## Local Team Wins First Game 21 to 0

Tahoka Bulldogs gave the fans a pleasant surprise last Friday night by defeating the supposedly much stronger Crosbyton Chiefs 21 to 0 in the first football game of the season for both teams. The largest first game crowd, without a doubt, was present in spite of the light rain which began falling a half hour before game time and continued throughout the game.

Tahoka scored once in the second quarter and twice in the fourth, roundly out-playing the heavier and more experienced Crosby county boys throughout the game.

Tahoka received the kick-off and kicked on the first play. Crosbyton made a first down, but was held for downs on the next series. Neither could gain consistently until in the second quarter the Bulldogs took over with three first downs. Joe Don Minor carrying the ball from the 9 yard line to the goal line, where he fumbled, Harold Crowell recovering the ball for the touchdown, the first of the tackle's career. Minor carried the ball off right tackle for the extra point.

Then, in the fourth quarter, behind superb blocking, Minor got away for a 30-yard touchdown gallop, and James Cleve Bairrington converted. Then, just to make it a cinch, in three plays, after forcing the Chiefs to punt, Minor again went all the way to pay dirt.

As usual, the backfield received much of the fans' attention, but it was fine line-play and excellent blocking that made the victory possible, and fans were elated at the fine job the new coach, Jim Foust, former Littlefield and West Texas State fullback, former assistant at Plainview, and more recently a pilot for the Army Air Forces in India and China, has done in rounding up a team so quickly.

Little Minor at times showed resemblance to his older brothers, and Bairrington looked good. Sargent Munn's stellar blocking was a highlight of the game. Several of the other backfield men looked good. Don Akin was a power in the line, but what looked good to the fans was the fact that Coach Foust had so quickly developed a line, as well as backfield, that worked in harmony to do the job.

Quarterback Bill Simmons, Halfback Bill Blackwood, and Guard Dallas Burrus were the outstanding men for the Chiefs. The visitors played an excellent game, but just did not have the spark and team play to bring victory.

Despite the rain, fumbles were few, Tahoka fumbling twice, and Crosby fumbling four times, Tahoka recovering four. First downs were 10 to 7 with Tahoka leading.

The next home game is with Slaton here Oct. 4. The Bulldogs play at Post tonight in the first conference game, then rest a week before meeting Slaton.

One of Coach Foust's biggest worries is that his young and inexperienced team might get too cocky and over-confident. Every Conference game this year is a real test for any Class A team, and Tahoka is at a disadvantage in most of them.

## Mrs. Ledbetter, 84, Pioneer Dies

Death came at 7:05 o'clock Wednesday morning in the Tahoka Clinic to Mrs. Amanda Emma Ledbetter, 84, widow of the late R. P. Ledbetter, of the Wells community, following a long illness. She had been seriously sick most of this year and several times her condition became critical. Her death was not unexpected.

Funeral services were conducted in the First Baptist Church here by the pastor, Rev. Levi Price, and by her pastor, Rev. Ray Harthcock of the Wells Baptist Church, assisted by Elmo Burkett, Minister of the Church of Christ.

Burial was in the Tahoka Cemetery under the direction of the Stanley Funeral Home.

Surviving are four sons and three daughters. The sons are Roy of Wells, Jesse of McLean, Garland of O'Donnell, and Audy of Wells. The daughters are Mrs. Ethel (F. A.) Trawick of Ford City and Misses Myrtle and Ina of Wells. Roy Ledbetter and the two single daughters resided with their mother in the family home at Wells. Also surviving are fourteen grandchildren. All the children and their families were here for the funeral services.

Mrs. Ledbetter had been a resident of the Wells community in this county since 1916. She was a native of Mississippi, having been born at Forrest in that state on February 7, 1862. Her maiden name was Amanda Emma Ware. While yet a child she came with her parents to Texas. She was married to R. P. Ledbetter in Kaufman county, Texas, on December 15, 1887, and they continued to reside in that county until 1906, when they moved westward, and then further and further westward till they reached Gray county. They came from that county in 1916 to Lynn county, settling in the Wells community, which then consisted almost entirely of ranch land.

Mrs. Ledbetter was converted early in life and united with a Protestant church, later joining the Baptist Church, of which she had been a devoted and faithful member for many years. Her friends were numbered by her acquaintances, and they feel a very distinct personal loss in her passing.

## Mrs. Frank Parris' Father Is Dead

Geo. H. Peebles, 75, of Charleston, West Virginia, father of Mrs. Frank Parris of this city, died on Tuesday night, according to word received here by Mrs. Parris' husband and daughter, Mary Ann. Mr. Peebles was known to a number of local people, he and Mrs. Peebles having visited here on two occasions.

Mrs. Parris was at her father's bedside. The Parris family visited their parents in Charleston earlier this summer, but were called back recently by Mr. Peebles' illness, and Mr. Parris and daughter had just returned from his bedside Tuesday.

Mr. Peebles was a native of Pennsylvania. He lived in Burma for 12 years while in the employ of an oil company.

## Hudman Child Is Given Father

The case of John Hudman vs. Mary Hudman, in which he had filed suit for divorce and for custody of the 11-year-old daughter, Joni Carmen, and in which she had filed a counter suit asking that she be granted a divorce and the custody of the child, was brought to a conclusion Wednesday night of this week.

The Court announced that he would grant a divorce to the plaintiff, John Hudman, and award to him the custody of the child, but the entering of judgment was delayed until the Court could figure out an equitable division of the property.

Defendant's attorneys gave notice of appeal. The trial of the case consumed about three days time last week; proceedings were then suspended until Wednesday of this week on account of the fact that some of the attorneys had cases elsewhere that demanded their attention. The case attracted much attention and many attended the trial.

Although George Maurice lacked two credits of having finished the work in the high school here, he went to McMurry Monday to take the examinations for entry into that institution as a Ministerial student. He is a grandson of Mr. and Mrs. and Mrs. George W. Small, and Mr. and Mrs. D. B. English, widely-known residents of Tahoka.

Services will begin each evening at 8:00 p. m.

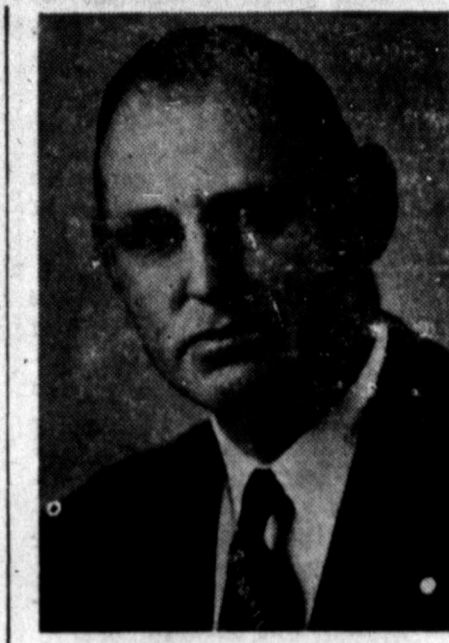

## Bootleggers Are Arrested Here

Two alleged bootleggers were assessed heavy punishment here last week, one other was placed under bond, and still another man was captured here Monday night and a quantity of liquor taken from his car.

On last Saturday Buster Millman entered a plea of guilty to a charge of unlawfully selling whiskey, two complaints having been filed against him in the county court, and upon the evidence the Court assessed his punishment at confinement in the county jail for 90 days and a fine of \$750.00.

On the same day, B. H. Leath of New Home, who was charged with the unlawful sale of liquor in four cases, also entered a plea of guilty and the Court assessed his punishment at a fine of approximately \$560.00 including costs.

A liquor complaint was also filed against Henry Sayles, colored. He made bond and expressed the intention of fighting the case. The case will likely be tried at an early date.

On Monday night, three men drove into town from the south in a car which attracted the attention of an officer by reason of its inability to stay on the right side of the highway. In fact it was pretty busy using both sides of the road. The car was stopped and searched near the railroad tracks, four cases of whiskey and wine taken from it, and the three occupants of the car were taken into custody. All three are said to have been drunk. The driver was charged with the unlawful transportation of intoxicating liquor and also with the offense of driving while intoxicated. The three are said to be residents of Post and to have been coming from Big Spring. Two of them were released without any charges being lodged against them. The third man made bond Tuesday morning.

## Watermelons, Bingo For Legion Meeting

A watermelon cutting and bingo party will be held at the Legion hall next Tuesday night for all Legion and Auxiliary members and all ex-servicemen interested in joining the Legion, according to Clint Walker, commander.

This is the regular social meeting of the Legion, and all who attend are promised a big evening of fun.

W. O. "Slim" Morgan, who has been very seriously ill for several weeks, and has been taking treatment at a Lubbock hospital, is now her father who has been ill. She back home apparently somewhat will remain there for several days improved.

Tahoka had possibly the hottest city election in her history on Tuesday, nearly 500 votes being polled. The election was a special one, called to elect an alderman to fill out the unexpired term of J. L. Heare, who had moved outside the city limits and resigned.

H. B. McCord and Alton Cain were the two opposing candidates. McCord received 314 votes and Cain 178. A total of 496 ballots were delivered to the judge of the election but, according to one of the election officials, two of them were mutilated, one had been marked in an improper manner and could not be counted for either candidate, and a fourth one was presented by a person who was under the voting age, leaving 492 valid votes.

Neither of the two opposing candidates had originally sought the office. A previous election had been held in which there was a tie vote. Ballots had been printed for that election which bore the name of H. B. McCord only. He had consented to permit his name to appear on the ballot after being importuned to do so by members of the city council. Certain citizens of the town undertook later to have Cain's name entered as a candidate but found that under law it was too late. On the afternoon of election day, however, they started a "write-in" campaign, all of which was unknown to Cain himself. When the polls closed, it was found that each of the two men had received 41 votes.

After canvassing the returns, the City Council ordered a new election, and the names of McCord and Cain were each filed in due time. Friends of each candidate got busy, with the result already stated.

The election, however, was not necessarily a test in any way of the popularity of either candidate. Both men are popular and each has many friends. The supporters of McCord felt, however, that the paramount issue was as to whether the record of the city council should be approved or repudiated. A vast majority of the people felt that on the whole the Council had made an excellent record which should not be repudiated. If that had not been an issue in the contest, the result might have been much closer.

## D. I. Gill Buried At Albuquerque

T. L. Gill, agent for the Santa Fe Railway Company here, returned to Tahoka a few days ago after having attended funeral services for his father, Daniel I. Gill, who died on Wednesday of last week at Albuquerque, New Mexico.

For several years, the elder Mr. Gill and family lived here, back in the twenties and many people here remember him and members of the family very kindly.

Funeral services were held last Friday at Palm Chapel in Albuquerque, followed by interment in Fairview Park, that city.

Survivors include the widow, four sons, three daughters, and other relatives. The sons are Thomas L. Gill of Tahoka, Albert I. Gill of Albuquerque, Francis E. of San Angelo, and D. W. of Albuquerque; the daughters, Mrs. Inez Jagers of Fence Lake, New Mexico, Mrs. Velma Wilson of Albuquerque, and Mrs. Media Bell of Fence Lake.

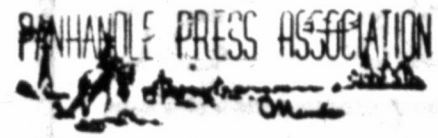

**ELECTION REFORM PROPOSED**

Representative Ed Gossett of Texas announces, says The Southern Weekly, "that he will introduce at the next session of Congress a resolution providing for submission to the States of a proposed amendment to the Constitution modifying the present method of electing the President and Vice-President of the United States. He does not propose to substitute election by popular vote for the electoral college, but under the terms of the amendment, if adopted, each candidate would be credited with a percentage of the electoral vote of each state corresponding to the percentage of the popular vote he received in the State. This would eliminate the possibility of the election of a candidate who received less than a majority of the popular vote, as was the case with Benjamin Harrison in 1888."

The Southern Weekly states that the purpose and effect of the amendment would be to reduce the power of organized minorities in Presidential elections "like the CIO Political Action Committee, the ne-

gry bloc, and similar groups." That it would be so is obvious. In a state nearly equally divided between Republicans and Democrats, for example, a small bloc of organized voters has the power under the present system to swing the election to one candidate or another according to their choice and thus deliver the entire electoral vote of that State to the favorite of such bloc. In a state like New York, for instance, a small bloc of voters, consisting, say, of one-twentieth or one-fiftieth of the whole, can swing the state to one side or the other, thus giving their choice the entire 47 electoral votes of that state.

Under the proposed amendment, one party might get 23 of the electoral votes and the other party 24. If Texas voted four to one Democratic, the Democratic candidate for the Presidency would receive 19 of her electoral votes while the Republican candidate would receive four of them. Under such a system, every vote would count, whether it be cast in Maine or California, or Georgia, or Texas.

That would not only be fair and not only would eliminate the abnormal power of pressure bloc, but it would be vastly advantageous to the South. Under the present system, Northern and Eastern Democrats usually figure that the vote of the Solid South is already in the bag regardless of the platform declarations and regardless of who the nominees are and that hence they can ignore the wishes of the South in both these respects.

But when a vote in Texas or Mississippi will have as much weight in the election of a President as will a vote in New York or Illinois, then will Northern Democrats and national conventions listen again to the voice of the South.

We are for Mr. Gossett's proposed Constitutional amendment and we hope that every Texan in Congress votes for its submission.

Tahoka's public schools already are functioning in fine fashion. We have a right to be proud of them. Other schools in the county and throughout Texas are doing likewise. Texas may stand thirty-eighth scholastically among the states of the union according to standards set up by certain so-called authorities, but we are persuaded that said "authorities" have not taken into consideration certain vital facts in fixing these ratings. We believe that the schools attended by a vast majority of the children of Texas are substantially as good as those of the states north and east and west. They slander us who belittle and malign our schools.

Why should Henry Wallace, Secretary of Commerce, busy with the business of the Secretary of State and give advice as to what attitude that official should take toward Great Britain and Russia respectively in his efforts to reach agreements with those nations respecting international affairs. Why should he go to Madison Square Garden, New York, to address thousands of members and representatives of labor unions and numerous radical elements of that city's population and, lash out viciously at our secretary of State for his "firm" or alleged "get-tough" policy with respect to Russia? The answer is that he has always been sympathetic with the radical elements in this country and made this speech as their champion. He expects to champion their cause in the next Democratic national convention and with their help win the nomination for the Presidency. Our prediction is that the rift between the Wallace radicals and the more conservative elements in the Democratic party will not soon be closed but will widen as the next Presidential campaign approaches. Wallace will be the hero of the Radicals while some other man will doubtless carry the old-time Democratic banner.

Russia wants a "sphere of influence" in eastern Germany and the other countries of middle and eastern Europe, and Henry Wallace echoes "Amen!" If Russia wants a sphere of influence in which she is to be unmolested, let her throw open her own doors to influences emanating from the United States and the other democracies, just as America's doors are open to the palavering of the Russian communists.

Those out-of-state "Professors" and pedagogical guilds who have been placing our University on the "prohibition" list seem to have done a good job of advertising it. More than 15,000 young people, it is stated, have been knocking at her doors for entrance, by far the largest number of any year of her history.

We like the ring of that speech Senator Connally's reported to have made in Paris Monday. It was not only a rebuke to such Russian sympathizers as Henry Wallace but it gave further notice to Stalin and Molotov that America is in no mood to put up with their foolishness.

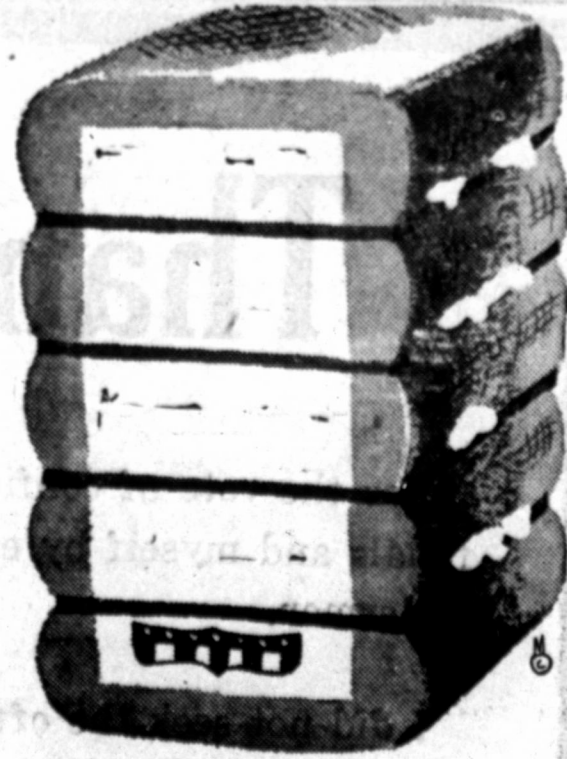

**CONVENTION FAVORS GOOD ROADS AMENDMENT**  
 Charles E. Simons, executive vice-president of the Texas Good Roads Association, expressed gratification today in the State Democratic Convention's resolution recommending adoption of the Good Roads Constitutional Amendment by the people in the November 5 General Election.  
 "This is a great step forward," Simons said, "and it is extremely gratifying that the convention adopted the resolution unanimously."  
 The Good Roads Amendment provides that motor vehicle registration fees and gasoline taxes, other than the one-fourth of the gas tax allocated to the Available School Fund, shall be used for the construction, maintenance and policing of public roadways and for the purchase of necessary rights-of-way.  
 "The development of a system of rural highways and farm-to-market roads is essential to the economic welfare of the state and is vital to the enrichment of the lives of our rural people," the Convention resolution pointed out.  
 Continuing, the resolution stated, "This proposed Constitutional Amendment has the endorsement of those public agencies responsible for the development of our road system."  
 Threats of diverting road money to non-highway purposes in the past caused confusion and uncertainty among road planners, who felt a hesitancy to begin long-range projects without the assurance that funds would be available when necessary.  
 Realizing the existing situation, the convention's resolution declared, "Stability of road finances is necessary to permit road administrators to plan effectively a long-range program of rural road construction, which stability can be guaranteed only through constitutional means."

**LOOKOUT FOR SCARLET FEVER**  
 AUSTIN, Tex., Sept. 19.—The State Department of Health has just issued a warning in regard to scarlet fever, as the number of cases usually increases during the fall months. The majority of deaths from this disease occur from October through February.  
 Scarlet fever is a very contagious and serious disease. Grown people may contract it, but children under 15 years are especially apt to have it, if exposed. It is especially dangerous for children under 5 years, and Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, warns mothers to "not let your children take any chances with scarlet fever. Call the doctor as soon as the first symptoms appear."



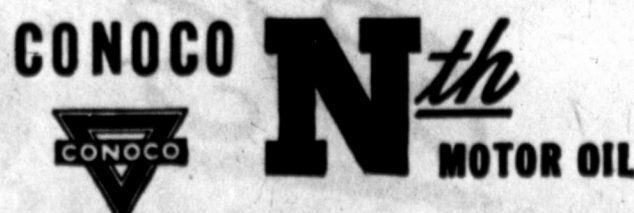

Some of the things we plan to do in the near future are: To build another water reservoir; extend and enlarge the City water mains that all parts of Tahoka will have adequate water; increase the number of pumping wells on our water area; install a booster pump to get the water from the wells through the 2½ mile pipe line to town faster; employ a full time man to assist Mr. Hines, water superintendent, in his many duties and to care for and operate our street maintainer.

These things we feel are of paramount importance. Later, as economic conditions become stable, we plan to pave more streets and make additional improvements as funds are available.

 stated that the body would be shipped back to Tahoka and would arrive some time Saturday by train in Post, accompanied by the present wife of deceased and by his daughter, Mrs. Margaret (Arnold) Houston. Frank was unable to state Wednesday night, whether funeral services here would be held on Saturday or Sunday afternoon. In fact, practically no funeral arrangements had been made.  
 Neither did Frank have much information as to the circumstances of his father's death, since he had received a letter from him just a few days ago, and there was no intimation that he was sick at that time. It is believed that he died suddenly or after only a brief illness, and that death was due chiefly to the natural infirmities of age.  
 Mr. Larkin was long a prominent and influential citizen of Tahoka. Born in Tennessee on June 3, 1868, he came to Texas about the turn of the century, stopping first in Fort Worth. Later he came from that vicinity out to Coleman county and there engaged in teaching. He was married to Miss Beulah B. Lewis in that county on December 15, 1901.  
 It was 1906 when he and wife

landed in Tahoka, and he and two brothers-in-law, A. T. Beard and George Milliken, formed a partnership and opened up a grocery store. The wives of the three men were sisters. Some time later he bought out the interest of his two partners and continued to operate the business alone, broadening its scope as the country settled up. It was some time in the middle thirties when he finally disposed of his business.  
 His wife died on February 21, 1933. He remained here for two or three or four years following that event, and then went to Florida. He married again a few years ago and has been living in Jacksonville. The Lynn County News has been going to his address regularly, but if for any reason he missed two or three papers in succession, he would begin writing at once to find out the trouble. He never ceased to be deeply interested in Tahoka and the people here.  
 During the many years of his residence here, he took a lively interest in every movement for the growth and betterment of the little city. Religiously, he was a member of the Presbyterian Church. The few 74-timers that are left here will sincerely cherish his memory as a genial, likeable, and

progressive citizen of his day and generation.  
 One son and one daughter, Frank Larkin of Tahoka and Mrs. Margaret Houston of Leesburg, Florida, together with 2 grandchildren are his only survivors, aside from his second wife and his collateral kin.

### SOCIAL SECURITY MAN WILL BE HERE OCTOBER 2

Elliott Adams, manager of the Social Security Administration of Lubbock, will be in Tahoka at the U. S. Post Office at 11:00 a. m., Wednesday, October 2, for the purpose of assisting persons who have questions regarding Social Security. Old-Age and Survivors Insurance is a Government insurance system for wage earners in business or industry. As the name implies, it protects both the aged worker and the survivors of young as well as old workers who die. It provides benefits for workers after they reach age 65 and stop work, and benefits for widows and children (in some cases parents) of insured workers, both young and old—who die. This plan makes it possible for a worker through his social security tax to lay away, every pay-day a little bit of his earnings to make provision for the time when he is too old to work or for the support of his dependents in case of his death. Under this plan the money paid to the retired worker or to his survivors is theirs by right, just as any other insurance money would be.
