## Tahoka Bulldogs Still Undefeated In Basketball

Tahoka Bulldogs opened their official 1948 conference basketball season Tuesday night at O'Donnell with a victory over Coach Gano Tubb's O'Donnell Eagles, the score being 37 to 23. In an unofficial "B" team game, O'Donnell won 23 to 14.

Tonight, Friday, Coach Jake Jacobs' Bulldogs will play their first home game, meeting the speedy Sundown team. Tahoka eked out a win over Sundown in the recent Post tournament, and the Hockley county crew will be seeking revenge tonight.

So far this season, the Bulldogs have won five games and lost none, all played away from home. It is hoped by the boys that a large crowd of home fans will be out for tonight's game.

Last week end, the Bulldogs carried away first honors in the second annual Post Invitational tournament, defeating the supposedly powerful Seminole Indians 35 to 27 in the preliminaries, defeating O'Donnell 33 to 22 in the semifinals, and then out-pointed Sundown 40 to 34 for the championship and a beautiful trophy.

Seminole took the championship in the consolation bracket, defeating Post.

The Bulldogs met Seminole Friday night, and the schedule forced them to pull the super-human stunt of playing two games Saturday night, O'Donnell at 7 o'clock and Sundown at 9 o'clock. The Tahoka boys finished the latter game utterly exhausted, but the score by quarters shows that they put on the steam in the fading minutes of the second game. They were behind 6 to 9 at the end of the first quarter, were tied 18-18 at half-time, were behind 27 to 23 at three-quarter time, and scored 13 points to Sundown's 6 in the final quarter.

Don D. Cowan was high point man of the tournament with 38 points, while Captain Finis Botkin was close behind. These two boys and Gilbert Hough, Joe Don Minor, Duane Carter, Wayne Sherrord, and Bob Boyd all played excellent games.

Coach Jacobs says the boys are showing improvement with every game, and he hopes to have them functioning as a smoother playing team soon.

## Tournament Is Next Week End

Tahoka High School will hold its annual Boys Invitation Basketball Tournament in the local gymnasium Friday and Saturday of next week, January 16 and 17, with trophies to be presented winners of first, second, and third places and winner of the consolation bracket. Gold basketballs will be presented the all-tournament team selected by participating coaches.

Teams already entered in the tournament are Denver City, Sundown, Seagraves, O'Donnell, Post, Slaton, and Tahoka.

Four games will be played Friday night, beginning at 7:30, four will be played Saturday afternoon and three will be played Saturday night. The definite schedule will be given in next Friday's paper.

Tahoka is expected to furnish sleeping quarters Friday night and breakfast Saturday morning for the boys and their coaches. Any citizen who can furnish rooms for two or more boys is requested to call the Student Council or Coach Jake Jacobs at the High School immediately. Here is a good-will and kind deed opportunity for our citizens. From 80 to 100 visiting basketball boys will be here for the two days and at least half of them must remain here over-night.

## New Buildings, Street Lights Improving Wilson As Lynn County Trading Center

The dawn of the new year found considerable building activity and a number of recent improvements in Wilson, our sprightly little neighbor to the north.

Postmaster Pat Campbell is constructing a cold storage food locker plant. It is being constructed of hollow tile and is about 53 by 60 feet in size, situated on the corner lot immediately north of the Wilson State Bank and facing east. Its capacity will be sufficient to accommodate many customers and will be a distinct asset to the town. Mr. Campbell has had previous experience in this kind of business, being the owner of a similar plant in Brownfield.

Another building under construction is a combination service station and grocery store, being built and to be operated by W. O. Kieschnick. It is a frame building finished outside with stucco and inside with sheetrock, 36 by 38 feet in size, facing north on the farm-to-market highway and situated just west of the Masker Service Station.

Osa Gattis, formerly of Tahoka, recently finished a small building facing east on Main Street next door north of the theatre building, which had also been con-

structed during the past year, and had just opened a combination drug store and cafe therein. The building had been neatly furnished, curtain fixtures installed, and the business is being operated as the O. & G. Drug store.

Another improvement of which the town is very proud is the installation of electric street lights. Ten lights had been installed and the number was expected to be increased to about 25. The lights had been turned on for the first time just before Christmas and are still the talk of the town.

A visit to the three cotton gins in Wilson revealed that more than nine thousand bales of cotton had been ginned there this season. In addition to this many bales had been brought to the yard there from near-by gins for shipment, and the cotton yard was the biggest one Wilson has ever had. Two or three barrack buildings had been purchased and moved in by the Farmers' Cooperative Gin, of which D. C. Newsom is the manager, several months ago for the use of the gin.

A number of small residences have also been built in Wilson recently. The town is enjoying quite a little boom.

## Bank Deposits Set New Record

The prosperity of Lynn county is reflected in the statement of The First National Bank of Tahoka published in this paper this week.

Deposits shown by this statement are the largest in the history of the Bank. Individual deposits subject to check amount to \$6,213,671.56. Time deposits, Government and political subdivision deposits and other deposits run the total up to \$6,532,947.58.

Deposits in the First National Bank of O'Donnell are reported to be approximately \$3,000,000.00 and in the Wilson State Bank more than \$1,500,000.00, making a total of approximately \$11,000,000.00.

## Man Is Killed In Plane Crash

One man was killed and another was seriously injured when an airplane in which they were hunting coyotes crashed between 5:30 and 6 o'clock Sunday afternoon just inside the Lynn-Terry county line about sixteen miles west of Tahoka.

James Ira Wright, 36, was the death victim and Goyd Wilson, about 26, sustained a fracture of one of the legs above the knee the bone being badly shattered. Both men lived in Brownfield. Wright was the pilot of the light airplane. He was co-owner of the Wright & Eves Radio shop in Brownfield. Wilson is a mechanic, employed in a Chevrolet shop there.

Wright's body was mangled and his head crushed. His body was first brought to the Stanley Funeral Home here but was later turned over to a Brownfield funeral home, where it was prepared for burial. Funeral services were held in Brownfield.

Wilson was taken to the Treadaway-Daniell hospital, where he is being treated.

Sheriff Sam Floyd investigated the crash, the accident having occurred just inside Lynn county. There seems to have been only one eye-witness to the tragedy, P. D. McMillan, who lives south of West Point and was returning from Brownfield. He told Sheriff Floyd that the plane had been flying low and circling clumps of "shinnery," evidently trying to locate coyotes, and he saw it plunge into a sand hill. A .22 rifle was found in the plane's wreckage. Wilson had been pinned beneath the wreckage but was released by men who gathered on the scene.

## Drive Is Started Limestone Show Building, Site

Directors of the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce held an important meeting Monday night at the call of President Winston Wharton.

In co-operation with farmers and agricultural workers, plans were made for a drive for funds with which to erect a club boys, livestock show barn on the outskirts of Tahoka on some site yet to be secured.

A committee composed of Vester Botkin, Claug Wells, Tom Gayard, Albert Curry, and Hubert Tankersley, was recently named by Lynn county agricultural workers as a "big gifts committee," according to Clint Walker, Lynn County AAA secretary who is also acting secretary of the Chamber of Commerce. This committee is already at work.

The C. of C. directors were also informed that community leaders would be named later.

Plans are to erect permanent show barns and pens that may be used by 4-H and FFA boys for their annual shows and that may possibly be used for the staging of a Lynn county fair. The committee has set its goal at \$10,000.

The Chamber of Commerce also discussed plans for the annual member banquet which will be held in February.

Negotiations are under way for an oil mill to be located in Tahoka, and representatives of a large company are expected here at an early date for a survey.

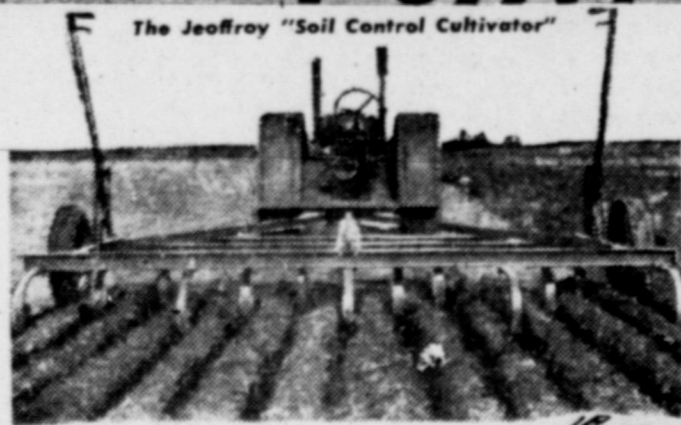

## Tahoka Fighters Win From Wilson

Last Monday night the Tahoka boxing team coached by Jim Foust won 13 of 17 fights over the Wilson boxing team before a crowd of between 700 to 800 boxing fans at the local gymnasium.

Some of Coach Jim Foust's boxers have had previous ring experience while some were boxing for their first time before the public.

The Wilson boxing team which is coached by A. D. Shores made a very impressive showing even though they only won 4 fights. Most of the boys on the Wilson boxing team, and possibly all of them, were fighting for the first time as the Wilson schools have not been training their boys how to sling leather or entered any boxing contests before.

Many of the fights were very close decisions and could have gone either way without raising any disapproval of the fans.

Good sportsmanship was shown by the boxers and by the fans all the way through the fights as the judges handed down the decisions with very little if any boating ever being made by the fans.

The fights were fast and furious from the time the first bout started until the last bout was finished. The Tahoka boxers scored one KO and two TKO's out of their 13 wins while all of Wilson's wins were by decision.

Van Brookshire, weighing 135-pounds dropped Charles Long, 136, in 40 seconds, but Long managed to stagger to his feet at the count of 8, but was out colder than a mackerel, so coach Shores shoved in the towel and Brookshire scored a TKO victory.

Bob Tippit, 138 pounder who lost most of his fights last year, surprised the local fans when he bounced out of his corner at the opening bell and sent a barrage of lefts and rights to the head of Junior Hagens, 137 pounder from Wilson, who went down for the full count. The time that had elapsed from ring of the bell to the time he hit the canvas was only six seconds and Bobby had won his first fight via the KO route.

Charles Pennington, 165 won by the TKO route when Odell Prass, 160 of Wilson failed to answer the bell starting the third round.

Garner Barham of the Tahoka team who fought his first fight Monday night looked like a coming fighter as well as Howard Wood, Brownie Williams, Joe Stone, Doug Scott, Gerald Coleman, Cordell Hagens, all of Wilson looked like coming fighters as well as all the other boys on both boxing teams. They all made fine showings, and some of them with a little more experience behind their belts will be just plain "salty" in any ring.

Walter Pond, 119 and Dan Martin, 125, both of Tahoka fought an exhibition bout that went all the way and no decision. However both boys looked good and really fought toe-to-toe all the way. Both are very promising fighters.

G. W. White, Ex-Golden Glover, Navy fighter, and Gloves champion of Oklahoma, refereed all the fights Monday night and his decisions were very popular with the crowd. Buster Driver of Tahoka and Martin Wuensche, jr., of Wilson served as judges.

#### County Is Governmental Keystone

In the system of our Democratic form of government of the county, state and nation, the most important function of such system is in the government by the counties themselves.

There are at this time more than 3,000 counties in the states of the Union, varying in number from three counties in Delaware to 254 counties in Texas. The population ranging from 235 in Loving County, Texas, according to the 1940 census, to more than three million in Cook County, Illinois, in which Chicago is located. The areas of the counties in Texas run from approximately 145 square miles in Rockwall County, to 6,208 square miles in Brewster County.

A county is a governmental subdivision of the state, which administers state laws and such laws and regulations as the state may delegate to the county, but the county is generally subject to the will of the state.

Each county has a full complement of officers whose duties are defined by law. In Texas the supreme authority in the county is the commissioners' court, composed of four commissioners and the county judge, who is the presiding officer.

The chief duties and functions of the commissioners' court are to establish and maintain public roads and highways, build and repair bridges, exercise general control over all county roads and highways; to build and repair courthouses, jails and all necessary public buildings; to audit, adjust and settle all accounts and claims in favor of the county; to provide for the support of paupers and such mentally deficient and mentally ill persons, who cannot be admitted into state hospitals, residents of this county, and who are unable to support themselves; to levy and collect taxes for the county and state; to audit and examine all reports and accounts of all county offices, and make any and all contracts of every kind for and on behalf of the county.

The judicial system of the county consists of district court, county court and justice courts.

The district court may be composed of one county or any number of counties, as provided by law, depending on the population of the county and the amount of litigation, with such terms in each county as may be provided by law. The district court is presided over by a district judge, elected by the people for a term of four years, assisted by a district attorney who represents the state in all criminal matters coming before the district court. A district clerk keeps the records and minutes of all actions of the district court. The court is also assisted by the sheriff and his deputies in carrying out the orders of the court, serving writs, and summoning witnesses and jurors.

The district courts have jurisdiction of all criminal cases in which the punishment may be fixed at confinement in the penitentiary, and original jurisdiction over all civil cases in which property of the value of \$1,000 or more is involved.

Next is the county court, presided over by the county judge, who has jurisdiction over criminal cases involving a fine or jail sentence and in civil cases where the amount in controversy is not less than \$200 nor more than \$500 and concurrent jurisdiction with the district court in case the amount in controversy is from \$500 to \$1,000. County courts also have jurisdiction over the administration of estates of dead persons and minors by guardianship, juvenile delinquents, etc.

Next the justice courts, which have jurisdiction over civil cases where the amount in controversy is \$200 or less and in criminal cases where the fine may not exceed \$200.

In all cases, civil and criminal, with minor exceptions, tried in the district, county and justice courts, the parties at interest have the Constitutional right to have their controversies and property rights and their rights to life and liberty, tried by a jury of their peers, qualified under the law, and generally of their selection. If litigants are not satisfied with the actions of the trial courts, they have their Constitutional right of appeal to the higher courts.

The appellate courts may then review the actions of the trial courts to determine whether or not a person has been given all the rights and protection to which he is entitled under Constitution and laws. However, litigants and persons who are aggrieved at actions of the trial courts, have no point of contact with the appellate courts, other than to have such courts review the written record of trial courts, with the right to be heard in such appellate courts by attorney. It can readily be seen therefore, that the local courts of the county are the only courts of the land, in most cases, in which interested parties appear personally before the courts and juries, testify in and have witnesses testify for and on their behalf.

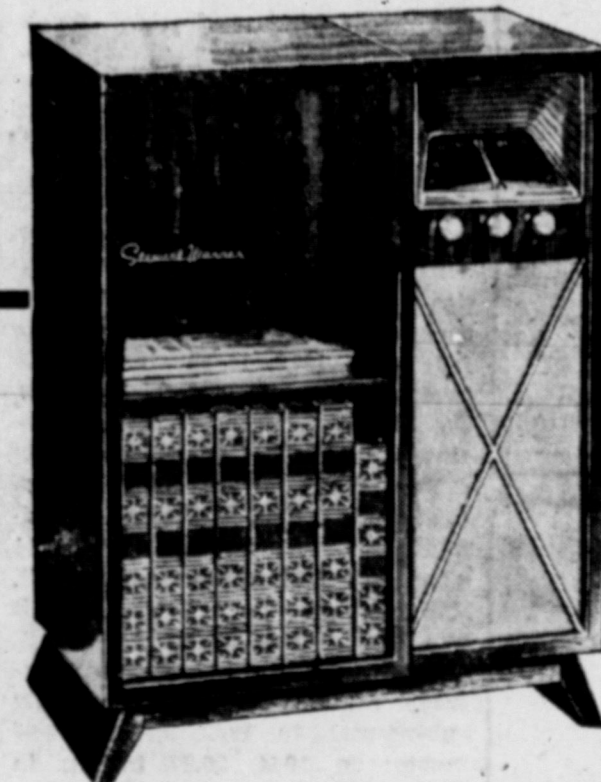

the officiating minister. An impressive double ring ceremony was performed. The bride wore a light blue suit with black accessories and a corsage of pink roses. After a wedding trip to Houston, the couple are at home in Tahoka at the former Jarrell Brown place, which they have purchased.

### 1947 Rainfall In County Very Light

Lynn county made its big cotton and feed crops the past year on practically one rain. A reference to the rainfall records kept from day to day by the local observr for the U. S. Weather Bureau proves that fact. That rain amounting to 3.22 inches fell on the 10th day of May. The total rainfall during that rainy spell, May 9-10-11, was 3.41 inches. Another rain of about an inch and a quarter and a few light showers on other days in that month ran the total rainfall in Tahoka during the month of May up to 5.54 inches. Only 5.87 inches fell during the eleven other months in the year, and that includes the moisture content in a few small snows.

Of the 11.41 inches which fell during the year, exactly two inches fell in October, November, and December, entirely too late to affect in any way the year's crop yield. Only 3.87 inches fell in the months of January, February, March, April, June, July, August, and September combined. That proves that the May rains, almost two-thirds of which fell in one day, made the crops. If that 3.22 inches of rain which fell on May 10 had not fallen it seems conclusive that very little cotton and very little feed would have been produced.

There is something else very remarkable about 1947's crop yield. The rainfall for the preceding two years had also been unusually light. In 1945, the total rainfall as registered by the U. S. rain gauge here amounted to only 11.52 inches and for the year 1946 to only 14.52 inches. The annual average for the two years was 13.02 inches. The average for the three years, 1945-1946-1947, was only 12.48 inches. It is beginning to look as if water were not essential to crop production out here in Lynn county. The crops were exceedingly light in 1945 and 1946, however. What has astounded our people is that with this background and this year's meager rainfall, Lynn county produced one of the best crops in its history.

This past year's rainfall record was compiled not only to satisfy our own curiosity but also in response to a request from the Soil Conservation Office here. This office has prepared a graph showing the rainfall in this county every year since 1912. It shows that the average annual rainfall here for the 34 years from 1913 to 1946 inclusive is 18.97 inches.

This graph affords an interesting study. The lightest annual rainfall in that period was in 1934 when only 8.91 inches of water fell. The year of the heaviest rainfall was 1941, when 39.81 inches fell. During the last five years the average rainfall has been unusually sub-normal. In 1943 it was 15.95 inches; in 1944, 20.27 inches; in 1945, 11.52 inches; in 1946, 14.52 inches; in 1947, 11.41 inches; an average for the five-year period of 14.73 inches.

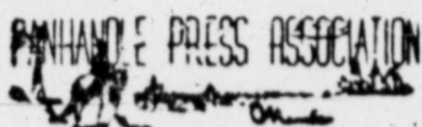

**A LITTLE MORE CANDOR, PLEASE**

We do not know how many candidates there will be this year for the important and exalted office of United States Senator from Texas to succeed W. Lee O'Daniel. By declaring his desire to run for the office of vice-president as the running-mate of General MacArthur on an independent ticket, and by his bitter and unrelenting criticism of the Democratic party for the past three or four years, Senator O'Daniel has practically taken himself out of the race for the United States Senate as a Democrat.

So far, former Governor Coke Stevenson is the only man who has formally announced as a candidate, and he has announced without a platform. It may be true as he suggested that the average political platform is not worth much, but still the people will want to know and should know how a candidate stands on issues that are likely to arise. In spite of his re-

nunciation of platforms, Mr. Stevenson takes the trouble to state to the people that he is opposed to Government Bureaucracy and Federal infringement upon the rights of the States. He also put himself on record as opposed to Communism. He says he favors European aid, but he does not state how much aid or what character of aid he would favor. He says he is not an isolationist but urges that Americans be not short-sighted in extending aid to Europe. It seems to us that he is trying to place himself in the position of being able to teach her "round or flat" as political exigencies of the future may require.

We can only hope that as political issues emerge as the campaign progresses, Mr. Stevenson may be able to take sides one way or the other. We have admired and supported him in the past but we should like for him now to be a little more explicit.

Dr. W. R. White, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Austin, has been elected president of Baylor University to succeed former Governor Pat M. Neff, who had been serving as Baylor's president for fifteen years and whose recent resignation took effect on January 1. Governor Neff, 75, has had a brilliantly successful career. Dr. White, 55, has been just as eminently successful, although he has never served as governor and has never been a candidate for office. He has made his impress, however, on the legislative history of this state. Pari mutuel horse race gambling most undoubtedly would have been legalized in Texas last year, had not "Billie" White, the brilliant and eloquent Austin pastor, intervened at the crucial moment and brought about its defeat. The gamblers quietly got in their work with the legislature and secured the passage of the bill through the House before the religious forces of the state scarcely realized what was happening. At that instant, "Billie" White sprang into the fight, made a clarion call

for the religious forces to assemble in Austin and protest to the members of the legislature. They did so in great numbers, many members of the legislature gradually faced about, and on another vote the infamous measure was gloriously defeated. To "Billie" White, more than to any other one man, is due the credit for that reversal of action on the part of the legislature. "Billie" White has never been governor but he would make a good one any day. He has a higher calling, however, and he now has the opportunity to make his impress upon thousands of the youth of Texas as president of one of our great educational institutions.

**PLENTY OF WATER IN HOCKLEY COUNTY**

COLLEGE STATION, Jan. 1. — The level terrain of Hockley county is underlaid with an abundant supply of water, and approximately 35,000 acres of the 324,000 acres of cropland is under irrigation.

Artie B. Forehand, county agent, says that more and more farmers are becoming interested in irrigation farming and he believes the reason for it can be laid to two things: The dry weather during the past months, which convinced farmers that irrigation is a good thing in spite of the cost, and the fact that in many instances, the increased yields from irrigated farms this year paid for the cost of irrigation installation.

Forehand says that the possibility of having irrigated permanent pastures is a big consideration. Most of the farmers who have come to him for help in locating well sites have talked of the need for alfalfa pastures for hogs and mixed legumes and grasses for cattle.

Such pastures, Forehand says, will lead to an increase in the number of livestock on the farms and more livestock will mean a better balanced and more stable system of farming in Hockley county.

## West Texan Is On High Court

John Edward Hickman, associate member of the Texas Supreme Court was appointed Monday as Chief Justice of that great tribunal, and he will doubtless become a worthy successor to Chief Justice James P. Alexander who died last week.

Justice Alexander was a jurist of outstanding ability and a man of high character. He was a distinct credit to Texas and to her judicial system. Justice Hickman has already won a reputation also as a great jurist and a good man.

He had won a reputation as an able lawyer before being elected in 1926 as associate justice of the Texas Court of Civil Appeals for the Eastland district. He was a member of that court until 1935 when he was appointed to a place on the commission of appeals, which had been created to assist the supreme court in disposing of the cases coming before that tribunal. When the membership of the supreme court was increased from three to nine members by constitutional amendment a few years ago, Hickman became a full-fledged member of the supreme court, and has served with distinction.

Hickman is a member of the Masonic fraternity and of the Methodist Church. He has taught a large Bible class in the University Methodist Church in Austin for several years. For 27 years he has been one of the trustees of Southern Methodist University of Dallas.

It was the privilege of the editor of this paper to become acquainted with Judge Hickman years ago when he was a young lawyer, and we admired him very much. We

## WHAT HAPPENS TO A COLLEGE GIRL'S MONEY?

LUBBOCK, Jan. 1. — Parents have wondered for many years, but it took a senior economics class at Tech College to answer the question of what happens to a college girl's money.

According to a survey conducted among Tech coeds, the average girl spends \$5.32 per week over and above room and board and clothing. Largest single item, \$1.89 to be exact, is spent on sodas and snacks. The girls are well groomed, spending an average of 96 cents weekly for cleaning and pressing bills, 61 cents for cosmetics and 43 cents for laundry and soap. The typical girl spends about 40 cents a week taking herself to the movies, and another 30 cents for bus fare. Cigarettes take another 22 cents, while magazines set at the rate of about eight cents worth per coed per week.

And here's why parents seldom hear from their college daughters: the average coed spends only nine cents weekly on stamps, which allows for only three letters if none of them are air mail. Six cents weekly is the stationery allowance.

And the girls keep pretty accurate records, as shown by the fact that only 28 cents a week is spent for "miscellaneous."

## Methodist Pastors At Lubbock Meet

Rev. John W. Rosenberg, pastor of the Tahoka Methodist Church, and other Methodist pastors in the county have been attending the Northwest Texas Conference school of evangelism in session in Lubbock from Monday until Friday of this week.

In addition to this general evangelistic conference, many of the pastors and leading laymen have been conducting at the same time local evangelistic campaigns in their own home towns and communities.

Pastor Rosenberg has been coming home each afternoon and on three afternoons he was accompanied by other pastors and all met each evening with a group of laymen, lunched together, and then went out on personal evangelistic tours into the homes of the people doing evangelistic visitation.

Other pastors who have been assisting him in this work are Rev. Ray Copeland of Goree, Rev. Royce Wcmack of Abilene, Rev. Lynward Harrison of Brownfield, and Rev. John English of Baird. Local laymen engaged in the work include John Silver, J. M. Uzzle, Hick Gibson, and Billy Ed Ware.

This is a means heretofore adopted by the Methodist Church governing bodies of the United States for the evangelization and enlistment of the unchurched people throughout the country and in the vicinity of the various local churches. It is coming more and more into practice each year in this part of the country.

Schools of evangelism like the one being held in Lubbock this week are held some time during the year in all the General Conferences of the United States.

At the Lubbock conference this week, new impetus was given to a movement suggested months ago by Bishop Charles C. Seelman for the establishment of Protestant parochial schools to supplement the work of the public schools by giving courses in religious instruction and training. Since this can not be done in the public schools, many children grow up without receiving any knowledge whatever of the Bible and without receiving any religious instruction or training. Even the children who attend various church Sunday schools oftentimes get only a meager knowledge of the teachings of the Bible.

The Methodist Church is therefore beginning to consider the establishment of so-called parochial schools in which it can partly remedy this deficiency in the religious education of the children of our country.
