Three Children Drown In Lake

Legion Is Moving Barracks Here For Improvements

Tahoka Post of the American Legion is this week moving a barracks building recently bought at Camp Berkeley, Abilene, to Tahoka for the purpose of enlarging the Legion hall here.

The two-story, 30 by 80 foot building has been dismantled, and the salvaged material will amount to about 40,000 feet of lumber. The building also includes a heating system, air conditioner, and plumbing. The cost was \$2200.00.

According to Clint Walker, commander of the Legion, the enlarged building will be approximately double the present floor space. It is hoped that work of laying the foundation for the addition may be started next week.

Members of the post will do much of the construction work. Harvey Freeman is chairman of a building committee which is making preliminary arrangements for the construction.

The post now has 195 members, Walker says, and is one of the largest posts in Texas for a town the size of Tahoka.

New officers of the organization will be elected at the next regular business meeting, June 23.

'Alcoholics' Give Lions Program

At the meeting of the Lions Club Tuesday night, the program was given by three members of Alcoholics Anonymous of Lubbock, with Bill Griffin presiding.

The three gentlemen each made talks, all of which were very informative and interesting. It would be a great thing if all of our young people and all the young people throughout our country could hear them, together with a lot of our older people.

They did not pose as prohibitionists or as moral reformers, but the mere recital of their experiences and their testimonies as to the powerful grip that the liquor habit has upon the addicts is enough to cause any sensible person to stop and think. Some people, admitted, could drink liquor without becoming slaves to the habit but many others can not. Over and over again they asserted that no alcoholic could break loose from the habit of his own will alone. They asserted that it was through the work of the "Alcoholics Anonymous" and of God that they were able to win the fight over alcoholism. Alcoholism, one of them asserted, leads invariably either to the penitentiary, to the insane asylum, or to the grave.

Also, they asserted, alcoholism is a disease. The victim is just as helpless in its grasp as is the victim of tuberculosis or any other incurable disease. They made it clear that while they never touch liquor they are still alcoholics. "If I should take one drink, I would be dead drunk tomorrow," they asserted repeatedly. One of them said just one drink would plunge him back to where he was before he joined "Alcoholics Anonymous."

These talks are per se a powerful argument in favor of total abstinence and a mighty warning to every person who thinks he can drink or not drink as he chooses.

New Lynn Lady Takes Own Life

Suffering from ill health, Mrs. Sarah Pauline Brewer, 52, wife of O. E. Brewer living near New Lynn on Route 1 of Tahoka, shot and killed herself in her home at about 11:30 o'clock last Saturday morning.

The body was prepared for burial in the Stanley Funeral Home here and was then conveyed by a Slaton ambulance to that city where funeral services were conducted Sunday with interment in the Slaton cemetery.

The family had moved from Slaton to New Lynn in January, 1944. Mr. Brewer is a farmer.

Survivors include the husband, two daughters, Mrs. E. W. Stokes of Wilson and Mrs. Dessie Mae White of Phillips; one son, Spencer Brewer of Wilson; her mother, Mrs. Gussie Baker of Bridgeport; four sisters, Misses Edna and Gladys Baker of Bridgeport, and Mrs. Opal Harrington and Mrs. Charles E. McKnight of Fort Worth; one brother, Robert Baker of Bridgeport.

Mrs. Brewer was a native of Wise county, having been born at Bridgeport on May 30, 1895, her maiden name being Sarah Pauline Baker. She was married at that place to O. E. Brewer in 1913. She was a member of the Methodist Church. She had been despondent in recent months on account of continued illness. Many friends sympathize with the bereaved family.

Grassland Paving Project Expected To Start Soon

The News is publishing this week Notice for Bids to be opened and contracts let on June 24 for the paving by the State Highway Commission of the short stretch of road running from state highway No. 380 at Central Baptist Church south through Grassland to a connection with the county farm-to-market road recently constructed by Lynn County at a point a short distance south of Grassland, this project embracing a mileage of 2.3 miles of road.

Included in the same contract will be three small stretches of highway in Garza county, one from Pleasant Valley west to the Lubbock-Post highway, about 1 mile; one from Close City south to the Post-Tahoka highway, about two miles; and one south from the Post-Tahoka highway to Graham, about two miles.

This construction will link up Grassland with both Tahoka and Post by state-paved highways. The country south and west of Grassland already is linked up with Tahoka by highway and farm-to-market roads recently constructed.

Wilson Lady Was Buried Sunday

Mrs. A. L. Percue of Wilson, 65, died in the Mercy Hospital in Slaton at 4:40 o'clock last Friday afternoon.

Funeral services were conducted at 3:00 o'clock Sunday afternoon in the First Baptist Church of Slaton by Rev. E. K. Shepherd of Wilson assisted by Rev. W. F. Ferguson, pastor of the Slaton church.

Mrs. Percue had been a resident of the Wilson vicinity for many years and was a member of the Wilson Baptist Church.

Jack Minor, who works in a grocery store in Seagraves, came over last Sunday to visit his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Minor.

Three small children were drowned in the Fred McGinty tank seven miles south of Tahoka at about 1:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon just as the News was about to close its forms for the last run on the paper.

The bodies of two of the victims, Doyle Johnson, 9, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Johnson, who live on the Tahoka-O'Donnell highway at the south edge of the Seven Mile Lake, and Bobby Faye Brooks, also 9, daughter of Mrs. E. W. McDaniell, who lives near by, were brought to the Stanley Funeral Home by Louie Weathers soon after the tragedy occurred to be prepared for burial. The third child, Gladys Rose Johnson, 7, sister of Doyle, was brought to the Tahoka Clinic, where persistent efforts are being made to revive the child, but with little hopes for success.

No funeral arrangements had been made at the time this paper closed its forms and went to press.

The McGinty tank is about a half mile southwest of the Johnson residence.

The children had been forbidden to go in swimming and had been taken away from the tank once by one of the mothers but, child-like, they had slipped back and gone in to the water.

Upon coming to the house for late dinner, Mr. Johnson asked about the children, and then instituted a search. A son and son-in-law went into the tank in search of the bodies. Then Cleveland Littlepage was notified and he hastened to the scene, found the body of Gladys Rose Johnson, and she was the first child rescued from the water, which was 5 or 6 feet deep where she sank. The other bodies were rescued a little later in water 7 or 8 feet deep. The deepest portion of the tank was about 12 feet, according to Fred McGinty.

Doyle Johnson is said to have been a good swimmer but neither of the girls could swim. It is believed that he lost his life in trying to save them.

Consolidation Of Three Districts Up For Vote June 19

Qualified voters residing in the Tahoka, West Point, and Three Lakes school districts will go to the polls next Thursday, June 19, to vote on the consolidation of the three districts.

No school has been maintained in Three Lakes and West Point districts for several years, but the children from these areas have been attending the Tahoka schools on a contract basis.

The consolidation proposal resulted from the Tahoka district's decision to do away with such working agreements and to ask the districts patronizing the Tahoka schools to become a part of the district. Many people believe such consolidation will be better for all concerned. In the first place, it is pointed out, these districts should be a part of this school district if they are to enjoy the privileges offered by it; also, that a better school can be operated on this more permanent basis.

West Point district consists of approximately 70 sections of land and Three Lakes of 32 sections. Thus, 102 sections would be added to the present district. Much of this land, however, is ranch land and much of it lake land and does not carry a high valuation.

In previous elections this spring and summer, the 38-section Redwine district, the 24-section Dixie district, and the 20-section Edith district have been consolidated with the Tahoka district. The old Tahoka district consisted of about 124 sections, and these additions have brought it to a total of 206 sections. If West Point and Three Lakes see fit to join the Tahoka district, its size would be increased to 308 sections.

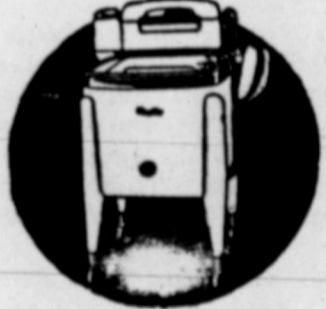

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Cortez' Relic is Authentic; Find Paper Relating History

MEXICO CITY.—Government authorities recently opened a crystal and gold casket said to contain the remains of Hernan Cortez, conqueror of Mexico.

Its contents of a skull, bones and a rolled document were pronounced authentic.

The document, dated December 6, 1836, was found to agree in every detail with a copy possessed by Baeza y Moreno, one of the four discoverers of the urn.

Historians assumed from the date that the casket was removed from its former resting place in the Chapel of Jesus hospital during anti-Spanish riots of 1823, but was not hidden in the wall of the chapel until 13 years later.

The document, signed by church authorities, attested to the authenticity of the casket's contents and briefly recounted their history to that date.

Pres. Avila Camacho has ordered the casket turned over to the National Historical and Anthropological institute for safekeeping.

Britons Squawk Over Service On Latest of Luxury Liners

LONDON.—Britons, resentful at word that steaks and other delicacies are served aboard the liner Queen Elizabeth, got this answer from Cunard White Star line: The food brings in American dollars.

"Dollar earnings of the company's ships are of considerable importance to the country, to say nothing of the sums spent here by visitors," Cunard said. "The Queen Elizabeth must offer service and food comparable with those of her competitors, all of whom are as anxious to obtain American dollars as ourselves."

WASHINGTON.—The army's plans for new blue dress uniforms for officers and enlisted men fell victim to economy and shortage of textiles.

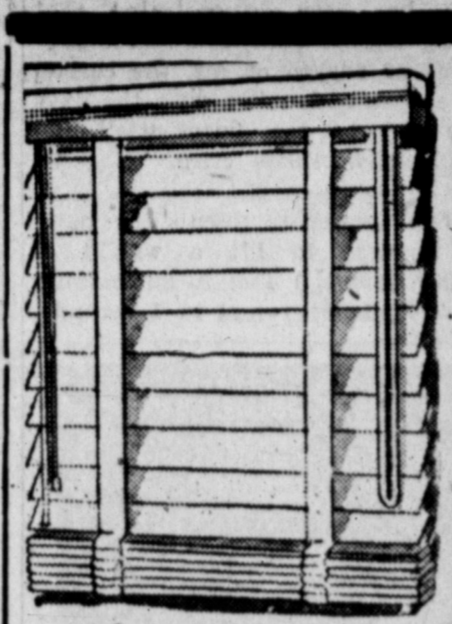
The war department disclosed its new budget estimates omit any request for funds for the resplendent, brass-buttoned garb that has been on display over the country in recent months.

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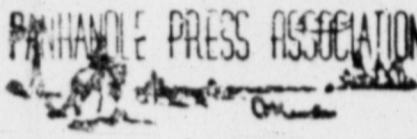

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MORE STRIKES

New major strikes seem to be brewing not only in the coal mining industry but also in some departments of the plant of the Ford Motor Company and other great industrial plants. We are not familiar with the provisions of the Hartley-Taft labor bill recently enacted by Congress and soon to receive the approval or disapproval of the President, nor do we know the nature of the objections to this bill which the President is said to entertain, but it does seem that there ought to be some remedy for the strike evil.

We realize that in our country where the personal rights of the individual are scrupulously guarded it is difficult to enact restrictive legislation without violating some of these rights. But it does seem that when a man breaks a contract and quits his job, even temporarily, the employer has the right to hire another man in his place. And the new employee unquestionably has the right to work at the job. Furthermore, if an employee strikes—quits his job temporarily—for the reason that he thinks he is entitled to higher wages, then the employer has the right to accept or refuse the employee's demand as he sees fit. If he refuses it and the employee still refuses to work, then the employer unquestionably has

the right to hire another man to do the job, and the new employee unquestionably has the right to work at the job.

These truths seem to us to be undeniable and fundamental.

Furthermore, while the Government may not have the right to compel a man to work at any given job for any given price, yet it most certainly does have the right to compel that man to permit another man to take the job and work at it at any price he may see fit to accept. The Government accordingly has the right to enact a law making it a criminal offense to attempt by force or threats to prevent any other man from working at any job on which he has been employed. In view of the attitude of most labor organizations and of their practice of interfering with the right of other men to work, such a law should be passed.

If the Hartley-Taft labor bill goes no further than to recognize these fundamental rights and to protect them by law, then we believe that President Truman should promptly approve the bill. Such a law, backed up by the military power of the United States if and when necessary, would effectively put an end to unjustifiable strikes and to the activities of the labor racketeers.

Members of congress doubtless feel that they have much weightier matters to deal with, and most of them furthermore are doubtless afraid to incur the wrath of the powerful liquor interests of this nation, but things are coming to the point where something should be done to curb the operations and the power of this gigantic monster that is sinking its claws deeper and deeper year by year into the vitals of America. This monster is an expert psychologist. It learned a long time ago that "Vice is a monster of so frightful mien as to be hated needs but to be seen, yet, seen too oft familiar with her face, we first endure, then pity, then embrace." It is therefore daily poking its horrid face into every home in America by means of the radio, the newspaper, and the magazine. Our children and our young people and even their parents are seeing its face and hearing its voice in the home and by the fireside so constantly that they have almost come to regard the liquor demon as a benevolent friend and forget that its

sole purpose is to sell more and more liquor, which will mean the wrecking of more and more homes, more and more lives, and the creation of more and more hell on earth. If the present trend keeps up, there will be ten times as many Alcoholics Anonymous ten years from today as there are today. Congress should pass a law prohibiting liquor advertising by radio, by press, by roadside signs and pictures, throughout this fair land of ours. We need some more Morris Shepherds and Andrew J. Volsteads in congress today.

The liquor interests in the legislature got in their work all right. They tacked a little amendment onto some kind of regulatory measure enacted by that body during the last days of the session that will have the effect of practically emasculating local prohibition in many of the counties of Texas. They claim that it will not apply to about 87 counties of the state but it will apply to the other 163. How will it work, Well, it provides that in any of the counties to which it applies, whether dry now or voted dry hereafter, any incorporated town or city therein or any political subdivision such as a justice precinct can turn right in and vote itself wet if wet sentiment happens to prevail in that portion of the county. For example, in Gaines county, now dry, Seagraves can call an election and vote itself wet if a majority of the voters within that town are "wets", which apparently is the case. That would destroy county-wide prohibition in Gaines county. The law applies in the same way to about 164 other counties of the state. Most of the "drys" in the legislature seemed to be asleep at the switch, if indeed they are "drys." We were glad to note that the aged Judge S. J. Isaacs of El Paso fought the measure. He was district judge of the Midland district years ago and was a good one. We need more men of his type in the legislature.

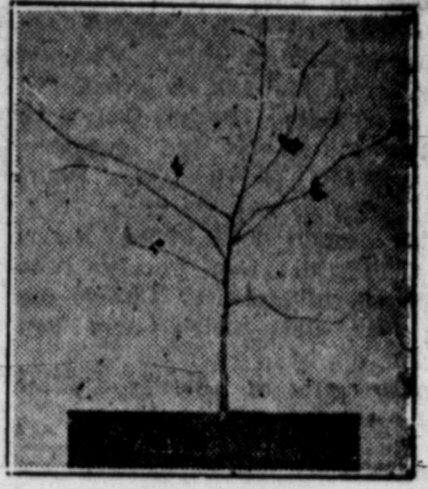

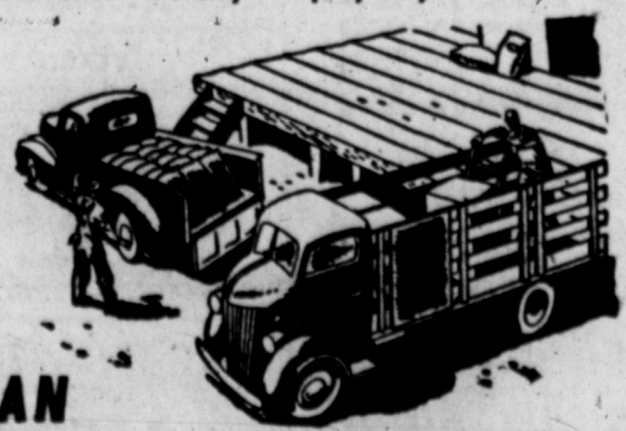

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Welfare 'Key' Found by Group
Churchmen Work Quietly to Help Institutions Improve Their Services.

LOUISVILLE, KY.—Two hundred Louisville churchmen have found a way to translate practical Christianity into practical government. They quietly study jails, courts, hospitals and public homes; they observe conditions, compare practices with those in other states and have a program to suggest before they criticize.
The group is known as the committee on institutions of the Louisville Council of Churches. It was formed five years ago.
A subcommittee studies an institution or department. Then it calls on the official in charge and discusses its investigation.
If it has criticisms it doesn't rebuke the official. In fact, it starts out by finding something he has done which it may commend. It recognizes the handicaps under which he may be working. Maybe it's lack of funds. Maybe it's antiquated buildings or equipment. Maybe it's lack of trained personnel.

Basic Assumption.
The general committee starts out on the assumption that every officeholder would rather do a good job than a poor one. And it offers the backing, indirectly at least, of about 400 churches, with an approximate membership of 100,000.
The committee doesn't care who gets the credit for improvements or reforms. The main thing is to get the job done.
Institutions which have felt the admonishing but sympathetic hand of the churchmen are the Central State Hospital for the Insane at Lakeland, the State reformatory at La Grange, the Jefferson county juvenile court and children's (detention) center and Louisville General hospital.

Prevention receives much attention from the committee. For instance, the child-care division, headed by Charles Walters, learned that the police crime prevention bureau keeps a spot map showing the homes of all juvenile offenders. Studying this chart, the committee noted an area which had been producing many boy delinquents.
A church which owned an unused building in the area rented it to the committee for \$1 a year. The committee persuaded the community chest to provide funds and the Salvation Army furnished a worker. Now there is a flourishing boys' club in the area.

Tasks for Chaplains.
At the juvenile court, La Grange reformatory and Lakeland Mental hospital, the committee has placed chaplains. These are not just ministers to look after the spiritual welfare of their charges, though they do that, too. These clergymen have been specially trained to work among delinquents or the mentally deficient. They also work with the inmates' families.
Lawyers, teachers, business men—all the professional resources of Louisville—are tapped to aid the committee's projects.

Groups of citizens worked with the budget committee of the legislature to obtain an increase in the Lakeland hospital per capita appropriation by 50 per cent.
A subcommittee is studying the case histories of the residents of the county Home for the Aged to see what makes an elderly citizen dependent upon public funds.
All subcommittees have long-range and short-range objectives. For example, the jail committee has been working on the immediate aim of making the city lockup clean. At the same time, it has the eventual goal of abolishing both the jail and an antiquated "workhouse" in favor of a prison farm.

The new shape won't get any billing in Hollywood, but the hog of the future will provide more roast loin pork and better bacon, animal husbandry experts say on the basis of research being conducted by the department at Beltsville, Md.
The new pig shape is being developed from the Landrace hog of Denmark. Breeders say they are succeeding in eliminating two shortcomings in the breed—its tendency to be too lean and the fact its skin is too white and tender.
A greater proportion of the improved Landrace pig's weight is deposited in the high-priced cuts—the ham, loin, bacon and shoulder butt, the department says.

LONDON.—A German bomb fell on the home of Iris Ada Porter in December, 1940, killing her husband and her baby and seriously injuring the 33-year-old Ilford housewife herself.
Iris Ada Porter died recently, six years after the tragedy.
"Death due to enemy action," Coroner P. B. Skiels recorded at an inquest.

Check your fields closely where your crop land is bordered by pasture land and where weeds are large enough on the turn rows to harbor these hoppers.

Poison is available, all you need to do is report your needs. This poison is furnished by the U.S.D.A. so the only cost is a small storage and mixing charge.

Tech Officials Favor Amendment

LUBBOCK, June 10.—Passage of a proposed amendment to the Texas constitution, creating a special building fund for state colleges, is the only certain method of obtaining critically needed buildings for Texas Technological College, officials declare.

Unless this amendment is passed, Texas Tech will be unable to take care of its present needs for classroom, laboratory and other essential buildings, including a building for physical and health education, they said.

Texas Tech would receive \$7,425,000 under the 30-year program, more than one and one half times the sum invested in the college's buildings, and more than three times the amount appropriated by the legislature since the college opened its doors 22 years ago. Total investment in buildings on the campus now stands at \$4,004,784.99.

The amendment will be submitted to a vote in a special election next August 23. College officials pointed out that the special fund would not increase ad valorem taxes now authorized by law. It would reduce from 35 to 30 cents per \$100 valuation the maximum property tax that may be levied for state general fund support, and would assign from the presently authorized 7-cent per \$100 valuation property tax for confederate pension purposes a 5-cent portion for the building fund.

Wayland Starts Enlargement Drive

Arrival of George Stokes, recently appointed member of the Wayland College staff, marks the beginning of an intensive effort to further the Wayland enlargement campaign this summer, announces Dr. J. W. Marshall, former personnel secretary of the Baptist Foreign Mission Board, and newly-elected president of the Baptist college at Plainview.

Assuming his duties as head of the \$385,000 enlargement program, Stokes pointed out that the campaign is especially geared to the predominantly agricultural plains country. The chief plan for raising funds is a campaign to have part of unharvested crops and the increase of livestock designated for Wayland College. Any type of product, including cotton, feed, sugar beets, potatoes, alfalfa, and all kinds of livestock, may be pledged and donated.

Under the program designed to allow easy participation by the farmers of the plains area, a donor may designate a given number of acres, bushels, or head of livestock, and market that acreage or livestock in the name of Wayland.

The money received in this campaign will be used for immediate expansion at Wayland, including such projects as a new girls' dormitory, a dining hall, faculty apartments, repairs on present buildings, and extension of the departments of agriculture and science, Stokes said.

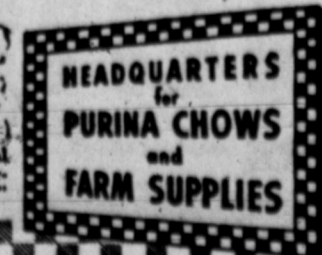

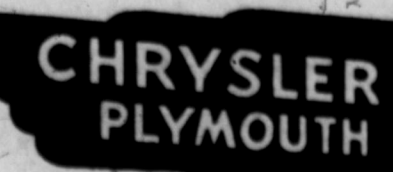

Sidelights From Washington

 Friends of the Army Air Forces and the cause of national defense won a victory in the House of Representatives last week which will be a warning to the world that the United States is not planning to surrender her position as the world's greatest air power.

The controversy over U. S. air power arose when the Appropriations Committee, the Committee upon which I serve, slashed \$40,000,000 from funds recommended for the purchase of new airplanes. The request for the funds had been made of Congress by the Chief of the Army Air Forces, the Secretary of War and the President. The

Committee then requested the House to approve the slash.

In Committee I had offered an amendment to restore the airplanes which had been denied but I was overwhelmingly defeated. When the bill came up in the House of Representatives I took up the fight again, re-offering the amendment to restore the funds for the airplane.

The Republican leadership fought the amendment and the question was debated for a pair of three days.

Finally, in the last half hour of the debate, Congressman Andrews of New York, the Republican Chairman of the House Committee on Armed Forces, took the Floor in support of my amendment and in support of my contention that the Appropriations Committee had misrepresented the facts and the figures in regard to army air power. This broke the back of the opposition and shortly thereafter the amendment was accepted and passed the House. A number of Members of Congress from Texas were very aggressive in the successful effort to restore the funds.

I argued that it would be inexcusable for us today, or at any future time, to start down the road to a second rate air force and an inadequate national defense program. I was stated that the defeat of the airplane request would be a slap in the wind which lead to disastrous international consequences. I pointed out that the army appropriations bill contained savings in funds to the extent of \$475,000,000 and that the expenditure of the additional \$40,000,000 provided in my amendment for army airplanes would not seriously interfere with the economy program.

Without my amendment there were already sufficient funds in the bill to provide 561 airplanes. With the Amendment the bill provides for 749 aircraft of the latest type the planes to come off the assembly line within two years.

Funds were not reduced for the National Guard, the ROTC units in high schools and colleges, and Reserve Officer training otherwise. No cut was made in funds requested for the important work of research and development. The bill reduced War Department civilian personnel by 74,600 employees and officer personnel by 18,000, it being felt that the Army was somewhat top heavy with officers. The bill provides for an army of 1,070,000 men during the period June 30, 1947 to July 1, 1948. The total funds in the bill exceed \$5,000,000,000.

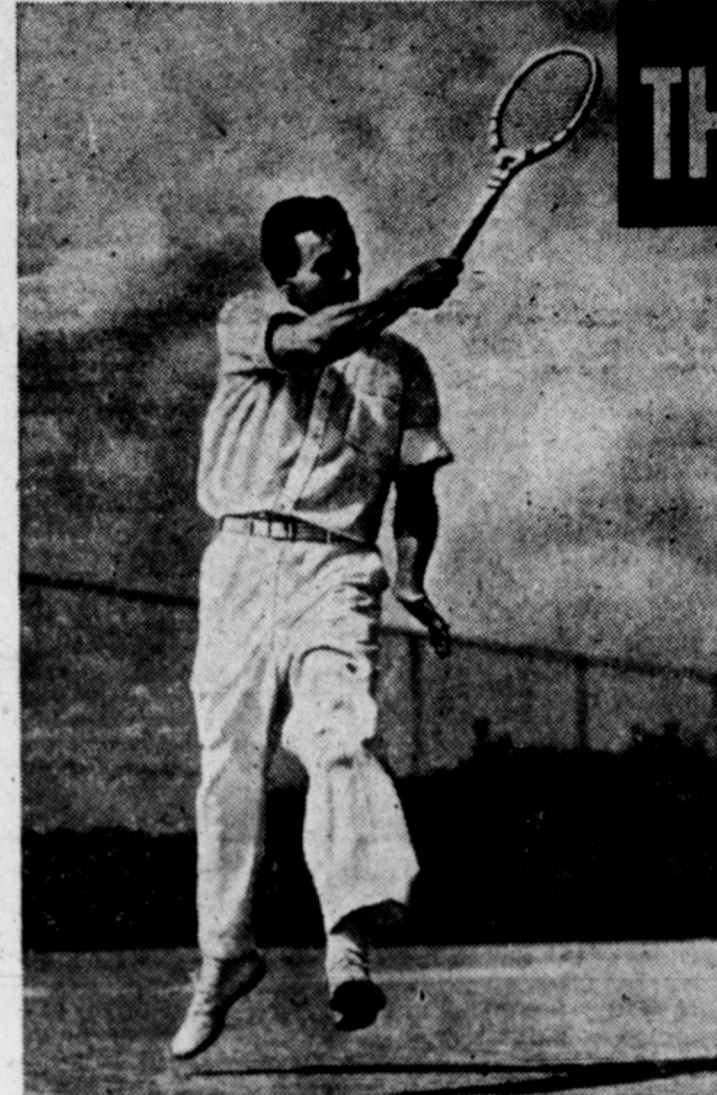

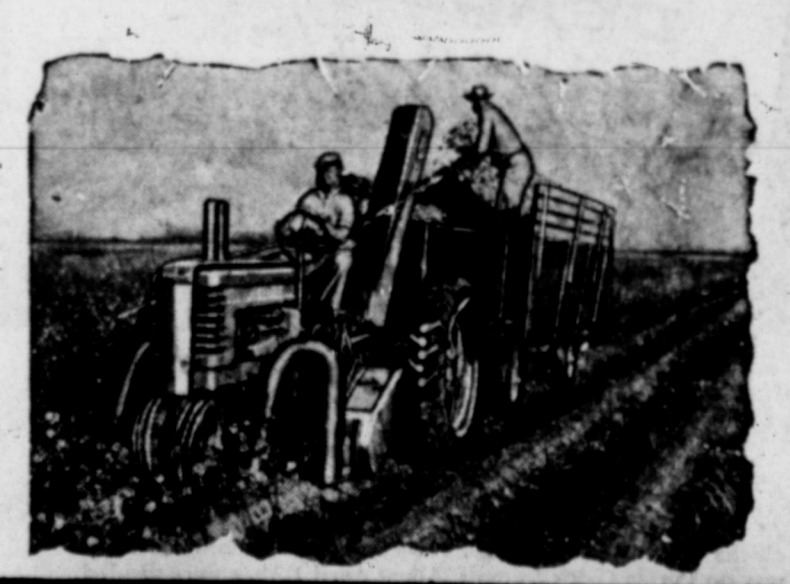

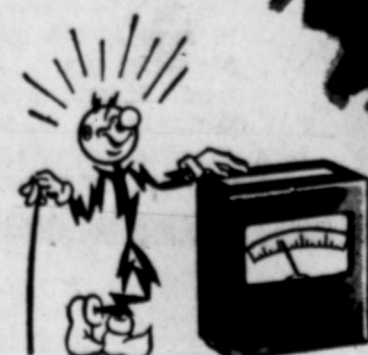

Soaring Costs Balk Building by Cities

Survey Shows Public Works Are Stalled Over Country.

CHICAGO. — Public works programs of many American cities have been stopped by the barrier of soaring construction costs, according to a survey.

The International City Managers' association said that of 17 cities queried, "nearly all" reported curtailing construction of capital improvements because of nearly 100 per cent increases in building costs. A further drain on city funds, the association said, came from demands of city employees for wage increases and the necessity of extending some city services to new developments regardless of cost.

The association cited Muskegon, Mich., as a "typical example" of public works curtailment. Work on the city's sewage disposal plant was suspended because work estimated to cost \$500,000 last year now would require a \$900,000 outlay.

Bartlesville, Okla., reported that it might have to ration water next summer because the cost of constructing a new pumping station has become prohibitive. Grand Junction, Colo., rejected bids on a water-works because inflation put costs above budget limits.

Berkeley, Calif., recently adopted a policy of rejecting bids above normal price levels on all but "emergency" projects. Austin, Tex., announced postponement of construction of new municipal building for which plans have been completed.

Municipal pay increases and extension of essential city services to new residential districts stymied the public works programs of Long Beach, Calif., and High Point, N. C. Long Beach postponed building new fire stations and libraries while High Point curtailed its public works program.

Despite construction curtailments, more than half the 17 cities surveyed had to increase taxes to meet current costs. Three cities lowered 1946 tax rates, but higher property valuations generally increased total revenues.

An Artesian Well Now Sprouting Electricity

DES MOINES, IOWA.—An artesian well of electricity which sends out a current strong enough to illuminate a light bulb or play a six volt battery radio has been discovered at the site of a new transmitter building for radio station KSO here.

The current comes from 80,000 feet of No. 8 gauge bare copper wire buried a foot under ground at the site.

"Apparently the electricity is the result of the difference in potentials between the earth currents in the sand and gumbo in which the wire is buried," Orrie M. Miller, station electrician, said.

A diamond will glow in the manner of luminous paint after exposure to sunlight or in the presence of radium.
