## Eight Teams Are In Tournament Starting Tonight

Eight boy's cage teams will compete in the local gymnasium tonight, Saturday afternoon, and Saturday night in the annual Tahoka Boy's Invitation Basketball tournament.

Teams entered are: Denver City, Seagraves, Sundown, Slaton, Post, O'Donnell, and Tahoka A and B teams.

Four games will be played tonight, beginning at 6:30 o'clock tonight, when Tahoka B and O'Donnell will play. At 7:30, Post and Sundown will compete; at 8:30, Slaton and Tahoka A; and at 9:30 Denver City and Seagraves.

The Tahoka-Slaton game is a conference contest also.

Saturday, beginning at 1:00, there will be four games, each starting on the hour. Saturday night, the consolation teams will play at 7:00 o'clock, the third and fourth teams will play for third place at 8:00, and the finals will be at 9:00.

Trophies will be presented first, second, third and consolation winners, and a sportsmanship trophy will be presented one of the contestants.

The new electric scoreboard has been installed, and this device will add greatly to the enjoyment of the game by fans.

Curtis Barrett and "Stumpy" Hamilton of Lubbock City Recreation department, will be the tournament officials.

Tahoka citizens will entertain in their homes tonight members of the visiting teams who wish to remain here overnight.

Admission charges to each session are 25 and 35 cents.

## Bulldogs Win One Game, Lose One

Tahoka Bulldog basketball team won one and lost one conference game during the past week's play. Tonight they play Slaton a conference game here as a part of the tournament. Next Tuesday night the Bulldogs meet the highly touted Abernathy Angolopes on the Tahoka court.

Friday night, Tahoka was nosed out by Sundown 32 to 34 in a hard-fought hair-raising game played here, the first home game for the Bulldogs, who have won six and lost one.

The Bulldogs had defeated Sundown in the Post tournament finals 40 to 37 and naturally the victory here was sweet revenge for the visitors. Friday night, the Bulldogs just could not "click" and lost to a team which played better basketball. Cowan was high-point man for Tahoka with 12 points, while the two Ethridge boys of Sundown scored 22 of their team's points.

The B team also lost to Sundown in a close curtain-raiser 20 to 23. Tuesday night, Tahoka defeated Post in a game played at Post by a score of 37 to 16. The score was tied 4-all at end of the first quarter, Tahoka led at half-time 15 to 12, had enlarged the breach to 22 to 16 at end of the third quarter, and held Post scoreless in the fourth while pushing its own score to 37. ## Tahoka Is Ranked High Financially

According to statistics published in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal Sunday, Tahoka stands seventh among all the towns and cities of the South Plains in the amount of their bank deposits. Those surpassing Tahoka are Lubbock, Plainview, Littlefield, Lamesa, Brownfield, and Levelland. Tahoka cut-strips Floydada, Slaton, Post, Spur, and all others in this area. Lubbock of course led the list with \$90,669,303.99.

Others listed were as follows: Plainview \$24,463,843.00 Littlefield \$6,667,912.77 Lamesa \$4,497,909.54 Brownfield \$12,840,765.75 Levelland \$9,204,499.26 Tahoka \$6,532,947.58 Floydada ran a close second to Tahoka, as shown by this additional list: Floydada \$6,240,324.45 Muleshoe \$4,737,520.35 Spur \$4,490,305.31 Slaton \$4,182,800.01 Post \$4,133,383.15

The News stated erroneously last week that the O'Donnell bank deposits were approximately \$3,000,000.00. We should have stated approximately \$2,000,000.00. The exact figures as published in the Avalanche-Journal were \$1,940,204.31. The Wilson Bank showed deposits of \$1,534,861.64.

This foots up a total of \$10,038,013.53 for the banks of Lynn county.

The 36 banks situated in the 29 cities and towns listed by the Avalanche carry a total of \$239,678,365.81.

Fifteen South Plains counties are covered by this report including three lying mostly below the Caprock.

## County Fair And 4-H Show Barns Virtually Assured

Success of the drive to provide funds for a county livestock show site and buildings was virtually assured Wednesday night, when committee reports showed that a total of \$2,295.00 had already been subscribed to the project, and only a small percent of the county's citizens had been seen, according to Clint Walker, AAA secretary and also acting secretary of the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce.

This amount had been raised by one committee of farmers during the past week.

Wednesday night, the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce directors agreed to make solicitations among the business firms, and a committee composed of Winston Wharton, J. A. Biggerstaff, Hubert Tankersley, Alton Cain, and Clint Walker are collecting funds from the business men. They had raised an additional \$600 the first half day.

A site in Tahoka and suitable buildings have been agreed on by the farmer committee, agricultural workers, and Chamber of Commerce.

Goal of the drive is \$10,000, but not nearly that much is needed to purchase the building and site. However, improvements will be necessary, even for a 4-H livestock show.

Plans now are, however, to organize a Lynn County Fair Association, and develop the site for. (Cont'd on last page)

**FURTHER USES OF COTTON AND WOOL SOUGHT**

ABILENE, Jan. 15.—Additional money for use in exploring the possibilities of wool and mohair in West Texas has been made available through \$5000 fund authorized by the Santa Fe railroad, it has been announced by President C. P. Dodson of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. This augments a similar amount provided by the WTCC for research work now being

done by the Texas Technological College.

This research will cover both the resources and liabilities of the cotton and wool industry in West Texas for its possible use in the development of the textile industry, according to WTCC Manager D. A. Bandeen. The organization hopes through an analytical study to determine whether there are economic possibilities for such a textile industry in its area, on the basis of the production of raw materials, consumption, freight rates and manufacture.

Announcement of the \$5000 from the Santa Fe came from San Angelo where E. L. Buelow, WTCC director and chairman of the Santa Fe industrial committee and H. C. Custard, WTCC past president, met with a group of Santa Fe officials, headed by General Manager R. B. Ball. It was announced that results of the study will be made available to industry and shippers of the area served by the road, and by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

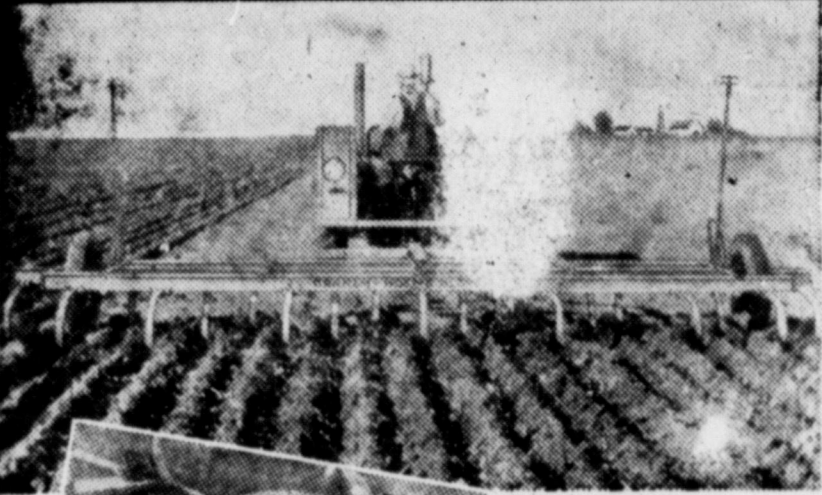
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**MANY HONOR THOMPSONS ON WEDDING ANNIVERSARY**

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Thompson, situated six miles east of Tahoka, was the center of attraction for a large circle of relatives and friends on last Friday when they observed the fiftieth anniversary of their wedding, which event occurred near Hubbard City in Hill county on January 9, 1893.

Anticipating the presence of many relatives and friends, Mr. and Mrs. Thompson made ample provision in advance for their entertainment. Tables had been arranged in the spacious yard and the noon hour found the tables loaded down with the finest barbecued meats and all the usual accessories that West Texas can produce, together with cakes, pies and other tempting viands.

When the crowd gathered around for the repast, C. C. Dwight mounted a truck and took several photographs of the crowd. After E. J. Cooper had expressed the thanks of the multitude, Railroad Commissioner Olin Culberson of Austin, a life-long friend of the couple, was called upon for a speech, to which he happily responded. Bill and Mrs. Thompson were also prevailed upon to make a few remarks, which they did with much feeling.

Not only were scores and scores of neighbors and friends present but there were also many from other counties, some of them from far-distant places.

Among these, in addition to Railroad Commission Olin Culberson, was Dean Gordon of the Texas Technological College, Mrs. Gordon, and their son Ed Gordon and his wife.

Bill and Mrs. Thompson claim the honor of having been students of the Dean when he taught his first school in a rural community down in Hill county.

Others among the visitors were Bill Thompson of Las Cruces, New Mexico, a cousin of Bill the Honoree; Mrs. Inez Soseby of Anson, another cousin, and her son Harold; Mrs. Melissa Morton of Mobeetie, a dear childhood friend of Mrs. Thompson whom she had not seen until recently in 53 years; Mr. and Mrs. Harper Moore of Clovis, New Mexico, "Booger" Moore of Elida, New Mexico, John Moore and wife and children of Clovis and "Grits" Gurley and wife of Clovis, all relatives of Mrs. Thompson; Mrs. J. T. Coker and son J. T. Jr. of Dallas, Mrs. Coker being a sister of Bill's; Mrs. Ethel Norris of Fort Worth, another sister; Wesley Stephens of Post, a friend; and numerous others whose names are not immediately available.

Bill Thompson was born in Alabama in 1879, but he had the good judgment to come on out to Texas the next year, 1880, bringing his parents along with

him. They settled in Hill county.

A few years later, little Miss Pearl Curry had the good fortune to be born in Texas, Hill county, and, fortunately or unfortunately, she met Bill early in life. The two grew up in the same community and they had scarcely gotten through the process of growing up when Bill proposed to the little lady. So, they were married near Hubbard City on July 9, 1898.

They came out to Lynn county in December, 1916, and bought a tract of land six miles east of Tahoka. They still live on it, but frequently go down to the lower Rio Grande Valley for a few weeks in the winter and out to Ruidoso, New Mexico, for another few weeks in the summer.

While this was being written, Bill dropped into the News office with a medium-sized but very smooth and pretty grapefruit and a beautiful giant orange which C. T. Tankersley had just sent him from the Valley. The folks in the editor's home will have grapefruit and orange just before breakfast tomorrow morning, and it will probably take all four of us to eat the fruit at one sitting. Thanks.

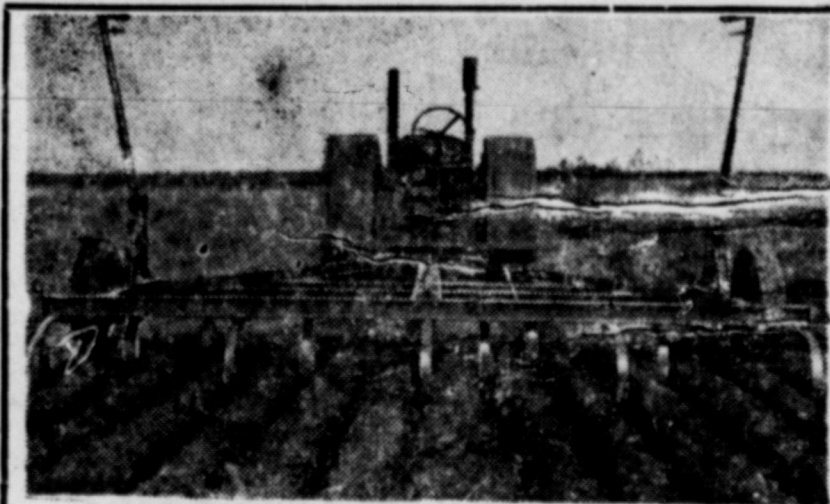

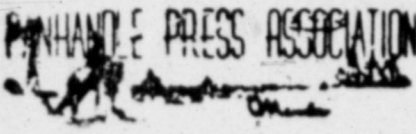

Charles Guy, editor of the *Avalanche-Journal* publications, Lubbock, was the guest speaker at the Rotary luncheon here on Thursday of last week. In the address, he covered in substance a number of the series of articles which have been running in the *Avalanche* setting forth facts and conditions in Germany as he found them on a recent visit to that country and the conclusions which he drew therefrom. His address was intensely interesting, and following its conclusion a number of questions were propounded to him, which he answered. The audience really wanted more but time forbade. One of the very satisfying conclusions that he reached was

that our own occupation forces are doing a swell job in winning the respect and friendship of the Germans and setting them on the road to democratic government. However, they have been ruled by dictators so long and have been so utterly crushed in spirit by the outcome of the war that it is a little difficult to teach them self-reliance. A very large percent of the Nazi youth are gradually relinquishing their devotion to Nazism. They think, and our soldiers there are doing a swell job in regaining the confidence and affection of the children. In fact, he declares, the greatest fear of the people generally is that the American forces will withdraw and the Russians promptly move in. They fear and hate the Russians. And, he says, there is a reason, for in conduct, in appearance, in cleanliness, in general intelligence, the American soldiers far out-class the Russians, who are slovenly, uncleanly, dull of comprehension, cruel, and vindictive. He thinks we should remain in Germany till the country is rehabilitated and placed on its feet again economically, and that we must continue to furnish substantial financial aid to Europe, whether the Marshall plan is adopted in full or in part. A number of visitors were present, and the Legion hall was well filled, but it is hoped that Mr. Guy may have the opportunity of speaking to a much larger audience here sometime in the near future.

**PAY POLL TAX AND VOTE**

Every potential voter in Lynn county who is required to pay a poll tax before being qualified to vote should take the trouble to pay such tax this month. This applies to white and colored residents alike. Under rulings of the Supreme Court of the United States, Negroes who have paid their poll taxes when required, can no longer be barred from participation in Democratic primaries.

The payment of a poll tax as a qualification for voting was not imposed in the first place forty years ago by reason of any hatred that the Whites bore toward the Negroes, nor was the practice of barring Negroes from participation in the Democratic primaries instituted for that reason, but the poll

tax law was passed and the barring of the Negroes from the primaries was instituted in the interest of cleaner politics in this state. Every mature person living in Texas at that time and still living knows that these are the facts.

Negroes were being herded together and voted in solid bunches in great numbers according to instructions that had been given them by white men. Not all Negroes could be thus voted by corrupt white men, but vast numbers of them were being so voted. In fact, Negro "moochers" showed up in every election campaign soliciting this candidate and that candidate for a contribution to be used in obtaining Negro votes for the contributing candidate. Some of these could deliver the goods and some could not. In fact, some did not even try to do so; what they were after was the money in hand.

The most effective method to assure the Negro vote in large numbers for this candidate or that was to gather a large number of Negroes together in some appointed place on the night before the election and give them careful instructions as to the ticket to be voted. When furnishing them with the names of the favored candidates or marking sample tickets for them, and then treating them to say kegs of "John Smith Beer" or "Bill Jones whiskey." The next day they swarmed at the election polls like black-birds and voted.

These were the conditions that brought about the adoption of the Terrell election law and later the barring of the Negroes from the Democratic primaries. By becoming the willing spawns of corrupt white men, the Negroes brought about their own disfranchisement as voters.

It is hoped and believed that Tahoka Negroes and most others in Texas will now prove their right to the ballot, both in the general and the primary elections by their conscientious and intelligent use of it. So, we hope they pay their poll taxes and thus qualify themselves as voters in all elections this year.

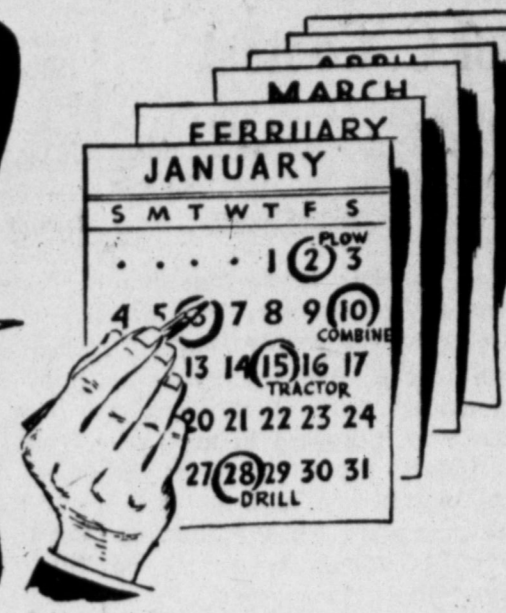

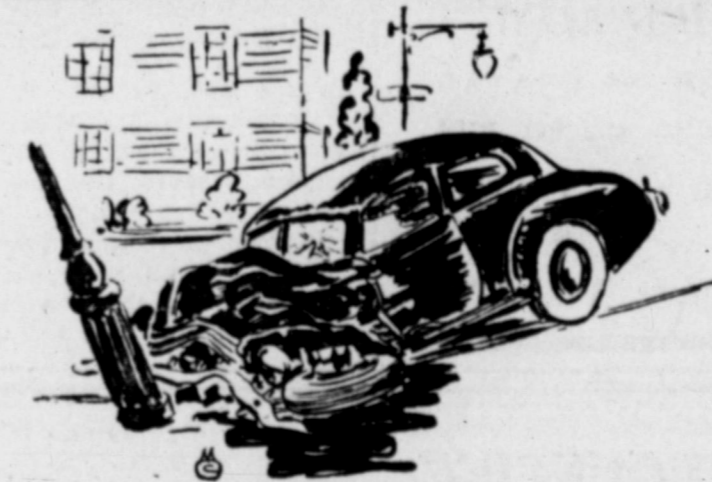

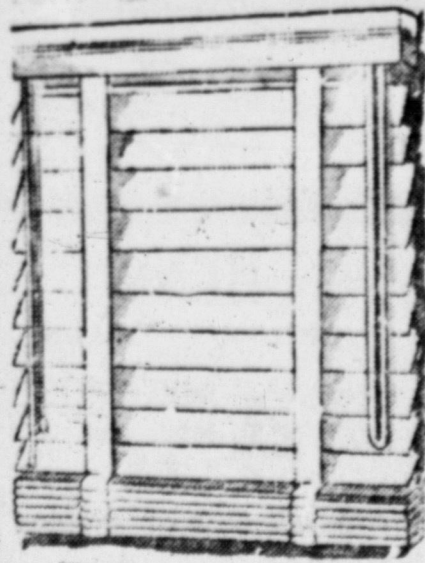

## County Keystone Of Government

(Following is the second part of an article by Judge Tom Garrard which appeared recently in The Texas Professional Engineer. The first part of the article appeared in last week's News.)

The sheriff's department is the right arm of the courts, authorized to execute the orders and judgments of the courts. In addition, the sheriff has a multitude of duties. His principal duties are to keep the peace in the county; apprehend and arrest all law violators and execute all process and precepts directed to him by legal authority.

The county clerk is ex officio clerk of the commissioners' court and keeps a record of all transactions of such court; again he is the clerk of the county court, keeps records and minutes of all proceedings of the county court, civil and criminal. He keeps full and complete records of all deeds and records affecting in any manner, the title of lands; and a financial record of all receipts and disbursements of county funds; issues mar-

riage licenses; records birth and death certificates and touches the most intimate affairs of the people of the county from the cradle to the grave. He also keeps records of the administration of estates of dead persons and of minors who have lost one or both parents.

The county school superintendent is a most important officer, who supervises all matters pertaining to public education in the county; apportions state and county school funds; approves teachers' contracts and vouchers; supervises and distributes free textbooks.

The county attorney has the duty of representing the state in all criminal prosecutions before the county and justice courts; advising the commissioners' court and the various officers of the county.

The county tax assessor and collector lists and assesses all property in the county for state and county tax purposes, prepares all tax rolls for the approval of the commissioners' court, collects state and county taxes, allocates such funds to the various funds of the county and state, and deposits all moneys with the county treasurer.

The duty of the county treasurer is to receive and disburse all county funds and to keep a full and complete record of all such receipts and pay all accounts of the county, approved and allowed by the commissioners' court.

All these county officers are elected by a vote of the people of the county. If any such officer fails in his duty he knows that he may be removed after the first term, which gives him more zeal in the performance of his duties, and makes him subject to the will of the people of the county he represents.

Thus it may be seen that the whole system of county government is closer and more intimately connected with the very hearthstones of our people than any branch of our government. From the time a person is born until he dies, the county records his personal and private affairs, giving him a certificate of birth, a license to marry; a public education, a record of title to any real estate he may own; protects him in life and property; gives him a guardian if he is left fatherless or motherless; protects him in his sleeping as well as his waking hours; and finally when he lays down this mortal coil and has the robes of immortality draped about him, the county will bury him, if unable to bury himself, and then furnish a certificate of death, which in many cases is of vital importance to those who follow after.

From all the above it doesn't require much of a "seer" to determine that the local county government is more closely and intimately connected with the life of the citizen, in every form and station of life, than any other branch of our state or national government, and is therefore his most important governing agency.

Every citizen of the county, in his everyday life and business relations, has direct personal and intimate contact with his county government and officers to a far greater extent than to any other government agency of the State or Nation. Every citizen of the county has or will have personal acquaintance and friendship with his county officers as long as he lives, while only very few ever see or have any personal contact with state and national officers; com-

One of our most recent and successful Texas governors and the strong sincere, efficient and high-minded President of this Nation are both former county judges, schooled in the very fundamentals of local self-government, humbled by intimate contact with the fire-sides of the land, and with personal knowledge and experience in the needs, wishes and desires of the family life of the state and nation.

Who therefore, can deny that the place of the county government is first and all-important in a democratic system of government?

 Property valuations in Lynn county amount to \$6,755,562, according to the tax rolls.  
 County taxes collected amounted to \$87,188.94, or 75 cents of the

total charged on the rolls.  
 State taxes collected amount to \$25,406.91, or 25 per cent of the total on the rolls.  
 Total poll tax receipts and exemptions issued, 1,653.  
 Number of cars, trucks, and trailers registered, with 1947 plates, 4,058.  
 Total car titles processed, 2,373.  
 By January 31, 1948, the deadline for paying poll taxes and the penalty date or all unpaid state and county taxes, collections will be approximately 98 per cent of actual taxes charged.  
 Poll taxes and exemptions for persons becoming 21 years old during 1947 must be issued before February 1, 1948.  
 Starting on February 1, 1948, a penalty will be added to all state and county taxes remaining on the roll as unpaid.

For the years 1943 through 1938, the U. S. supplied 4.6 percent of all grains for world export. In 1946 and 1947, with almost no change in the amount of grains moving in world trade, the U. S. supplied 52.4 percent.

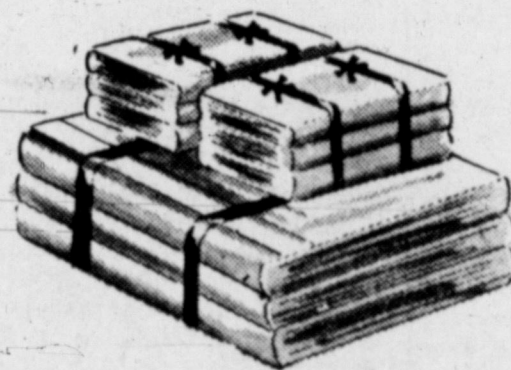
