





New Congressmen Elected In Texas

When the next Congress convenes Texas will have four brand-new congressmen in that body as a result of last Saturday's, election. Two old war horses, who were forced into run-off campaigns, were also re-elected.


Rep. Joseph J. Mansfield, 85, congressman from the Galveston district, and oldest member of Congress, had as his opponent Louis J. Sulak, state senator and newspaper publisher. With 1600 votes still out Monday morning, Manfield had a lead of 3,112. The vote then counted was: Mansfield, 29,070; Sulak, 25,958.

Milton H. West, who succeeded John Nance Garner in Congress in 1934, was re-nominated over John T. Ellis Jr With 600 votes still out, West had 21,982; Ellis, 21,192.

The four new Congressmen-elect are J. Frank Wilson in the Dallas district, Col Olin Teague in the Corsicana district, Wingate Lucas in the Fort Worth district, and Omar Burleson in the Abilene district.
