SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

Proposing an amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of two new sections to be known as Sections 17 and 18 providing a special fund for the payment of Confederate pensions and providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at state institutions of higher learning; providing for a fivecent reduction in the maximum allowable state tax on property: providing for an election and the issuance of a proclomation therefor Be It Resolved By The Legislature

Of The State Of Texas: Section 1. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Sections 17 and 18 which shall read as

"Section 17. In lieu of the state ad valorem tax on property of Seven (7c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 51 of Article 3, as amended there is hereby levied in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Two (2c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy; frontier organization's and the militia of the State of Texas, and for the widows of such soldiers serving in said armies organizations or militia provided that the Legislature may reduce the tax rate hereinabove

LUBBOCK, May 15.-Nine of the ten top ranking grain sorghum producing counties in Texas for 1945 were on the South Plains, according to figures released by the United States Census Bureau.

No. 1 county in the state was Lamb which grew 5,614,123 bushels of grain sorghum. The only county off the South Plains to break into the first ten was Nueces which raised 2,493,000 bushels and rank-

Other South Plains counties and their rankings were Terry, second: Lynn, third; Lubbock fourth; Bailey, fifth; Hockley, sixth; Dawson, seventh; Parmer, eighth; and Castro tenth.

The South Plains produced 57.5 per cent of the state total of 94,-389.395 bushels of grain sorghum

BUTANE DEALERS ADVISE CUSTOMERS TO REPLACE STORAGE TANKS

With the return to the domestic market of gas-burning appliances in large numbers the problems of a luncheon in her home on Thurs- the engagement of their daughter, the butane industry are increasing rapidly, according to a statement just made by Lyle Blanton of Hereford who is president of the Texas Butane Dealers Association. He pointed out that prior to the war few persons were heavy users of butane and propane as a heating and cooking fuel and that the small storage system in general vogue at the time was ample to meet his needs.

"As the manufacturers get back into production and appliances begin to flow to the markets, thousands of persons are adding ranges, refrigerators, water heaters and space heaters to already overloaded systems," continued Blanton, "with the result there is an unprecedented drain upon their small systems and the customer often finds himself without fuel. This requires frequent trips by the fuel dealer to the customer's premises, but it also raises the more serious question of whether or not the trend will continue to the point where there will not be enough gas produced during the peak months of November, December, January, and February to fulfill the demands. As a matter of fact, this condition did develop in many parts of Texas last year and it appears it will be even worse next winter.

"The logical and practical! answer to the problem," stated the president of the state butane trade association, "is for customers to take out 'winter insurance' by purchasing and installing butane systems large enough so they can 'stock-pile the butane gas during' the summer months when the domestic demand is the lightest. In that way they can have enough fuel on hand at the beginning of! the winter months to carry them through until Spring without another filling of their tank. There is absolutely no loss to the customer from evaporation or shrinkage during the months the gas is being






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
