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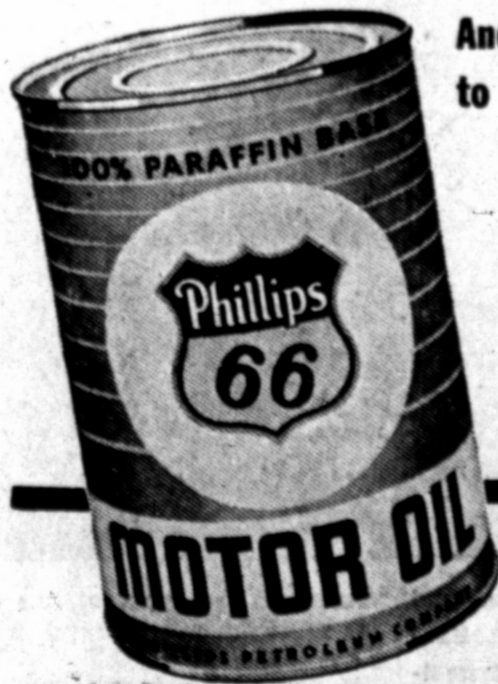

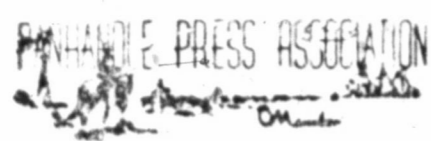

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LET'S APPROVE THE AMENDMENTS

Many voters, when they reach the proposed constitutional amendments that may be printed upon the ballots for approval or rejection, merely say "O well, I don't know anything about that amendment and so I will just vote against it." And so they do. We believe that is error. In such case, a person should not vote either way. He should leave both the "For" and the "Against" clauses on his ballot or scratch both of them out. In either case, his vote would not count either way on that proposition.

Three proposed constitutional amendments will appear on your ballot next Tuesday. We believe that every one of them should be adopted. We have discussed the proposed gasoline tax amendment heretofore, giving some of the reasons why it should be adopted. We take it that practically all of the farmers and most of the town and city residents will vote for it, if they understand it.

In another place in this paper, reasons are given why the people should authorize the legislature to appropriate money to pay for that building that was constructed at John Tarleton Agricultural College several years ago and has never been paid for. It merely provides for the payment of an honest debt.

The second amendment appearing on the ballot would authorize the State and counties to provide a Retirement, Disability, and Death compensation system for state and county employees. The News had a card just a few days ago from a former Tahoka gentleman now employed in one of the state departments asking support of this proposed amendment in which he stated that he is one type of worker that the present social security program does not help. He thinks

that provision should be made whereby all state employees should be assured protection against want in their old age. Few of them receive salaries sufficient for them to lay up anything after their living expenses are paid. His plea seems to have merit, and the News believes that the voters should adopt this amendment and thus make provision for the rainy day that is almost sure to come when the shadows lengthen and old age creeps on and finds these aged workers, who have spent their lives at work for meager salaries, stranded and without jobs. Let's make provision for them before that day comes.

A few days ago we were scanning the pages of a magazine published as the official organ of an organization made up principally of law-enforcement officials—a body of highly respectable and intelligent citizens. It was in fact a high-class publication of its kind and we liked it—that is, until we came to the editorial page. We do not know who wrote the editorials, but about half of them were just jibes and jeers and sneers at Congress, not at any particular congressman but at congress as a body, not at any particular act of Congress except in one instance but at its work generally. We think that editor was doing a distinct disservice to our country. Apparently he was undertaking to belittle and disparage and discredit that body elected by the free choice of the people of this country and set up by the Constitution as the only legislative body which the people have. Congress as an institution is the workmanship of the forefathers who founded this republic. Its personnel at any given time represents the choice of the sovereign people of the states and of the respective congressional districts. Since it would be utterly impossible for a pure democracy to function in the enactment of our laws generally, the only alternative for a free people is representative government. Destroy congress and the only alternative left would be a dictatorship. We can understand why a German Nazi or a Russian communist might seek to undermine the confidence of our people in our congress—in representative government—but we can not understand why any red-blooded American would seek to do it. We think that like Peter of old that editor should go out and weep bitterly.

Elections are to be held all over the United States next Tuesday. On Wednesday morning Democrats will be either surveying the wreckage or singing "Our Flag is still there." Thirty-three governors, 35 United States Senators, and 432 congressmen are to be elected. The Republicans have been waging the most hopeful fight in sixteen years.

The Democrats might be more hopeful if they had had an FDR to give a few of those withering "fire-side chats" during the campaign. But with the voice of this marvelous campaigner hushed in the silence of death, there has been no one during the entire campaign to arouse the fighting spirit of the dispirited Democrats, and the result of the election is anybody's guess.

HOW IT HAPPENED

What was probably the most expensive clerical error in the history of Texas was made in 1937 when a clerk inadvertently omitted from a copy of the general appropriation bill, signed by Governor Allred, a clause authorizing a \$75,000 science building at John Tarleton Agricultural College.

When Governor Allred, who signed the bill under the impression that money for the building was included, learned of the omission he granted a deficiency appropriation of \$75,000 to correct the error, and the A. Farnell Blair General Construction Company, taking the state of Texas on faith, went ahead and constructed the building accepting deficiency warrants as payment.

In 1939 Attorney General Mann ruled that the warrant was illegal and could not be paid by the state except by constitutional amendment. In 1942 an amendment to the constitution making payment possible was defeated by only 1,855 votes.

Therefore, on the state-owned campus of John Tarleton Agricultural College today stands a three-story red brick building which has been paid for by private individuals. For nine years the Blair Construction Company has been holding the sack—a sack of warrants which may be worthless. Two other firms, Martyn Brothers of Dallas, who provided the plumbing and heating and the Empire Electric Company of Fort Worth, which did the electrical work, are also involved for lesser sums.

Because of the current influx of veterans Tarleton's unpaid-for science building is now providing valuable and needed classrooms and laboratories for the college. But the building in its present location is worthless to the men who acting in good faith invested their time, money, and material in it, and unless a majority of Texas voters render a favorable decision on constitutional amendment SJR No. 5 this November, the paradox of a building owned by private citizens but located on state property and used advantageously by the state will continue.

**SECOND AIRPLANE CRASH

The second crash occurring at Grassland last Wednesday when E. L. Short attempted to make a down wind turn at a low altitude. His plane stalled out in the turn and went into a flat spiral and before Mr. Short could regain control the plane hit the ground damaging the plane considerably, but Mr. Short escaped without injury.

There are well over a hundred airplane pilots in and around Tahoka and they have maintained a very excellent record in the past several years. In fact so far as we now there have only been five local pilots to ever have an accident including Mr. Short's crash and only one of them was serious.

Several planes have been wrecked by the wind here and there will

probably be others blown away in time to come, but that is not counted as an airplane crash, because the planes as a rule are staked to the ground and no one anywhere near them when they are blown away.

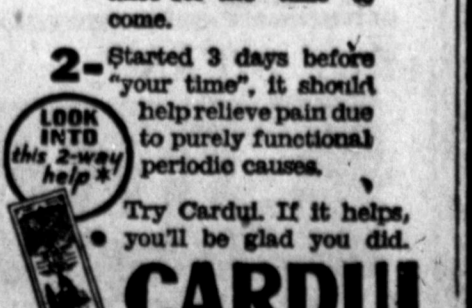

2, 4-D KILLS BULL NETTLE

West Texas farmers whose pastures are overrun with bull nettle might take a tip from R. B. Carraway of Rock Church, Hood County.

Carraway is a strong believer in 2, 4-D as a control against bull nettle. He recently conducted a 2, 4-D field trial on pasture land that was heavily infested with bull nettle. Three weeks later, observing good results, Carraway dug up several of the nettles and found that the roots were "either rotten or soured" to a depth of over 30 inches. Since then he has gone ahead with more extensive 2, 4-D treatment and called in his neighbors to watch the progress.

Hood County Agricultural Agent J. Q. Gallaway reports that 2, 4-D is making a reputation as a bull nettle killer all over the county. Gallaway has conducted field trials on five, widely separated farms in Hood County. The trials were made under varying weather and growing conditions and on every type of soil on which the nettles thrive. In almost all cases he reports the killing effects of the 2, 4-D as "complete".

SOCIAL SECURITY MAN TO BE HERE NOV. 6

Elliott Adams, Manager of the Lubbock office of the Social Security Administration, will be in Tahoka, at the U. S. Post Office at 11:00 a. m. Wednesday, November 6, for the purpose of assisting persons who have questions regarding Social Security.

Recent amendments to the Social Security Act provide for Old-Age and Survivors Insurance payments to thousands of formerly ineligible survivors of discharged World War II Veterans.

These amendments, long postponed by Congress, provide protection to survivors if:

The veteran dies within three years after discharge:

He had at least 90 days of active service in the armed forces after September 16, 1940.

He was not dishonorably discharged, and

The survivors are not eligible for payments from the Veterans Administration. Proceeds from National Service Life Insurance policies are not counted as payments from the Veterans Administration.

The amendment does not provide for payment to live veterans or to their dependents, and it does not provide for benefits to survivors of servicemen who died while on active duty.

Since payment of these benefits is not automatic claims must be filed at the nearest office of the Social Security Administration.

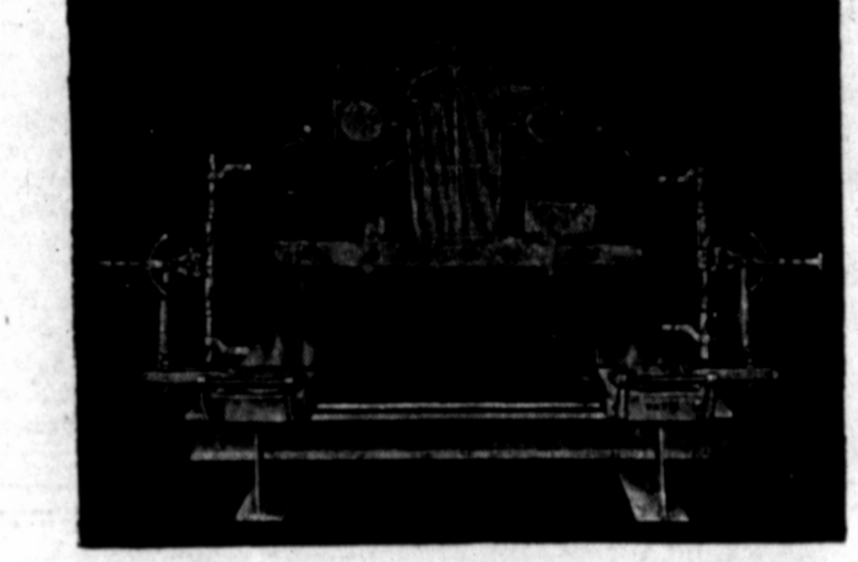

Smith who is now operating the Tahoka Airport informed a representative of the News that he is making a lot of progress in getting the local field designated as a secondary training school for ex-GI's who wish to go on up from private pilots license to commercial license. B. T. said it may not be very much longer before he would have his equipment and his approval from the Government.

Last Sunday Billy Hill gave Mrs. Monte Ray Kellner of Cherry Point, North Carolina her first airplane ride and she was thrilled to death over it. 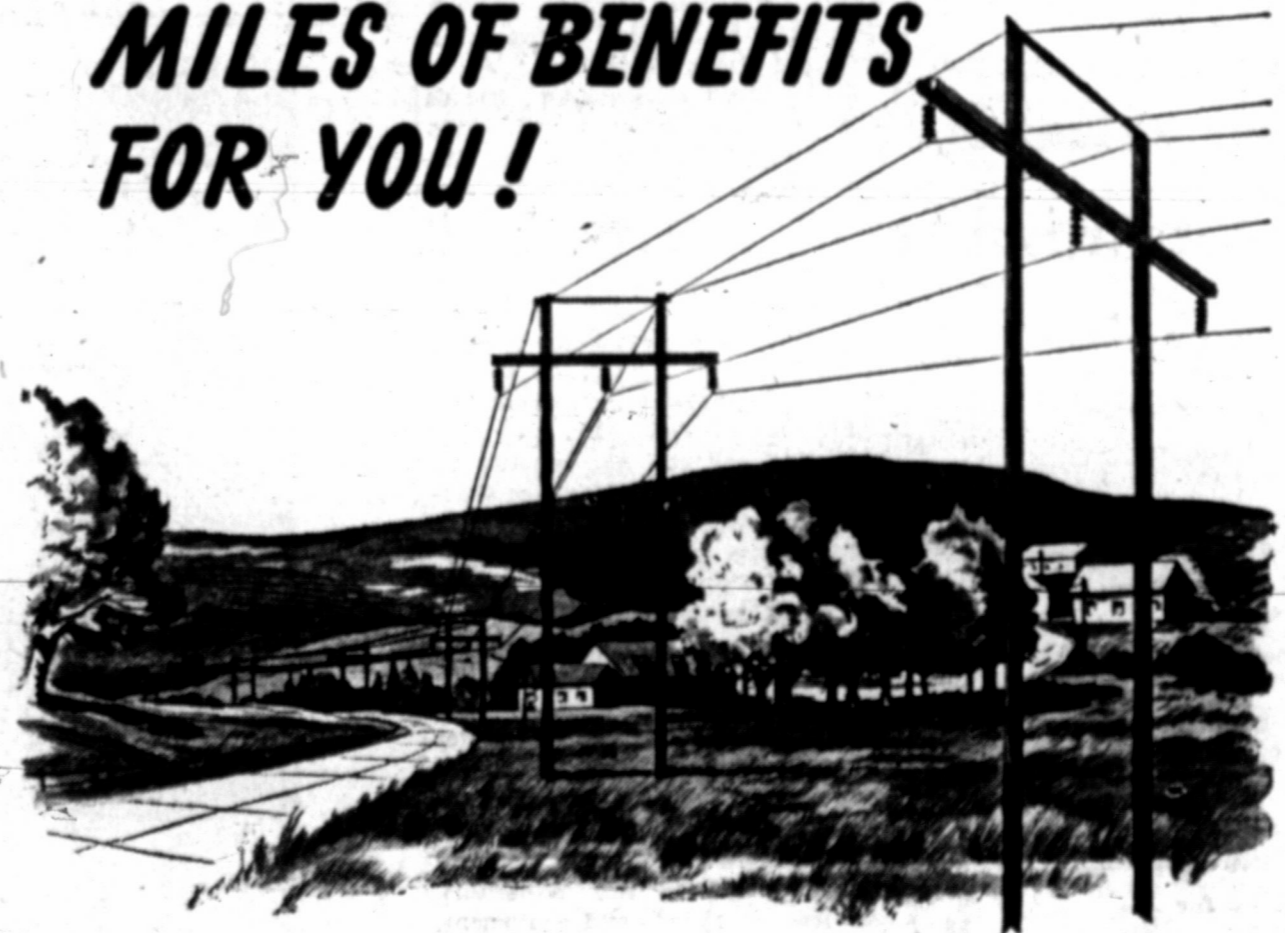

since the condition of his health forced his retirement from active life.

Survivors are one daughter, Mrs. Webb Williams of El Paso, a cousin, George Moss of White Deer, and an aunt, a nephew and a niece residing in California, but none of the out-of-state relatives could be here for the funeral. His father died when Jim was a small boy and his mother died at Gail about the year of 1909 or 1910. He had two brothers that they too have been dead for years. His wife died in Tahoka on October 21, 1926.

He had quite a few relatives by marriage, however. Mrs. Sam Sanford of Tahoka, Mrs. Ross Simpson of Lamesa, and Mrs. J. D. Brown of El Paso were sisters of Mrs. Weatherford, while Henry Hale of Higgins and Horace and Joe Hale of Corpus Christi were her brothers. Tom Hale of Tahoka is a nephew as is Lawrence Sanford also, and Mrs. Virginia Bailey is a niece. Jim Weatherford was born in Tennessee on August 7, 1872. He came with his mother and two brothers to Colorado City in the early 'eighties. He attended school there and worked on a ranch for a few years before the family came up into Borden county, where he also began working on a ranch. By the time he was 21 years old he was an old hand at the cow-punching business. He made more than one trip "up the trail" and learned all the ins and outs of cattle business. Those were the days of the "Old West," about which so many

thrilling tales, false and true, have been written by the literary "big game" of the era.

On February 12, 1902, at the age of 29, Jim Weatherford was married at Gail to Miss Lucy Hale. Of this union only one child was born, Inez Weatherford, now Mrs. Webb Williams.

A few years after his marriage, Jim's friends encouraged him to make the race for county and district clerk of Borden County, and he won. Gail had been a prosperous town, and the opening of court always brought a big crowd, ranchmen and cowboys coming from all over the South Plains. But the man with the plow and the hoe was then beginning to dig his dug-out or build his shack here and there over the plains, and soon new towns that had sprung up, like Tahoka, were growing and the crowds that erstwhile had been flocking to Gail on court days were shrinking up. So, in 1915, during the second, or possibly it was his third term, as county and district clerk, Jim resigned his office and came up to the Lofton Ranch at Tahoka Lake and took charge of that. He remained there as boss until 1921, when he and family moved into Tahoka and he accepted a position here as city secretary.

In 1924 he ran for tax assessor of Lynn county and was elected, being re-elected in 1926 and again in 1928. During this time he had also been serving as secretary, assessor and collector for the school board of the Tahoka Independent School district, and after he gave up the county office he continued to serve for several years as secretary of the school board. In the latter years of his life he served as a night watchman for a time in the industrial district of Tahoka and also took another turn at serving the Tahoka school board, but his failing health finally made his retirement imperative. He retired and went to the home of his daughter at Sierra Blanca in March of last year, and in June following they moved to El Paso.

Mr. Weatherford had a great host of friends here, as he had also at Gail. Pall bearers for the funeral were: Walter Slaton, Jim Burleson, L. C. Haney, Oscar Roberts, G. M. Stewart, all of Tahoka, and Dave Dorward of Gail. Honorary pall bearers included W. O. Thomas, Claude Wells, Frank P. Hill, Raymond Weathers, Skip Taylor, George Small, Walter Anglin, E. I. Hill, and Pink Mitchell.

Out-of-town relatives and friends here for the funeral included Mr. and Mrs. Webb Williams and Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Brown of El Paso; George Moss and family of White Deer, H. H. Hale and wife of Higgins, Ross Simpson and family of Lamesa; John Williams, Mr. and Mrs. Sterling Williams, Miss Oleta Mitchell, all of Snyder; Dave Dorward, Will Williams, and Miss Ora Smoot, all of Gail; Mr. and Mrs. Pink Mitchell and Mr. Jenkins, all of Lubbock; Mr. and Mrs. Lee Wooten of Slaton; and possibly others whose names we failed to get.

Jim Weatherford had a warm heart and he loved his friends. In turn, they loved, honored, and respected him. Peace to his ashes.
