## Bulldogs Open Football Season At Crosbyton

Tahoka Bulldogs will open their 1947 football season tonight at 8 o'clock against the Crosbyton Chiefs in that city. Little is known here of the Chiefs, except that they will outweigh the Bulldogs about seven pounds per man and their fans are hoping for a championship in their district this year.

Coch J. Poust and Jake Jacobs have been working the Bulldogs aspirants from two to four hours daily since Sept. 1, but the coaches say they do not yet have the boys "clicking" as they should. Tahoka may or may not have an excellent team this year, depending to a great extent on how much fight and determination the would-be Bulldogs have this year.

Though not a heavy team, material is much better in both quantity and quality this year than it was last.

Coch Poust has not decided on a starting line-up definitely, but many of the 36 squadmen are due to see some service tonight at Crosbyton. The smaller and younger boys are receiving some valuable training for future Bulldog teams.

## C. W. Cleveland, Pioneer, Buried

Funeral services were conducted at 3:30 Saturday afternoon, September 6, at Stanley Funeral Chapel, for Cyrus W. Cleveland, 82, who had been a resident of Lynn county for more than forty years and who died at 2:00 o'clock Friday morning at the home of his daughter and his son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Littlepage, in the Midway community a few miles south of Tahoka.

Services were conducted by Elder V. J. Lowrance, pastor of the Primitive Baptist Church here of which deceased had long been a member, and burial was under the direction of the Stanley Funeral Home. Pall bearers were: Bill Corley of Tahoka; Rob Doss and A. T. McCampbell of Post, Martin Freeman and J. A. Freeman of Brownfield, and D. Richardson of Lubbock.

Survivors include Mrs. R. L. Littlepage, a daughter; and two sons, W. D. Cleveland of Portales, New Mexico, and Jess Cleveland of El Paso. Also surviving is a sister, Mrs. Susie Anderson of Knox City. His wife died here in 1935, and his body was buried beside her grave in the Tahoka cemetery.

Mr. Cleveland was a native of Gonzales county, having been born there on March 30, 1865, and lived for years in Bell county. He came from Bell to Lynn county more than forty years ago and as one of the pioneers of this county he was well known to all the oldtimers as well as to many of the later arrivals.

He engaged in farming and stock raising until prevented by the infirmities of age, and since the death of his wife about twelve years ago, he had lived with his children, mostly with Mr. and Mrs. Littlepage. He also greatly enjoyed visits with his friends. While he had become somewhat feeble, he was still able to be up and to go wherever he pleased, and it is believed that death resulted from a stroke of some kind.

Many friends were grieved at his departure.

## Officers Making Many Arrests On Liquor Violations

Scouting along up the highway Saturday night, Sheriff Sam Floyd and Deputy Tom Hale espied a car parked out beside the road and a man out of the car drinking a bottle of beer. Figuring that that was the time and the place to unearth something, the sheriff and deputy quickly slowed down, wheeled around, and doubled back to investigate.

They found two men instead of one, and from the parked car they extracted one case of whiskey and six cases of beer. The case of whiskey consisted of 48 half-pint bottles. They took charge of the men, the car, and the liquor and brought them all down to the courthouse.

Charges of transporting liquor were filed against the driver and he was lodged in jail. On Monday morning, he entered a plea of guilty in the county court and he was fined \$100 and costs.

On Tuesday afternoon, the attention of the sheriff and his deputy was attracted to a man driving off south on the highway at a terrific rate of speed. They got into the sheriff's car and gave chase but were not able to overtake and to stop the wild driver until he had almost reached Lamesa. He appeared to be pretty drunk, and it is a marvel that he didn't wreck his car. He was brought back to Tahoka and given a berth in jail. On Wednesday morning he entered his plea of guilty in the county court to a charge of drunken driving and was assessed a fine of \$100.00 and costs.

Also on Tuesday afternoon, Deputy Tom Hale and Deputy Dee Sanders took into tow two men in a truck about four miles down the highway south. A charge of drunken driving was filed against one of them, and his case was still pending Wednesday. He had indicated an intention of contesting the charge.

## Wharton Builds Large Addition

Work was begun Monday morning on an addition to the already large building of Winston Wharton in which he conducts his various lines of business. The addition is to be 45 by 88 feet in size, adding 3,960 square feet to his floor space.

The addition is being constructed onto the rear of his present large and attractive building, extending across its entire width of 88 feet and extending back 45 feet to the street on the east side.

Most of the additional space will be used in the expansion of the workshop and of the parts department.

Construction will be of steel, brick and tile.

The present building was constructed just a few years ago, but Mr. Wharton's business has expanded so rapidly that additional floor space became very necessary. He is seeking to meet the need.

## Reese Joins S.M.U. Journalism Faculty

Martin Sylvester Reese, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Reese of this city, has been named an assistant professor of Journalism at Southern Methodist University, Dallas, according to a letter to his parents received last week end. He has been engaged in the real estate business in that city for the past several months.

Sylvester received his apprenticeship as a printer in The News shop, later attended Texas Tech majoring in Journalism and Business Administration while working in the Tech print shop, received his B. A. and M. A. degrees, and served for a time as superintendent of the Tech shop, later was advertising manager of a South Texas Paper, and then went into the Navy as a commissioned officer. He and his wife, a Dallas girl, have been living in that city since his discharge from the service.

## Legion Receives Aid On Building

The American Legion building fund has received a substantial contribution of \$70.63 from the old Texas State Guard company, according to Jess Gurley and Clint Walker of the Legion. This fund was left in the bank when the local guard company disbanded and the gift was authorized by E. R. Edwards, H. O. Hargett, and H. L. Roddy, who were commissioned officers of the company when it was disbanded.

Members of the Legion have contributed about \$300 to the building fund, and several civic organizations are considering plans to aid the Legion financially, in order that the Legion Hall enlargement program may be effected.

The Legion will sponsor the appearance of Harley Sadler and his tent theatre in its showing here during October.

## Baptists Purchase South Side Lot

The First Baptist Church has purchased a lot with a two-room residence situated on it about two blocks south of the public square and facing the O'Donnell highway, with a view to erecting thereon at some early date a building to be used for religious services.

The small house on the lot is to be sold or moved off and a suitable building for church services built or bought and moved upon the premises. It is contemplated that in the course of time a second Baptist Church will be organized for the convenience of residents of south Tahoka and any others who may prefer to attend services there.

## Tahoka Schools Open 1947-48 Session With Record Enrollment, Enlarged Faculty, Many Plant Improvements

### Fenton Builds Units For Mexican Laborers

Buster Fenton has just about completed a big apartment house for the use of Mexican cotton pickers who will soon be flocking into this county.

The house is situated just south of the Rollin McCord building near the southeast corner of the public square. Its dimensions are 28 by 126 feet, running east and west. It is to be divided into eighteen rooms and will house temporarily a comparatively large number of cotton-pickers.

The house will be finished inside with sheet iron but will have a stucco finish outside.

### School Lunch Room Opening

The school lunch room will be operated again this year, under the direction of Mr. and Mrs. Urban Brown, according to Superintendent Vernon Brewer, and Mr. Brown, at his request is giving the following information for the benefit of pupils and patrons alike.

"The price of the lunches this year will be 25 cents," Mr. Brown states. "This increase in the price of the lunches has been brought about by a decrease in the appropriation of funds by the Government for these lunches."

"In the past years the Government has reimbursed the school nine cents on each meal served, and this year the reimbursement has been decreased to six cents. There has also been an increase in the price of groceries over last year."

"There are also certain other requirements which must be met in order to draw this reimbursement from the Government. Some of these requirements are: The Government furnishes certain surplus foods, such as potatoes, spinach, beans, and a few other foods, which must be served. They also furnish a list of abundant foods which must be bought and served. Suggested menus are also furnished, and they must be followed in so far as possible."

"These things plus a few others go to make the operation of the lunch room a far greater problem than many people realize."

Mr. Brewer stated that lunches this week are being served in the gymnasium, awaiting the completion of the cafeteria, but they expect to open the cafeteria next Monday.

A total of 257 lunches were served the first day of school.

### Walker's Brother Killed Accidentally

Mr. and Mrs. Paul Walker returned on Wednesday night of last Paul's brother Joe Walker and the county, after having attended funeral services on Tuesday for week from Cotton Center. Hale latter's wife, who died as the result of a head-on collision of two cars on the highway east of Spade as the couple were returning from Anton to their home at Cotton Center, about sunset Sunday afternoon.

Mrs. Walker died instantly and her husband died about five hours later in a hospital. It was reported that the couple in the other car were critically injured.

Attending the funeral services from Tahoka, in addition to the Walkers, were Mr. and Mrs. J. Y. Thompson, Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Thompson, Clayton Beard, and E. D. Robison.

Paul Walker's survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Walker of Cotton Center; three brothers, Paul of Tahoka, Herbert and John Walker of Hale county; two sisters, Mrs. Helen Huffman of Lockney and Mrs. Annie Laura Brown of Hale county; and a step-son, Michael White.

Joe Walker was a veteran of the late World War, serving in the Medical corps of the Army, and saw service overseas. He had not often visited in Tahoka.

A little more than 800 students registered in the Tahoka schools during the first two days this week, 803 to be exact.

Of this number, 767 are Whites and 36 are Negroes.

In the high school, 235 pupils registered, and in the grade school, white, 532 registered.

Quite a number are yet expected to register, especially in the high school.

The pupils of all the original districts that recently consolidated with the Tahoka district, with the exception of the pupils from Redwine, were already attending the Tahoka school by transfer and by contract with the Tahoka trustees. Only the Redwine district is sending new pupils to the Tahoka schools.

In addition to the pupils of the consolidated district, high school pupils from Grassland and Midway are also being admitted to the Tahoka school.

Supt. Vernon Brewer reports that there are now 31 white teachers and one colored teacher on the Tahoka school faculty. One additional teacher, Mrs. Tom Gill, was employed by the Board of trustees Tuesday.

A spiedic faculty of teachers has been employed with an increase of salaries, which, it is believed, will encourage the most proficient teachers to remain in the profession rather than to accept other work because of better pay. This will be good for the morale of the school.

Furthermore, a greater abundance of satisfied teachers will enable the board of trustees to weed out gradually such teachers as may prove to be unsatisfactory.

So, although Tahoka already has one of the finest school systems of any town its size in the entire Plains area, the prospects are that this system will gradually be improved until the Tahoka schools become notable for their proficiency.

Mr. Brewer also announces that the Tahoka colored school has been given affiliation as such, so that its graduates can hereafter enter any of the state colored institutions of higher learning without examination. Miss Paralee Sayles, the teacher, is due much of the credit for this achievement. Some of the credit, of course, goes to the board of trustees for constructing an adequate building and providing additional equipment for this school. Although this school has been duly accredited, it must be conceded that another teacher for this school really is needed.

We believe, Mr. Superintendent and members of the faculty, that the patrons of the school and the people generally of the entire consolidated district, are with you heart and soul, and are intent in backing you up to the utmost in your efforts to make this school term the best and most successful in every way that Tahoka has ever had.

Yes, our hats off to you.

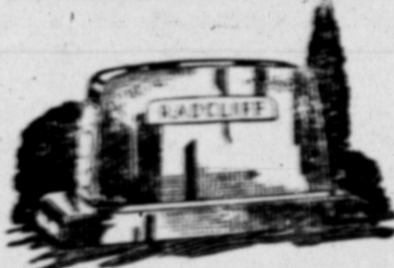

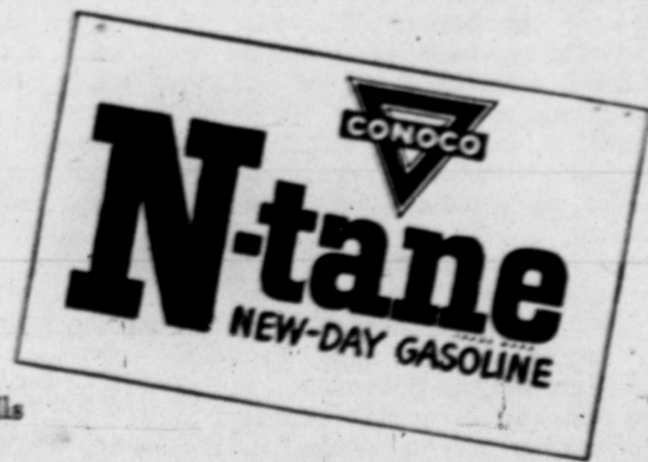

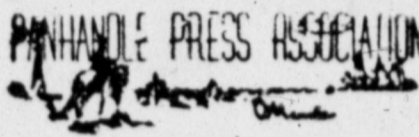

**BOYS, LEARN ENGLISH, NOT JARGON**

Tahoka's greatly expanded school system opened its doors Monday morning and registration of pupils began almost immediately. All the other consolidated schools of the county also opened on Monday or on the preceding Monday, O'Donnell, Wilson, and New Home. A few other public schools teaching only elementary grades will also function during the current school year.

That the public schools of today, on the whole, are far more proficient than were the public schools of a generation ago will be conceded by nearly everybody. The curriculum is much broader, in the first place, and the average school student is taught much about many subjects that were scarcely taught at all in the schools of thirty or forty years ago.

However, we have one criticism to offer, which is intended to be of a constructive nature. It is no reflection on any teacher. Our criticism is that, due largely to the fact that the curriculum properly and necessarily includes a much wider range of subjects than formerly, the student is allowed to neglect some of the fundamental and most vital of all subjects taught and therefore, at the end of his

high school life, we find him woefully lacking in knowledge of these fundamental subjects. This is notably true with respect to the English language. Many high school graduates can not write a dozen simple sentences without committing two or three or a half dozen gross errors. Many of them know practically nothing about grammar or about the various figures of speech. They wouldn't know a metaphor from a simile if they should meet the two in the road; and we doubt if they know much about the conjugations of verbs or the inflection of nouns or pronouns.

This of course does not apply to all high school graduates, but what many high school graduates know about English is truly pitiful. If it were our business to hand out advice to students it would be: Major in English, from the lower grades on up through high school. Now, we have stuck out our neck, for we realize that many errors in English appear weekly in these columns, even in the editorials. Wish we could write better English.

**CON. GOSSETT PROPOSES BETTER WAY OF ELECTING PRESIDENT (First In A Series)**

A few months ago we stated editorially that Congressman Ed Gossett of the Wichita Falls district had proposed a Constitutional Amendment proposing a more direct method of electing the President of the United States and we pointed out vigorously some of the reasons why the proposal should receive general support.

Recently an address which Mr. Gossett made in Congress in support of the proposal came into our hands, and it contains so much information and is so educational, and states the case with so much clarity and cogency, that we have decided to give space to a portion of it each week for several weeks in our paper, just as a public service. We hope that every man and woman interested in the welfare of our country shall read the various portions of this address as they appear from week to week.

Mr. Gossett himself knows nothing about our intention to thus publish his address.

**The Address**

The Government of the United States is by all odds the biggest and most important business in the world. When a young nation we could muddle through more easily and could make mistakes with less injury than we can today. We have now come of age. Our domestic and foreign responsibilities are staggering. Unless we make democracy work at home we have little chance of teaching it abroad. There is an old facetious and vulgar saying that "God looks after sailors, drunks, and the United States of America."

God has been good to us indeed, but He may not always smile upon us. In the matter of reform, we are often like the Irishman who refused to repair his roof when the sun was shining. There is at least one major repair job that should be made before our structure of

Government is seriously impaired—before some storm blows our house down. This is to abolish electors and the electoral college and to substitute an honest and democratic method of electing Presidents.

This subject is by no means new. In fact it is as old as the Government itself. Many resolutions to this effect have been introduced in the Congress from time to time. In the Seventy-second and Seventy-third Congresses, House committees unanimously reported such resolutions, of which Congressman Lea of California was the author. In 1934, the Senate twice voted on a proposal by Senator Norris to do away with electors. The first vote was 42 yeas to 24 nays, and the next vote was 52 yeas to 29 nays. In both cases, the necessary two-thirds vote was lacking. Senator Lodge, of Massachusetts, introduced a resolution in 1941 providing for the election of Presidents by direct popular vote. He has again introduced such a resolution in this Congress.

Under the existing system, as you know, no citizen has ever been permitted to vote directly for a President. In fact, under our present system, the votes of millions of our citizens do not count in the final tally. We elect the most important officer of our Government through a hocus-pocus method called the electoral college. We vote for electors, who in turn, through a dubious, confused, and technical procedure, vote for one of the candidates for President. The candidate who receives the greatest number of popular votes in a particular state gets all of the electoral vote of that particular state, each state having a number of electoral votes equal to the number of its members in the Congress. If no candidate gets a majority of the electoral votes of the nation, the issue is then thrown into the Congress to be decided among the high three candidates.

The several Resolutions now pending before our Judiciary Committee would do simply this: Abolish the electors and the electoral college and provide that one vote directly for the candidate of his choice for President and Vice President. We retain the electoral vote however. Under the proposed reform New York would still have 47 electoral votes, Pennsylvania 35, Texas 23, and so forth. We would not tamper with or change the relative voting strength of the States or the States' absolute control of the franchise and of elections. These matters would be left to local State sovereignty and responsibility. However, a candidate

would get a proportion of the electoral vote of each State in the exact ratio with his popular vote. In other words, if the Republican candidate received 33 and one half per cent of the popular vote in Texas, he would get 33 and one half per cent of our 23 electoral votes. You would have a direct vote on the President in terms of electoral votes. The count becomes a matter of exact mathematics. The high man wins.
