## Basketball Boys Are Ready For Intensive Season

Though the Tahoka Bulldog basketball team, in training only ten days, is playing a practice game with the O'Donnell Eagles in O'Donnell's fine, new gymnasium Thursday night as The News goes to press, the official opening of the local schedule will not be until after January 1st.

Tahoka is about two weeks behind most teams in this area in basketball training brought about by the long football season during which Tahoka advanced to bi-district play.

However, Coach Jake Jacobs says the squad is coming along nicely. Most of the boys need a lot of training but he hopes to field a creditable team that should win a lot of games, but he thinks the boys will have a rough time in district competition this year with such teams as Abernathy, Post, O'Donnell, Slaton, and Sundown, all in the south zone of basketball district 5A. Winners of the south half will meet winners of the north half, which is composed of Leveland, Littlefield, Sudan, Morton, Oton, Springlake, and Muleshoe.

The Bulldogs are entering the Post tournament being held Jan. 1, 2, and 3, will hold an invitation tournament here January 16 and 17, and plan to enter some other tournament later.

In addition to the conference schedule, which follows, the Bulldogs will also schedule several other non-conference games.

The conference schedule follows: Slaton at Tahoka, date to be set. Jan. 6, Tahoka at O'Donnell. Jan. 9, Sundown at Tahoka. Jan. 13, Tahoka at Post. Jan. 23, Tahoka at Slaton. Jan. 27, O'Donnell at Tahoka. Feb. 3, Tahoka at Sundown. Feb. 6, Post at Tahoka. Feb. 13, Tahoka at Abernathy.

New sweat suits for the team have arrived and new playing suits are expected by January 1.

Wednesday, Finis Botkin, forward, was elected by the squad to captain the team.

This is Coach Jacobs' first year as Bulldog basketball coach. He was captain of the West Texas State team last year and was named on the all-Border Conference team for two seasons.

## 100 People Will Die This Christmas In Traffic Accidents, Officers Estimate

Sheriff Sam Floyd this week received a letter from Governor Beauford Jester in which the Governor issues a plea for extreme vigilance on the part of officers and the general public during the holiday season in the prevention of automobile accidents.

"It is my solemn duty, he writes to acquaint the citizens of this state with the grim prediction of traffic deaths and injuries during the coming Christmas holiday season.

"The Texas Department of Public Safety predicts that 100 persons will die, 2,870 will be injured, from accidents on our streets and

highways during the eleven day period, December 20-31. It is expected that the final 1947 traffic death toll will reach 2,100—the worst toll in Texas history.

"These predicted deaths and injuries are not inevitable. They can and must be prevented. Such sickening slaughter and suffering would be a stark negation of the Christmas message of 'on earth peace, good will toward men.'"

The Governor urges "each citizen to impose upon himself such discipline and a sense of responsibility for the welfare of others that his acts behind-the-wheel may not lead to death of his fellow man.

## Cecil Jones Dies In Car Wreck

Cecil Ben Jones, 41, a resident of Lynn county for the past eleven years, was instantly killed near Mason about 9:15 o'clock last Friday when the pick-up in which he and two nephews were riding collided with a truck driven by a Mexican.

The body as brought to Tahoka in a Stanley ambulance and funeral services were conducted Sunday afternoon in the Baptist Church in the Petty community where deceased had been living, and burial followed in the Tahoka cemetery.

Mr. Jones and two nephews, Zane and J. W. Box of Brownfield, were on their way to Mason for a deer hunt and had reached a point on the highway two miles west of Mason when the accident occurred. The News has no further details as to the collision. The two Box brothers sustained severe bruises and lacerations and received treatment in a hospital in Brady. The Mexicans, who occupied the truck, were only slightly hurt, it is said.

Funeral services were conducted by Rev. Stephens, a Methodist Minister of Woodrow. The Stanley Funeral Home here had charge of all arrangements.

Born in Dublin, Texas, in 1906, Mr. Jones had removed with his family to Lynn county in 1936, and was a highly respected citizen of the Petty community.

Relatives surviving him include his wife, Mrs. Rachel Jones; two sons, H. M. and Weldon, and two daughters, Jerildine and Joyce; his mother, Mrs. Laura E. Jones, two brothers, Otto and H. W., all of the Petty community; three sisters, Mrs. Iza Melton, Mrs. Trever Box, and Mrs. Madeline Masingale, all of Brownfield; and other relatives.

Pall bearers were Lee Cromer of Lubbock, Herschel Jones of Tahoka, G. B. McAllister, Algie Brown, W. L. Bledsoe and Joe Jones, all of Petty.

Each year some other organization has helped the American Legion in seeing that the right children receive these toys on Christmas day. This year the Boy Scouts will be in charge of this part of the distribution of the toys.

## Close City Robbers Caught By 'Law'

The three men who staged the daring robbery of the Close City store and service station two weeks ago today and who hid out at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Olen Long, who live two miles south of Grassland, in this county, for nineteen hours, are being held by state and federal officers in Arizona, according to Sheriff Sam Floyd.

There is little doubt but that the three held were the same men who robbed the store and held the Long family captives in their own home, since the descriptions of the three tally perfectly, and the same type and color car they were driving carried a license plate stolen in Tahoka.

The three have been identified as escapees from the Springfield, Mo., medical center, who already had criminal records. Charles R. Maley, 24, of Springfield, Ohio, Edward Elsbury, 21, of Marianna, Pa., and William E. McClellan, 23, of Cumberland, Md.

They escaped from the medical center, along with two other inmates, captured earlier, on December 1, and are being investigated in a series of crimes across Oklahoma and Texas.

They are charged with the robbery of a service station near Sanders, Ariz., on Tuesday night of last week. McClellan was apprehended soon afterward, the other two escaped into the desert country, and were caught after a man-hunt over a large area.

Sheriff Floyd says they have been charged here with robbery but it is doubtful if they will be returned here for trial. While at the Long home, they are alleged to have taken some of their clothes and to have stolen a gun belonging to Leroy Davis.

Supt. A. L. Pace of New Home reports that his boys' basketball team recently won second place in the Roosevelt tournament and third place in the New Deal tournament. The New Home girls carried away first place honors in the Roosevelt event.

## Election Monday On Re-allocation Of County Funds

All qualified Lynn county voters are urged to go to the polls Monday, December 22, to pass judgment on the proposal to re-allocate Lynn county funds for the purpose of building some more farm-to-market roads.

Ballots will be available at the usual voting places in the various precincts.

The commissioners' court of this county propose to build some more roads if the issue is approved favorably by the voters.

But, to do so, it will be necessary for the voters to approve the re-allocation of certain county funds.

Building of additional roads can be accomplished by issuing warrants on the Road and Bridge Fund to the amount of approximately \$120,000, which together with the bond and gasoline tax funds now on hand will complete the road running from a point on the Post-Tahoka highway, three miles east of Tahoka seven miles south and four miles west to the Tahoka-O'Donnell highway, just south of the big lake on the latter highway; and to complete the road from one mile east of Wells north ten miles to the Tahoka-Brownfield highway at a point six miles west of Tahoka; and two and one half miles of road north from the West Point gin toward Lakeview.

County Judge Tom Garrard is authority for the statement that re-allocation of the funds will not increase the county's tax rate one cent, but will permit use now of surpluses and anticipated revenue from the rapidly increasing county's portion of the four-cent gasoline tax fund.

Warrants could be issued without the election on a 20 year basis, but if the voters give their approval to the re-allocation, the warrants and bonds may be issued on a ten-year basis and thereby save about \$22,000 in interest. All qualified voters of the county are urged to express their opinions by voting next Monday.

For farmers information on 1947 Income Tax.

**Income subject to Tax:** All cash and value of merchandise received from sale of livestock, livestock products, crops, etc., and cash and value of merchandise received for work and other services outside the farm. All AAA payments received should be included.

**Expenses that may be Deducted:** Cost of livestock, livestock products and crops purchased this year or in previous years which are sold in 1947. If desired, depreciation may be taken on livestock for work, breeding, or dairy purposes. All ordinary and necessary expenses in feeding and raising livestock, as well as all other disbursements in crop production, cultivating and processing. Depreciation on farm buildings (except residence), permanent improvements, and machinery and equipment. Depreciation on small orchards, usual charge on small tools, death losses, of purchased livestock; taxes including State, County, School and Poll; auto and truck licenses, gifts to charitable, religious, and educational institutions, and medical expenses in excess of 5% of net income.

Bill-Griffin, County Agent has ready for distribution a sheet on the Farm business that is valuable to the farmer, at Income tax time.

grace of God should taste death for every man". Heb. 5:8-9. John says, "He (Christ) is the propitiation for our sins; and not for ours only, but also for the sins of the whole world". I. Jno. 2:2.

From the above passages we learn that God is willing for all men to be saved. We learn that Jesus tasted death for every man.

**Who Will Be Saved?**  
From passages given above we have learned that the sinner is elected to salvation according to the foreknowledge of God, that the sinner is chosen according to the will of God, and called by the Gospel. Since God is no respecter of persons, and Christ tasted death for all men, "Who Then Will Be Saved?" Heb. 5:8-9 says, "Christ is the author of eternal salvation unto All Them That Obey Him". 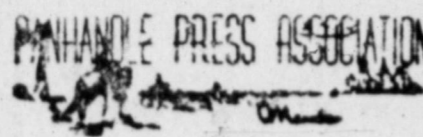

**SAFETY PRECAUTIONS GIVEN FOR WASHING**

LUBBOCK, Dec. 18.—Washing clothes with an electric washing machine is not generally considered a hazardous undertaking, but certain safety precautions should be observed to prevent accidents, according to Miss Lois M. Drew, assistant professor of home management at Texas Technological College.

The cord to the machine should be covered with rubber, and if an extension cord is used it, too, should be rubber insulated to prevent the wires from becoming wet. Electric switches should never be touched when the machine operator is holding wet clothes, standing on a wet floor, or when her hands are damp, Miss Drew warned.

Winter rain and the increase in darkness and semi-darkness make December walking more hazardous. This means, says the Texas Safety Association, that pedestrians should be even more careful not to walk against a red light, not to cross the street in the middle of the block, and not to relax their vigilance for an instant out in the street.

**FREEZE THE FOWLS**

COLLEGE STATION, Dec. 18.—With the emphasis on better management of the poultry flock to save money and grain, there will be a lot of roosters and poor layers lined up for the freezer locker this year.

Roy Snyder, extension poultry marketing specialist for Texas A. & M. College, says that home preparation of poultry for the freezer locker is comparatively easy. The main thing to remember is that no time should be lost between killing and freezing.

It is very important that the birds be well-bled. The temperature of the scalding water should be 128 deg. F. Pierce the brain, just as though the bird was going to be dry-picked. The feathers will pull a little easier and the skin will be in better condition for storage.

Tie the wings and legs down on birds for roasting or baking, to make a more compact package.

If the temperature of the freezer is maintained at zero deg. F., well-packaged poultry can be kept six to 12 months.

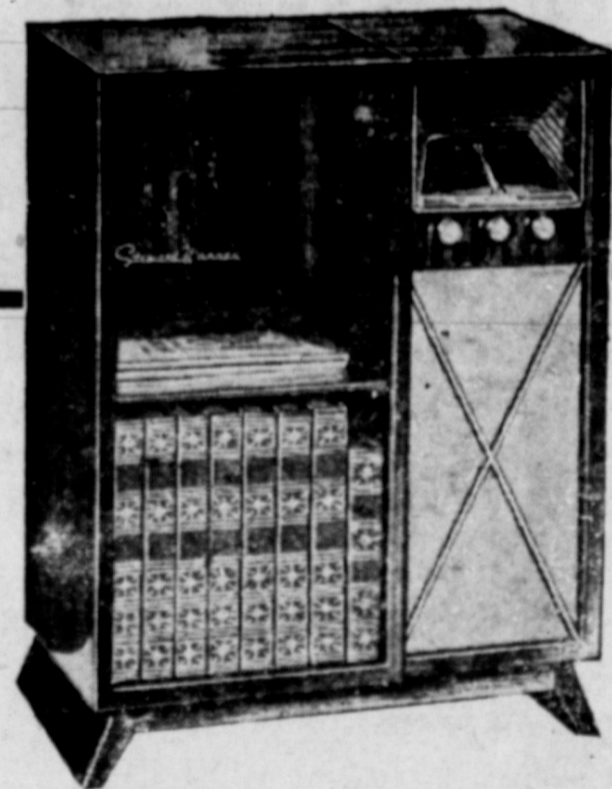

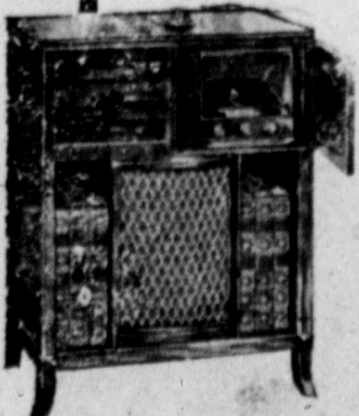
