## Factory Is Opened For Manufacture Of Gin Equipment

Tahoka has a new industry, a plant for the manufacture and repair of gin machinery.

The new firm is chartered as the Lone Star State Manufacturing Machine Co., Inc., and is setting up equipment in the Littlepage building on the east side of the courthouse square. Incorporators are: Tom Rowell, president; F. D. Roan, vice president; and W. T. Roan, secretary and treasurer.

Mr. Roan is with the Humble Pipeline Company, and lives at McCamey, but expects to move here at a later date. W. T. Roan recently moved here from Pampa, and F. D. Roan moved here from Lubbock. Others expected to join the firm as soon as possible are F. D. Roan Jr., of Pampa, and Harold Wayne Roan, who is in the Navy stationed at Guam.

The elder Roan, F. D., is father of the other three and father-in-law of Mr. Rowell.

F. D. Roan is the inventor of a new spike cylinder machine for use in cotton ginning plants. He has already built eleven of these machines, and they are said to have met with complete satisfaction. However, much of these experimental machines were construction, whereas, in the future, they will be of more durable all-metal construction.

The Lone Star State Manufacturing Machine company will also specialize in all types of cotton gin work, and is equipped to file gin saws and re-rib gin breast on any type of gin.

Further, their show is equipped with a large lathe, welding equipment, and is prepared to do almost any type of machine shop work for the general public.

These men are welcomed to Tahoka, and the citizens of this area will wish they well in the new venture.

## Services Held For John C. Evans

Funeral services were conducted at the First Baptist Church here at 2:00 o'clock Tuesday afternoon for J. C. Evans, 69, who died of heart trouble in the Seale Clinic here at 11:50 Monday morning. He had been in critical condition for two or three weeks. Rev. Levi Price, pastor of the church, conducted the services, assisted by J. Elmo Burkett, pastor of the Church of Christ. The body was conveyed overland in a Stanley Ambulance on Wednesday to Evans Chapel situated near Leon County, where another brief funeral service was to be conducted at 3:00 p. m., Wednesday followed by burial there.

Survivors include the widow Mrs. Mattie Evans and the following children and step-children: W. E. Evans of New Mexico, L. R. Evans of El Paso, C. M. Evans of Oklahoma, Mrs. C. P. Weinbrenner of El Paso, Mrs. W. W. Walker of New Mexico, J. T. Elliott of Tahoka, Mrs. J. B. Noel of Pampa, Mrs. George Merritt of Brownfield, Mrs. Gus Ratcliff of Quemado, and Mrs. Maude Rogers of Port Arthur; also several grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

He had been a resident of Tahoka for about three years and had made many friends here. Last summer he made the race for Justice of the Peace of the Tahoka precinct and received a most creditable vote.

He lived for a number of years at Quemado in Maverick county on the Rio Grande River and for two years he served as mayor of the town. For three and a half years he was a deputy sheriff of Maverick county.

John C. Evans was born in Leon county on October 4, 1877 and lived there for many years. He was a good man and a Christian gentleman, having long been a member of the Christian Church. His many new friends here join with his old friends there in mourning his departure.

## Lynn County Vet Dies In Hospital

Earl Barton, 56, a brother of R. W. Barton of this county and a resident of this county himself for a year or two, died in the Veterans' Sanitarium at Kerrville on Tuesday night, February 11, and the body was taken from there to Coleman, his former home, for burial.

Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Barton and daughter, Carolyn and Mr. and Mrs. Burnie Bingham and children of New Lynn attended the funeral services, which were held in the Baptist Church at Coleman at 3:00 o'clock on Thursday afternoon of last week.

Mr. Barton had lived in this county for possibly a year at one time and came back later and remained several months with his aged father, who was sick a long time and died in April of 1945. His only brother other than R. W. was accidentally killed in the following June and his mother died at Coleman in November, 1945. He has five sisters surviving but none of them live in this part of the state.

He had been working for the Sterling-Austin Co., in an oil field in south Texas, when he became ill of the flu in December, then he contracted pneumonia, and later was sent to the Kerrville institution. He lived only four or five weeks after going there.

Mr. Barton was a veteran of World War I and was a member of the American Legion. He had no family.

## Baptist Revival Will Close Sunday

The First Baptist Church of Tahoka, one of the 101 Baptist churches in district Nine engaged in revival services between February 9 and 23, had received 36 additions to its membership at the close of the services Monday night, according to Rev. Levi W. Price. Of this number 20 had come for baptism and 16 had joined by letter or statement. There have been eight who offered themselves for special service, such as missionaries and other types of religious work.

As the result of a diligent attendance campaign, possibly the largest congregation that ever crowded into the church auditorium was present last Sunday. After all the pews were taken a number of chairs were brought in and still it was necessary for a goodly number to stand in the rear and in the vestibule. There were 603 present in Sunday School, surpassing any previous attendance record by 68. There were quite a number of responses to the invitations given at the close of the service.

Reports have been received from indicating successful revivals almost anywhere churches in the district everywhere. Pastor Levi Price, the visiting Minister, Cooper Waters, and the singer David Green attended a general meeting of the pastors, evangelists, and other workers held in Plainview Monday afternoon, at which they reported that sixty churches in the district were represented and reported a total of 545 additions by baptism and 549 by letter, together with 118 other conversions, up to that time.

Services in the Tahoka church are being conducted twice daily, at 10:00 a. m. and 7:30 p. m., each preaching service being preceded by a thirty-minute period of prayer. Rev. Cooper Waters of North Hill Baptist Church of Houston is doing the preaching and David Green of Hardin-Simmons University is conducting the song services. The meeting will close Sunday night.

Mr. and Mrs. Larry Daniel's baby is under treatment in Tahoka Clinic. The baby was improving as this was written.

## Wilson Lays Plans For Water System

Many of the citizens of Wilson met on last Friday night and laid plans for the construction of a water system for the town.

Truett Smith, attorney, and Mayor Joe Bovell of Tahoka had been invited to meet with the group to give such information and legal advice as might be needed, which they did.

At the meeting it was decided to organize and to incorporate under the name of the Wilson Water Works, Incorporated. Officers were elected and application for a charter is to be made.

The officers and board of directors were named as follows: H. B. Crosby, president; H. G. Cook, vice-president; Pat Campbell, secretary-treasurer; J. F. Covey, L. Lumsden, D. C. Newsom, and Clarence Church.

It is planned to drill a well, erect a water tank, and lay pipe to convey water to practically all the business houses and residences in the town. It is hoped that piping for the purpose can be purchased from surplus stock held by the War Assets Administration.

This is a progressive move on the part of the citizens of Wilson, for a water system will not only afford protection against fire but will assure the town of greatly reduced insurance rates. Coming along with the building of farm-to-market roads into the town and the prospective construction of a highway through the town from Tahoka to Slaton within the next year or two, Wilson ought to experience a growth that it has not had for years.

## Tahoka Bulldogs Win Place In District Finals

Though given little hope by fans of getting into the district play-off the Tahoka Bulldog basketball boys staged an upset here last week end by defeating Post and Seminole and will team up with Andrews to battle Sudan and Levelland this week-end for the district basketball championship.

The district tournament will be held in the Sundown gymnasium today and Saturday. Tahoka meets Sudan in the tournament opener at 1:30 this Friday afternoon. Andrews will play Levelland at 3:00 o'clock. Friday night at 7:30, losers will play losers and winners will play winners of the afternoon games. The semi-final game will be Saturday afternoon at 2:30, and the final game Saturday night at 8:00 in the double-elimination play. Trophies will be presented the winner and the runner-up, and 20 gold and silver basketballs will go to the team members. Winner will proceed in the state Interscholastic League play-off.

Levelland was runner-up in the state finals at Austin last year, but this year was forced to play a three game series, winning two of the games, with Abernathy for the right to represent the north half of this basketball district.

In the tournament for championship of the south half of the district, Andrews won the No. 1 spot, while the Bulldogs put on an exceptional exhibition of basketball to win the No. 2 spot. Previously in league play Post and Tahoka had emerged as the two best team of the southern quarter of the district, and Andrews and Seminole had proved themselves the cream of the crop in the southwestern quarter of this immense district.

All games here Friday and Saturday were closely contested, and the fans got their money's worth.

Friday afternoon, Andrews won over Tahoka 25 to 23, and Seminole eked out a 26 to 24 victory over Post. That night Tahoka pulled the surprise of the tournament by out-scoring favored Post, who had been defeating Tahoka almost consistently earlier in the season by a 36-33 score in a game that required two overtime periods to determine a winner; and Andrews ran wild to defeat Seminole 57 to 30. The two losses eliminated Post and Seminole, and undefeated Andrews met the one-defeated Bulldogs that night to determine first and second place winners, Andrews winning by a score of 37 to 25.

Following the game, Superintendent Vernon Brewer presented team trophies to the coaches of the Andrews and Tahoka teams, and gold basketballs to members of the boys selected by the coaches as all-tournament players.

Boys named to the mythical team were: Charles Pinnel and "Red" Pinnel, Andrews; "No. 8" Baker of Seminole; Roy Williams, Post; and Finis Botkin, Tahoka.

Coach Jim Foust has been working his boys hard this week, and they hope to spring an upset at Sundown today.

This program is the regular KSEL "West Texas Today" program that is broadcast at that time every day.

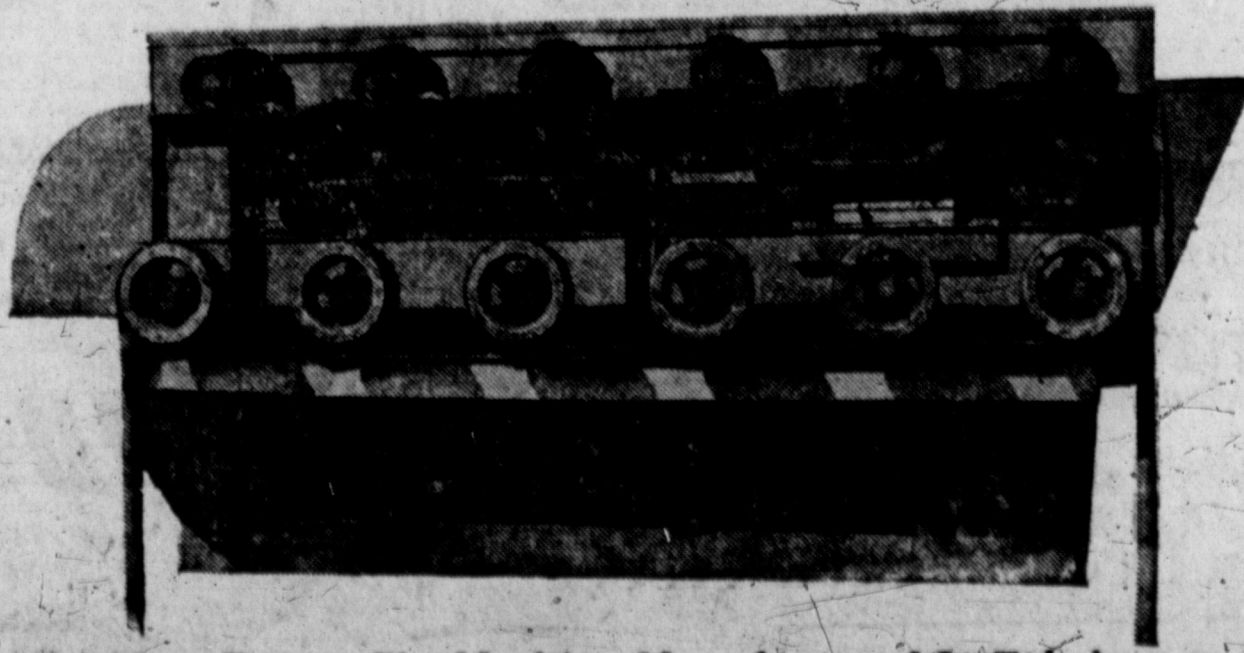
On the program from Lynn County will be R. L. "Kid" Gibson, E. H. Newton, J. E. Nance and Bill Griffin, local County Agent.

### T Hangar Flying

According to last week's issue of the Cross Country News, an aviation publication of this section stated that Tahoka and O'Donnell had been listed for aid by the Federal Government to build class I municipal airports. Other surrounding towns including Post, Slaton, Lamme, Brownfield and possibly others were also included in this list. The Civil Aeronautics administration has recommended that 4,431

airports in the nation be constructed or improved within the next three years. The list includes 306 such projects for Texas.

It is not known whether the City of Tahoka still has intentions of building a municipal field or not. The Tahoka Airport is not city-owned and therefore can not receive help from the Federal Government for improvement.

Many people were out at the airport Sunday watching the planes that were flying around the field. It may have been a mystery to some of the spectators as to what was happening, so we will tell you. The pilots were participating in a "Spot-Landing" contest. A line was drawn across the runway and the pilots were seeing how close to this line they could land their plane without landing behind it. If a plane touched the ground behind the line he was given credit with a miss of 300 feet regardless of how far behind the line he missed. If the front wheels of the plane hit on the far side of the line and the tail wheel behind the line, the plane was directed on the spot. Markers twenty-five feet apart were placed on the far side of the line. The pilot having the best score after a certain number of landings won the contest.

#### NEW USE FOR SHORT STAPLE COTTON DEVELOPED

LUBBOCK, Feb. 18.—A new use for short staple West Texas cotton in the manufacture of terry toweling is being developed by the Cotton Research Committee of Texas, located at Texas Technological College, according to Herbert E. Kieke, committee superintendent of textile research.

Towels manufactured in the committee laboratories are about one-third more absorbent and are superior on abrasion tests than other towels tested, which were presumed made of long staple cotton yarn, Kieke said.

At the present time short staple yarn is generally relegated to use for ducking and other coarse fabrics. The new use will greatly increase the value of cotton produced in this area if manufacturers adopt it, Kieke said, adding that a towel factory could operate profitably in Texas. No such factory has yet been opened west of the Mississippi river.

Towels are now made from ply yarn, in which two pieces of yarn are twisted together to form the threads. By the recently developed process, a single ply yarn is used, making an equally strong and absorbent thread.

Friday, February 21, was set for the date for Miss Anderson to meet with the seven girls entering the dress review contest.—Reporter.

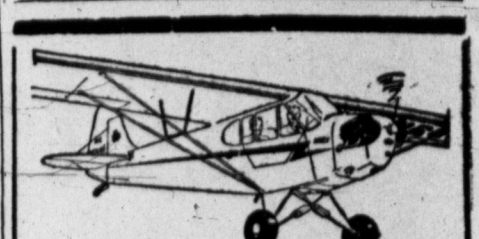

**MEMORIAL LOAN FUND MOVE STARTED AT TECH**  
LUBBOCK, Feb. 19.—In a move to establish a veterans' memorial loan fund to be made available to children of veterans of World War II who wish to attend Texas Technological College, the Tech War Veterans Association is conducting a campaign for Tech students to contribute books to be sold for the fund.

Priority on loans will be given to children of men killed in the war who need financial aid to attend Tech.

TWA officials predicted that more than \$60,000 can be raised for the fund by 1960. It is proposed that as much as \$250 per semester will be made available to students at one per cent interest.

Present plans are that the loan fund will be set up as a corporation, observing state laws, and with a bonded board of directors. Money raised immediately will be turned over to a reliable company at interest until it is needed.

#### Special Preparation Needed For Frozen Fruits

Properly prepared, frozen fruits are a good dessert in themselves and a tasty topping for ice creams and sherbets. But without special preparation, fruits suffer radical changes in color, flavor and appearance.

After washing the fruit carefully, prepare it for packing by cutting or slicing. Berries may be frozen whole or sliced. The fruit should then be packed in dry sugar, sugar syrup, or a syrup made of sugar and corn syrup.

If the dry pack is used, mix three parts of fruit with one part of sugar, shaking the container after the fruit is packed to be sure all the fruit is covered with sugar. By the time freezing starts, the sugar will be dissolved.

When you use the sugar syrup pack, prepare and pack the fruit and then cover it with a sugar syrup solution, allowing from a half inch to an inch head space in the containers to permit expansion.

#### Eggs Nutritious

Eggs contain most of the nutrients required for an adequate human diet and for that reason should be included in the diet of every person both young and old. An egg a day is recommended, but three to four each week is a safe number. Eggs are classed as a protective food because of their high vitamin, mineral and protein content. An egg, when broken, should have a delicate odor. Freshness of an egg does not depend on time elapsed since it was laid. Eggs held at 40 degrees Fahrenheit for 100 days are fresher than eggs held 3 days at 100 degrees. Food value is determined by feed given the hen. In cooking eggs, regardless of the method used, one rule must always be remembered—They belong to the protein and fat foods and should not be cooked at too high a temperature.

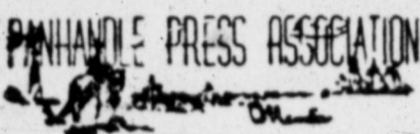

 The statement is often made by word of mouth and in print that among all the books published the Bible is by far the world's best seller. It is no doubt true, and yet our general ignorance of the Bible is appalling. Possibly 75 or 80 per cent of the people of the United States scarcely ever read it. Of the remaining 25 per cent who do read it regularly or frequently, few really study it. They find much of the Old Testament difficult to understand and soon cast it aside as dull reading. With the exception of Revelation, the New Testament is much more readily understandable and is more frequently read and studied. The King James Version has probably had more influence in shaping the life of America than

all other literary productions combined.

Yet this version, first published in 1611, contains many words and expressions that are now obsolete and others whose meaning has changed. Accordingly, there came a demand decades ago for a revised version. Then came the English Revised Version of 1881 and the American Standard Version of 1901, but these really made few changes in the verbiage and did not meet the demand.

Then came a number of revisions by individual scholars who translated either the entire Bible or the New Testament alone into modern English. While these versions expressed more accurately, no doubt, the meaning and the thought, yet they lost much of the dignity, the beauty, and the solemnity of the old King James Version.

Bible scholars and students still were dissatisfied. So, in 1937, the International Council of Religious Education, in which the educational boards of forty of the major Protestant denominations in the United States and Canada are associated, selected and authorized a committee of scholars to make a new revision of the entire Bible, one section of which was to revise the Old Testament and the other section to revise the New Testament.

The New Testament group completed their work, and after being approved by the entire committee, it was first published and placed on the market last year. It is known as the Revised Standard Version of the New Testament. Without losing much, if any, of the beauty and the dignity of the King James Version, it is written in graphic modern English and the events seem as fresh and as thrilling as if they had occurred but yesterday. If you do not have this book in your home, you should procure it. It can be obtained from most any of the denominational publishing houses; good cloth binding \$2.00 other bindings at higher prices. The Revised Old Testament will not appear for three or four years yet.

We believe that in time, this new version of the Bible will create new interest in the book and bring about a much more general and wide-spread reading of it.

**Sidelights From Washington**

By George Malton

I was rather pleased to read in a Texas newspaper today that George Mahon is one of the hardest-working men in Washington these days. I don't want to enter into a controversy with the press and cannot there for deny the statement.

Speaking of denials, we were having a hot argument in the Joint Senate-House Budget Committee the other day when Congressman Knutson, a blustering Republican leader, shouted that if the Republicans didn't do so-and-so they could be rightfully accused of talking through their hats for the last ten years. Senate Democratic Leader Barkley of Kentucky spoke up very quietly and said, "Well, I would like to say to the gentleman that I am in no position to deny that."

My main work lately has been in connection with the effort of Congress to slash the budget and reduce Government spending, an essential requirement for our national well-being. As a member of the Joint Senate-House Committee to do the spade work on the job and report to Congress, I have attended all the meetings. At the final meeting last Friday, I voted against the 6 billion dollar cut which was proposed and approved by the Committee. I made a speech in opposition to the action of the Committee, asserting that the Republican members had concealed from the Congress and from the American people the facts and figures as to just where the cuts were to be made. I said that the report would be meaningless and ineffective unless backed up with an itemized list of the major cuts. Senator Taft agreed with me on this point and to demonstrate his good faith, he himself gave some specific figures as to where he would support certain reductions, but the figures were inadequate and inconclusive. As to the Armed Forces, he thought a cut of one billion dollars would be in order. My thought is that some cut in military appropriations can safely be made, but not that much. Cuts in the military should be made in civilian personnel and in Army construction, but not in such things as military personnel, research and development, and aviation.

At any rate, it is estimated by those best acquainted with the facts that if the 6 billion dollar cut actually goes into effect, the Army and Navy will be decidedly reduced, the Federal road program will be curtailed, the school lunch program for next year will be abolished, the administrative expense of the Veterans Administration will be reduced by 200 million dollars, AAA payments already committed will be reduced by 100 million dollars, authorization of REA loans to local Co-Ops will be reduced by more than 125 million dollars, the Soil Conservation Service will be pared down, support prices for agricultural crops will be jeopardized.

The Department of Agriculture on a percentage basis would take the most drastic cut of any agency. I have said to my colleagues here that Government economy was in the interest of Agriculture but that it was poor economy to try to balance the budget out of the hide of the farmer, and I could not go along with the Republican sponsored plan for agriculture.

In the meeting last Friday, 102 Members of the House and Senate were permitted to participate. We made a motion to permit members of the press to listen to the proceeding so that a full report could be given to the people. The motion was voted down. A motion was made that 3 billion dollars of the 6 billion dollar expenditure reduction be applied on the public debt. This motion was likewise voted down. Senator Barkley, on behalf of three Members of the Senate, and Cannon, Doughton, and myself of the House, offered a motion that no income tax reduction be considered by Congress until we had passed the major appropriation bills through

the House and had actually demonstrated that the proposed savings would be made. This motion was likewise rejected.

The whole controversy has now gone to the floor of the House and Senate. It will be confusing to try to follow this controversy. But I hope that many needed economies will be made and Government spending reduced, without the impairment of essential Government operations. Everybody wants to cut expenses and reduce taxes. The argument comes over the extent of the cuts and where they are to be made.

The Bureau of the Budget has recommended the spending of 37 1/2 billion dollars next year, but Congress thinks that's too much and we feel the people agree.

One day last week General Omar Bradley came down and said he needed 2 billion dollars in additional funds for the Veterans Administration. We are going to provide part of the money now and more later when he needs it. The OPA has 14,000 employees and plans to spend 28 million dollars for operating expenses between now and July 1st. But we are asking Congress to reduce this expenditure by one-half, recapturing some of the funds appropriated for OPA before the President lifted most controls last November.

One of the Members of our Committee said he got a letter from a man in his District in Missouri a few days ago which began like this, "I'm so mad at the OPA that I am shouting to my stenographer as I dictate this letter."

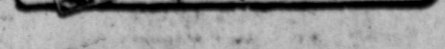

Tekell, Pete Gage, Oscar King, Harley Henderson, Roy Apple, and two colored boys, Johnny Young and Henry Fry all had tractors plowing the field.

Approximately four hundred and fifty acres was plowed by these men in only a few hours. Some of them stated that they had never seen so many tractors plowing in the same field at one time before and that they had never heard of that much land being plowed in such short a time.

Harold was a member of the Tahoka High school football team last year and suffered a broken arm in one of the games and was treated at the Seale Clinic and in a Dallas hospital. It was recently reported that he had completely recovered from that and was beginning to use the arm again in his daily duties.

### COTTON GROWERS WARNED TO PLAN 1947 CROP WITH CARE

AUSTIN, Feb. 20.—Warning cotton growers to plan 1947 operations with care, Dr. A. B. Cox, professor of cotton marketing at the University of Texas says that possible declining prices anticipated in 1947 could be the pitfall of cotton growers.

In the current Texas Business Review, published by the Bureau of Business Research, Dr. Cox writes, "The consensus is that the year 1947 will be one of declining prices both in terms of what farmers buy as well as what they sell. These declines will not be universal, they will not be uniform and they will not occur at the same time."

He estimated the carryover of cotton in the United States in Aug., 1947 will be about 3,200,000 bales, the lowest since August 1929. On August 1, 1946, the carryover was 7,522,000 bales.

Demand for cotton goods is still strong in the United States as well as throughout the world, Dr. Cox said, and there probably will be a high rate of consumption in the next 12 months.

A spectacular weapon of World War II—the proximity fuse, which automatically exploded shells within deadly range of their targets—is now helping many of the estimated 8,000,000 Americans who have serious hearing defects. The fuse was powered by "Mini-Max" batteries similar to those used in the new electronic hearing aids.

"A History of Latin America," co-authored by Dr. C. E. Castaneda, University of Texas professor of history, has been selected as an official text for the United States Armed Forces Institute. Dr. Samuel Guy Inman wrote the ext, and Dr. Castaneda Cooperated in revisions and interpretations.

The American divorce rate in 1945 was one for every three marriages. Prior to the recent war the rate was one divorce for every six marriages and before World War I was one for nine.

The only known file of the Marshall Tri-Weekly Herald has been acquired by the University of Texas through the Littlefield Fund for Southern History. The file is dated from 1875 to 1888.

A secret voice-ray telephone, using infra-red light and immune to enemy interception, was developed during the war by the Navy.

The number of hospitalized veterans has now reached 119,845, the highest total in Veterans Administration history.

Spring semester registration at the University of Texas totals 16,643 students.

The VA reports there are now 18,277,000 veterans of all American wars living in the United States.

### SOCIAL SECURITY MAN TO BE HERE MARCH 5

Elliott W. Adams, Manager of the Lubbock office of the Social Security Administration, will be in Tahoka, Wednesday, March 5, at 11 o'clock at the Post Office for the purpose of assisting those who wish to file a claim for Old-Age and Survivors Insurance, apply for a Social Security Account Number Card, or have the name changed on his old card.

Adams stated that a number of individuals applying for social security account numbers by mail stated that they had never before applied for an account number and upon investigation determined that an account number had been previously issued to the applicant.

He stressed the facts that no individual should ever secure more than one account number. "To secure additional account numbers means possible loss in benefits to the individual as well as causing the government unnecessary expense in establishing a new account," Adams said. "Since no one number can be assigned to two different individuals, any employee for whom two accounts are established prohibits forever the Administration using the extra account number assigned for anyone else."

**Grassroots . . .**By Bill Griffin  
County Agent

The time of the year to purchase baby chicks has rolled around again. Chicks you purchase should come from a recognized breeding farm or hatchery that is securing hatching eggs from supervised flocks where the parent stock has been bred for livability, high production, high hatchability, large egg size, and uniform standard quality. These flocks should be pul-lorum tested.

Before your chicks arrive thoroughly clean and disinfect the brooder house. Check the house and close up any crack in the wall or floor that might cause a draft. Round your corners with building paper or any suitable material to prevent chicks from piling in the corners.

Put the brooder in the house and operate it for two days before the chicks arrive, making sure that it holds an even temperature of 95 to 98 degrees two inches from the floor at the edge of the hover. Check the ventilation of your house. Chicks require an abundance of fresh air without drafts and a uniform heat. A hot brooder house is not conducive to proper development.

After the chicks arrive remove them from the boxes and place them under the brooder. Avoid chilling chicks with cold hands or exposing them to cold air.

Supply fresh starter and fresh water every day and keep chick size granite grit or gravel in the grit hopper constantly.

The temperature of the brooder should be lowered 5 degrees per

week until heat is no longer needed. A dim light burning in the house all night will help prevent crowding and also give the weaker chicks an opportunity to eat and drink at night.

There is probably no place that efforts expended in keeping things clean will pay a larger dividend than in raising chicks. Clean your house as often as needed.

A clean yard is necessary. It is much better if chicks can be raised on ground that is not used for poultry more than one year out of three.

The growing of strong healthy chicks is dependent upon the use of a very definite sanitation program.

**Only Half Of Vets Have Asked Pay On Terminal Leave**

Although all branches of the Armed Forces have adequate personnel on hand to process and pay applications, less than 50 per cent of the eligible veterans have made applications according to J. W. Weathers, Lynn County Service Officer.

Your right to do this expires September 1, 1947. Although it is still possible to delay for several months and still get "under the wire" failure on the part of the veterans to send in their applications promptly may result in discharging a portion of the personnel now hired and available for such service.

Only about 5 per cent of the claims of widows and next of kin of veterans who have died since their discharge from service have been filed to date.

Any widow or person claiming dependency of a veteran who has died since discharge is urged to call on me for information concerning the veterans Terminus. Leave pay. This only applies to persons who have died since discharge.

Let's get these claims filed. Don't wait until the last day.

If you don't have a blank already, get one at your local Post Office, read it carefully, if you don't understand it, drop in to see me and I will be glad to assist you with it. Mr. Weathers office is located in the Courthouse at Tahoka.

The general objectives of Rotary Clubs in every country are the same—the development of fellowship and understanding among the business and professional men in the community, the promotion of community-betterment endeavors and of high standards in business and professional practices, and the advancement of international understanding, good will and peace.

ing rural-urban relations by sponsoring animal-judging contests for boys and girls. There is an eye clinic and a school for the deaf and dumb in Chungking, China, under the direction of Rotarians.

The Rotary Club of Coquimbo, Chile, is constructing a school for teaching trades to poor children. Rotary Clubs in the State of Georgia are bringing students from France to study on Rotary Scholarships at the University of Georgia.

In St. Johns, Newfoundland, the Rotary Club was recently accorded official governmental recognition for its valuable contributions in fighting a high tuberculosis death rate. The Rotary Club of Durban, South Africa, sponsors an annual camp for students. Through the generosity and hard work of Rotarians, the Hospital for Crippled Adults in Memphis, Tenn., has provided free care for more than 4000 patients.

The Rotary Club of Wayne, Michigan, recently donated \$4,000 to purchase food for the war-devastated countries of Europe. In Haifa, Palestine, Rotarians are leading a campaign to reduce traffic accidents. More than \$36,000 has been loaned to students by the Rotary Club of Lubbock, Texas, to assist them in completing their education.

These are just a few of the service activities of Rotary Clubs around the world. Here in Tahoka, the Rotary Club, in addition to fostering a better spirit of friendship among the business and professional men, has aided under-privileged children, crippled children, sponsored 4-H stock shows, Christmas programs, playground equipment for the city park, a summer recreation program, sponsored a Boy Scout troop, and scores of other activities for the good of the community.

The Tahoka Club was organized in 1937 with 20 charter members. Today, it has more than sixty members, and meets each Thursday noon at the Legion Hall.

To assist in developing an informed public opinion on vital problems confronting the world, Rotary International provides all Rotary Clubs with up-to-the-minute background information on the United Nations organization and its specialized agencies. There were Rotary consultants in San Francisco when the United Nations organization was established and Rotary has been represented at every meeting of the United Nations since that time—in Atlantic City, Copenhagen, London, Montreal, New York, Paris and Washington!

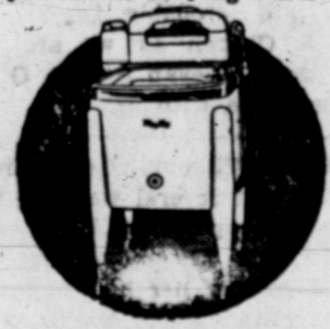

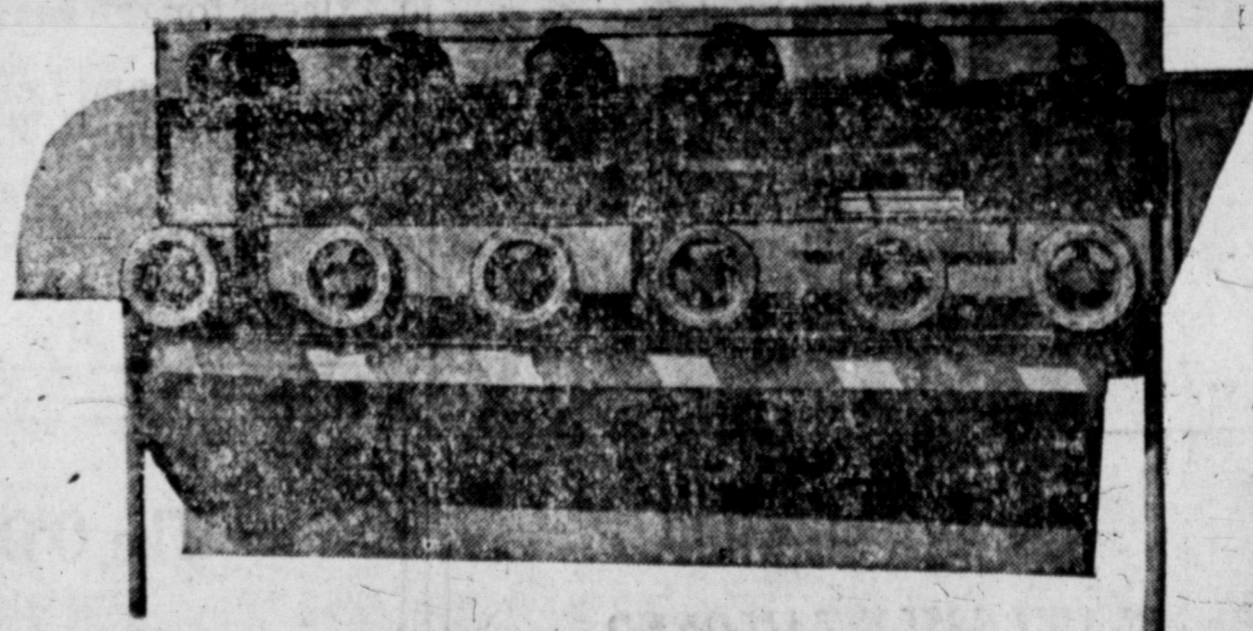

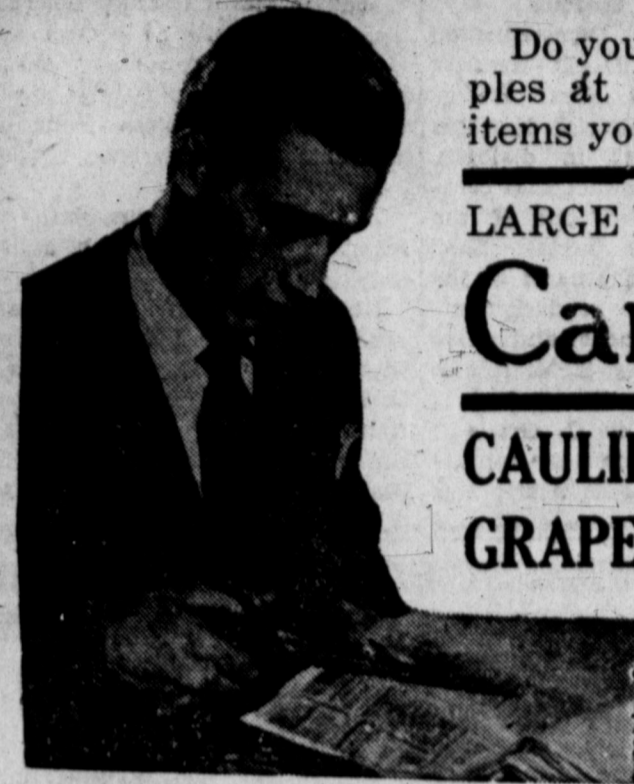

from defects as is possible for any food to be. U. S. grade B means "good" in flavor and nutritious quality, but not quite as perfect as A. U. S. Grade C foods may be used where pieces or pulp are used in combination with other foods, such as cream of tomato soup or peach pie.
