## Andrews Coming Tonight; O'Donnell Is Winner 19-12

Tahoka Bulldogs close out their home football schedule tonight on Foust Field here when they meet the powerful Andrews team at 8:00 o'clock.

The game has been designated as Homecoming game for ex-students of the local school, and a large crowd is expected.

Andrews is in second place in district 6-A competition, ranking next to the champions Seminole, and are rated several touchdowns better than the Bulldogs—at least, the Bulldog team of the past few games. However, Coach Jim Foust's boys are capable of playing good football, and if Coach can get the boys in the notion, the game tonight may be far closer than comparative scores might indicate.

Last Friday night, a crippled and over-confident Tahoka team went down in defeat 19 to 12 to their old rivals, the scrappy O'Donnell Eagles. Hard luck and lack of a desire of the Tahoka boys to block and tackle also had a part in the loss by Tahoka to a team that was running plays with near-perfection to win their one big game of the season.

Though the Bulldogs rolled up 14 first downs to the Eagles 7, the local team lost the ball five times on fumbles, two of which directly was the set-up for O'Donnell scores.

O'Donnell scored early in the first quarter after recovering a Tahoka fumble, Larren Davis going over the double-stripe. Late in the same quarter, Munn got away on a 40-yard run to put the ball on the O'Donnell 11. Two plays later Bairrington went right through the line for 14 yards and a TD to tie the score at 6 and 6.

During the second quarter, the visitors recovered another fumble on the 5-yard line, and Davis proceeded to score again.

During the third quarter, Tahoka put on an offensive that carried the ball from their 30 to a touchdown, with some nice ball carrying by Minor, Munn, and Bairrington, the latter going over from the one yard line on a fourth-down attempt. That tied the score at 12-12.

But, a few plays later Davis went 16 yards for another touchdown and then kicked goal to make the score 19-12.

The fourth quarter was scoreless, but as the game ended, Botkin was threatening the visitors with three complete passes in row, but the sun ending the game stopped the drive. (Continued on Back Page)

Three Tahoka men returned last week from a successful hunting expedition to the north, bringing home evidence of their hunting skill.

He was accompanied by his brother-in-law, Clarence Burgett of Galveston, and the two hunted pheasants near Gregory, North Dakota, for five days in company with Bill McNeely and Terry Thompson, and each of the four got their limit of 25 birds each. Bill and Terry flew up to South Dakota in Bill's plane, and on their return trip got stranded by the snow storm in Nebraska for a few days.

Smith and Burgett, however, had gone on to Miles City, Montana, and spent five days hunting deer 100 miles west of that city in the mountains. Their party killed five deer, Hap getting two of them, each a big 8-point buck. After having been "drawn," one of the bucks weighed 172 pounds and the other 170 pounds.

Though it was very cold up in South Dakota and Montana, Hap says it was one of the most enjoyable trips he ever made. The people up in those countries are very hospitable and accommodating, he says, and everyone seemed to enjoy having hunting guests from Texas.

## Methodist Pastors Get Assignments; New Pastor Here

After a fruitful service of four years and five months here, Rev. H. A. Nichols was assigned to the church at Stratford for the next Conference year by Bishop C. C. Sealeman last Sunday and the former Stratford pastor, Rev. J. W. Rosenburg, was assigned to the Tahoka Church. Rev. and Mrs. Nichols left Thursday morning for Stratford, and Rev. and Mrs. Rosenburg and little son came to Tahoka the same day. The new pastor will fill the pulpit here Sunday, of course.

Stratford is the county seat of Sherman county, which is one of the tier of counties lying farthest north in the Panhandle and bordering on the narrow Oklahoma Panhandle, not far this side of Kansas, erred him peculiarly fitted.

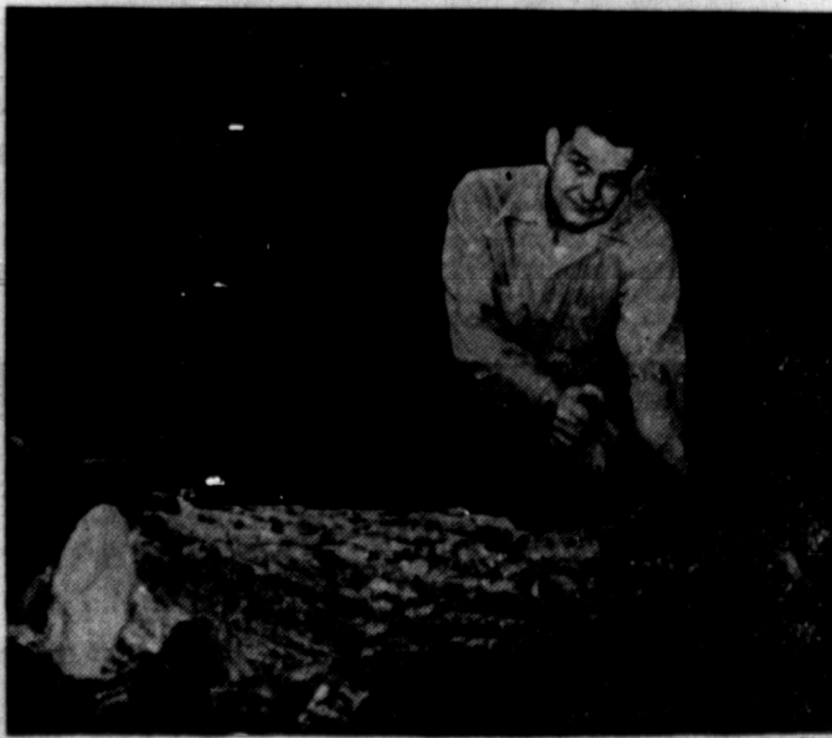
## H. D. COUNCIL WILL MEET SATURDAY

## Light Vote Here In Two Elections; Issues Carry

A total of 887 votes were cast in Lynn county for United States Senator and for governor in the general election held on Tuesday, November 5. About the same number of votes were cast for other state, district, and county officers and a somewhat fewer number on the three constitutional amendments which had been submitted.

For United States Senator, Tom Connally received 858 votes and Murray C. Sells, Republican, 29 votes.

For Governor, Beauford Jester received 867 votes and Eugene Nott Jr., Republican, 30 votes.

For Congress, 19th district George Mahon received 817 votes and Mohler D. Temple, Republican, 27 votes.

Amendment No. 1, providing for the payment of a building constructed at John Tarleton College several years ago; For 533, against, 210.

Amendment No. 2, providing for Social Security benefits for state and county employees; For 315, against 390.

Amendment No. 3, proposing a constitutional provision in conformity with the present statutory law making disposition of the state gasoline tax; For 559, against 168.

At the election held on Thursday, November 7, instead of Tuesday, November 5, through a clerical error contained in the submission resolution, only 361 votes were cast in Lynn county. This amendment provided for the issuance of state bonds, with the proceeds of which the State might purchase lands to be re-sold in tracts of various sizes to former service men on long-time credit to be converted by them into farm and ranch homes. The vote for the amendment was 334, against, 27.

All the above amendments were adopted by the people of the state by enormous majorities.

All state and county Democratic nominees in Texas were elected except in Gillespie county, where an Independent ticket was elected.

## 12 Miles of Road Project Complete

The commissioners court was in session Tuesday. In addition to routine matters they canvassed the returns of the recent elections, the general election held on November 5 and the special election on November 7. The returns of these elections are published in part elsewhere in this paper.

The court also took preliminary steps for the purchase of some road machinery, but no further bids for paving contracts were called for at this time.

For the benefit of people living in other parts of the county, it might be stated that road construction has been proceeding in the Draw-Grassland precinct about as rapidly as weather conditions would permit.

Caliche has been laid on the farm-to-market road extending south from the Tahoka-Post highway to a point south of Draw, and the hot top has been placed on this caliche base for a distance of five or six miles, completing the road that far.

Also the five-mile arm extending east from the Draw project four miles to a point one mile south of Grassland and thence north one mile to Grassland has been completed.

The hot top will be placed on the remainder of this project as weather conditions will permit, and it is hoped that the weather will offer little interference. Draw and Redview will soon be connected with Tahoka by paved highways. Grassland is already thus connected with Tahoka but not by a direct route. The State, it will be remembered, is to pave the sector of road extending north from Grassland and connecting with the Tahoka-Post highway at Central Church.

## Travis Davis Is Improving Rapidly

D. C. Davis reported Tuesday that his son Travis, who has been under treatment in the Lubbock Memorial Hospital for several weeks, was much improved and it was expected that he would be able to come home early next week.

Having been taken to the hospital in a critical condition, it was four weeks before he was able to stand an operation. On Friday night, November 1, appendectomy was performed and it was found that the appendix had ruptured probably before he reached the hospital. Since the operation he has been steadily improving and it is now felt that he is entirely out of danger.

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### Tahoka Dog "Eyes" For Amarillo Lady

Here is a story about a blind woman and a Tahoka dog that became her "seeing eye" and thus enabled her to walk safely out upon the streets of her home city of Amarillo. The story, written by Cal Brumley, appeared in the Amarillo Globe Thursday, October 31, and it is confirmed in all its essential features by Reginald Frazier of Tahoka, who furnished the dog. The dog originally belonged to a young man out in the Midway community, and after it was returned to him following its service in a hospital, the young man gave the dog to Reginald.

But here is the story as told by Mr. Brumley.

Tex is a dream walking just like walking was a dream for Mrs. Joe Meacham, 1408 Lincoln, until she found Tex.

Tex is a seeing eye dog. Mrs. Meacham has been blind more than 20 years and until a few days ago had not taken a walk down the street without another person along

since she lost her sight. Mrs. Meacham had not tried to get a seeing eye dog until about three months ago when she sent in her application. The foundation answered, saying she was too old to qualify. They hesitate to let a woman more than 45 years old have one of their dogs.

After receiving the answer, Mrs. Meacham had about resigned herself to a life of immobility. That is until Tex came along.

A few weeks ago Mr. and Mrs. Meacham were in Crosbyton for a visit, and on the way back to Amarillo they stopped in Ralls at a filling station. The attendant noticed her condition and asked if she would like to have a dog.

Her answer was yes in less time than it takes a 6-year-old to say yes to an ice cream cone.

It turned out the attendant knew a man who had a dog trained for seeing eye work, but he didn't know the man's name, only where he lived.

The owner of the dog lived in Tahoka, but a search appeared futile. For awhile it looked as if her

dream of strolling again was only a bursted bubble. As a last chance they got in touch with the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce to enlist their aid. A Mr. Thompson said he would find the dog in three days. And he did.

On the third day he telephoned Mrs. Meacham and told her the dog's owner was R. L. Frazier. They contacted Mr. Frazier and he volunteered to give Mrs. Meacham the dog.

Tex, the dog, is an Army veteran. His serial number, tattooed on the inside of his left hind leg, is 5-V-77. Mrs. Meacham does not know where he served while in the Army, but it was in a hospital doing work with blind veterans.

He was volunteered by Mr. Frazier when just a puppy and when the emergency was over the Army returned the dog to his original owner.

Mr. Frazier loved the dog but hated to see Tex's valuable training go to waste. When Mrs. Meacham asked for Tex, Mr. Frazier leaped at the chance for the dog to go into useful service again.

Routine tasks are part of Tex's work. He helps her take out the trash, gather the laundry from the line in the back yard, and in fact, do nearly everything except cook. And Mrs. Meacham cooks, even though she has been blind 20 years.

Mrs. Meacham said, "Tex is too wonderful to go through life being just a dog."

She has had the dog only a week but already the streets in her part of town are becoming familiar to her and her seeing eye.

Yesterday she went to the grocery store for the first time in 20 years, made her purchases and found her way home.

Tex and his mistress are becoming inseparable. He is a large dog standing on clean-cut and well-set legs. His ears have a set of alertness, and his eyes sparkle with a glow of intelligence.

When out of harness, his personality is one of complete friendliness except to cats, and other dogs who invade his domain.

But in his working clothes, which consist of a shoulder harness and hand handle for his mistress, he is completely indifferent to anything except guarding Mrs. Meacham. Already he is devoted to her.

Like all seemingly perfect specimens, Tex has one failing. Nearly every day Mrs. Meacham goes to a cafe six blocks from home and there Tex reveals his frailty. He just has to have a bar of candy to satisfy his sweet tooth.

Miss Gwynelle Davis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Borden Davis, underwent appendectomy in the West Texas Hospital, Lubbock, last Sunday and is reported to be recovering satisfactorily.

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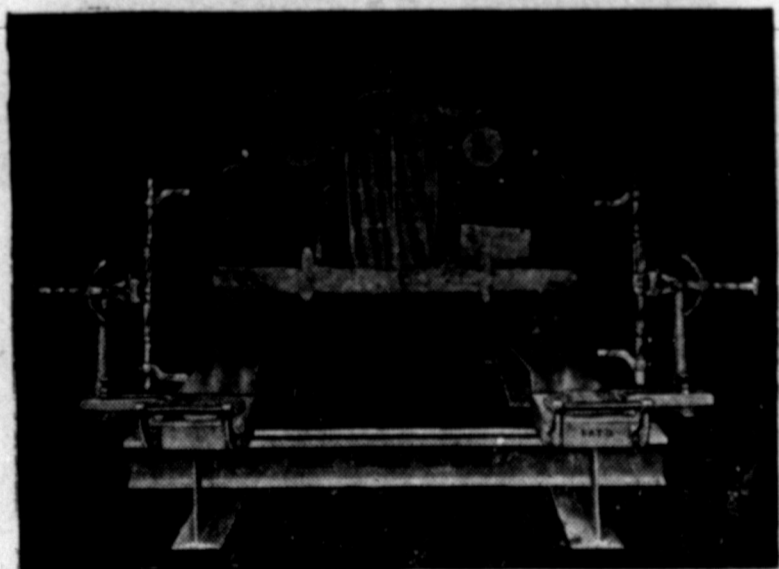

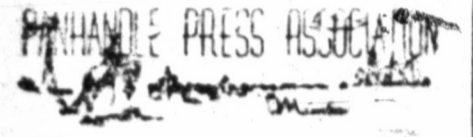

President Truman promptly put a quietus on the demand that was gaining some force to the effect that he should resign. Many people thought that it was a good suggestion but we do not share that opinion. He was not elected for a term of two years but for a term of four years. Our Constitution was constructed on the theory that our government should be one of checks and balances. For that reason two legislative houses were provided, so that any proposed measure would be required to run the gauntlet in both houses before it could become a law. And as a further safeguard against hasty and unwise legislation, a President was provided for with the veto power. There may be some objections to such a system but it has proven fairly satisfactory for 150 years and it has never been seriously proposed heretofore that the system be abrogated because of a sudden change in the complexion of Congress. Besides, there may be another change of sentiment during the next two years back away from the Republican viewpoint after the Republicans have fully

showed their hand just as there has been a swing in the other direction during the past two years. As for responsibility, the Republicans can be held responsible for their legislative record just as definitely as might be if a Republican were in the Executive Mansion, and likewise the Democratic President can be held responsible for his approval or disapproval of the measures sent up to him by a Republican Congress. In fact, we are not sure but that the different attitudes of the two parties can be more clearly reflected in this way than they could be if a single party controlled all of the departments of government. Let Truman stay in there and do the job he was elected to do, with full responsibility for his record.

Our much envied neighbor, Jack Stricklin of the Terry County Herald, is back home and on the job again, and his fracks can be seen all over the editorial page of his paper. Jack has been running around a lot here lately. He has kin-folks in Texas all the way from Coahoma to Cleburne and he just has to make frequent trips to see them. Then he still has a lot of kin-folks back in old Tennessee—we don't know exactly where but some section where we suspect they still "Shoot the Buffalo," and "Measure My Love to Show You," and possibly make a little liquid corn. So Jack makes almost annual trips back there, one just recently, and from his accounts of it he enjoyed it greatly. He had hardly got seated in his luxurious editorial chair when he thought of some kin-folks who had wandered off to California and so the Wanderlust bit him again. Off he went, and he was writing back to his paper about the wonders he was seeing, and about the people who seemed really glad to see him. Last week he came back and complained in his paper that work had piled up so that he had no time to rest from his vacation. But he did find time to peck out a few editorials jabbing Frank Doble and a few University students in the ribs for their radicalism, biffing the CIO-PAC, and feeling sorry for HST. Anyway, we always miss Jack's editorials when he is gone. They are almost as refreshing as taking a trip for yourself.

Pity the Republicans, exultant though they now be. They have inherited the troublesome Union Labor problem that has so plagued the Democrats the past few years. If they deal with this problem in accordance with their past professed convictions, legislate in favor of the open shop and clamp down on the strikers, they run the risk of alienating most of the Union-Labor vote, and according to the Unions they now have about 15 million members. That is a terrific number of votes to flout. On the other hand, if they court the favor of the Labor vote, coddle the strikers, and frown upon the open shop, they will place themselves in the same position before the rest of the country that the Democrats have occupied heretofore and will thus invite criticism from the employers and the business interests of the country. A lot of trouble lies ahead of the Republican party, and it will probably split into two or more factions as it undertakes to meet this issue. The leaders will be wise indeed if they please the business interests on the one side and the Murphys and the Lewises and the Greens on the other.

Many of us had foreseen that the Democratic majority in Congress was going to be greatly reduced and possibly wiped out entirely in the lower house but few of us down here in Texas were prepared for the reversal in the Senate. We believe that the Fort Worth Star-Telegram summed up the situation completely last Friday morning in the following single paragraph: "The people have shown clearly they are against peacetime controls, regimentation, bureaucracy, pro-labor policies, federal extravagance, and deficit spending. They turned to the party which opposed these policies. They revolted against vacillation and evasion toward needed legislation to curb abuses of previous reforms—and against inept administration. They affirmed their belief in freedom and the rights of the individual." But it is doubtful that the Republican party will be able to perform as well as it has been able to point out the failures and the mistakes of the Democrats. There will be serious divisions before long in the ranks of the Republicans.

There is some comfort to be derived from the recent Republican victory at the polls. That is that in turning out the Democrats they will also turn out every communist and near communist found in some government position.

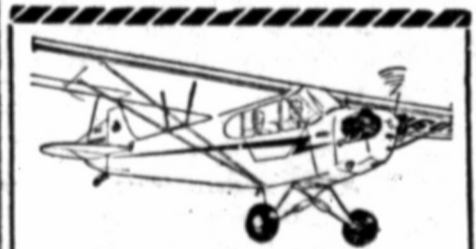
Of a public official who fancied himself as a speaker, a rival said: "He never opens his mouth but what he subtracts from the sum total of human knowledge."

structor at the field, giving flight and ground instructions.  
Mr. McNeely states that the GI Training Program will continue as usual and that there will be plenty of planes including the Super Cruiser used for this program.  
There have been two planes that have been damaged recently, but they will be back on the program as soon as they are repaired.  
Mrs. McNeely will resume her job as office clerk and bookkeeper at the airport office.  
Plans are now being made to have the Airfield designated as a secondary Training School and to be qualified for giving instructions to Commercial Licenses. Heavier aircraft will be used in this program with radio equipment and lighted runways for night-flying.  
There are approximately 45 ex-GI's now training under the GI Bill of Rights at this school and it is expected that many more will be enrolled in this program in the near future.  
According to a report released by the Piper Aircraft Corporation, there are more licensed and student pilots in Tahoka than there is in any other town in the United States of the same population.

They met the car just outside the southern limits of Tahoka, where they turned around and gave chase. They overtook the Ford and its occupants some twelve miles north of town. They were captured and brought back to the sheriff's office.

Investigation revealed that two of the youths were soldiers stationed at El Paso, 17 and 18 years of age respectively, and their two girl companions were each 19. The third youth was just a hitch-hiker. They had taken a Plymouth car in El Paso and coming through Carlsbad had abandoned it just beyond Hobbs, having run out of gasoline. They picked up the Ford car in Hobbs. They were held for theft. But this week charges were filed against them in the Federal court in Lubbock for transporting a stolen car across a state line. The two boys and one of the girls were from the North, one from Philadelphia one from Detroit, and one from some other city.

**DRUNKEN DRIVER CAUSES NEAR-SERIOUS ACCIDENT**

As two men in a Pontiac car were hastening south on the Tahoka-Lamesa highway near O'Donnell one day early this week to attend a funeral at Midland, they were met by a Chevrolet occupied by two men coming north. Suddenly the driver of the Chevrolet decided to turn around on the highway and did so just in front of the Pontiac, at too short a distance from it to avoid being struck. Both cars were badly damaged but luckily none of the occupants was seriously hurt.

The Pontiac car was turned over, however, and the two occupants were buried beneath the flowers intended for another's funeral. The two occupants of the Chevrolet were Terry county citizens. A complaint for drunken driving and for unlawfully transporting liquor was filed against one of them and a complaint for drunkenness against the other.

**New Process Utilizes Cull Potatoes for Stock Food**

A major sanitary and economic problem of America's potato-growing regions has been solved by development of a new process for utilizing inferior potatoes. The new method, which converts cull potatoes into a valuable stock food at a cost of less than a cent a pound, will go a long way toward eliminating unsightly and unsanitary piles of rotten and low-grade potatoes now dumped wherever potatoes are graded and shipped, it was said.

At the same time, the report points out, the development, which in effect creates a new potato industry, will give the farmer a market for inferior grades which he could not otherwise sell, and will add to the nation's supply of stock food.

The process, while in a sense revolutionary, is very simple, involving only three major steps, it was stated. First, the water in the potato is freed by passing the whole raw potato through a hammer mill, thus rupturing the cell walls and releasing the water. Second, the major portion of the water eliminated is removed mechanically by passing the pulp from the hammer mill through a continuous rotary press. Third, the resulting presscake is passed through a continuous rotary dryer in direct contact with hot furnace gases. The product is a dry, granular material which makes excellent stock food without further processing.

**Faroe Islands Give Way Before Thundering Sea**

In the Faroe Islands, life is a never-ending battle against nature. Thundering seas pound the black basalt cliffs of this island cluster in the bleak North Atlantic waters between Norway and Iceland. Slowly the land is giving way before the assault of breakers that throw up mountains of spray, tossed inland for miles by the winds.

Islanders show visitors one needle rock, scarcely adequate for a mountain goat, which once supported a thousand sheep. Out in the lonely moors, farm houses are half buried in the ground and are rimmed by stone walls to ward off the tempestuous winds.

The Faroes, believed to have formed part of a great land mass in prehistoric times, today are broken up into a score of islands covering only 540 square miles. There, about 25,000 people follow a Spartan regime in which fishing and sheep raising provide the chief elements of a meager living. Boys swim like seals and climb like Alpine experts.

**Pickle-Making**

In making pickles the volume of brine should equal one-half the volume of material to be fermented. Keep the pickles completely covered with brine by means of a plate and weight. The brine will be weakened by the water extracted from the cucumbers and must be kept at its original strength by adding salt. After 24 hours, add about one pound of salt for every 10 pounds of cucumbers; add one-fourth pound of salt each week thereafter for about five weeks, or until the cucumbers are cured. The mixture should be kept at about 88 degrees F. And a word of advice: Use salt that has not been processed to prevent caking. Soft water should be used if possible; otherwise add a small quantity of vinegar to neutralize the alkalinity. Almost anything may be used as a weight except objects composed of limestone or iron, which blacken pickles.

**Clarifying Fat**

To clarify solid fats, such as pork, beef and lamb, pour hot water over the fat, using one cup of water to each cup of fat. Heat slowly for 10 minutes, stirring well. Strain through a clean cloth and chill. When the layer of fat is hard, pour off the water and break off any dark material that may be clinging to the under side of the fat. For clarifying oils or poultry fats that are very soft at room temperature, add thin slices of raw potato and cook slowly over low heat for about 20 minutes. Strain the fat through a clean cloth and cool. Clarified fat will not keep indefinitely. Store in a covered container in a cool, dark place.

Gist, Plaintiff, vs. James William Gist, Defendant.

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to wit: Same is a suit for divorce, Plaintiff alleging that she is now and has been for more than twelve months prior to exhibiting the petition an actual bona fide inhabitant of the State of Texas and has resided in Lynn County, Texas, for more than six months next preceding the filing of this suit and that the Defendant is a non-resident of the State of Texas, and that Plaintiff believes that he resides in either the State of Oregon or the State of Washington. That plaintiff and Defendant were married at Reno, Nevada, on or about October 26, 1941, and that they lived together as husband and wife until on or about December 5, 1941, at which time they separated. That Plaintiff was forced to separate from the Defendant because the Defendant was addicted to drinking intoxicating liquors to excess and that he became drunk daily and on such occasions was constantly quarreling with Plaintiff and cursing and abusing her until his conduct became so unbearable that Plaintiff was forced to leave him. That Plaintiff has had the care, custody and support of said child without any contribution from the Defendant and that she is able and willing to have such care, custody and education of said child and is the proper person therefor and the Defendant is not the proper person therefor. That there is no community property of said marriage; as is more fully shown by Plaintiff's Petition on file in this suit.

The officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law, and make due return as the law directs.

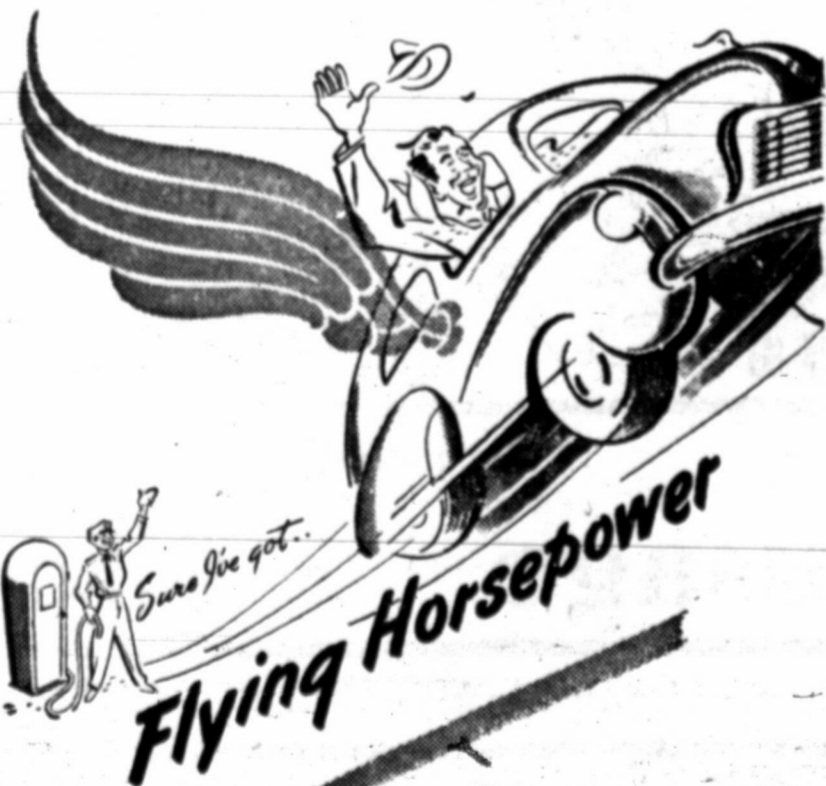

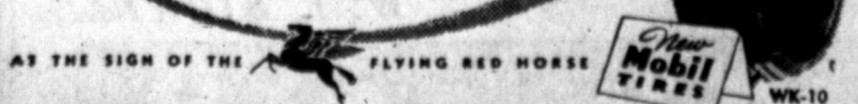
