The election was a special one, called to elect an alderman to fulout the unexpired term of J. L. Heare, who had moved outside the city limits and resigned.

H. B. McCord and Alton Cain were the two opposing candidates. McCord received 314 votes and Cain 178. A total of 496 ballots were delivered to the judge of the election tion officials, two of them were mutilated, one had been marked in an improper manner and could not be counted for either candidate, and a fourth one was presented by a person who was under the voting age, leaving 492 valid votes.

Neither of the two opposing candidates had originally sought the office. A previous election had been held in which there was a tie vote.
