## **Bulldogs Upset Abernathy Here** In Cage Game

The Tahoka high basketeers who had started the season off with a bang, but had hit a shimp the past week or so and who had just rereived their worst defeat which was handed them by Sundown ast Saturday night in the cournament here, bounced back with the biggest upset of the season so far and defeated the highly-touted Abernathy five who are supposed to be the powerhouse in the south half of district 4-A, by a score 44 to 25.

For the first time this season, the Tahoka cagers started swishing the basket from just inside the center line. During the first half Duane Carter sank 3 shots from the sideline to keep the Bulldogs in the game with Cowan sinking Farm Valuation a last second shot to tie the game up 12-all at the half time period. Starting the second half the Bulldogs took the lead with Finis Botkin and Joe Don Minor and Don Cowan sinking shots from every angle and by the end of the third period had gone out into the lead 28 to 16.

At one time during the four.h period the Bulldogs had extended their lead to 42 to 18 but when the final buzzer sounded the score was 44 to 25.

The Tahoka five controlled the ball throughout the game with or general maintenance, the report largest crop having been produced 17. Gilbert Hough and Joe Don Minor hawking the ball away from their opponents and with Botkin, Carter, and Cowan keeping control of the ball off the backboards which was one of the main reasons the Bulldogs won by such a decisive score Botkin High Point Man

# Planned For 1948

Probably not as much over-all conservation, but a greater concentration on most needed practices is what Clarence Church, Chair. man of the Lynn County Agricultural Conservation Committee, pre, dicts under the 1948 Agricultural Conservation Program. Discia ming any gifts of prophecy, the county chairman said he bases his prediction on what he knows about farming and farmers and about the 1948 Program.

In the first place, he explains with the reduced assistance which can be offered, many farmers will not be in a position to carry out as much and as many conservation practices. The \$500 limit on the amount of assistance to any one person may have some effect in reducing the amount of conservation, but he points out that in the past comparatively few farmers received more than this amount in assistance.

The main reason we can expect even better conservation work, the chairman states, is that practices have been improving each year. The program has been developing toward more adaptability to local needs, and as farmers understand conservation better they are doing a better job.

More and more farmers are sensing their responsibility as cus. todians of the Nation's soil and what they are expected to do in return for the assistance they receive to help them carry out these needed conservation practic's.

Improved machinery and better quipment are making it possible farmers to do a better job of nd leveling: terracing: construc ion of damsh diversion ditches: nd similar practices. Better mahinery is available for the spreadng of lime and phosphate, and improved strains of grasses and lerumes will make for greener and tore productive pastures.

NEW HIGHWAY MARKINGS ON TEXAS HIGHWAYS

AUSTIN. Jan. 22.-Officials of the Texas Highway Department Thursday told the story about the bright yellow lines now being seen by motorists everyday throughout the vast 27,000 mile system of paved highways.

"The new yellow no-passing line being put down on our highways is a double indemnity device," State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer de-

'It gives a flashy and obvious warning of danger to the motorists who want to protect his own life. and the lives of others," he explained, "and it gives the police something definite on which to jail or punish the driver who apparently cares little for his life and thereby endangers the lives of innocent motorists in the other lane."

In all States the color was changed to yellow, which tests have shown is more visible in ali kinds of weather than any other type of marking. This yellow color is used also to impress the motorist that where yellow is seen on the road it must not be crossed.

65,000 gallons of yellow paint are being used by the Texas Department's painting crews to mark these no-passing zones. The painting operations have been under way since November and are now moving rapidly toward completion. Highway Department officials pointed out the state-wide yellow striping program for no passing zones is considered the best metnod from the engineering point of view for temperarily combating the traffic accident menace on the

On the high plains, comparatively little water is carried away by streams. Most of the water which is not absorbed by the soil where it falls is collected into surface lakes where it eventually soaks into the earth or is evapor-

sted. Below the caprock, great quantitles are carried away by numerous streams. It was generally recognized that as much of this runoff water as possible should be impounded by dams for the use of the people of that area, either for domestic purposes or for irrigation.

But the problem is how to go about this matter of saving and utilizing to the utmost our water supply in the various sections of the West Texas area.

In times past there have been suggestions for controlling and regulating the drilling of irrigation wells on portions of the Plains. It is agreed that any attempt to do this would run into a lot of trouble, but many people believe that eventually this will have to be done.




