Only 1298 bales had been ginned here at 3:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon when the News received reports from the local gins. That meant that 611 bales had been ginned since The reports were gathered two weeks ago.



Recent amendments to the Social Security Act provide for Old-Age and Survivors Insurance payments to thousands of formerly ineligible survivors of decharged World War

These amendments, long postponed by Congress, provide p.otection to survivors if:

The veteran dies within three years after discharge:

He had at least 90 days of active service in the armed forces after September 16, 1940; He were not dishonorably discharged, and

The survivors are not eligible for payments from the Veterans Administration. Proceeds from National Service Life Insurance policies are not counted as payments from the Veterans Administration.

The amendment does not provide for payment to live veterans or to their dependents, and it does not provide for benefits to survivors of servicemen who died while on at or before 10 o'clock A. M. of the






