## Many Violators Of Liquor Laws Land In Jail

Bootleggers have found the selling a bit rough in Tahoka the past few days and nights and some of them are now getting their meals at the county boarding house on the third floor of the courthouse.

Also, the ante-room of Sheriff Sam Floyd's office is beginning to look like a liquor store, but he has nothing for sale—just for evidence. Sam's first customer was a Negro, who claimed Mineral Wells as his home but was returning from Hobbs, New Mexico, on important business. Night Watchman Ernest Martin suspected the nature of his business and proceeded to take a look. He found two cases of whiskey in the brunette's car. He took the Negro to jail and the whiskey to the sheriff's office. The Negro's name is in keeping with his color. It is Brown, Joe. E.

On Monday night Martin ran onto two white men who had too much liquor, both under the belt and in the car. He took two cases of whiskey from the car and escorted the two men to jail. He filed complaints for drunken driving and for unlawfully transporting liquor against one of them and a complaint for drunkenness against the other. The complaints bear the names of Lynn Wright and J. E. Dillon.

On Tuesday afternoon Sheriff Floyd himself detected a Negro who aroused his suspicions, and upon making a little investigation he found the colored gent's car was well loaded. He took from it five cases of gin and four cases of whiskey, and marched the driver to jail, where he still pines for the shadow of the pines that grow down around Longview, which the Negro claims as his home. He was on his way from Hobbs, New Mexico, however, when he drove into Tahoka.

The presence of so many liquor peddlers in Tahoka the past few days would indicate that they may have a good many customers here. The sheriff and his force and the night watchman are to be commended for their vigilance in running down these law violators, and it is to be hoped that they will increase their vigilance. We have no room for bootleggers in Tahoka except he county jail.

## Former Citizen Is ABC Governor

Former Senator G. H. Nelson of Lubbock was accorded quite an honor last Saturday when he was unanimously elected governor of the sixth district of the American Business Club for the ensuing year at its annual meeting in Amarillo. The sixth district comprises the states of Texas and Oklahoma.

Nelson resided in Tahoka for quite a number of years, serving here first as superintendent of the Tahoka public schools. Later he was admitted to the bar and began the practice of law here. Then he was elected and served as county attorney district attorney of the 106th judicial district, and finally as state senator. After moving to Lubbock he made a creditable but unsuccessful race for lieutenant governor, being defeated by the Hon. Coke R. Stevenson. But he has achieved considerable success as a lawyer and a business man and at the same time has been very active in political, civic, and religious circles. This latest honor is one which most of his friends here had not suspected was in store for him.

## Santa Fe Plans Aircraft Service

The Santa Fe Railway and its wholly-owned affiliate, Santa Fe Skyway, are filing applications with the Civil Aeronautics Board in Washington, D. C. for permanent certificates of public convenience and necessity to operate civil aircraft service in scheduled operations for the transportation of property and United States mail over routes within the general area of the Company's lines of railroad, Fred G. Gurley, Santa Fe's President, announced this week.

Authority is sought to operate over two or more such routes in combination and to operate non-stop service between any two or more points along the routes as traffic requirements indicate. Presently Santa Fe Skyway is engaged in carriage of freight by air as a contract carrier. It owns four Douglas DC-4 and three Douglas DC-3 aircraft. Additional aircraft as needed will be acquired.

Pointing out the Santa Fe has been handling mail since 1871, Mr. Gurley said that the Santa Fe seeks to place itself in a position to handle property and mail by either rail or air, as will best serve the needs of its customers, the Post Office Department and the communities involved.

Air route No. 1 which the Santa Fe proposes to operate extends from Chicago via Kansas City, Wichita, Amarillo, Albuquerque, and Phoenix to Los Angeles, and thence via Bakersfield and Stockton to San Francisco.

Air route No. 2 would extend from Kansas City, via Wichita, Oklahoma City, Fort Worth-Dallas, Temple, and Houston to Galveston.

Air route No. 3, which would serve the South Plains, would extend from Amarillo, via Lubbock, Sweetwater, San Angelo, Brownwood, Temple, and Houston to Galveston.

Air transportation of mail and freight by the railroads is now just in its infancy. It will probably reach enormous proportions within a few years.

Dates for the campaign were given as November 18 through December 7, but Saturday, November 23, has been designated by Governor Coke R. Stevenson as Sister Kenny Day in Texas.

## New Home School Gets Movie Machine

They will try to secure high-quality educational pictures which will be valuable in teaching.

## Rev. R. T. Breedlove Retires Ministry

The Lynn County News and the daily press erred last week in stating that Rev. R. T. Breedlove was assigned by Bishop Selcman to the Methodist Church at Hale Center, according to W. E. Suddarth, who was present.

Mr. Suddarth says that he had been listed to go to Hale Center but that he made application to be retired from the ministry on account of the condition of his health as shown by a physician's certificate and that his application was granted.

## Tahoka Will Be In New School League District

The latter part of last week, Mr. Vernon Brewer, brought a letter that he had received from the State Athletic Director informing him that a tentative plan of revising the interscholastic districts in this part of the state is in progress.

Mr. S. P. Johnson, Superintendent of the O'Donnell schools, proposed to the State Athletic Director of Interscholastic League that the schools be re-classified so that those in agricultural areas should play schools in agricultural areas.

The State executive committee has tentatively classified the schools of regions 1 and 2 as follows:

District 4-A: Crosbyton, Floydada, Lockney, Matador, Paducah, Ralls, and Spur.

District 5-A: Levelland, Littlefield, Morton, Muleshoe, Olton and Sudan.

District 6-A: O'Donnell, Post, Slaton, Tahoka, Abernathy and Petersburg.

District 7-A: Andrews, Dumas, City, Seagraves, Seminole, Sundown, Kermit, McCamey, Monahans, Pecos, and Wink.

According to the letter received by Mr. Vernon Brewer, "this advance notice was given so schools could make plans for the coming year."

## T. S. T. A. Makes School Survey

The Texas State Teachers Association has just completed a survey among city and county school superintendents to determine the condition in the public schools of Texas. Replies were received from 1,038 superintendents representing 35,374 teaching positions or about 78% of the total in Texas. The turnover in the teacher personnel in the public schools for this year is the greatest in our history; 9,272 teachers or more than 25% were new in their job when school opened this fall.

Of the teachers included in the survey, 5,730 were listed with sub-standard qualifications, which represents 1 out of each 6 in the state. Superintendents reporting stated that they had in their school systems 2,157 classes with a student enrollment of 40 or more. The national standard for enrollment is 27 students in high school classes and 30 in elementary classes. This overcrowded condition has resulted from the shortage of teachers, and in many instances, a lack of adequate classrooms.

Today, Texas needs at least 9,000 qualified teachers to relieve our overcrowded classrooms, to add to the curriculum many subjects that have been eliminated during the war years, and to replace sub-standard personnel.

Superintendent Charles M. Rogers of Amarillo, retiring president of the Texas State Teachers Association commented that: "Today if our public schools could employ immediately all of the students in the colleges and universities of Texas that are preparing to be teachers, we would not relieve our great shortage. I am sure that we do not have in our Texas institutions of higher learning 9,000 people today who are preparing to become teachers. We must raise salaries in Texas high enough to encourage those now in college to enter teaching as their chosen profession. I cannot see any other solution to the problem."

## Two Prisoners Saw Way Out Of Lynn County Jail

Two prisoners, a Mexican and a Negro, escaped from the Lynn county jail Monday night and thus far have not been recaptured. They effected their escape by sawing through a locking bar on a run-around door.

The Mexican, Pedro Davilla, a 35-year-old man, was an AWOL soldier whom the sheriff had picked up here and was holding for the military authorities. His recapture is the worry chiefly of the Army. The Negro, Eunice McMillan, 32, was in jail on a charge of having burglarized the residence of James Applewhite several weeks ago. While he has not yet been located, Sheriff Sam Floyd is confident that he will get the colored gentleman in due course of time.

How the couple procured the saw with which they effected their escape has not been definitely determined.

The jail break was discovered when Night Watchman Ernest Martin took a couple of drunks to jail.

Another Mexican and another Negro charged with misdemeanor offenses declined to leave with the other two. The Mexican had been permitted to leave the jail Friday on his honor to attend funeral services for his dead infant in Lubbock, and was doubtless showing his gratitude to the officers for this kindness by refusing to go out with the others Monday night.

## Dry Weather Is Aid To Harvest Of County Crops

Farmers are getting busy this week harvesting one of the largest grain crops the county has ever produced. The yield per acre is not as large as it has been many years in the past but the acreage is doubtless the largest in the history of the county. Jim Burselon estimates that the average yield will be from 800 pounds to a half-ton per acre. However, due to the fact that much of the feed was very late and some of it had not fully matured when the first killing frost came on November 11, much of the crop is being and will be harvested with binders. A part of this will be fed to livestock in the bundles and a part of it will be threshed. Some of it will be ground up into silage.

Nevertheless, a large part of the crop will be harvested and is being harvested by combines and will be handled by the elevators, of which there are five in Tahoka, some in O'Donnell, and two in Wilson. One grain dealer estimated that a million pounds of grain daily are already being handled here. His bin became filled one day this week and he had to stop buying for a time.

The price being paid for grain, however, has dropped considerably since the opening of the season. A month ago it was worth about \$2.25 per 100 pounds. In the past two weeks it has dropped from \$2.50 to the current price of \$1.75 per 100 lbs. It is believed, however, that there will not be much further drop if it will stabilize around \$1.75, the crop will bring an enormous amount of money to the farmers of Lynn county.

The cotton crop, of course, is exceedingly light as compared with normal years. The acreage was greatly limited by the prolonged drought and the yield is exceedingly variable in different localities. There are fields in which the yield per acre is good, while in adjoining fields perhaps it is very light.

Reports gathered by the News Wednesday afternoon showed that up to that time 2,006 bales had been ginned in Tahoka. The official report gathered for the Bureau of the Census by Special Agent James G. Womack showed, however, that 10,025 bales had been ginned in Lynn county prior to November 1. Doubtless the gin at Wells has ginned more cotton this season than any other gin in the county, for the crop in that vicinity has been fairly good, much better than in any other comparable area.

The price of cotton has been so varied and unstable that any price published today might be ridiculous tomorrow.

The price of seed, however, has been the sensation of the season, now being \$100 per ton. It is going to cost catfishers a mint of money to feed those old cows a few weeks if it becomes necessary to feed them cotton seed meal, and beef doubtless is going to remain pretty high for some time. It's going to cost the farmer another big jag of money to plant a cotton crop next year too, if he has to buy his seed.

Little wheat pastures all over the country are certainly going to be the salvation of many a man who raises cows as well as cattle on his little farm. The wheat thus far is fine.

## Clayton Contracts To Build Houses For Postex Mills

The Clayton Lumber Company of Tahoka signed a contract with the Postex Cotton Mills of Post to build thirty houses for that plant's employees.

Information was not readily available as to when the construction of these houses would begin.

**CITATION BY PUBLICATION The State Of Texas**

TO: James William Gist Defendant, Greeting:

You are hereby commanded to appear before the Honorable 106th District Court of Lynn County at the Court House thereof, in Tahoka, Texas, at or before 10 o'clock A. M. of the first Monday next after the expiration of forty-two days from the date of the issuance of this citation, same being the 30th day of December A. D. 1946, then and there to answer Plaintiff's Petition filed in said Court, on the 8th day of April A. D. 1946, in this cause, numbered 1692 on the docket of said court and styled Helen B. Gist, Plaintiff, vs. James William Gist, Defendant.

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to wit: Same is a suit for divorce, Plaintiff alleging that she is now and has been for more than twelve months prior to exhibiting the petition an actual bona fide inhabitant of the State of Texas and has resided in Lynn County, Texas, for more than six months next preceding the filing of this suit and that the Defendant is a non-resident of the State of Texas and that Plaintiff believes that he resides in either the State of Oregon or the State of Washington. That plaintiff and Defendant were married at Reno, Nevada, on or about October 25, 1941, and that they lived together as husband and wife until on or about December 5, 1941, at which time they separated. That Plaintiff was forced to separate from the Defendant because the Defendant was addicted to drinking intoxicating liquors to excess and that he became drunk daily and on such occasions was constantly quarreling with Plaintiff and cursing and abusing her until his conduct became so unbearable that Plaintiff was forced to leave him. That thereafter, sometime in December, 1946, after Defendant's discharge from the Armed Forces, Defendant came through Tahoka, Texas, and in order to attempt a reconciliation between them, Plaintiff lived with him for about one month, but thereafter the Defendant left the State of Texas and has not returned to Plaintiff. That there was born of said marriage one child, a boy, by the name of Jimmy Duane Gist. That Plaintiff has had the care, custody and support of said child without any contribution from the Defendant and that she is able and willing to have such care, custody and education of said child and is the proper person therefor and the Defendant is not the proper person therefor. That

there is no community property of said marriage, as is more fully shown by Plaintiff's Petition on file in this suit.

The officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law, and make due return as the law directs.

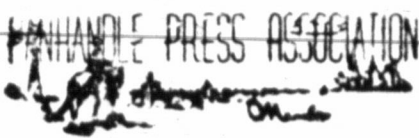

A few years ago a few aspiring young Democrats, who apparently were dissatisfied with the way just plain Democrats were running affairs in Texas, met and formed an organization. These "young" Democrats were all supposed to be young, but no age limit was fixed, so far as we know, and every old spavined political war horse in the state that thought himself still able to tote a saddle tried to slip into the organization. Some of them did, but the body managed to confine its membership chiefly to politicians not over forty or forty-five years of age. Personally, the editor of the News has always wondered what difference it should make if a man were 46 or just 39 years of age provided he were a real Democrat. We have wondered if age should be any sort of test of a man's democracy. And, we have been trying to find out just what the "young" Democrats stand for in contradistinction

to the "elder statesmen" in the party. We haven't found out yet. They don't seem to know themselves. They met down at Houston last week and proceeded to split. One faction bolted and held a convention of its own. The dominant faction before closing proceeded to resolute, but only after a hot debate, a few of its members disagreeing vociferously and hotly with the majority. The resolutions passed by the dominant faction, who called themselves "liberals," asserted labor's right to collective bargaining and the closed shop, and the main spokesman espoused the cause of the CIO and the AFL. That "closed shop" business is what gets the goat of real Democrats. It is the incorrigible child of the Lewises and the Murphys and the Greens and is the boy who has been staging all these strikes throughout the country. And so, we find that the "liberal" young Democrats of Texas are in cahoots strictly with the Lewis-Murphy-Green cohorts of the North and East.

We think that Tom Connally or somebody should whisper, or maybe shout it, into Comrade Molotov's ear that the best way for a nation to invite suspicion and distrust; an ill will is to hang an iron curtain around it and not permit anybody to peep in. The Man of Galilee observed nearly two thousand years ago that men love darkness because their deeds are evil. Men are never ashamed of good conduct. Furthermore, a man is not ordinarily afraid that the ordinary storms of life will blow down his house if it is a structure of stone and steel built on a rock. Yes, we think that Uncle Sam and John Bull and Lady France and all the other brothers and sisters in the family of nations should just keep on challenging Russia to tear down her iron curtains, throw open her doors, visit around a bit among the neighbors, and invite the neighbors to walk in on them at any time. That is the way to be neighborly, inspire confidence, and assure peace.

Recently we heard a man testify in court that he had spent a large part of a certain night in a place which the jury found to be a gambling house. He testified that he himself did some gambling in the place. He also testified that he was drinking that night. That same man, according to his testimony, at the time of the trial was operating a liquor store in a town not far away. We think we remember that those high in authority in this country told the people, when they were advocating the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment, that only men of high repute and of good moral character would be granted licenses to operate liquor stores if the people would vote to repeal the Eighteenth Amendment. We knew then that no confidence was to be placed in such promises but we and numerous others of like faith were unable to stem the wet tide. Now we invite the people just to take an honest look at that motley bunch of men who are operating our liquor stores. Oh yeah! some of them wear the air of respectability.

There are some things we have never been able to understand. One is why men will work with fanatical fury to enthroned some dictator or group of dictators—Nazi, Fascist, or Communistic—which always means the death of their own political and personal rights. Another is why intelligent and even scholarly people can be hoodwinked into believing that some mere human being, because he wears the title of Pope, can open or close the doors of Heaven to his soul. Still another is why some highly intelligent people believe that one must physically observe some mere ceremony in order to gain entrance for the soul into the pearly gates. Still another is why any religionist will seek entrance into the convention or conference of any religious group or body that he constantly criticizes and condemns and will then insist on making an ass of himself when such admission is refused. We guess we are plumb dumb for we can not understand these things.

**Tests Support Theory of Gaseous Origin of Earth**

Recent chemical experiments at high temperature in laboratories on the Berkeley campus of the University of California have thrown new light on the probable origin of the earth and planets. Dr. Wendell Latimer, dean of the college of chemistry, says that a study of chemical reactions at about 5,000 degrees absolute, the temperature of the sun's surface and probable temperature at which the earth and planets were formed, supports the theory that these bodies originated as hot gaseous masses thrown off from the sun.

He says that the common origin of the earth and planets can be reconciled with their present differences by considering their different sizes and gravitational fields and the variations in rate of cooling with size. In a large planet, such as Jupiter, Dr. Latimer says the heavy gravitational field prevented the escape of light elements from the hot mass. Jupiter cooled to a composition similar to the sun, he explains, except that at lower temperatures the light elements have formed gaseous compounds such as ammonia and methane which do not exist in the sun.

In the earth, and small planets, Dr. Latimer continues, the molecules of light elements had sufficient energy to escape from the lower gravitational field. Thus, he says, the earth cooled to a greater average density than any of the planets. At a later stage in the earth's history, he adds, a chemical reaction took place which produced water and air.

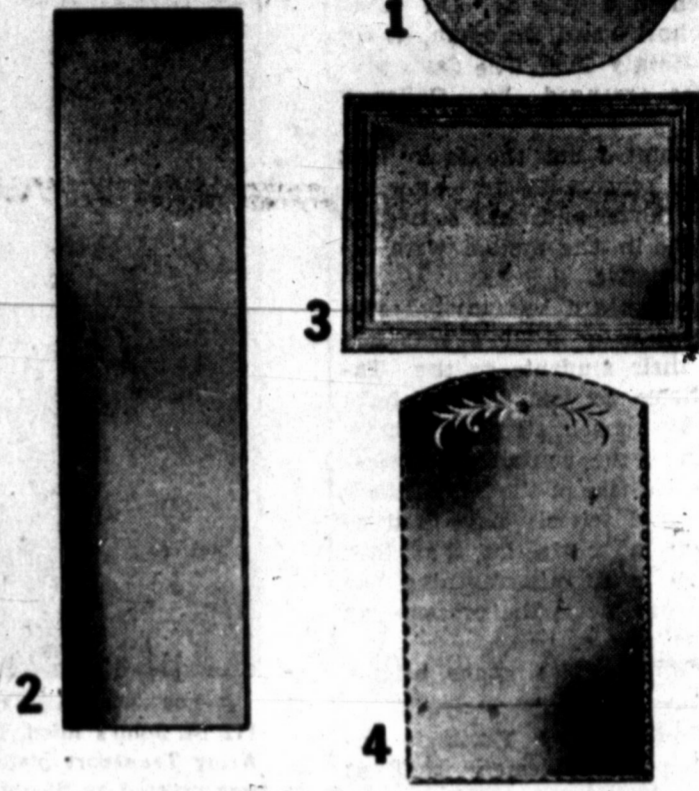

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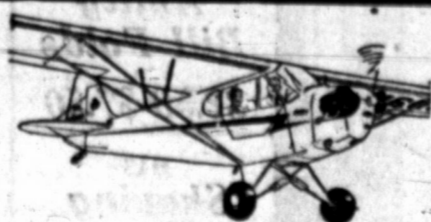
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**TAYLOR P. T. A. MEETS**

**Appetizing, Wholesome Lunch Essential for School Kids**  
 As school days again appear on the family schedule, the question of lunches absorbs many mothers. Unless the lunch is appetizing, adequate and wholesome, the children will not keep well nor learn so easily.

The underweight child, particularly if he has a finicky appetite, may suffer from colds and other diseases. If his lunch fails to tempt him he is likely to eat very little of it. When such children also fail to eat an adequate breakfast at home, the situation is indeed serious. No matter how good the lunch is, however, it will not benefit the child fully if he is so interested in play that he fails to eat all the lunch or eats it so hurriedly that it is not well chewed. The teacher who can make the lunch hour a happy, interesting time and who establishes a definite period of about 20 minutes for lunch, is contributing to the good nutrition of the child.  
 The school lunch needs to contain plenty of food for the child's needs and food that is easily digested so the child may do the best school work he is capable of doing. In the appetizing lunch there is a variety in texture, a nice contrast and blend of flavors, and variety in color. The food is not all soft, solid or dry but offers something a little soft and moist, and something crisp or crunchy to chew. For instance, cornbread with ham, bananas and soft cookies would be too dry. The addition of a salad or pickled beets and an apple in place of the banana would improve the texture by adding something both moist and crisp.

**Hints for Housewives on Rejuvenating Old Curtains**

Here are some of first aid hints for curtains that need a lift:  
 Use tucks to conceal places in curtains that have been pieced.  
 Trim and rehem the worn edges, or even set on a contrasting ruffle or hem.  
 Tinting faded curtains gives the room a new appearance.  
 Mend oiled silk or plastic shower curtains by using transparent adhesive tape or by pasting matching fabric underneath with household cement. Window shades can be mended this way, too.  
 Turning curtains bottom side up often solves a problem.  
 Cornice boards, which serve as a valance, covered with gay cretonne can conceal the problem of a curtain that is too short—it just covers the gap.

**Paint Surfaces**  
 The old adage "haste makes waste" is highly applicable to preparation of surfaces for a paint job. If there are any holes, cracks or chips in the surfaces to be painted, no matter what type of paint is to be used, they should be carefully filled with proper material and made smooth before any paint is applied. In the case of cement, concrete, brick, stone or stucco walls, the openings should be carefully cleaned out and then filled with patching material which can be purchased from paint dealers, and mixed and used according to the manufacturer's instructions. Large cracks and holes should be cut along the edges so that the openings will be wider on the inside than at the surface, in order to assure a good anchorage for the filling material. With most filling materials, it is important to thoroughly wet the inside surfaces of the openings before patching, but specific instructions will be found on the packages of patching material.

**Strange Plant**  
 An "octopus" of the plant world is an exhibit in the Chicago Natural History museum. It is known as the Welwitschia plant, and because of its wood barklike, cup shaped trunk or stem is described as a "dwarf tree" that spreads out on the ground instead of growing in a standing position. It lives for hundreds of years. With its round, solid center or trunk, growing 3 to 4 feet in diameter, from which radiate strap shaped leaves that grow to lengths of 6 to 8 feet like tentacles, the plant suggests in appearance an octopus. Welwitschia appears to be a relic from some past age, so different is it from any other modern plants. The museum specimen was collected in Angola by Prof. Henri Humbert, director of the phanerogamic botany section of the Jardin des Plantes, Paris, who was commissioned for the purpose by the Chicago institution.

**Aborigine Medicine**  
 Ipecac, the root of the ipecacuanha shrub, was first used as a medicinal agent by the aborigines of South America. Some of the therapeutic root was brought to Europe, and fell into the hands of one Adrien Helvetius of Paris. Keeping the composition of his remedy secret, Helvetius used ipecac in the treatment of dysentery. His remarkable cures—advertised on sign cards at Parisian street corners—soon attracted the attention of Louis XIV, whose son the Dauphin lay ill with this disease. Helvetius cured the Dauphin and later sold his secret to Louis for the equivalent of \$4,000. The ipecac root is still used in medicine today, as an expectorant and diaphoretic, but has been supplanted by other compounds in the treatment of dysentery.

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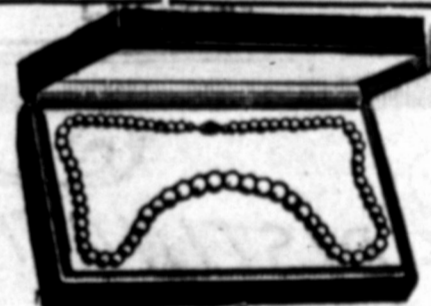

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### Tests Show Eight Amino Acids Essential to Diet

Tests on human volunteers show that eight of the amino acids—the "bricks" in the protein molecule—are essential in man's diet, according to Dr. William C. Rose of the University of Illinois. The experiments showed that the 13 remaining known amino acids in the protein molecule are not required for maintaining nitrogen balance in man, and evidently can be manufactured by the body.

Healthy young men have served as the experimental subjects, Dr. Rose said. The diets were composed of mixtures of purified amino acids, starch sugar, concentrated butter, inorganic salts, and vitamins. The amino acid mixtures furnished 7 to 10 grams of nitrogen daily.

Following the ingestion of such diets, the subjects came into nitrogen equilibrium within a few days. At the expiration of the fore period in each subject, single amino acids were omitted from the food, and the effects upon nitrogen balance were noted. The work is being continued to determine the minimum amount of the eight amino acid "bricks" needed in the diet, he added.

### Allow Room for Expansion In Hull of Great Liner

The Queen Elizabeth, world's largest passenger liner due to make her maiden voyage on October 18, actually "stretches" to accommodate herself to rough seas.

During the exhaustive investigations made in the design stage, when thousands of decisions had to be made on the thickness and strength of her hull plating, engineers hit on the possibility of using special elastic steel in areas where particularly heavy strain was likely to be encountered. They then incorporated into the hull many plates of this steel which "gives" when subjected to the pounding of heavy waves.

The main strength of the Queen Elizabeth has been placed in the structure from the keel to the promenade deck. The superstructure has been built in lighter materials. However, since the tremendous length of the 83,673-ton ship involves heavy stresses even to the superstructure, the latter was built in sections detached from each other by a few inches. Known as "expansion joints," these spaces expand and contract with sea-going strains, at the same time presenting an unbroken line to the observer.

### Avoiding Trichinosis

Trichinosis is a fancy word, but it's also a serious disease that can affect human beings. Trichinosis is readily preventable, however, if people will remember to cook pork thoroughly since swine may be hosts to this parasite. During the winter season, particularly during the holidays, smoked and dried sausage and various other products containing pork are eaten without cooking in some households. Such products, if they happen to have been made from hogs that were affected with trichinae, are some of the sources of trichinosis in this country. Tasting sausage to determine its seasoning is one method of acquiring this disease. Hamburgers also frequently contain some pork, and when they are not sufficiently cooked, this disease may be acquired. It should be remembered that large pieces of pork require much more cooking than small ones because heat penetrates slowly into meat in the process of cooking. Large pieces that are well-cooked on the outside may be imperfectly cooked or almost entirely raw in the center. Care should be taken that pork is "done" thoroughly, and throughout.

### Preserving Dahlias

Proper digging and storage of dahlia tubers has a great deal to do with their keeping qualities. If they are injured in digging, decay starts in the wound and spreads to the healthy roots. Digging should be done about a week or 10 days after the first killing frost. Before digging cut off the stalks to about two inches above the ground. In removing the tubers there are two precautions that should be remembered. First, be careful not to break the clumps apart and second, don't pull the clumps out by the stems. Store upside down in a dry cellar for about two weeks. At the end of this time cut off all loose and broken roots. Powder the crowns with a fine dusting sulphur and the roots are ready to be stored. The ideal temperature for storage is 40 to 45 degrees.

### Rose Fungicide

A special fungicidal dusting compound to control foliage diseases of roses has been introduced by the Du Pont company. The rose dust has proved especially effective against black spot, powdery mildew and rust. It may be employed either as a dust or spray and is suitable also for carnations and snapdragons. Rose dust should be applied as necessary to keep new foliage covered, particularly during rainy and foggy periods. Plants should not be "drowned" with dust. Proper use of the compound, authorities point out, is largely a matter of timing. As a spray, rose dust is recommended at the rate of three table-spoonfuls in one gallon. No leaf burning has been encountered in tests except during hot weather.

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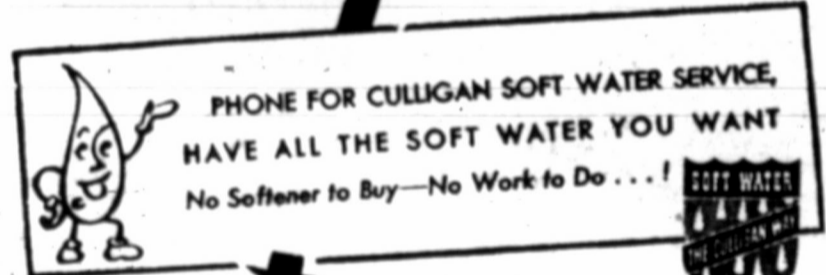
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
