

MILLMANS OBSERVE GOLDEN WEDDING ANNIVERSARY

It was a happy occasion last Friday when old-time friends and others gathered at the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Millman to honor them on the 50th anniversary of their wedding.

In spite of the inclement weather, scores of the pioneers of this town and county called to congratulate them, leave gifts, and to rejoice with them awhile as they recalled the happy events of the past. Newer friends also called to pay their respects and to honor the aged couple.

Out-of-town relatives and friends who were present included Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Wilkison and daughter Miss Isla Wilkison of Ropesville, Mr. Wilkison being a brother of Mrs. Millman; Mr. and Mrs. Riley Galley of Ropesville, Mrs. Galley being Mrs. Millman's niece; Mr. and Mrs. Odean Millman of Lubbock, Odean being a son of the honorees; Mrs. Arthur Taylor of Abilene, their daughter, who came up Thursday and remained until Sunday; Mrs. W. H. McCallon of Shallowater, mother of Mrs. Odean Millman; and of course their son Buster Millman of Tahoka was present.

Those who could not come but sent gifts included Mrs. H. I. Flynn, Mrs. Elizabeth Conniff, and

Mr. and Mrs. Millman were married in the home of Mrs. Millman's parents in Abilene on Sunday morning at 8 o'clock on January 16, 1898, Rev. Mr. Hicks, a Methodist minister, performing the ceremony. Her maiden name was Beulah Wilkison. She recalls that soon after the wedding ceremony the couple left in a two-horse buggy for Roby, where Mr. Millman lived. He had been making his home there with a sister. Not only was there a good sized crowd present that morning to witness the marriage ceremony but there was also a large crowd at the big supper given in their honor in the home of Mr. Millman's sister in Roby that evening.

Mr. Millman had been born at Lawrenceville, Illinois about 1862 but migrated to Roby at the age of about 21, which was in the early 'eighties. He had been in that area therefore 15 years or more preceding his marriage. Mrs. Millman had come with her parents from Dawson, Navar county, where she was born, to Abilene. For 1 1/2 years after their marriage, they continued to live at Roby and then came to Tahoka, arriving in May. The county had just been organized and the town of Tahoka laid out and the foundation for a school house was being laid when they arrived.

They bought some lots and erected a modest little home thereon and have lived at the same place ever since, although part of the time in another house erected later.

Mr. Millman has engaged in farming and other occupations since then but in those pioneer years he was a freighter, and he hauled much of the lumber that went into many of the early homes in Tahoka.

Many gifts were received by the happy couple Friday.

The 1946-47 edition included biographical sketches of more than fifteen hundred students representing more than two hundred schools.

As has been the custom, the Santa Fe Railway company has been distributing this month copies of Everyman's Almanac, a Santa Fe publication. One of them was sent to the News office. It is a meaty little booklet, filled with interesting or valuable bits of information, wise sayings, historical facts, little poems, clever verses, and a sprinkling of Santa Fe propaganda. This little almanac may not be a house-hold necessity in this day of numberless books, magazines, newspapers, and radios, but it is a handy thing to have about the house nevertheless. A hurried perusal of its pages brought back to us memories of a quarter-century and even a half-century ago, when no home, no two-room shack, was without one or more of the popular almanacs of the time, and everybody read them from grandma and grandpa down to the first-

graders. Many of our readers even yet probably have a copy of Ladies Birthday Almanac or some other similar literary production in their homes, but none that we have seen in recent years, is comparable to the Santa Fe publication. Benjamin Franklin started this almanac business a couple of centuries ago, and the idea seems to have stuck, as many of Benjamin's ideas did. He was one of the most versatile men this or any other country ever produced. Starting out as a printer, he became also a scientist, a philosopher, and a statesman. He not only published the first almanac but he was about the first man that ever tickled with lightning. He was tinkering with something about as dangerous when he helped to write the Declaration of Independence. He also sat in the Constitutional Convention and helped to write the Constitution of the United States and start this country out on the right track. A few Benjamin Franklins in Washington now might help some.

It cost Henry Ford \$110,411.38 to get buried, if claims filed against his estate are allowed. In round numbers, some of the items of expense were listed as: Funeral expenses \$21,980, flowers \$1,383, basket \$15,370, professional services of the choir and organist \$3,540, three ministers \$400. Press reports did not state who was to get the remaining \$68,000. We always did have a horror of dying rich, but the present prospects are that we will die happy.

General Jonathan Wainwright was quoted recently as saying that no good soldier ever made a good politician. In that connection, he said that General Eisenhower and General MacArthur are fine soldiers and he thinks it would be a mistake for them to get into poli-

We believe he is right. In the first place, many military men, whose lifetime training and service has been in the army or navy, are not fitted for the performance of the duties of a civil office, and most of them who try it come out with their wings singed. The chances are that neither Eisenhower nor MacArthur would come out of the Presidency as popular as they are now. Furthermore, the chances are that neither of them could perform the duties of the Presidential office as well as they have performed their duties in military life. General Wainwright himself has been solicited to run for the United States Senate from Texas, but he prefers to raise sheep and short-horn cattle. Wise old Wainwright.

Communism is running true to form in China. They are using violence to force their crazy ideas and their totalitarian form of government upon unwilling peoples, and since American missionaries there come from a democratic country and are thoroughly imbued with democratic ideals and Christian principles, the Communists are running them out of the country under threats of death. Russian communists, of course, are inspiring and backing up the course of the communists in China, and the more communism spreads and conquers the more aggressive, intolerant, and war-like will it become. Like Nazism, it has set out to subdue and rule the world. But a stern policy on the part of this government against Russia's ambitions is the best way to stop her and to assure world peace for the years of the immediate future, we believe.

No honest man can condone the conduct of high government officials who take advantage of the knowledge gained in these positions to feather their nests at the expense of the people. Some, apparently, have done this. They should be kicked out.

If we must have a eulogist for President during the next four years we hope the gentleman's name will be Harold E. Stassen.

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NEW HIGHWAY MARKINGS ON TEXAS HIGHWAYS

AUSTIN, Jan. 22.—Officials of the Texas Highway Department Thursday told the story about the bright yellow lines now being seen by motorists everyday throughout the vast 27,000 mile system of paved highways.

"The new yellow no-passing line being put down on our highways is a double indemnity device," State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer declared.

"It gives a flashy and obvious warning of danger to the motorists who want to protect his own life and the lives of others," he explained, "and it gives the police something definite on which to jail or punish the driver who apparently cares little for his life and thereby endangers the lives of innocent motorists in the other lane."

Last year President Truman's Highway Safety Conference urged the States to concentrate on improvement of highway center stripe in a major attempt to reduce the ghastly toll of accidents due to head-on collisions and sideswiping.

In all States the color was changed to yellow, which tests have shown is more visible in all kinds of weather than any other type of marking. This yellow color is used also to impress the motorist that where yellow is seen on the road it must not be crossed.

65,000 gallons of yellow paint are being used by the Texas Department's painting crews to mark these no-passing zones. The painting operations have been under way since November and are now moving rapidly toward completion.

Highway Department officials pointed out the state-wide yellow striping program for no-passing zones is considered the best method from the engineering point of view for temporarily combating the traffic accident menace on the highway system.

The officials are hopeful the traveling public will soon become "yellow line conscious," since crossing the yellow line is not only an invitation for loss of life and limb, but is a violation of Texas law under the new uniform traffic code making violators liable for a maximum fine of \$200.

"Do not cross the yellow line" is the new password to safer driving.

The six 4-H Club girls who will attend this camp are to be selected from the entire 4-H Club environment of the county some factors to be considered in selecting these six girls will be the amount of club work done, the records they have kept and their ability as leaders.

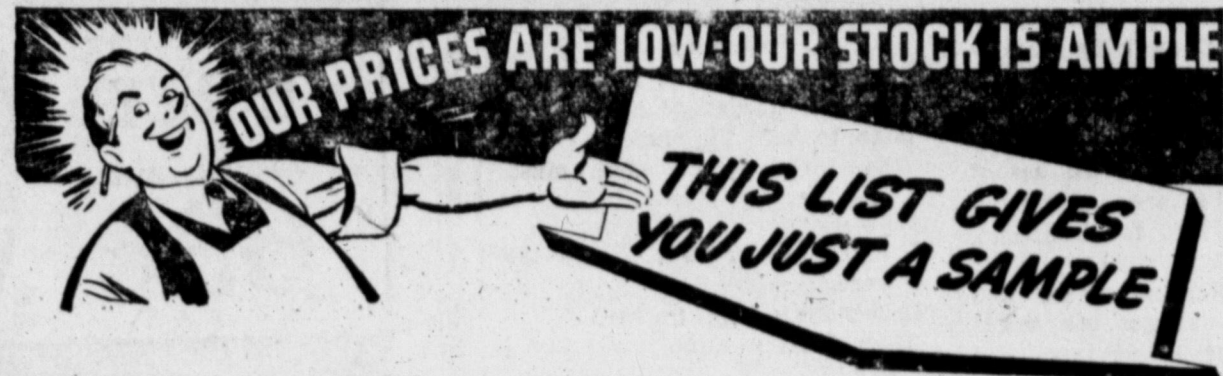

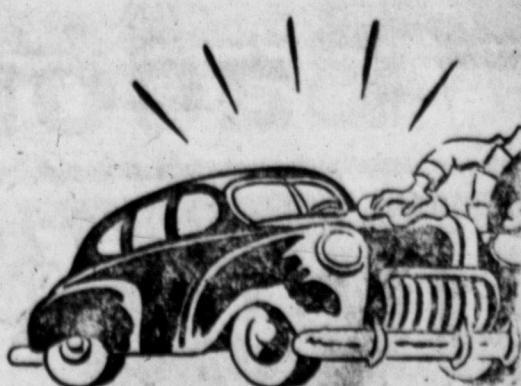

GARRARD ATTENDS WATER MEETING

Accepting a special invitation from Governor Jester, County Judge Tom Garrard attended a West Texas water conservation meeting held in Big Spring Tuesday. He was accompanied to Big Spring by Tom Hale.

Declaring that he was merely an interested listener, Judge Garrard said the discussions covered two phases of the water problem, one respecting the conservation of surface waters and the other respecting the conservation and replenishment of underground waters.

On the high plains, comparatively little water is carried away by streams. Most of the water which is not absorbed by the soil where it falls is collected into surface lakes where it eventually soaks into the earth or is evaporated.

Below the caprock, great quantities are carried away by numerous streams. It was generally recognized that as much of this runoff water as possible should be impounded by dams for the use of the people of that area, either for domestic purposes or for irrigation.

But the problem is how to go about this matter of saving and utilizing to the utmost our water supply in the various sections of the West Texas area.

In times past there have been suggestions for controlling and regulating the drilling of irrigation wells on portions of the Plains. It is agreed that any attempt to do this would run into a lot of trouble, but many people believe that eventually this will have to be done.

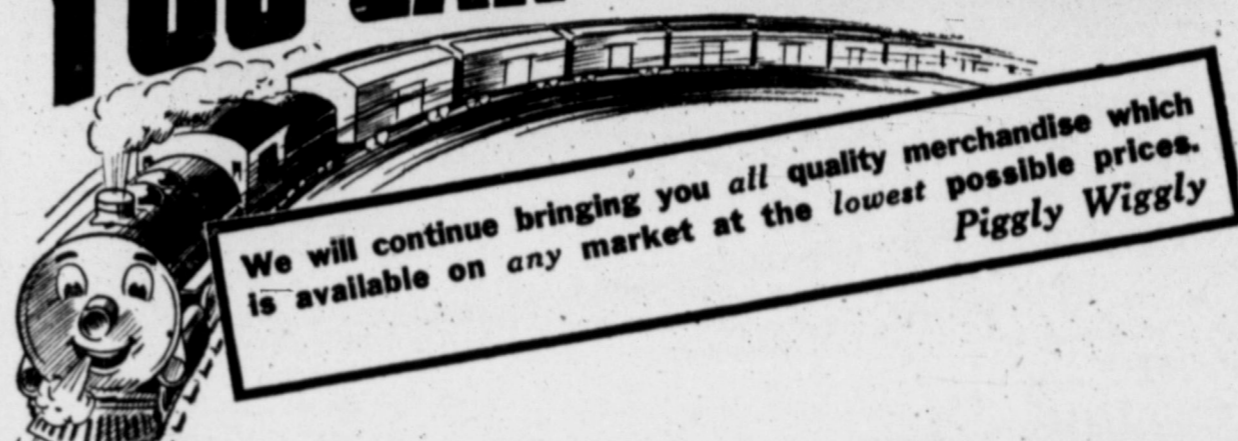

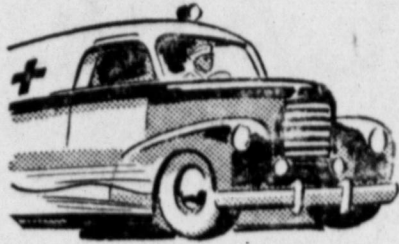

Rats found in Texas are the Norway, or common rat, and Alexandrine or roof rat. The Norway rat lives on the ground, under buildings, heaps of rubbish or in burrows, while the Alexandrine rat lives in attics, lofts, under roofs and eaves and in double walls.
