one of the closest county contests here in years. McGlaun received 1549 votes to Weathers' 1530.

E. J. Cooper of Tahoka won over Pat Swann of Wilson, who was running for re-election as commissioner, precinct 1, by a vote of 656 to 517.

Willie Pennington defeated the incumbent, Lonnie Williams, 519 to 374, for commissioner of precinct 2.

In the state races, Lynn county gave Beauford Jester 2103 votes to Homer P. Rainey, 959, in the race for governor; for lieutenant governor, Boyce House, 1665, and Shivers, 1351; for commissioner of agriculture, R. E. McDonald, 1494, to 1379 from the present incumbent, J. E. McDonald; and for judge of the court of criminal appeals, Owens, a West Texan, received 1729 votes to 1069 for the present incumbent, Beauford Jester.

As most good citizens know by now, Jester was elected governor; Shivers, lieutenant governor; J. E. McDonald was returned to the office of commissioner of agriculture; and Beauchamp was re-elected judge of the court of criminal appeals.

#### G.I. School For County Approved

An Agricultural and Industrial School for Returned Veterans for Lynn County has been approved, and instruction will begin either on Sept. 15 or Oct. 1, according to County Superintendent Lenore M. Tunnell, acting co-ordinator.

Approval for the school came the Veterans' Administration and the State Board of Vocational Education. T. L. Leach, representing the former, and Zane Brewer, the latter, were here Wednesday, making arrangements for the school.

Cleveland Littlepage has been selected as teacher for the south half of the county and Floyd Heck for the north half.

Service men are eligible for training in the school under the GI bill. Those interesting in qualifying, must file certified copies of their discharge papers, marriage certificate, birth certificates of children if any, and Form 1956, which may be secured at the local Veterans' Service Office. Those qualifying will receive \$90 per month if married and \$65 per month if single while attending school 12 1/2 hours per week. Agriculture students must have a farm, rent a farm, or have a rental agreement with parents.

G.I.'s interested in qualifying are requested to meet Sept. 6 at 2 p. m. with authorities of the school at the court house.

**CITATION BY PUBLICATION**

The State of Texas To: Vance W. Gwinn, Defendant. Greeting:

You are hereby commanded to appear before the Honorable District Court of Lynn County at the Court House thereof, in Tahoka, Texas, at or before 10 o'clock A. M. of the first Monday next after the expiration of forty-two days from the date of the issuance of this citation, same being the 14th day of October A. D. 1946, then and there to answer Plaintiff's Petition filed in said Court, on the 21st day of August A. D. 1946, in this cause, numbered 1715 on the docket of said court and styled Nelda Ruth Gwinn, Plaintiff, vs. Vance W. Gwinn, Defendant.

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to wit: Plaintiff alleges that she and defendant were married on or about the 22nd day of May, 1945, in Dawson County, Texas, and that she has resided in Lynn County, Texas, for more than twelve months before filing such suit; that soon after said marriage the defendant carried the plaintiff to Seagraves, Texas, where he worked for awhile and lost his job, and was not able to support plaintiff, and he brought her back to her home in Lamesa, Texas. After a few days he took plaintiff to Fort Worth, Texas, and worked a few days, and again lost his job; that he then took the plaintiff to Dumas, Texas, and worked on three different jobs there, and was continuously dragging the plaintiff around from one place to another and never giving her a home or supporting her. That during all of said time the defendant continuously nagged the plaintiff and fussed with her; that he always treated plaintiff in a rude, harsh and dictatorial manner; that all such acts and conduct on the part of the defendant toward plaintiff caused the plaintiff to worry and lose sleep to the extent that such action threatened to permanently, and did injure plaintiff's health; that such excesses and cruel treatment and outrages on the part of the defendant toward plaintiff were such that the plaintiff was forced and compelled to leave the defendant at Dumas, Texas, on the 22nd day of September, 1945, and that since such time plaintiff has never heard from the defendant; he has never contributed in any manner to her support and has left the plaintiff to work and support herself; that during the marriage relations between the plaintiff and the defendant there has never been any children born to the union, as is more fully shown by Plaintiff's Petition on file in this suit.

The officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law, and make due return as the law directs.

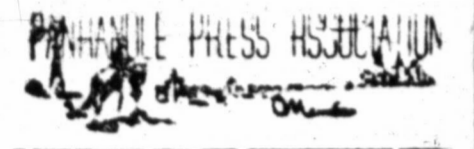

**REV. H. A. NICHOLS WRITES OF BLOY'S CAMP**  
 Rev. H. A. Nichols and family returned early last week from Ft. Davis, where they had spent a week attending the noted Bloys Camp meeting, which is an annual affair. He furnished the News a most interesting description and story of the camp, but along with much other matter it was crowded out last week. It is just as interesting this week, however, as it would have been last week. Here it is.  
 The Bloys Camp meeting used to be called the Cowboys camp meeting.

Anyway, the ranchers sponsor and underwrite the expenses of the meeting—some thirty ranchers. Nothing is allowed to be sold on the camp ground, not even stationery and stamps. They are there in a room, and of course if you use either you would not take it without leaving the amount it cost the association.  
 Some eight large sheds are used for the food to be served; tables and benches where every one can be comfortably seated at meal time. Three hot meals are served daily; even hot biscuits are served three times a day. Beef, mutton, and kid

are served, and other foods. A person can eat at any of the places. No charge is made for any of the eats. On the last Sunday morning, if any one wants to make a contribution, he can do so, and a committee will receive same. The great crowds who attend more than contribute sufficiently to meet all expenses.  
 Last Sunday one shed fed some 350 and on down to some 200. At least 2,000 people were at the meeting Sunday morning.  
 Four denominations sponsor this camp meeting, which began in 1890 and has continued yearly ever since. Presbyterians, Methodists, Baptists, and Christians. Each church has a minister during the meeting to preach. This year they were Dr. Yeokel, Span, White, and Anderson respectively. The type of preaching and teaching—four services daily—was up above par. Each represented his church satisfactorily.

**PIONEERS CELEBRATE GOLDEN WEDDING**  
 Mr. and Mrs. Walter H. May celebrated their Golden Wedding anniversary at their attractive ranch home five miles southeast of Wilson Sunday. Members of the family were in the reception line and there were more than 100 callers during the day, among them a number of the pioneer settlers of this county who are still living.  
 Walter H. May and Kate Brown were married in Hamilton county on August 23, 1896. A few years later they moved to Lynn county and established themselves on the very ranch on which they still live. They have resided on almost the exact same spot of ground for approximately 45 years, although the residence in which they now live was not constructed until 1916. The former home has moved back a short distance to permit the building of the new on the same site.  
 Upon moving to Lynn county, Mr. May went into the ranching business and has been engaged in that business ever since, though a part of his ranch has been converted into farming land. 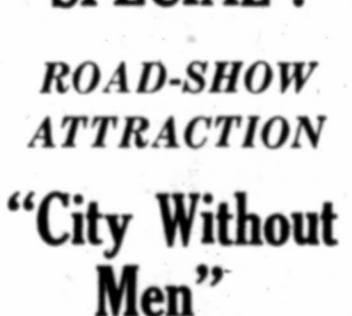

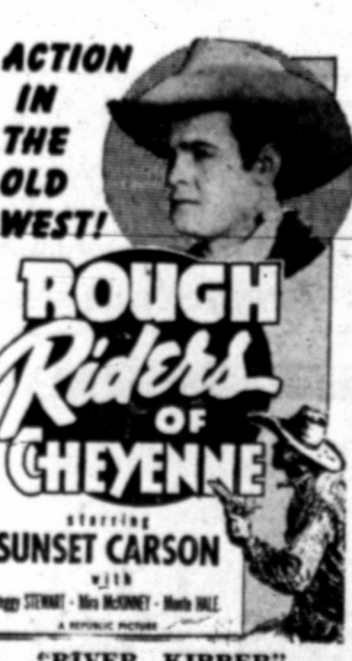

## New Congressmen Elected In Texas

When the next Congress convenes Texas will have four brand-new congressmen in that body as a result of last Saturday's election. Two old war horses, who were forced into run-off campaigns, were also re-elected.

Rep. Joseph J. Mansfield, 85, congressman from the Galveston district, and oldest member of Congress, had as his opponent Louis J. Sulak, state senator and newspaper publisher. With 1600 votes still out Monday morning, Mansfield had a lead of 3,112. The vote then counted was: Mansfield, 29,070; Sulak, 25,958.

Milton H. West, who succeeded John Nance Garner in Congress in 1934, was re-nominated over John T. Ellis Jr. With 600 votes still out, West had 21,982; Ellis, 21,192.

The four new Congressmen-elect are J. Frank Wilson in the Dallas district, Col. Olin Teague in the Corsicana district, Wingate Lucas in the Fort Worth district, and Omar Burleson in the Abilene district.

Wilson defeated Judge Sarah T. Hughes of Dallas by a vote of 36,890 to 22,819 for his lady opponent. Mrs. Hughes was a self-styled liberal. Wilson was an outspoken foe of the CIO-PAC and had the support of the retiring veteran congressman, Hutton W. Summers.

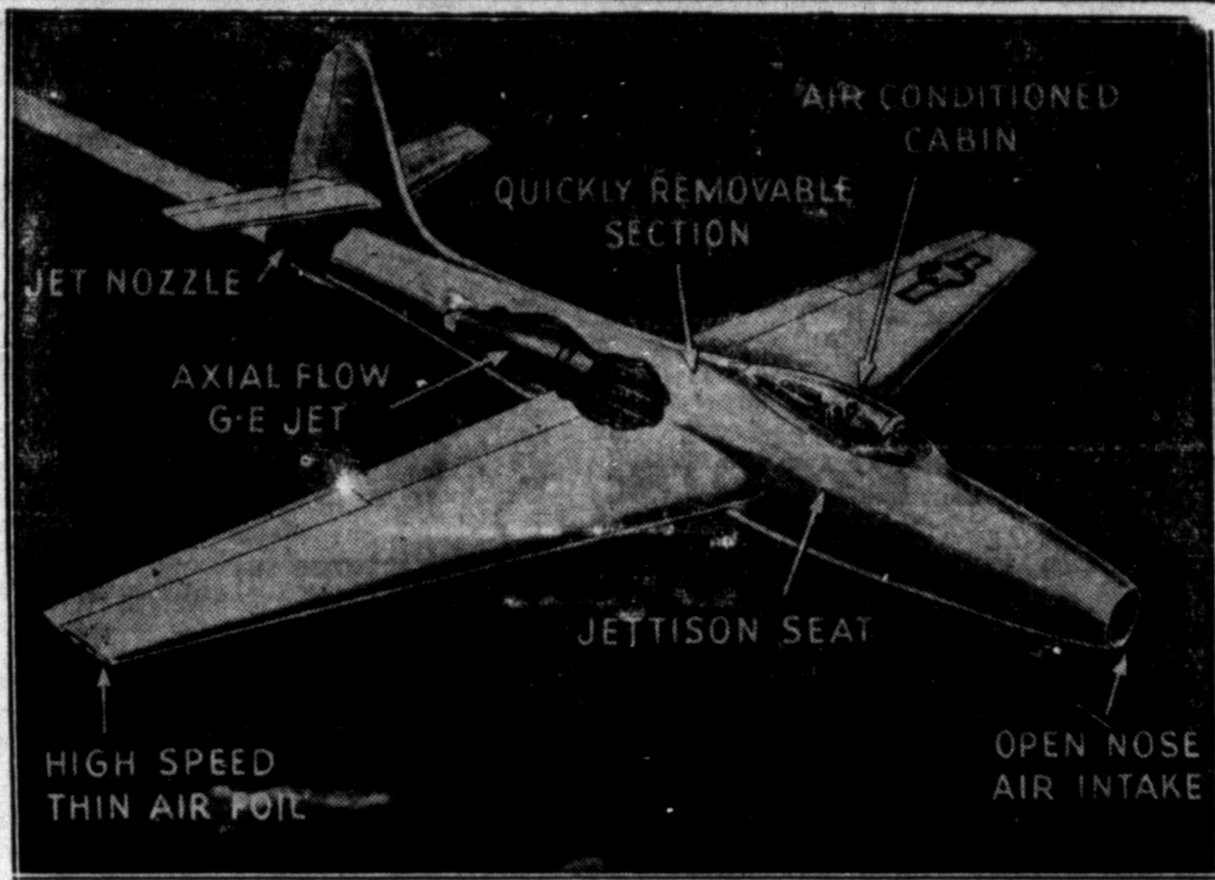
In the Corsicana district, Col. Olin Teague, veteran of both World Wars and wounded in the last one, was elected without an opponent, his run-off competitor having withdrawn soon after the first primary.

In the Fort Worth district, Wingate Lucas, attorney and former assistant secretary to the retiring congressman, Fritz Lanham, won over District Judge Penn Jackson of Cleburne. With practically all

votes in the results were: Lucas 30,298; Jackson, 28,982.

Down here in the Abilene district, Omar Burleson of Anson, former county judge of Jones county, and William W. Blanton of Albany, son of former Congressman Thomas L. Blanton, were the opposing candidates. With about 600 votes out, the returns gave Burleson 28,684 and Blanton 21,943. Burleson will succeed Sam Russell of Stephenville, who voluntarily retired. Burleson was Russell's former secretary.

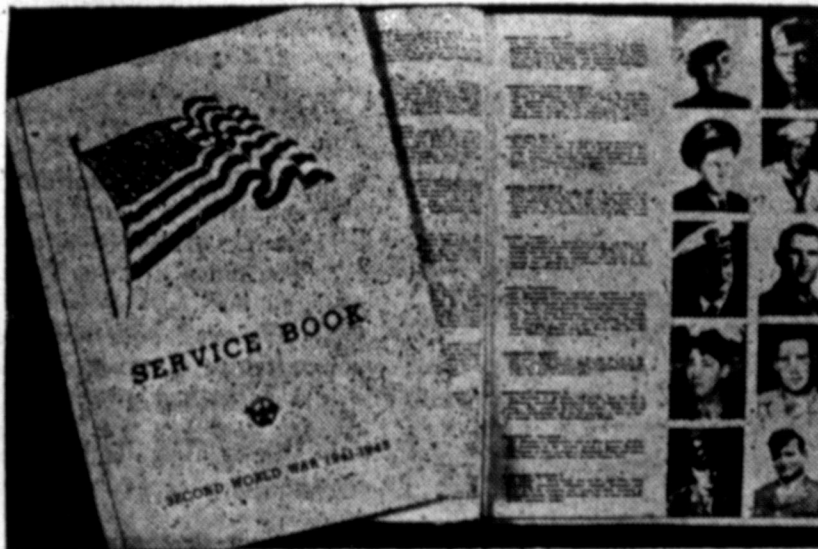

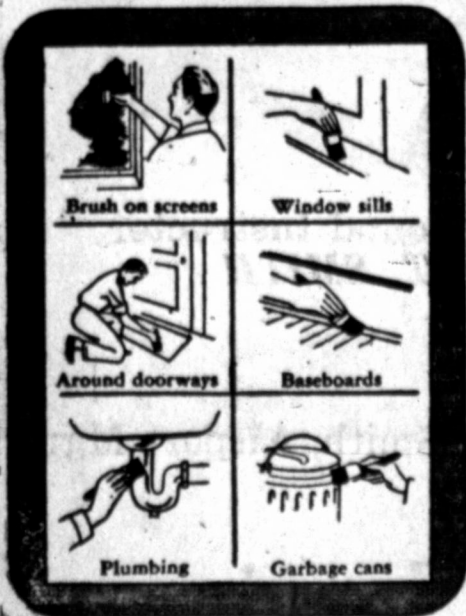
