Contract Let For 26 Miles of Farm Road Construction

According to previous announcement, the commissioners' court let a contract Thursday of last week for the construction of 26.564 miles of farm-to-market roads in the north-west quarter of Lynn county.

The successful bidders were Kerr & Middleton of Lubbock, who had previously constructed the stretch of state highway leading from New Home to Wilson, a distance of about 11 miles, and who are now constructing a farm-to-market road from Newmoore via O'Donnell to the vicinity of Draw, through the southern portion of Lynn county. Their bid was to build the New Home, farm-to-market road for the sum of \$192,716.17, the lowest bid submitted.

There were eight other bidders, their bids being for the following sums respectively: \$193,138.92, \$195,214.80, \$197,722.12, \$198,424.09, \$201,186.60, \$218,640.69, \$226,484.88, and \$233,325.34.

The system of roads to be built under this contract extends from New Home west to the Terry county line, two spurs extending north to the Lubbock county line, one south three miles in the direction of West Point, another south to Petty, and a short stretch from Crossroads filling station west two and a half miles or more past Dixie schoolhouse.

If the reader will get his pencil and do a little figuring he will find that this system of roads is to cost approximately \$7,217.15 per mile, slightly cheaper per mile than the 14-mile stretch to be built east of Wilson. The News is not informed as to whether the exact type of road will be built as the Wilson project, but it is probably approximately the same.

Mark Halsey Died Suddenly Saturday

Quite a number of Tahoka people and other Lynn county residents attended funeral services for Mark Halsey, 59, well known Lubbock druggist and civic leader, conducted in the Broadway Church of Christ at 4 o'clock Monday afternoon. Mr. Halsey died unexpectedly in his sleep while on a fishing trip with others on the Devil's River near Del Rio at about 1:30 o'clock last Saturday afternoon.

Mrs. Millie Halsey (E. I.) Hill of Tahoka was a sister, and both his son Hop, former representative in the legislature and associated with him in business, and his daughter Joyce, former radio announcer and now a student of dramatics in Los Angeles, were well known throughout Lynn and other South Plains counties. Other survivors are his wife and a daughter, Mrs. Janelle (Curtis) Reynolds, and a brother John Halsey, all of Lubbock, and another brother, Hurley Halsey of Luling.

Mr. Halsey had been in ill health for several years and since the fire which destroyed the Mark Halsey Drug Store No. 1 in December, in which he almost lost his life, his health had been very bad. On Monday of last week, in company with B. J. Boyd, manager of Drug Store No. 3, formerly an O'Donnell druggist, W. L. Gardenhire of O'Donnell, and a couple of other friends, he went on the fishing trip to Del Rio. On Saturday soon after noon, while doing some camp chores, he lay down on a boat which was turned upside down and went to sleep. Not (Cont'd. on last page)

W. T. Lowrance Dies Suddenly

Funeral services were conducted at Roaring Springs, Motley county, at 2:00 o'clock Thursday afternoon for William T. Lowrance, 77, who died after a brief illness at the home of his son, Elder Oscar Lowrance, three and a half miles southwest of Wilson at 11:20 o'clock Monday night.

Mr. Lowrance became ill at about 9:30 and died shortly after a doctor arrived.

His companion, Mrs. Minerva Susan Lowrance, died in Dickens county in 1936 and was buried at Roaring Springs. The body of Mr. Lowrance was taken there for burial, and funeral services were conducted at the graveside, by Elder O. Strickland of Graham.

The aged man left twelve surviving children, seven sons and five daughters. The sons are: E. C. Lowrance of Olathe, Colo.; V. F. Lowrance of Donaldson, Ark.; V. J. Lowrance of Roaring Springs, Tex.; A. C. Lowrance of Robert Lee; Henry Lowrance of Afton; Oscar Lowrance of Wilson; and W. A. Lowrance of Delta, Colorado.

The daughters are: Mrs. J. C. Brewer of Meeker, Colo.; Mrs. H. L. Seay of San Diego, Calif.; Mrs. Alton Seay of Delta, Colo.; Mrs. Eva Mae McGee of Roaring Springs; Mrs. Ollie Previco, Big Spring.

Also surviving are 57 grandchildren and four great grandchildren, together with three brothers, L. A. Lowrance of Cisco, H. C. Lowrance of Robert Lee, and J. N. Lowrance of Big Spring.

Mr. Lowrance was born in Illinois August 22, 1869. He came with his parents and their family to Texas many years ago. He has long been a member of the Primitive Baptist church and was a member of the Tahoka Church at the time of his death. His son, Elder Virgil F. Lowrance, was pastor of the church here for a number of years and another son is pastor now, Al, though Mr. Lowrance personally was not widely known in this county, two of the sons and their families are held in the highest esteem by many friends here, and deceased was doubtless a man of the highest character.

His son and family have the sympathy of many friends.

A. D. Jester Suffers Serious Illness

R. L. Northam Falls Dead In Back Yard

Robert Lee Northam, 69, died suddenly at his residence, a few blocks west of the business section of Tahoka and about one block north of the Don Bradley home at about 6:30 o'clock Monday afternoon. He had gone out to dig some bait intending to go on a fishing trip, it was explained, and suddenly sank down dead or in a dying condition. He is supposed to have suffered an attack of heart trouble.

Funeral services were conducted in the Methodist Church in Ropesville at 3:00 o'clock Wednesday afternoon by Rev. C. A. Bickley, a former Lubbock pastor, with burial under the direction of the Stanley Funeral Home of Tahoka in the Ropesville cemetery.

Survivors include the widow, Mrs. Minnie Lee Northam, three sons and two daughters as follows: J. H. Northam of Meadow, M. E. Northam of Lubbock, R. L. Northam Jr. of Meadow, Mrs. G. A. Martin and Mrs. D. W. Staggs both of Lubbock; eight granddaughters, five grand sons, and five great-grandchildren.

Mr. Northam had been a resident of Lynn county since 1916. He was a farmer and lived in the north-west part of the county until recently when he moved into Tahoka. He was an excellent citizen and a faithful member of the Methodist Church.

A native of Alabama, Mr. Northam was born on July 15, 1877. He lived in Fisher county, Texas, before coming to Lynn county in 1916. Married on November 26, 1896, he and his companion celebrated their golden wedding anniversary last November 26. He was held in the highest esteem by hosts of friends, and they will miss him greatly. Consolidation Is Voted by Three School Districts

By an almost unanimous vote, the three school districts of Tahoka, Dixie, and Redwine voted Saturday to consolidate, each district assuming its share of the bonds outstanding in the other two districts. In other words, the tax-payers of the consolidated district will be responsible for the payment of the total amount of bonds outstanding in all the three districts. There will be very little change, however, in the individual responsibility of each tax-payer.

In the Tahoka Independent school district, the vote was 37 to 2 in favor of consolidation; Redwine 23 to 2; and Dixie 16 to 2. The bond assumption vote was practically the same as the consolidation vote.

It will be necessary for the consolidated district to elect a new board of trustees, and steps will soon be taken for the holding of a trustee election. It will be necessary to elect a board of seven members.

An election will be held in the O'Donnell and Draw districts next Saturday to determine whether or not those two districts shall consolidate.

John W. Burleson Buried Wednesday

John W. Burleson, 80, native Texan, widely known Plains pioneer, and the father of Jim and Bill Burleson of Tahoka, died Tuesday at 5 p. m. at his home in Lubbock at 2308 18th street. Funeral services were held at First Baptist Church, Lamesa, at 4 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, and burial followed in the cemetery there.

Born in Gonzales county June 6, 1867, he moved to the Plains in 1900 and settled in Dawson county before that county was organized and several years before the town of Lamesa was established. "Uncle Johnnie," as he was affectionately known to many people over the South Plains, moved to Lubbock in 1920, and had lived there since. His wife died in 1935. Mr. Burleson had been in ill health for several years.

Survivors include three daughters, Mrs. H. G. Donaldson of Mineral Wells, Mrs. W. L. Housour of Stanton, and Mrs. J. T. Simmonds of Lubbock; four sons, O. O. of Sladon, Elzie of Lamesa; and Jim and Bill of Tahoka; a sister, Mrs. Ella Stockbridge of Lubbock; 21 grandchildren and 26 great-grandchildren.

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Tech Is To Get New Football Stadium

LUBBOCK, March 13. — Contract for construction of a new steel and concrete stadium to seat about 15,700 persons at Texas Technological College has been awarded the Old-Midwest company of Dallas. It has been announced by the Texas Tech Foundation, established by the board of directors to supervise the new structure.

A work order for \$250,000 has been issued by the foundation, and other orders will be forthcoming as quickly as materials are released by the Civilian Production Administration. The contract does not include plumbing and electrical work.

The new stadium will be located northwest of the present playing field and under the contract must be completed by October 1, a few days previous to Tech's opening home football game, with West Texas State Teachers College in the fall. Erection of the stands, playing field, dressing rooms and offices, as well as necessary grading are included.

The stadium will be used for athletic contests of both Texas Tech and Lubbock High school. Lacking release of needed electrical facilities by the CPA, Tech officials are planning to represent all 1947 football games during afternoons, eliminating plans for at least two night contests.

The stadium, named Clifford and Audrey Jones Stadium in honor of Dr. Clifford B. Jones, president emeritus of Tech, and his wife, will be financed from funds raised in a recent drive.

Texas School Bills Explained To Public; Governor Jester Approves One, Denounces One

AUSTIN, March 13. (Sp.) — Two bills are now before the Texas Legislature assuring a minimum salary of \$2,000 annually but the differences they provide in administrative policies challenge the attention and study of not only all school teachers but of all citizens, for under one, the so-called \$55 per capita measure, the state will launch itself into a program of confusion and discrimination which few persons understand, because the terms of the bill have been given little publicity, and many members of the legislature, not having had time to compare the two bills, have been pressured for the \$55 per capita bill. This measure already has passed the house, authored by Representative Dallas Blankenship of Dallas.

The other measure, which has as its objective equalization for all school districts in Texas and which accomplishes the identical purpose of the Blankenship bill by guaranteeing a minimum salary of \$2,000, has been introduced in the senate by Senator James E. Taylor of Kerens, and it has the utmost support of Governor Jester and Taylor's colleagues.

Under the terms of the Blankenship \$55 per capita bill, should it be enacted, schools in the larger Texas cities will be given more money than they need or ask at the expense of the smaller or rural school districts which will receive much less than they need, which makes a dangerous situation because only a few are aware of this condition.

While the Blankenship measure will require new taxes in the tidy sum of at least \$30,000,000, most of which would go to the large cities, the Taylor bill would require only \$10,000,000 additional, with the funds available without the necessity of seeking already overtaxed people.

The Texas Research Bureau in making an intensive survey of the \$55 per capita bill, announces that 16 Texas counties will receive \$4,000,000 more than they require should this measure be enacted. In Dallas county, where Representative Blankenship hails from, his schools would receive \$891,436 more than it asks or needs, Harris county, or Houston, would receive the huge amount of \$1,315,596 more than needed. Excess amounts for the other counties are: Bexar, \$880,877; El Paso, \$400,860; Tarrant, \$158,919; Jefferson, \$398,969; Hidalgo, \$400,720; Nueces, \$292,714; Cameron, \$252,411; Potter, \$191,172.

But look at the shortages some Texas counties would have to undergo under the Blankenship \$55 per capita bill, and all these figures can be confirmed. Over in Bowie county, Texas, where H. W. Stillwell, former President of the Texas State Teachers Association lives, his schools would be cut \$66,962, so the minimum of \$2,000 could not be met. It is very interesting to look at Wichita county,

home of Charles Tenneyson, now representing the teachers association lobby here and who is seeking passage of the Blankenship bill. Well, Wichita county, should the latter bill pass, will receive an excess of \$85,231.

Referring to some of the smaller, or rural counties over the state located in various sections, these shortages under the \$55 per capita measure should be called to immediate public attention. Losses in Anderson county will be \$70,976; Angelina, \$23,514; Archer, \$16,144; Baylor, \$67,529; Brazoria, \$33,302; Childress, \$14,648 and many other counties including Wise, Collin, Eastland, Ellis, Denton, Pannin, Gregg, Hunt, Henderson, Parker, Wise, and others.

This is not the entire list of shortages exposed in the Blankenship bill but it is sufficient to give readers an idea of the situation here in Austin, one that is of paramount interest to schools, students, parents of students and to all others. Under the Taylor bill there is provision for a minimum salary of \$2,000 annually for a degree teacher, with \$35 per month added for each additional year of college training; and \$6 per month added for each year of experience up to 12 years experience would receive a total of \$2,880. Any school in Texas with more than 20 scholars can share in the fund under easy requirements, one of them providing that a school shall levy a local maintenance tax of not less than 50 cents on the \$100 property valuation, and have an average daily attendance of 85 percent.

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
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T Hangar Flying . .

According to an article recently appearing in The Cross Country News, a new instrument has been invented to warn pilots of an impending stall regardless of what position the plane may be in. In case some of the readers do not know what a stall is, we will tell you. A stall occurs any time an airplane loses flying speed. When a plane stalls it is completely out of control of the pilot and regardless of where he moves the controls the plane will not respond to them. This instrument will warn the pilot when the plane is nearing the stall before it occurs, which will give the pilot enough time to change the position of the plane or to increase its speed and therefore prevent the plane from unintentionally stalling.



A murderous rape fiend just 17 years old has brought home to Massachusetts the fact that such crimes engender the same horror, wrath, and mob spirit in the hearts of Massachusetts people as similar crimes committed in the South engender in the hearts of Southern people. If not quite so intense, it is only because the people of the North are not quite as warm-hearted as the people of the South. Even so, if the mob that gathered when Robert Coombes was arrested for the murder of little Jacqueline Maxwell, 11, after criminally assaulting her, had gotten organized and in action just a little sooner, Coombes doubtless would have been lynched right in the suburbs of Boston. It is reasonable to believe that if the criminal had been a negro, excitement would have run even higher; and if the perpetration of such crimes should become frequent in New England, as they formerly were in the South, lynchings most certainly would occur there occasionally as they have resulted in the South. The News is not condoning this method of inflicting punishment; however, we are glad that mob violence has become practically extinct in the South.

This patient and thorough judgement, based on thousands of captured documents and hundreds of witnesses' testimony, is in itself a definitive history of the Nazi movement, and of the criminality that was inseparable from its rise and fall.

Copies of this historic document, which marked the culmination of more than ten months of trial of the major Nazi war criminals, may be obtained from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C., at a price of \$1.25 in the cloth-bound edition, or at 45 cents in the pamphlet edition.

RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT DIV. PERSONNEL PROGRAM

(Continued from Page 1) long afterwards, when they undertook to arouse him, they found that he was dead. Following an inquest, the body was taken to a funeral home and the family at Lubbock were notified. The body arrived in Lubbock about 9 o'clock Sunday morning.

Mr. Halsey had united with the Methodist Church early in life but after moving to Lubbock more of ten attended services at the Broadway Church of Christ, of which his wife is a devoted member. Elder John T. Smith of Dallas, a former minister of the Broadway church and a very intimate friend of Mr. Halsey, delivered the funeral discourse in the presence of a congregation that packed the auditorium. Elder Norvelle Young, the present Minister, being in charge of the services. The body was buried in Memorial Park cemetery under the direction of Rix Funeral Home.

Mr. Halsey was born at Rogers in Bell county on Feb. 25, 1888. He graduated at Thomas Arnold High School at Salado and later received his degree in Pharmacy from the Medical College of the University of Texas. After having been employed at Rogers and McAllen, he bought a little drug store at Salado, Bell county, and entered the drug business for himself. 
